Operators on vessels running to Alaska do not need to be well acquainted with the rates. The attached schedule issued by the Navy Department gives these rates in full.

Please give your special attention to Paragraph #5 of this schedule. Messages transmitted thru a Naval Station to Nome by wireless, pass thru both the Naval Station (Umanak, Dutch Harbor or St. Paul) and the Army Station at Nome; there is, therefore, a Coast Tax of 5 cents per word from both the Army and Navy Stations, total, 10 cents per word plus the Ship tax.

Messages transmitted via Kodiak, Cordova or Sitka for points in Alaska, are placed on the cable at Sitka or Cordova, and the Coast Tax is 5 cents per word, but there is an additional tax of 2 cents per word from the Naval Stations at these two points to the Signal Corps Office. (See Circular 120.)

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We are enclosing herewith for your careful study and observance the following:-

- 1.- Berlin International Radiotelegraphic Convention.
- 2.- Act of August 13th, 1912.
- 3.- Regulations Governing Radio Communication.
- 4.- Forms of Application for Operators' License.

Certain operators at the present time hold certificates of skill but these are not accepted as proper licenses and all operators are hereby instructed to prepare themselves for an examination for license which is required by law prior to December 13th, 1912.

Your attention is particularly directed to page #8 "part #2 Licenses - Operators", "1. Commercial" of Regulations Governing Radio Communication. It will be noted that knowledge of the Berlin Radiotelegraphic Convention and certain sections of the Act of August 13th is necessary in order that the applicant can secure his license. On and after December 13th, 1912, the requirements of the Berlin Radiotelegraphic Convention and of the Act of August 13th, 1912, will be fully enforced and any infraction of these regulations will subject the operator guilty thereof to the penalties prescribed.

It is therefore, necessary for operators to thoroughly familiarize themselves with all service regulations of the above Treaty and Act, and to work strictly in accordance therewith.

The application forms after being filled in are to be forwarded to the Head Office, San Francisco. Officers in charge of stations are instructed to obtain from the operators employed at their stations the application forms properly filled in, all of which are to be mailed to the Head Office.

We are confident that the large majority of our operators are capable of passing the examination of first grade commercial operators and we urge all operators to prepare themselves for that examination.

Information relative to apparatus, etc. will be forwarded shortly.

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C I R C U L A R ~~#106~~ **102**

It has been noticed that certain operators failing to transmit a message, refund the tolls to the sender, making no entries in abstracts or log sheets, and thus destroying any evidence that would enable us to investigate the cause of nontransmission, or of remedying a defective service.

ALL messages accepted from the Public MUST be entered on Form N-100 whether transmitted or not.

Messages not transmitted should be endorsed by the sender showing tolls to have been refunded. In the Remarks Column MUST be entered the reason of failure to transmit. The tolls on such messages are to be deducted from the gross total of cash received and the NET total carried to Account Current Form N-120.

Operators are earnestly requested to make a special written report to this office, giving dates and times, of any inattention, inefficiency or unnecessary remarks of ship or shore stations.

It should be borne in mind that the deficiencies of our service are being reported, and NOT the individual apparently at fault.

SUGGESTIONS TO OPERATORS AS TO WAYS OF INCREASING
THE NUMBER OF MESSAGES FILED ABOARD SHIP.

For the information of passengers prepare neat notices each day showing through what station, wireless communications may be sent and the rate per word and post same on saloon companionway bulletin, if there is one, or in some other prominent place. Make several copies of these notices and post also in the smoking room and social hall. Also put one just outside the wireless room.

Whenever there is available space in the news section of the "Ocean Wireless News" publish the fact that the ship is in wireless communication with ships and shore stations, giving their names and mention the wireless rate per word.

Whenever passengers call at the door of the wireless room and display an interest in wireless, be sure to hand them a folder showing rates, etc., and accommodate them by explaining briefly how wireless communications are handled. Afterward if within communicating distance of a station suggest in a nice way, that you can at that moment transmit any message to any of their friends anywhere, if they desire to file it.

Do not allow anyone to loiter in the wireless room, for if someone is seated in the room conversing with the operator, a passenger stepping to the door with the object of investigating the wireless, would be very likely not to stop or make any inquiry, believing that the operator was busy at the time with the person inside the room.

Be sure at all times that the small framed Marconi signs are posted on the ship. There should be at least three on each vessel. One each in the smoking room and social hall, and on the stairs leading to the dining saloon. Ships having second class saloons, should have signs posted there also. As many signs will be furnished as can be posted. They should also be placed in sheltered locations on the decks, if convenient places can be found.

Operators on the Trans-Pacific Vessels should be sure to mention in the "Ocean Wireless News" the names of vessels they can communicate with, the direction they are bound, the distance they are away at a certain time and the probable time of passing. This will be of interest to all passengers and will doubtless produce business.

From this date operators will discontinue accepting "COLLECT" business from the Public: All business must be "PREPAID".

Ships Business Messages, which are to be forwarded to their destination via land line, must be sent "DE & PAID" - NOT "DE & COLLECT" - and the land line tolls must be paid on the ship. These instructions are in accordance with Article XIV of the Berlin International Radiotelegraphic Convention.

Special attention is also called to the following clause of the same Convention:

6. SPECIAL TELEGRAMS.

XXIII

The following telegrams shall not be accepted for transmission:

- (a) Telegrams with answer prepaid;
- (b) Money order telegrams;
- (c) Telegrams calling for repetition of message (for purposes of verification);
- (d) Telegrams calling for acknowledgement of receipt;
- (e) Telegrams to be forwarded, (if addressee is not found at address given);
- (f) Paid service telegrams, except in so far as transmission over the lines of the telegraph system is concerned;
- (g) Urgent telegrams, except in so far as transmission over the lines of the telegraph system is concerned, subject to the application of the provisions of the International Telegraph Regulations;
- (h) Telegrams to be delivered by express or mail;

Some of the Operators on the Marconi vessels are turning in very poorly made out reports and are not collecting proper tolls, therefore, hereafter any Operator who turns in a report poorly or improperly made out, it will show up as a discredit mark against him, and he will be required to make the report over. We call your attention below, to the most frequent errors made:

Circular No. 114 requires that the name and addressee and office of destination, be entered in full in column 7 of Form 7.

The instructions with reference to column 17 are, that full wire tolls (now 10 cents per word) must be entered on all franked or MSG messages.

Rule 1 of Circular No. 133 requires that the original message, when not written on the regular sending blank, is to be attached to the proper blank and also that the preamble and sending marks are to be filled in in the spaces provided for that purpose.

On any messages sent to the Dominion Government for delivery at a Dominion Government Station, there is always a 25 and 2 cent charge; that is, a 2 cent per word charge with a 25 cent minimum.

Study your rate sheets carefully and study all circulars given you, and understand that all rules must be adhered to and all rates properly collected.

Reports are not only to be correctly made but they are to be neatly made.

Please note that on and after December 13, 1912 all messages routed via the undermentioned naval coast stations will be subject to a charge of 12¢ per word coast tax, Cable Count, to be used, with a minimum of ten words.

Before leaving port, be sure you receive from the Chief Operator, a book of message receipts and in the use of these, the following instructions must be absolutely followed:

- 1st. The number of the receipt issued to the sender of the message must be entered on the back of that message.
- 2d. In making out the receipt, a duplicate must be obtained by means of carbon paper on the back of the sending blank, using the lower half of the blank.
- 3d. Every receipt must be accounted for. If spoiled, - receipt must be marked "Void" and turned in with the ship's reports.
- 4th. If the sender of a message declines to accept a receipt, the original receipt must be attached to the message and turned in with the ship's reports.

CIRCULAR NO. 109.

The Service Regulations annexed to the International Radiotelegraphic Convention provide that wireless telegrams shall show in the preamble that the service is "wireless" (RADIO) and you are hereby instructed to conform to the above requirements and transmit the word RADIO in the check of every wireless message sent.

Operators must see that the word Radio is written on the copies of all messages, whether "sent" or "received".

Referring to Regulation No. 128 of "GENERAL ORDERS", please note that the landline, as well as the Marconi tolls, on all radiograms on official business of the Government are to be treated as fully paid at the office of origin.

Such messages must have the word "Govt." inserted as the first word in the address, which is to be counted and charged for.

The landline rates applicable on Government messages will be found on Pages XII, XIII and XIV of the Western Union Telegraph Company's Tariff Book for 1913.

The U.S. Naval Radio Stations will continue to handle Government messages free of coast charges.

The instructions given in Regulation No. 128 of "GENERAL ORDERS" must therefore, be amended.

1. All operators must be on board their respective vessels two hours before sailing time. Numerous complaints have been received from Government Radio Inspectors. Operators are warned that any infraction of this rule is liable to lead to suspension or cancellation of license.
2. It is found in many instances that storage batteries are badly neglected. Operators must carefully follow the instructions contained in Circular No. 144, entitled "Instructions to Marconi Operators". In case of doubt, advice can be obtained from the Company's Inspectors, or from the Construction Department, 50 Main St.
3. Duplicate reports on Form No. 30 must be rendered each trip.

On January 1st, 1913, the Operating Staff of the Pacific Coast Division will be placed on a permanent basis, and the following classification of Marine Operators will go in to effect.

1.- Permanent Staff.

2.- Temporary Staff.

Operators appointed to the Permanent Staff will remain on our pay-roll, whether appointed to a ship or not, so long as their conduct and services prove satisfactory. Should it be necessary to discharge an Operator for any reason other than that required to maintain discipline, two weeks notice, or in lieu thereof, two weeks salary will be given. It is expected that Operators wishing to resign will give the Company two weeks notice. Operators leaving the service without due notice, will not, under any circumstances, be reinstated.

Operators on the permanent staff will be classified as follows:

First Class.	Operators in charge of vessels carrying two or more operators.
Second Class.	Operators in charge of cargo vessels, or others requiring only one operator.
Third Class.	Operators working under the supervision of First Class Operators.

In addition to the foregoing, Special Supervising Operators will be appointed who will be assigned to the larger ships engaged in the various trade routes. Their duties will be to exercise a close watch on the service in general, making reports to the management direct, showing defects in the service, infractions of the Company's regulations, etc. They shall have a general supervision over Operators afloat, and, in ports where the Company does not maintain repairing facilities, they will be expected to correct faults on ships apparatus requiring attention.

