We received your reception report for November 1, 1951 and wish to verify it. There has been a delay in answering due to the large volume of mail we are receiving.

The **W A N T** transmitter is located on Belle Island in the James River near the Lee bridge. The transmitter is Western Electric 353-E1 with direct crystal control. The final is two 500 watt tubes (W.E. 279's) with low level modulation. The antenna is 300 ft. uniform cross-section, guyed, series excited, vertical radiator. Ground consists of 120 radials 300 ft. long and 120 radials 30 ft. long of buried copper wire.

W A N T operates on EST daytime schedule (6:45 AM to 5:00 PM) through November. There is no regularly scheduled night test and frequency checks are made during regular broadcasting hours by Mutton Monitoring Service of Catonsville, Md.





That was the third attempt to measure the frequency as a local station in Washington interfered the first two attempts.