A system of promotion will be adopted. An Operator showing ability and serving the company's best interests will always secure the best appointments. A seniority list will be maintained, and when consistent with ability and good conduct, the senior man will be given preference.

Following order issued by the secretary of Navy: "No communications are permitted to be handled with radio ship or shore station of belligerent nations by any Government or commercial radio station under jurisdiction of U.S. Vessels nor permitted to be sent from any radio station of the U.S.S. Via Foreign radio station if destined to belligerent ships messages containing information relative to mutual operators or personal of armed forces of any belligerent nation will be handled considered unnatural in character and will not be handled except in the case of cipher messages to or from U.S. official in general. Observe carefully.

It has come to our notice - that in several cases - operators after leaving port have changed the present arrangement of their apparatus and reverted to "direct coupling" replacing the helix clips in the old positions, or as it is called by the Operating Staff, "The United hook-up". This is strictly in violation of the present Government Regulations which provide for specified wave lengths decrements, etc.

Also, it has been found in several instances that operators on their own initiative - have made such changes to the apparatus on board ships as the installation of a privately owned rotary spark gap, etc. All operators are hereby cautioned against such practices. The tuning and rearrangement of apparatus will be attended to by the Company's authorized inspectors.

With the use of the present inductive coupling it is important that the points of the anchor spark gap be neatly trimmed and the distance between them be kept at a minimum. Attention to this matter will, in many cases, obviate the troubles of an intermittent spark at the anchor gap.

In order that there may be established a uniform manner of handling traffic the following requirements are set forth for the guidance of operators. While instances may arise where they cannot be strictly followed by Transpacific Vessels they can usually be carried out to advantage by all Coastwise Vessels, and, to a great extent, by others.

1. Adhere strictly to the London International Radiotelegraphic Convention Rules, and the Act of August 13th, 1912.

CALLING AND SIGNING OFF-

Article XXV of these Rules reads as follows:-

"The call shall comprise the signal "KA", the call letters of the station called repeated three times, the letters "de" followed by the call letters of the sending station repeated three times.

The called station shall answer by making the signal "KA" followed by the call letters of the corresponding station repeated three times, the letters "de" and its own call letters, and the signal "K". (Invitation to transmit)"

And Article XXXI as follows:-

"The transmission of the Radiogram shall be preceded by the signal "KA", and terminated by the signal "AR" followed by the call letters of the sending station and by the signal "K"

2. Upon beginning the watch, prior to leaving port, do not use the spark until you have listened in at least five (5) minutes to make certain no one is working.

3. After adjusting detector and tuning for six hundred meters, if no one is working, proceed to call as above prescribed, i.e. KA-KPH KPH-KPH-de-WGR-WGR-WGR-AR, and wait until told to go ahead, ("K"). If the call is not answered within five (5) minutes, repeat. DO NOT send a message unless advised to do so by the signal "K".

4. DO NOT use the letter "K" in signing off. This is to be used only as specified in Rule 1 above.

5. DO NOT repeat call letters more than three times in calling or answering. Three times is sufficient

6. Listen closely at all times and do not mistake other call letters for your own. Do not mistake the letters "BK" for "K".

7. Number all messages from midnight to midnight and be sure that the proper number is sent with each message transmitted.

8. Be sure all checks are correct. Cable count is to be used throughout as prescribed in Circular No. 102.

9. Observe the form of transmitting messages, as set forth in Chapter 10. of New York Circular No. 144B. Your particular attention is called to Page 60. of the above Circular. The instructions regarding Prefixes must be carried out. If this is not thoroughly understood ask for explanation at the Office.

10. Each time your vessel leaves San Francisco or Seattle for any port, send a "Clearance" message addressed to Marconi in the following form:-

Send 3 PM. Set OK". If the

11. All messages addressed to Marconi must be either signed with the name of the Operator in Charge, or the Commander. News service position messages should be signed by the Commander.
12. DO NOT send "notes" addressed to Marconi. If you have any communications for the office, send them as regular service messages.
13. Send in "PM. position" messages as near to eight PM. as possible, as these positions are given to the papers at nine o'clock each night.
14. DO NOT duplicate position messages, i.e. if the 8 PM. position is sent addressed to the Steamship Company, do not send the same message to "Marconi". If none be filed for the Steamship Company, secure 8 PM. position message from the Captain and address it to "Marconi".
15. In calling a station to ascertain if it has any business for you, call the station in the regular manner and send the signal "QRU". (London Convention May 8, 1913, Page 30). If no business is on hand for you, the station will so advise you by sending the letters "NIL".
16. If you have no business for a station and wish to make your presence in his vicinity known, call in the regular manner and send the letters "NIL". Do not wait for an answer to your call before saying "NIL". but send them immediately after your own call letters and before signing off with "AR".
17. If a mistake be made in transmitting, use the character(eight dots), and repeat the last word properly sent, Do not go back more than one word unless a word has been omitted or an extra word is to be added. Do not make the Morse interrogation point when an error is made.
18. Use the following method in asking for repetitions:-
 - "K"—AGW—(Go ahead entire message again)
 - "K"—CK—(Go ahead check only)
 - "K"—TO—(Go ahead address only)
 - "K"—BODY—(Go ahead body of message only)
 - "K"—AB—(Go ahead all before-----)
 - "K"—AA—(Go ahead all after-----)
 - "K"—WA—(Go ahead word after-----)
 - "K"—WB—(Go ahead word or words between-----and-----)
 - "K"—SIG—(Go ahead signature only)
19. When repetition is requested as prescribed in Rule 18. above, pay particular attention to what is asked for and repeat that part ONLY.
20. In giving an "OK" for messages received, the following form only will be used:-
 - "KA-WGR-WGR-WGR-de-KPH-KPH-KPH-1-R-KPH-AR".or if more than one be received:-
 - "KA-WGR-WGR-WGR-de-KPH-KPH-KPH-5-R-KPH-AR".
21. Always count the check of your messages before you start to send same. DO NOT delay traffic by having to ascertain the proper check after you have been told to go ahead.
22. It is imperative that you clear with the station at the Port of destination before docking. If on a vessel from a foreign port, clear immediately after leaving quarantine.
23. If on a vessel which carries only one Operator, you should maintain a steady watch while within fifty miles of a station either arriving, departing, or when passing the home port of the vessel. A

All Marconi Stations, with the exception of Marshfield, Oregon, and San Luis Obispo, California, will accept such Radiograms as "Service Messages". The Radiogram must only contain the distance of a vessel from a given point. The hour of arrival may be included if desired by the Commander.

27. Land Station Operators will act in a supervisory capacity and direct the transmission of all traffic through their station. They will report to headquarters any irregularity in connection with traffic and its handling, interference, inattention, or violation of instructions.

The co-operation of all concerned is necessary for the prompt handling of traffic and this circular is issued with this object in view. All Operators must study it carefully and handle their business in accordance therewith, with the possible exceptions mentioned in the first paragraph.

Operators Assigned To Ships Will Observe The Following Rules:-

Upon receiving an assignment Operators will immediately get in direct communication with either the Commander of the vessel, First Officer, or a Steamship Official in direct charge and ascertain the sailing date and hour, and the time they shall report to the ship for the purpose of signing the ship's Articles. The Shipping Commissioner is not to be kept waiting on account of the Wireless Operators, who must be on hand at the time specified. Operators must thereafter keep in close touch with the vessel in order to cover any subsequent changes in the time specified for departure.

When in the port of San Francisco or Seattle, Operators must report at the office at 9-30 AM. daily. On sailing day they must report at 9-30 AM. and again, if the vessel sails in the afternoon, three hours before sailing time. They must be aboard the ship two hours before sailing from any port and immediately get into uniform. For a full hour before sailing they must be in the Wireless Room where they can be readily found by the Customs Officers, Inspectors and other officials visiting the ship for the purpose of inspecting the apparatus, or to interview the Operators assigned.

Failure to carry out the above requirements will adversely affect the service of the Operator at fault.

Proper blanks are now being prepared for the purpose of transferring the extra parts of apparatus, stationery, call lists, circulars, etc., from the Operator who is being relieved to the relieving Operator, and after these are available the former must prepare this Report (Form 31), showing all supplies on hand which must be checked up and signed by both Operators and turned in at the office. Care must be taken to preserve all circulars, call lists and extra parts of apparatus, as Operators will be charged for any loss. The new Operator will be expected to obtain at the office all supplies necessary for a full trip, and will make sure that he has copies of all circulars before leaving port.

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RADIO TRAFFIC

Circular No. 144B, - issued by the New York Office of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America, dated June, 1913 contains a chapter, (No. X, Page 58), devoted to the correct method of handling Radio Traffic. It is presumed that all Operators have made themselves familiar with, and understand perfectly the instructions given therein. The present circular is issued with the special object of explaining in greater detail the use of the Prefix in Radiotelegraphy, and also of making such modifications as are deemed necessary owing to the conditions prevailing on the Pacific Coast.

This Circular is to be carefully studied in conjunction with Chapter X of Circular No. 144B, and also Circular No. 131, dated July 14, 1913.

It is to be understood that the instructions contained in this Circular, Chapter X of Circular No. 144B and Circular No. 131 are to be carried out ONLY WHEN TRANSMITTING MESSAGES TO, OR RECEIVING MESSAGES FROM, SHIP AND LAND STATIONS OPERATED AND CONTROLLED BY THE MARCONI WIRELESS TELEGRAPH COMPANY OF AMERICA. When communicating with Ship or Land Stations operated by "Foreign" Companies or Governments (Japanese Vessels, the Canadian Government Land Stations, etc.) or by the United States Navy and Army, the system employed at the present time will remain in force, owing to the fact that the method of handling Radio Traffic explained in this Circular will not be understood by any Ship or Land Station which is not operated and controlled by the Marconi Company.

Before giving further explanation with regard to the use of the Prefix, it is necessary to draw the attention of all Operators to the following Rules:-

1. Every message, transmitted, received or re-transmitted MUST be written upon its proper blank, Form 1, 4 or 6 respectively; each Operator when appointed to a vessel is required to sign an inventory (Form 31) of the supplies he received from his predecessor, so that in the future there can be no excuse for an Operator going to sea without a full supply of the various forms he will require. These can always be obtained at the office. An Operator, making more than one voyage on the same vessel, is also required to apply at the office, in ample time, before he goes on board, for such forms as he may need for the ensuing voyage. It sometimes happens that the person sending a message does not write it out on the regular sending blank. This should be discouraged as much as possible; but if it cannot be avoided, the Preamble (Circular 144, Chap. X, Page 61), must be filled in on the regular sending blank (Form 1), as well as the "Sending Marks", and the original message attached to it.

2. Every message received for delivery on board a vessel, whether "Paid", "Msg" or "DH" MUST BE SIGNED FOR BY THE ADDRESSEE on the regular Delivery Sheet (Form 3 -A). This Delivery Sheet must be turned in to the office with the reports at the end of each voyage.

3. If an Operator, having accepted a message for transmission and collected the charges thereon, is unable to transmit the message, the amount collected is to be returned to the person from whom the message was accepted, and his signed receipt for the refund to be written on the back of the original message, which must be turned in with the Reports at the end of the voyage. The reason for non-transmission must also be written on the message.

4. All messages received must be delivered to the addressee at the earliest possible moment unless special service instructions are given concerning the time and date of delivery. If for any reason a message cannot be delivered, a service message (SG) must at once be sent to the originating point or point of transfer from the land lines, giving the exact reason for the non-delivery. This service message must then be attached to the undelivered message. Upon receipt of this service message, the originating or transfer station will communicate with the sender of the original message and secure his instructions covering its disposal: these instructions must then be sent to the destination station in the form of another service message (SG). If the instructions are to cancel the message, it is to be filed and recorded on Form No. 7 without any refund of tolls; but, if the instructions are to forward the message to another point, the forwarding charges must be collected from the sender at the originating point, and the forwarding station will check the originating or transfer station for the amount of the additional tolls on Form No. 9 and write in the "Remarks" column, "Message Forwarded".

Operators who do not follow these instructions will be called upon to make the refund of the full tolls on any undelivered message which has not been properly covered by the necessary service messages.

MESSAGE PREFIXES.

A Prefix is the letter, or combination of letters, which enables the operator receiving a message to identify the nature of that message: it is transmitted as the first part of the Preamble, immediately preceding the number of the message.

The Prefixes to be used will be the following:

S	Paid Message.
SP	Press Message.
SSB	Press Message of more than 100 words.
SG	Service Message.
SB	Government Message.
XSG	Relay Service Message.
MSG	Master's Service Message (communications between Captains or officers of vessels and Steamship Owners or Agents, and strictly confined to the business of the vessels).
SDH	Wireless tolls deadhead, other line tolls paid.
X	Paid Relay Message.
XMSG	Relay Master's Service Message.
XDH	Relay Deadhead Message.
RUSH	Special Service Message.

NOTE: The "Check" of a message, when the Prefix is used, is the number of words in the message (Cable Count), followed by the word "Radio", AND NOTHING ELSE; such checks as "16 DH Radio and 11 Collect" are to be discontinued. S-PAID MESSAGE.

Article XIV of the Berlin Convention enacts that "The total charge for Wireless Telegrams shall be collected of the sender". Therefore, the Prefix "S" will indicate to the receiving operator at the land station that both the Wireless tolls and the C.L. forwarding charge have been paid on the ship. For example: The Preamble of a 10 word paid message from the S.S. "BEAR", given to Eureka Station, addressed to San Francisco will be as follows:

"S 1 10 Radio Bear"

(the number after the Prefix will, of course, depend on whether the message is the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc., given to the Eureka Station on that date). The operator at Eureka knowing that ALL charges must be prepaid, will forward the message to San Francisco, via Western Union, and check the "BEAR" for the Shore Tax of 60¢ and O.L. forwarding charge of 40¢.

Again, if a paid message of 12 words is given by the "BEAR" to "KPH", destination San Francisco, and is the second message given to "KPH" by the "BEAR" on that date, the Preamble will be:

"S 2 12 Radio Bear"

The operator receiving the message at "KPH" station will know that ALL charges have been prepaid, and will check the "BEAR" for 72¢ Shore Tax and 24¢ O.L. forwarding charge.

SG- SERVICE MESSAGE.

This Prefix will be used only for messages addressed to "Marconi" on the Company's business, signed by the operator, or "Position Messages", addressed to "Marconi" and signed by the Captain, for the News Service. Such messages as "Bear left for Portland 3 PM. Set OK.", will be given to "KPH" as:

"SG 1 8 Radio Bear".

XSG- RELAY SERVICE MESSAGE.

If, in the last example, the "BEAR" had given the message to the "GOVERNOR" for re-transmission to San Francisco, the Preamble of the "BEAR's" message when given to the "GOVERNOR" would have been:

"XSG 1 8 Radio Bear"

and, supposing that the operator of the "GOVERNOR" had already sent five messages to San Francisco on that date, he would give San Francisco the message as:

"XSG 6 8 Radio Bear".

MSG- MASTER'S SERVICE MESSAGE.

This Prefix is to be used only for messages between Captains or Officers of vessels and Steamship Owners, Agents, or other parties, when the message is strictly confined to "Ship's Business", and when there are no forwarding charges on the messages.

SDH- WIRELESS TOLLS DEADHEAD, OTHER LINE TOLLS PAID.

Messages which are "deadhead" wireless, and which cannot be classed as either "SG's" or "MSG's", but on which forwarding charges have been prepaid, are to be transmitted with this Prefix. For example: A "Frank" message of 15 words from the "GOVERNOR" addressed to Seattle and given to Astoria, the Frank Number being C 403, would be transmitted to Astoria with the Preamble: (suppose it is the 3rd message given to Astoria on that date.)

"SDH 3 15 Radio Governor C 403".

immediately following the "Office of Origin"), and re-transmit them with the same Prefixes respectively.

CMSG - MASTER'S SERVICE MESSAGE, TO BE FORWARDED TO ITS DESTINATION VIA LAND LINE, WITH O.L. TOLLS COLLECT AT DOMESTIC COUNT.

Circular No. 16, sent to all the Land Stations operated and controlled by the Marconi Company on the Pacific Coast, informed the Operators in charge of the Stations that, in a message, confined strictly to "Ship's Business", was received from a vessel with a double check, (for example: "15 DH Radio and 11 paid", or "15 DH Radio and 11 collect"), such a message MIGHT be sent from the Land Station which received it, and forwarded to its destination, via Land Line, as a domestic message, at Day, Night, Day Letter or Night Letter rate, either "paid" or "collect" as indicated in the check.

Hereafter, all "MSG's" which have to be forwarded via land line from the receiving station to their destination, MUST be dated from that receiving station and forwarded as domestic messages (domestic count being used), AND THEY MUST BE SENT "COLLECT" WITHOUT EXCEPTION. They can be forwarded at Day, Night, Day Letter or Night Letter domestic rate. The Prefix "CMSG" will indicate to the receiving operator at the Land Station that the message is Marconi tolls "deadhead" and forwarding charges "collect", and also that the message must be dated from his Station and not from the vessel transmitting the message. If the message is to be forwarded as a Day or Night Letter, "Service Instructions" to that effect must be given immediately after the "Office of Origin". If no such instructions are given, the message will be forwarded at the regular domestic Day rate.

If, in the above example, the "NANN SMITH" had been unable to transmit the message to Eureka direct, but could have relayed the message to that station through the "WATSON", the Operator of the "NANN SMITH" would have transmitted the message to the "WATSON" with the Preamble:

"XCMSG 1 22 Radio Nann Smith via KPM",

or, if the message were to be forwarded as a Night Letter:

"XCMSG 1 22 Radio Mann Smith N.L. via KPM"

The "WATSON's" Operator would re-transmit the message to Eureka with the same Preamble, changing the number in case he had previously sent messages to that station on that date.

"FRANK" MESSAGES.

A "Frank" message is one on which the Marconi tolls are "deadhead". The "Frank" is issued in the form of a book of adhesive stamps, each of which represents the Marconi tolls on a 10 word (Cable Count) message. The "Frank" is not transferable, and must only be accepted for a message which is signed by the party to whom the "Frank" is issued, whose signature will be found on the back cover of the stamp-book.

Each stamp bears the inscription "Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America", and the year during which it is current. "Franks" issued in a former year, or by an affiliated Marconi Company, must not be accepted.

As previously stated in this Circular, a "Frank" message

"COMM 1" 100 miles north of Cape Blanco, etc.

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If, however, the "Frank" message is to be forwarded via land line to its destination, the O.L. forwarding charges must be collected from the sender. The Prefix will then be "SDH", or, if the message is relayed, "XDH".

The conditions covering the use of "Franks" are printed on the inside of the covers of the stamp-book. They are as follows:

"Good only for Family and Social Messages. Not to be used for Business or Political Communications".

CONDITIONS.

"These stamps will frank ONLY THE PERSONAL SOCIAL MESSAGES of the holder and must not be used for BUSINESS OR POLITICAL COMMUNICATIONS. They must not be USED BY nor FOR any other than the person to whom they are issued. If offered by any other person, Operators will take up the frank and collect regular tolls.

A stamp must be affixed to every message containing ten words or less, and an additional stamp for every additional ten words or fraction thereof.

The recipient of these stamps, by accepting and using them, assumes all risks, and agrees that the Wireless Company shall not be liable for damages, whether from negligence of Agents or from whatever cause arising".

Any Operator who accepts a "Frank" under other conditions than those given above will be charged the full value of the message.

Any Operator who does not thoroughly understand the explanations given in this Circular, is requested to apply at the office for further information upon any points upon which he is in doubt. If no such application is made, it will be presumed that the contents of this Circular are perfectly clear to him. Subsequent errors or delay in handling traffic, brought about by his ignorance of these instructions will be referred to the Office of the Division to which he belongs.

NOTE: The Prefix of each message transmitted, received or re-transmitted must be entered in the "Remarks" Column of Abstracts, Form 7 or 9 respectively. No further indication of the nature of the message is needed.

Special notes concerning messages,--such as "Undelivered" or "Not transmitted",--must also be entered in this Column.

SHIP STATION REPORT.

Form #30.

It is noted that the preparation of the Ship-Station Report (Form 30) is not being given proper attention. In many instances the headings are not properly filled in and in other cases the wrong information is given.

This must be remedied at once and the information showing the name of the Steamer, the name of the Company, the pier at which the steamer is docked, the date of the arrival and the sailing date must always be shown CORRECTLY.

In addition to the above information, this form must hereafter show what officer of the ship has the Key to the Wireless Room. The room MUST in EVERY case be locked by the Operator in charge when he leaves the ship, but the Key MUST be left aboard the vessel. It should be left with the First Officer, but if for any reason it is not practicable to leave it with him, it should be left with the Second Officer and so noted on Form 30.

Operators in charge aboard Steamer Schooners or Freight Vessels which move about from one dock to another must also obtain from the ship as much information as possible concerning the movements of the vessel while in port, and show it on Form 30, in order that the Construction Department may plan their work so as to cover the inspection and repairs of the apparatus in the least possible time and at the minimum expense.

Effective immediately, only one Copy of Form 30 is required.

Log Reports.

The following rules will govern the preparation of the Log Report and show the necessary entries that must always appear on it:

1. The headings on all the sheets must be properly filled in.
2. Each page must bear a number on the upper right hand corner. The numbers will start with 1 at the beginning of each voyage.
3. The time and date of leaving each port.
4. Closely timed and dated entries covering the signals sent and received, other stations working, unnecessary use of the apparatus (by whom), interference (by whom), atmospheric and weather conditions. The time of entering and leaving a fog belt, giving density.
5. The position of the vessel must be entered twice daily: one morning and one evening report.
6. The receipt of weather and time signals.
7. Repairs made to apparatus and time consumed.
8. At the end of each shift the signature of the operator must appear in full.
9. On vessels where only one operator is carried, his full signature must appear at the end of each sheet.
10. Each page must be carefully and neatly written. Both sides are to be used.
11. The designation AM or PM must be shown in all instances where time is used.
12. Abbreviations are not to be used with the exception of call letters.
13. Vulgar and obscene language will not be tolerated.

Any additional items concerning, in any way, the operation of wireless in connection with the vessel must also be entered as they may prove of value to the company at some future date.

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OCEAN LETTERS.PREFIX SSD.

Effective September 1st, 1913, an "OCEAN LETTER" Service will be inaugurated on all vessels on the Pacific Ocean, which are operated and controlled by the Pacific Coast Division of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America, and on vessels of the Affiliated Marconi Companies.

An "Ocean Letter" is a message from an outgoing to an incoming vessel, and is entitled to only one wireless transmission (from the originating to the receiving vessel). The operator receiving the "Ocean Letter" WILL NOT RE-TRANSMIT it to a Coastal Station; but will forward it to its destination by REGISTERED MAIL immediately upon arrival at the first Port of Call, attaching the Post Office receipt to the duplicate copy of the Letter turned in to the office with his Ship Reports. At points where registration cannot be effected, the Letter will be forwarded by ordinary letter post.

The minimum Marconi Tolls on an "Ocean Letter" are \$1.20 for 30 words, including address and signature, plus 2 cents for each additional word: To this must be added the registration fee and postage (10 cents registration and 2 cents postage in the United States, The Hawaiian Islands, The Philippine Islands, Canada and Shanghai, China).

The registration fee and postage in Countries other than those given above must be ascertained from the Purser, and this amount charged in addition to the Wireless Tolls on the Letter.

The maximum number of words permissible in an "Ocean Letter", including address and signature, is 100.

1. The first step is to identify the problem or question that needs to be answered. This involves understanding the context and the specific requirements of the task.

Registered cable, telegraphic and abbreviated addresses are not allowed on "Ocean Letters", and the text of such letters is to be written in plain language.

Plain language is such as in the opinion of the Telegraph Service bears an intelligible meaning on the face of it, and does not include a succession of numbers, names or words without connected meaning.

The registration fee and postage are to be entered in Col. 14 (O. L. forwarding charges) and the Marconi Tolls in Col. 13 (Ship Tax) of Form 7. The operator of the vessel receiving the message will enter in Col 13 (Ship Tax) of Form 9, the Marconi Tolls accruing to his ship (60 cents for 30 words and 1 cent for each additional word), and in Col. 14 (O. L. forwarding charges) the amount of the registration fee and postage paid for each Letter. The total amount so paid during the voyage is to be entered on the credit side of Form N 120 (Account Current) under the heading "Disbursements".

To Operators in Charge, Trans-Pacific Vessels.

Owing to local interference along the Coast between Eight P. M. and midnight, land station operators find it difficult to clear Trans-Pacific Vessels at long distances during these hours.

Effective immediately, operators on such vessels when distant 500 miles or more from the Coast, will wait until after 1:00 A. M. to transmit their traffic to Coast Stations except in cases where messages of an urgent nature are on hand which should be transmitted before midnight to accomplish their purpose.

This will not affect the present practice of working with Honolulu or other vessels of the same class, which are likewise more than 500 miles from a Pacific Coast Station.

Instead of wasting time calling Coast Stations before midnight, operators on the Trans-Pacific, Honolulu, or Australian route ships should co-operate in preparing for prompt clearing of all traffic from such vessels. The vessel that is in the best position, as to distance, or efficiency, for direct work with the Coast should gather the business from ships in a less favorable position and have it ready for prompt transmission after midnight. As the off shore vessels can be easily tuned out by Coast Stations, this work will not interfere with them and they can devote the evening hours to the clearing of Coastwise vessels, thus leaving a practically clear field for off shore work after the press has been sent.

Strict compliance with these instructions is required.

Message Receipts

Effective September 1st, 1913, a receipt (Form 10) will be issued to the sender of every paid message, for the total amount paid for the message,

The receipt must be made in duplicate by means of carbon paper, the Carbon Copy being made upon the lower half of the back of the sending blank (Form 1).

The following rules will govern the use of receipts, and are to be strictly carried out.

1. The serial number of the receipt issued must be written on the back of the message.

2. Every receipt must be accounted for, spoiled receipts must be marked "void" and turned in with the Ship's Reports at the end of each voyage.

3. If the sender of a message declines to accept a receipt, the latter must nevertheless be written out and the original attached to the message, and turned in with the Ship's Reports.

The London Convention contemplates the sending of service messages to and from ships through the nearest coast station, regardless of the administration operating such coast station.

To effect this result in the United States, we have agreed with the U. S. Naval Radio Service to transmit reciprocally, without charge, through each other's coast stations which are open to commercial business, all necessary service messages which relate strictly to commercial RADIOGRAMS.

In exceptional cases, use may also be made of ships for such purpose, but only in cases of importance, and when a coast station cannot be reached directly.

As an example of such use, may be taken the case of a ship passing along the coast which receives a commercial message through a coast station and for some reason or other is unable to effect delivery of the message. The ship may be out of range before it is possible to send the notice of non-delivery to the office of origin. In this case, the ship will send such notice through the next coast station with which it can communicate, whether that be a Marconi Station or a Naval Station open to commercial business. The coast station will forward such a service message to destination in all respects as through it related to its own correspondence.

In cases where a reply to a service message is to be expected, a ship may ask that it be sent through another coast station by stating "Reply via" in its original service.

It must be understood that the instructions contained in this Circular are to be strictly confined to service messages relating to paid traffic. "MSG's" and "SG's" other than the above must on no account be sent to a U. S. Naval Station unless paid for at the established rate.

The President of the United States having signed the proclamation promulgating the London International Radio-telegraphic Convention, please therefore, note that on and from September 1st. 1913, the following special RADIOGRAMS are admitted into the Radiotelegraphic Service:

Another class, "Urgent Radiograms" is not recognized in the United States, as the longline telegraph companies do not have such a classification.

You are instructed to note carefully the following instructions with regard to the acceptance and handling of the above special radiograms:

1. RADIOGRAMS WITH ANSWER PREPAID: The sender of a Radiogram can prepay a reply of not less than ten words via American coast station, i.e., the ship tax, coast tax, and forwarding charges must be charged for on the minimum basis of ten words for the reply message.

The instruction "R P...." - the dots standing for the amount paid for the return message - must be transmitted in two places, FIRST as the last item of the preamble, SECOND as the first item in the address. The two transmissions are therefore, separated by the double-dash. The expression is transmitted free in the preamble but is charged for in the address. The whole expression "R P...." (including the amount) sent in the address, is counted in the check as ONE word, and is charged for.

By the International Convention, the value of the reply message is to be expressed in francs, and, in sending by RADIO to FOREIGN ships, it shall be so expressed. In sending to United States ships, it shall be expressed in dollars and cents. For the convenience of our coast stations, a franc shall be taken as equal to 20¢ U.S. currency and five centimes shall be taken as equal to one cent U.S. currency.

For example: an "R P" message of ten words originating in Los Angeles for transmission to a passenger on board a foreign Trans-Pacific ship via San Francisco, would be expressed "R P fr. 12". A similar message sent to an American ship would be "R P two dollars forty". The landline telegraph offices throughout the United States express the value of the reply by the number of words prepaid for such reply. Therefore, in forwarding a Radiogram from a ship over the landline, the operator in charge of the coast station shall convert the money value as given by the ship into the equivalent number of words. This will necessitate the operators knowing all charges accurately and care must be used in making the conversion. Similarly when a reply prepaid message is received at a coast station from the landlines for transmission to a ship, the value of the reply message must be converted from the number of words into the money equivalent, francs or dollars.

The receiver of a "Reply Prepaid Message" is given a voucher equal in value to the amount prepaid for the reply. This voucher is good for six weeks only.

The receiver of such a message is not bound to send a reply to the sender of the original message, but can apply the value of his voucher to the payment of any RADIO message he wishes to send.

Should the expression "Reply Prepaid" or on foreign messages "Reponse Payee" be used instead of "R P" the operator shall transmit it by the abbreviation "R".

The prepaid answer to such a message is in reality a paid message and is so treated.

On landlines in the United States, the prefix "Collect Reply" is used by the Western Union Telegraph Company and "Anstorp" by the Postal Telegraph Company but for RADIO work no such abbreviation is necessary. The word RADIO in the preamble indicates that the message is a commercial paid message.

2. - RADIOGRAMS CALLING FOR REPETITION OF MESSAGE:

The sender of a Radiogram may have it repeated at each station or office during transmission by paying the ordinary charge plus one quarter. Such repetition is for the purpose of verification only.

The expression "T C", or the words "Repeat Back" are used. The expression "T C" is transmitted as the last item of the preamble, and also as the first item of the address, in the same manner as described for the expression "R P....".

The expression in the address is counted in the check as one word and is charged for.

In this case the message is repeated back by each station that relays it to the one before. The additional charge for repeating back is one fourth of the regular tolls.

Should the expression "Repeat Back" be written by the sender, it shall be transmitted by the abbreviation "T C".

3. - SPECIAL DELIVERY RADIOGRAMS:

These are messages which involve delivery beyond the limits of a telegraph office. Such delivery is accomplished by messenger or telephone.

The International Convention stipulates that these shall be accepted only in cases where the charge for special delivery is paid by the addressee.

The special designation for this class of message is "Express", sent as the last item of the preamble and again as

the first item of the address, the same as stated above for the other expression.

The word "Express" in the address is counted and is charged for as ONE word.

4. - RADIOGRAMS TO BE DELIVERED BY MAIL:

These are distinguished by the instruction "Post", transmitted as the last item of the preamble and again as the first item of the address.

Such Radiograms shall be sent by mail by the coast station receiving them, to the addressee; or, if the name of some other place follows the word "Post", it shall be forwarded by landline to that place with the instruction "Mail". It is then mailed from the telegraph office from which forwarded.

An additional charge of one word is made for the instruction "Post" (and it is counted in the check) and five cents (\$.05) for postage.

The expression "P R" used instead of "Post" signifies that it is to be posted by registered mail. In this case, the charges must include fifteen cents (\$.15) for postage instead of five cents (\$.05).

Foreign ships may use "Poste Recommandee" or "Registered Post", in lieu of "P R". In such cases each word of the expression is counted and charged for.

5. - MULTIPLE RADIOGRAMS:

By multiple Radiogram is meant one message addressed either to several persons, or to the same person at several addresses, in the same locality or in different localities served by the same telegraph office.

Such messages contain the abbreviation "T H x" ("x" standing for the number of different addresses). This is transmitted by RADIO as the last item of the preamble and also as the first item of the first address. The "T M x" in the address is charged for as one word and is counted in the check for RADIO transmission. It is not forwarded over the landlines. Multiple telegrams are not recognized as such by the landlines in the United States; therefore, such a message is charged for as so many different messages by the landline companies and must be so transmitted over the land wires; that is, a multiple message may be received by RADIO, the various addresses being followed by but one "body of message" or text, but when put on the landlines each message will have to be complete, i. e., the text must accompany each address, and each separate message must be entered on a separate blank. This will involve special care by the accepting officer on shipboard to see that the correct RADIO tolls are collected for but one message and the correct landline tolls for the different messages.

6.- RADIOGRAMS CALLING FOR ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF RECEIPT:

Such acknowledgment is limited to notification of the date and hour at which the coast station shall have transmitted the RADIOGRAM to the ship to which it was addressed. This notification is sent to the office of origin either by telegraph or mail, at the option of the sender of the message.

The instruction to send acknowledgment of receipt is transmitted by the letters "P C", or the words "Acknowledgment paid" as the last item of the preamble and also as the first item of the address.

The letters "P C" in the address are counted in the check and charged for as ONE word. This calls

for telegraphic acknowledgment.

The letter "P C P" instead of "P C" call for acknowledgment by mail, and are charged for as ONE word.

Should the expression "Acknowledgment Paid" be written on the blank, it shall be transmitted by the abbreviation.

If telegraphic acknowledgment is requested, the sender of the message is charged for a five word telegram by the same route.

Mail acknowledgments are sent free. They are addressed to the telegraph office at which the message originated.

Telegraphic acknowledgment is announced by message containing the abbreviation "C R", followed by the name of the addressee, ship, the word "Transmitted" and the hour and date. Example - San Francisco having received a Radiogram from Lincoln, Nebraska, addressed to JONES, MONGOLIA and transmitted it at 10:00 a.m. on the 25th of the month sends the following telegram to the telegraph office at Lincoln, Nebraska: "C R JONES MONGOLIA transmitted 10:00 a.m. 25."

7. - PAID SERVICE NOTICE:

These are service messages, i. e., messages exchanged only between offices (stations), whether RADIO or telegraph, sent at the request of sender of a commercial message, and are charged for at regular rates.

The London Convention prohibits paid service messages calling for repetition or information.

"Paid Service Messages" are designated by the prefix "RADIO S T" instead of "RADIO".

They may be sent for various reasons, as, to rectify or complete an address, to rectify or complete the text, or to cancel a message.

Operators will also note that on and from September 1st, 1913 the date and actual time of acceptance must in all cases be recorded on the message form.

Article XIV (2) of the London Convention enacts that "In the transmission of radiograms proceeding from a ship at sea, the date and hour of posting at the shipboard station shall be stated in the preamble". It will, therefore, be compulsory for ships' operators to send the date and filing time of every message accepted for transmission. These instructions will cancel the NOTE on page 5. of circular 133 to the effect that the date of a message is to be transmitted only when different from the day on which the message is being sent.

The date and filing time of a message are to be transmitted immediately after the office of origin.

This new rule will not apply to messages from shore to ship.

This information however, will not be telegraphed by coast stations when forwarding messages over the lines of the connecting telegraph companies in the United States.

A supply of special vouchers for "Reply Prepaid Radiograms" will be furnished each station and likewise a copy of the London Convention.

In addition to the foregoing, you are to note carefully the following provisions of the Convention:

(a) Attention is invited to the fact the Convention governs only commercial communication, except in so far as the injunction to avoid interference and to give priority to distress calls is concerned, in which matters all RADIO installations are included within the purview of the Convention.

(b) Emphasis is laid on the fact that the Convention, both explicitly and in spirit, places the control of RADIO communication within range of any coast station, in the hands of that coast station. Thus, communication between a ship and coast station is governed by the latter, and ships within range must not intercommunicate if such communication interferes with the work of the coast station. Exception to this rule is made in cases of distress, and for naval and military installations, though these are expected to show fairness in following the spirit of the Convention.

(c) Article XIX of the Convention stipulates that the check of the office of origin is conclusive. This follows the rule of the International Telegraph Convention, which governs communication by cable. In practice, however, each administration insists upon the check being correct and refuses to accept a check which is wrong. This rule will be followed by our ship and shore stations and in all cases the receiving operator shall verify the check and in case of disagreement, call upon the sending operator for verification. He shall not acknowledge receipt of a message until the checks of both operators agree.

(d) Article XXIV of the Convention stipulates that ships should call shore stations when within range of the latter, even though they have no message to send, so as to permit the shore station to send any messages they may have for the ships.

(e) Article XXXII provides that when stations have long messages to send, they shall cease transmission after each period of fifteen minutes and listen for three minutes (on six hundred meter wave) for distress or other calls.

(f) Article XVII authorizes the relaying of messages by ships or by coast stations as intermediary, but the number of retransmissions shall not exceed two. At present German vessels apply a charge of 8¢ per word for relaying but all other vessels equipped with the Marconi apparatus make no charge.

With the object of promoting better service and increasing the earning capacity of Ship Stations and the operators in charge, the Company has decided to introduce the practice of distributing, in addition to the regular salary, a gratuitous bonus among the operators in its employ who display the proper zeal, proficiency and care in the performance of their duties.

This bonus will consist of a payment of 10 cents to the operators in charge for each full rate radiogram originating on their ship. If there be two operators assigned to the vessel, the amount will be divided on the basis of 60% to the Operator in charge and 40% to his assistant.

This plan will become effective on November 1st, 1913. but as a period of two months' time will be required by the auditors to properly check ship statements, the first payment of the bonus cannot be made until January 1st, 1914. After that date, payments will be made monthly on the first of each month.

Generally speaking, no message will be considered to have been correctly accepted, transmitted, received and delivered unless it is dealt with in strict compliance with the instructions issued and to be issued by this Company. No bonus will be allowed for messages, the tolls on which, for any reason, are refunded to the sender.

The Company reserves the right to pay this bonus only to those who remain in its service, and the decision as to whether any or what bonus is payable to any operator will rest with the Company and be final.

The plan of payment is based on a certain amount per message basis rather than on a percentage basis, in order that the remuneration may be more evenly distributed among the different classes of vessels. We are inaugurating an advertising campaign and with the reduction in rates on Coast-wise ships it will be possible for operators to greatly increase their earnings by displaying an active interest in their work and by handling all messages in a prompt and careful manner. This will demonstrate to the public the fact that our service is efficient and accurate and will naturally result in an increased volume of business from which both the Company and its Operators will derive a substantial benefit.

Any suggestion to further our mutual interests looking toward the increase of business or the more efficient handling of traffic will be gladly received and given careful attention.

Numerous cases of failure in making delivery of messages aboard ship are being reported, owing to not locating the addressee among the passengers. In many such cases, a claim is made for refund of tolls, the sender stating positively that the addressee was a passenger aboard the vessel at the time the message was received.

All operators must be very careful to find out to a certainty that the addressee of a message is positively not aboard their vessel, before giving up the search. If the steward who is called to deliver the message cannot find the addressee after consulting the passenger list and paging the person throughout the ship, notices must be immediately posted on the main companionway, in the Saloon, Social Hall, Smoking Room and on the door of the radio room, announcing the name of the person for whom there is a message on hand.

In addition, the operator in charge, when off watch, must consult the Purser regarding the matter and go over the passenger list very carefully. If there are passengers listed whose names are similar to the one shown in the message, each of them must be interviewed on the supposition that they might be the person for whom the message is intended. **Notices must be left in their stateroom if they cannot be located.**

Refunds.

Operators are hereby notified that, effective immediately, when refunds have to be made owing to the non-receipt of messages at the station to which they were supposed to be sent, the sending operator will be held responsible and will be called upon to pay the full amount of the refund. This course is rendered necessary owing to the fact that investigation of the claims has shown that some operators, when sending messages, are not sufficiently careful in obtaining "acknowledgment of receipt" from the receiving operator for all messages transmitted.

When refunds have to be made on account of errors and omissions and the investigation indicates that the fault lies with the receiving operator the latter will be held responsible and charged with the amount of the refund.

When the vessel is working direct with San Francisco this detail is unnecessary and only consumes time and energy.

This method can also be used in connection with other well known steamship lines, the above being mentioned only as illustrations.

This practice should NOT be followed when sending "CMSG's" or "XCMSG's". The latter class of messages should show the address more in detail to guard against the possibility of their reaching the land line wires with an incomplete address..

Care must be exercised in abbreviating addresses to always give the name of the individual when a message is so addressed.

If the address is not a familiar one which is in daily use, DO NOT, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, abbreviate it, but send it in full, the object of this circular being to cut out unnecessary sending only when there can be no possible chance of errors and delays arising from incomplete addresses.

Coast Station Operators will complete abbreviated addresses on the addressees copy before same is delivered.

Effective immediately, operators in charge of ship and shore stations are required to make out a summary of traffic on Form 16. This summary is to be made daily, using one line for each day for the total number of messages and words handled, with the exception of re-transmitted messages. One entry for the total number of messages and words re-transmitted during the month or voyage is to be made on the last line of the space provided for messages "received for delivery". Each sheet of Form 16 is to be added and the totals carried forward to the end of the month or voyage, as many sheets being used as are necessary.

Shore stations will furnish this summary monthly, ship stations at the end of each voyage. If a voyage extends over more than one month, a separate summary must be made for each month.

The total number of words "Accepted for Transmission" must agree with the total number of words as given on Form 7. The total number of words "Received for Delivery" must agree with the total of Form 9.

The printed matter at the left of the ruled space is to be disregarded and the date entered in this margin.

USE OF FORM 31.

Many operators do not seem to realize the importance to them of the proper preparation of Form 31, Report of EXTRA Wireless Apparatus and Stationery on hand.

One of these forms must be prepared at the end of each trip and must show correctly the amount of stationery and the number of pieces of EXTRA apparatus on hand.

When a transfer of the station is made from one operator to another, Form 31 must be prepared and submitted in DUPLICATE, signed by both the operator who is being relieved and the one who takes charge of the station. One copy of the form will be retained by the Auditor and the other by the Construction Department. Upon receipt of the forms at these offices, they will be carefully checked with the form showing the previous transfer. Any missing articles will be charged up to the operator responsible.

Attention is called to the fact that under the heading EXTRA WIRELESS APPARATUS there are not to be entered any articles that go to make up one complete set. For instance, if there is but one pair of telephones aboard the vessel, the word "NONE" should be written in the space immediately after the word "Telephones" in Form 31. If, on the other hand, there is one EXTRA pair of telephones BESIDE the pair in use, the figure "1" should be shown in the blank space referred to.

Whenever a ship "lays up" and the operator in charge is withdrawn from the vessel, he will, hereafter, take the head telephones to the shop for checking and obtain a receipt there for the number of telephone sets turned in, submitting same to the Chief Operator at San Francisco who will, after noting, turn same over to the Auditor for filing.

In cases where ships "lay up" at Seattle, the receipt will be turned over to the Chief Operator at that point.

The practice of some operators to have privately owned head telephones in ship station operating rooms must be discontinued immediately. Inventories of stations will be taken frequently, all wireless apparatus in view in the operating room will be considered Company's property.

"OCEAN LETTERS" may be Exchanged with vessels operated and controlled by any of the Affiliated Marconi Companies with the exception of the Debeg Co., that is, with all Marconi equipped vessels except those of German Registry. "OCEAN LETTERS" received from Foreign Marconi vessels will be entered as at present on Form 9. The Wireless tolls "Due This Ship" in Col 13, registration fee and postage in Col. 14.

Operators may occasionally be of assistance to the Captain by writing out the message for him at his dictation, but all such messages must be approved and initialled by the Captain or his responsible officer before despatch.

A signed message receipt must be obtained for every message delivered on ship board.

Serious notice will be taken in all cases where it is found that due effect is not being given to the above instructions.

Attention is called to Circular No. 116-A, concerning the changing of the adjustment of apparatus by operators, resulting in a wave of improper length being emitted, in violation of the United States Radio Laws.

It is reported that there are indications of some operators having changed the coupling of the oscillation transformer, notwithstanding instructions to the contrary.

Effective immediately, any operator who operates the transmitter of his station with an adjustment other than that left by the Construction Department or Radio Inspector, except for sending distress calls or handling messages relating to ships in distress, will be dismissed from the Service.

The proper positions for all clips at both 300 and 600 meters should be plainly marked with tags, or shown on tuning cards posted in the Radio Room. The proper position of the secondary, as compared to the primary of the oscillation transformer, should also be marked on the standard holding same. Operators, when taking charge of a station, will immediately ascertain if the apparatus is properly marked. If it is not, the matter should be immediately reported to the District Superintendent, in order that it may be given attention before the ship sails.

It is also noted that some operators have placed engine oil in condenser tanks, while others have used linseed oil to cover the condenser plates. This practice must stop immediately.

Nothing but oil furnished for the purpose by this Company is to be used in condenser tanks. Operators in Charge will see that an emergency supply is kept on hand at their respective ship or shore stations where oil condensers are used.

The importance of giving accumulators proper attention cannot be too strongly urged. All terminals must be kept free from sulphate and the tops of cells free from dirt and dust and encumbrances such as duplicators and typewriters. This condition can be maintained by the application of a thin coating of vaseline to accumulator terminals.

Inspectors report that grease is being applied to the caps instead of the terminals. This, of course, can serve no purpose whatever, except to indicate that operators do not understand the care of the accumulators. Continued reports of this nature will receive serious attention and operators responsible for such conditions will be penalized.

1. Storage batteries of auxiliary equipment must be kept well charged at all times.
2. Charge every two weeks when not used for other than testing purposes, until all cells have been gasing strongly for one hour.
3. If used for more than testing purposes, charge as often as may be required until all cells have been gasing strongly for one hour.
4. On the day entering port, where inspection will take place, charge battery until all cells have been gasing strongly for one hour.
5. Keep electrolyte 1/2" above the top of the plates by adding pure drinking water as required, and noting condition weekly.
6. In making out station reports, please note that voltage on charge should be taken just previous to stopping the charge.
7. Also, that voltage on discharge should be taken while the key is held down after the cells have been standing idle for not less than 1/2 hour.

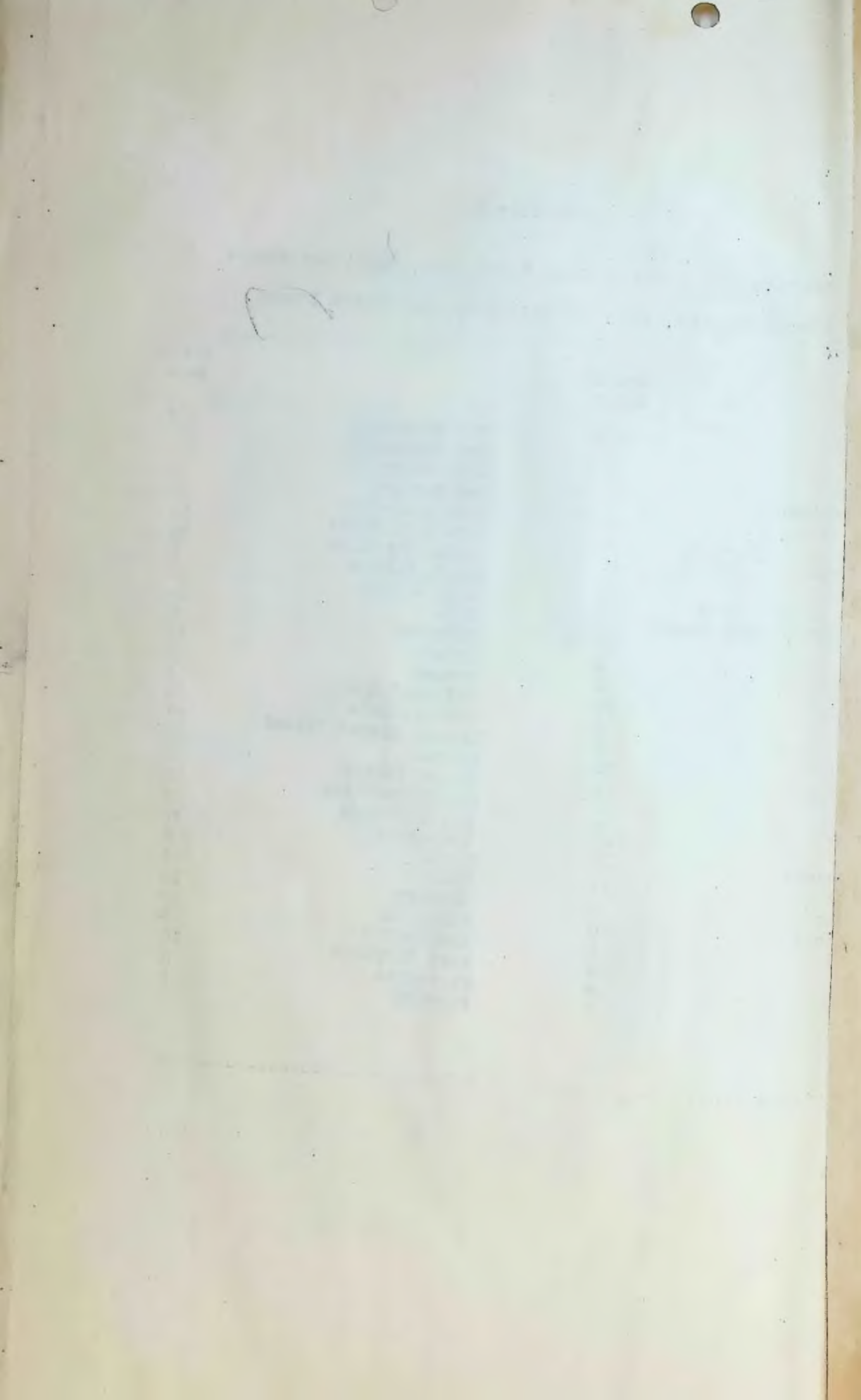

OFFICERS IN CHARGE,

MARCONI TELEGRAPHS.

Please note that on and after November 1, 1912, the existing message rates via the under-mentioned coastal stations will be cancelled and in place thereof through word rates (wireless and landline) with a minimum charge for ten words, will be effective.

COUNTING AND CHARGING

The cable system of counting and charging must be used throughout, the address and signature being counted and charged for, but every message which contains less than ten words must be charged for in the same manner as if it contained ten words.

RATES VIA COASTAL STATIONS

The wireless rate via coastal stations has been fixed at 20 cents per word. To these rates have been added the landline word rates to and from all points in the United States of America, as set forth in the following table of through rates. On messages destined to foreign countries the regular cable charges beyond the coastal stations must be collected in addition to the wireless charges. On messages to Alaska, Alberta, Saskatchewan, etc., add tolls from distributing point to destination.

CODE ADDRESSES

Code addresses registered with telegraph or cable companies may be used by the senders of messages sent from ships for delivery on land.

NO CHARGE FOR OFFICE OF ORIGIN

Effective with the establishment of word rates there will be no extra landline charge made for transmitting the names of steamships in the check of messages sent from ships.

VIA WESTERN UNION

All messages received at coastal stations must be forwarded "via Western Union" unless instructions are received to route otherwise.

SHIP TO SHIP

The rate for messages sent from one ship to another of the American Marconi Co. is 16 cents per word, with a minimum of ten words. This amount is to be entered on the report as "This Line" Tolls.

RATES TO AND FROM FOREIGN SHIPS

The rate on messages transmitted to or received from vessels of other companies (including the affiliated Marconi Companies) is 16 cents per word, with a minimum of ten words, divided 8 cents "This Line" and 8 cents "Other Lines."

SHIP'S BUSINESS MESSAGES

Messages relating strictly to ship's business will be delivered free when given to the station at the point of destination; also those given to Friday Harbor addressed to Seattle. When given to a station to be forwarded to their destination via landline, the landline tolls will be computed in accordance with the "Landline Word Rate" Schedule. Ship's business messages may be sent at night letter rate counted and charged as heretofore.

TRAFFIC BETWEEN SHIPS.

The rate for messages between ships is obtained by adding the respective rates of the sending and receiving ships. When transmitting messages of less than 10-words it must not be forgotten that certain vessels do not apply the 10 word minimum. Therefore in such cases the amount to be collected for the receiving ship Tax will only be the actual number of words transmitted multiplied by the receiving Ship Tax.

Notwithstanding the instructions contained in paragraph 40 of the General Orders & Circulars 131 and 133, prohibiting the sending of notes, and instructing that every message handled must be written on its proper blank, many operators continue to handle communications between stations in a contrary manner. This is noticed particularly between ship stations.

Effective immediately, each and every communication sent from a ship or coast station must be in the form of a message written upon the Company's official message form, properly addressed and signed. All free communications from ship stations relating in any manner to the vessel, its position, condition of the weather, or other information of any nature concerning the steamer or its owners, no matter to whom addressed, must be in official message form and SIGNED BY THE COMMANDER before being transmitted. After being properly transmitted, each and every message must be entered on the Traffic Statement and the original copy placed with the file of messages.

All Steamship Companies agree to the importance of these instructions and have suitably instructed their commanders, but should a commander or his responsible deputy refuse to sign any communication offered for transmission by ships' officers and order its transmission without such signature, the message must be forwarded and a written report of the matter immediately addressed to the Superintendent of the District, by the Operator in Charge.

Paid traffic containing any reference to the vessel, or business of the Steamship Company, must be endorsed by the commander before being transmitted.

All communications concerning the Marconi Company's business must also be in the regulation message form, addressed and signed.

It should be clear, that absolutely no conversation of any nature is to be engaged in, or verbal information or requests for information passed between stations. The operation of the apparatus will be confined to the uses prescribed by law, and the handling of messages EXCLUSIVELY.

Any operator failing to comply with these instructions will be subject to dismissal from the service.

Numerous cases of failure in making delivery of messages aboard ship are being reported, owing to not locating the addressee among the passengers. In many such cases, a claim is made for refund of tolls, the sender stating positively that the addressee was a passenger aboard the vessel at the time the message was received.

All operators must be very careful to find out to a certainty that the addressee of a message is positively not aboard their vessel, before giving up the search. If the steward who is called to deliver the message cannot find the addressee after consulting the passenger list and paging the person throughout the ship, notices must be immediately posted on the main companionway, in the Saloon, Social Hall, Smoking Room and on the door of the radio room, announcing the name of the person for whom there is a message on hand.

In addition, the operator in charge, when off watch, must consult the Purser regarding the matter and go over the passenger list very carefully. If there are passengers listed whose names are similar to the one shown in the message, each of them must be interviewed on the supposition that they might be the person for whom the message is intended. Notices must be left in their stateroom if they cannot be located.

A RECEIPT SIGNED BY THE ADDRESSEE MUST BE OBTAINED FOR EVERY MESSAGE DELIVERED. THIS INCLUDES "MSGs" AS WELL AS PAID MESSAGES.

It must be remembered that a copy of a message with the ship's reports is no proof of delivery.

Please carefully note the arrangements refer only to messages that are partly handled by cable, i.e., radiotelegrams which during the course of transmission are forwarded over cable lines and that they are addressed to or received from places in the British Empire.

These arrangements will come into force immediately. Instructions will probably be issued in a few days including New Zealand Stations in the above arrangements.

The above instructions do not apply to the ship tax.

The "COASTAL" rate will apply on ordinary messages forwarded through the Canadian Government Radiotelegraph Stations on the West Coast to vessels, irrespective of nationality, engaged in the coastal trade on the Pacific Coast; all such messages must have the prefix "C" inserted in the preamble.

This rate will not apply on messages to and from vessels engaged on transpacific runs.

RESUME OF RATES IN FORCE ON MESSAGES FORWARDED THROUGH
CANADIAN GOVERNMENT RADIOTELEGRAPH STATIONS
ON THE WEST COAST.

On and after January 1st, 1915, the following coastal rates will be in force on messages forwarded to vessels via the Canadian Government Radiotelegraph stations on the West Coast.

1. Ordinary messages for vessels engaged on transpacific or ocean voyages, 12 cents per word, with a minimum charge per message equal to the charge for ten words cable count.
2. Ordinary messages for vessels in the Coastal trade on the Pacific Coast, 6 cents per word, with a minimum charge per message equal to the charge for ten words, cable count; all such messages must have the prefix "C" inserted in the preamble.
3. Messages exchanged between the Captain of any ship and the owners or agents of such ships, in plain language and strictly on ships business, 5 cents per word, with a minimum charge per message equal to the charge for ten words, cable count; all such messages must have the prefix "SP" inserted in the preamble.
4. Messages for vessels engaged on the Triangular ferry run between lower Vancouver Island ports, Seattle, Vancouver, Nanaimo, and Comox, 5¢ per word, with a minimum charge per message equal to the charge for ten words, cable count; all such messages must have the prefix "FB" inserted in the preamble. The "Ferry" rate is divided
Coast tax 3¢ per word
Ship tax 2¢ per word

Please revise Circular No. 160 in accordance with the above.

The following is an excerpt from the "Rules and Regulations for the Operation and Navigation of the Panama Canal and Approaches Thereto, Including All Waters Under Its Jurisdiction". Promulgated by Executive Order No. 1990, dated July 9th, 1914:

40. As soon as radio communication can be established with the Canal, vessels should report their names, nationality, length, draft, tonnage, whether or not they desire to pass through the Canal, require coal, provisions, supplies, repairs, to go alongside of a wharf, the use of tugs, probable time of arrival, length of stay in port, or any other matters, of importance or interest. If this information has been previously communicated through agents or otherwise, to the Captain of the Port, it will not be necessary to report by radio; but the probable time of arrival should always be sent.

41. Control of radio communication is entirely in the hands of the radio shore stations. No vessel will be allowed to interfere in the slightest degree with the Canal radio stations; upon an order being received by a vessel at any time while within the waters under the control of the Canal to discontinue using radio, even if in the midst of transmission of a message, she shall immediately comply.

42. Upon a ship's arriving within the 15-mile limit, and until leaving the 15-mile limit of the Canal Zone, she shall transmit only with low power, not exceeding 1/2 K. W.

43. Messages to stations will be sent only to the Colon Station (NAX) when in Gatun locks and to northward thereof, and only to Balboa Station (NPJ) when in Miraflores locks and to southward thereof; between these two points ships may work to either station, preferably to the nearer one; the high power station (Darien) at Radio, will not handle commercial work and will not be called for Canal business except in case of emergency.

44. All messages between ships in the Canal Zone and ships at sea must be forwarded through the nearer shore station.

45. Messages from ships in the Caribbean Sea for ships in the Pacific waters, or vice versa, shall be routed through the Canal Zone shore stations.

46. All vessels fitted with radio, after leaving the terminal harbor to pass through the Canal, shall keep an operator on watch until the further terminal harbor has been reached; this applies to the time when they are anchored in Gatun Lake, while passing through the locks, or moored to the lock walls, or to any of the wharves in the Canal proper, as well as when they are under way. Messages relating to the ship's movements and the Canal business shall take place precedence over all commercial messages.

47. Pilots on vessels passing through the Canal shall have the right to use a vessel's radio freely for the transaction of the Canal business.

48. Under the direction of the pilots, vessels will from time to time report their progress through the Canal; accidents to machinery, propellers, steering gear, equipment, or anything else that may delay them or require assistance; any sickness or casualties that require medical attendance from Canal officials; or any other matters of importance that may arise.

49. No radio tolls, either coast station or forwarding will be imposed against ships on radiograms transmitted by ships on Canal business. There will be no charge made against the Panama Canal, by Canal Zone Land lines or radio stations, for the transmission of radiograms to ships on Canal business.

50. No vessel will be allowed to communicate with any lock or signal station while in transit through the Canal, except through the pilot; all messages of any kind must be sent through him. This does not apply to vessels moored at the terminals at Cristobal or Balboa, before entering or having passed through the Canal, which may wish to communicate through the terminal stations.

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On wireless telegrams received in relation to Canal business from Canal Zone Radio Stations, the "ship tax" of the receiving ship shall be charged against the sending Radio Coast Station.

The large number of head telephones received recently in bad order from ships prove very conclusively that they are being very carelessly handled by operators. The damage usually is either a broken cord, a broken terminal, a bent diaphragm, or a burnt-out coil.

The cord and terminals are evidently broken by an unnecessary strain put upon them. The diaphragms are bent by needless handling, and the coils are burnt out by carelessly placing the phones across some of the transmitting circuit wires, on the aerial switch, or the auxiliary coil.

All operators are cautioned to use more care in handling all apparatus, so that more drastic action in the matter will be unnecessary.

It has been ascertained that the reason for the rapid deterioration of cerussite crystals is that an accumulation of dust and dirt is allowed to remain on them. To prevent this, operators should brush off the crystal daily, when it is in use, and keep it carefully covered with a piece of cloth or paper, when not in use.

Defective cerussite detectors must be reported on Form 30 or Form 41. Repairs will then be made by the Construction Department.

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It has been noted that some operators do not exercise proper judgment in the handling of traffic during such times as static disturbances prevail.

The ability to handle traffic under such conditions is an essential qualification of all wireless operators and the strictest attention and cooperation is invited to the following suggestions:

Consideration for the receiving operator should be the guiding principle when transmitting through static. To transmit a message at high speed when static renders reception difficult at even a low rate of speed, results only in loss of time and energy.

The number of repetitions required and the speed of transmission should be determined by the nature of the prevailing static as well as the ability of the receiving operator.

When the transmitting operator decides as to the number of times he will repeat each word of the message, care should be taken to send steadily and to space properly. The transmitting operator should be particularly careful to see that each repetition is made in identically the same manner so as not to confuse the receiving operator with different signals. It should also be borne in mind that superfluous signals, while always detrimental to efficient operation, are especially hindering during static conditions and they should therefore be eliminated.

When receiving through static, the receiving operator should write down every letter received regardless of whether the word is completely received or not. In this manner the operator will receive everything possible and, with the aid of several repetitions, the message becomes completely intelligent.

Operators should also pay particular attention to the adjustments of the tuner when receiving through static as it will be found, in many cases, that signals may be read with greater ease when the receiving circuits are more loosely coupled, thereby minimizing the effect of static disturbances.

OPENING OF NAVAL RADIO STATIONS IN ALASKA TO COMMERCIAL BUSINESS.

1. The following naval radio stations will be opened for commercial messages on Jan. 15, 1913

St. Paul (Pribilofs), Dutch Harbor, Unalga, Kodiak, Cordova and Sitka.

Ship-to-shore Communications.

2. Messages will be accepted from ships at sea at any of the above mentioned stations for local delivery, or for any other of the above, at the rate of 5 cents per word.
Communications between Sitka and Cordova will be made at War Department cable rates.
3. Messages from ships at sea addressed to points in the United States will be charged for as follows:
From St. Paul (Pribilofs), Dutch Harbor, Unalga, and Kodiak to all points in the United States, except California, via North Head, Wash. Radio Station, 25 cents per word, plus the Western Union word rate to destination.
From St. Paul (Pribilofs), Dutch Harbor, Unalga, and Kodiak to points in California, via the Eureka Radio Station, 30 cents per word, plus the Western Union word rate to destination.
4. A message intended for any point in the United States, except California, will be sent by radio to North Head through any station able to handle the work, relayed if necessary. A message intended for California will be sent similarly by radio to Eureka.
5. The word rate for messages to points in Alaska on the War Department cables or telegraph lines will be 5 cents, plus the cable rate from Cordova or Sitka, if sent through Kodiak, Cordova or Sitka, or 10 cents per word, plus the radio and telegraph rate beyond Nome, if sent through Unalga, Dutch Harbor, or St. Paul and Nome.
6. Messages for Nome, St. Michael, or points in the interior of Alaska to be sent by radio to Nome, will be accepted at Unalga, Dutch Harbor and St. Paul only.
7. The word rate for messages to be sent to the United States via War Department cable will be 5 cents per word, plus the cable rate from Cordova to Seattle (24 cents) plus the land line rate to destination, whether sent through Cordova or Sitka stations.
8. ALL THE RATES GIVEN ABOVE ARE IN ADDITION TO THE SHIP RATE.
9. Messages for ships will be accepted from land lines and from War Department cables, land lines and radio station at Nome at the rates given above, IF FULLY PREPAID, including the ship rate.

Messages Filed at Radio Stations.

10. Messages will be accepted from the public at any of the stations mentioned in paragraph 1, above, as follows:

First: For transmission to any other of these stations at a word rate of 5 cents, except that messages between Cordova and Sitka will be charged cable rates.

Second: For transmission to the United States at the following rates:
From St. Paul (Pribilofs), Dutch Harbor, Unalga, and Kodiak to all points in the United States, except California, via North Head, Wash. Radio Station, 20 cents per word, plus the Western Union word rate to destination.

From St. Paul (Pribilofs), Dutch Harbor, Unalga, and Kodiak to all points in California, via Eureka Radio Station, 25 cents per word, plus the Western Union word rate to destination.

From Cordova and Sitka to all points in the United States, except California, via North Head Radio Station, 21 and 11 cents, respectively.

From Cordova and Sitka to all points in California, via Eureka Radio Station, 26 and 16 cents, respectively.

Third: For transmission to any stations on War Department cables or telegraph lines at a word rate of 5 cents, if sent via Cordova or Sitka, and 10 cents if sent via Nome, plus the War Department rate to destination from Cordova or Sitka, and Nome, respectively. Messages for transmission through the War Department radio station at Nome will be accepted at Unalga, Dutch Harbor, and St. Paul only.

Messages Originating in the United States.

11. Fully prepaid messages addressed to ships in Alaskan waters and to Alaskan points will be accepted at North Head and Eureka from the public or by land wire for transmission by radio at the rates mentioned above.

Minimum Charge.

12. In all cases the minimum charge will be for a radiogram of ten words.

Counting of Words.

13. The cable rules for counting words will be used throughout every word of address, message, and signature being counted.

Information.

14. Stations will furnish rates to any point on request. Additional information concerning rates or the handling of commercial messages by Alaskan stations may be obtained by addressing the Commandant, Navy Yard, Mare Island, Vallejo, Cal., or the Superintendent of Naval Radio Service, Radio, Va.

Wave Lengths of Alaskan Stations.

15. All Alaskan stations will use a wave length of 600 meters only in communication with ships, with the following exceptions:
First: Dutch Harbor, 600 meters, normal; 300 meters at certain times of which ships will be advised. Unalga, the controlling station, about 18 miles distant, will use 600 meters.
Second: Ships fitted to send at 1,800 meters may get into communication at long range by requesting a station to listen for calls at a certain hour on that wave length (or "tune") and to use that wave in sending.

16. Ships must use the wave length of the station in communicating.

North Head and Eureka Telegraph Rates.

17. The North Head and Eureka Naval Stations are connected to Western Union Lines only. Messages from Alaska sent through these stations must be routed via Western Union. Both Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies will use the "cable count" (see Par. 13) for all radiograms sent through naval radio station.

 a transmission to any station on War Department cables or by land at a word rate of 5 cents. If sent via Kodiak or Alaska it costs 10 cents via Nome, plus the War Department rate for transmission from Kodiak or Alaska, respectively. Messages for transmission through the War Department radio station at Dutch Harbor, Unalga, Dutch Harbor, and 21.5m only.

Messages Originating in the United States.

Any prepaid messages addressed to ships in Alaskan waters Alaskan points will be accepted at North Head and Kodiak by land or by land wire for transmission by radio at the rate mentioned above.

Minimum Charge.

In all cases the minimum charge will be for a radiogram of 10 words.

Counting of Words.

No cable rates for counting words will be used throughout word of address, message, and signature being counted.

Information.

Stations will furnish rates to any point on request. Additional rates concerning rates or the handling of commercial messages when stations may be obtained by addressing the Commandant, Alaska Island, Valdez, Al., or the Superintendent of Radio Service, Radio, Al.

Wave Lengths of Alaskan Stations.

All Alaskan stations will use a wave length of 600 meters only with the following exceptions:
 Dutch Harbor, 500 meters, normal; 300 meters at certain times of which ships will be advised. Unalga, the controlling station, 18 miles distant, will use 600 meters.
 Ships fitted to send at 1,600 meters may get into communication by requesting a station to listen for calls at a long range or that wave length (or "tone") and to use that wave length.

Ships must use the wave length of the station in communicating.

North Head and Dutch Harbor Radio.

The North Head and Dutch Harbor Radio Stations are connected to the Union lines only. Messages from Alaska sent through these stations must be routed via Western Union. Both Western Union and the "cable route" will use the "cable route" for all radiograms sent through naval radio station.

RULES FOR COUNTING MESSAGES BY "CABLE COUNT".

1. The minimum charge for a message is ten words; A message of less than ten words must be charged for as if it contained ten words.
2. All words in the message, including the address and signature, must be counted and charged for.
3. In the address of any message, the name of the office of destination, the name of the country and the name of the territorial subdivision are each counted as one word, no matter how many letters are employed.
4. The address of every message must consist of at least two words, the first indicating the name of the receiver and the second the name of the office of destination.
5. The sender is responsible for an incorrect or insufficient address. Corrections and alterations can only be made by a paid service message.
6. Messages destined for places beyond the lines of telegraph must contain instructions as to the name of the place from which they are to be mailed. Such instructions must be inserted as a part of the address, and must be paid for.

PLAIN MESSAGES.

7. Plain messages (i. e., neither Code nor Cipher) may be written IN ANY LANGUAGE THAT CAN BE EXPRESSED IN ROMAN LETTERS. In such messages each word of fifteen letters or less is counted as a word, and words of over fifteen letters are counted at the rate of fifteen letters or fractions of fifteen letters to a word.

CODE MESSAGES.

8. Code messages may contain words belonging to one or more of the following languages: English, French, German, Italian, Dutch, Portuguese, Spanish and Latin. The use of words of other languages is not allowed. Code messages may also contain artificial words—that is, groups of letters so combined as to be pronounceable in at least one of the eight admitted languages. In Code messages each code word (whether genuine or artificial) of ten letters or less is counted as a word, and no code word of more than ten letters can be accepted. If any words in plain language, and of more than ten letters each, are used in Code messages, they should be counted at the rate of ten letters or fraction of ten letters to a word.

CIPHER MESSAGES.

9. In Cipher messages, which may be composed of groups of figures or of groups of letters, the groups are counted at the rate of five figures or letters, or fraction thereof, to a word. Words in plain language inserted in such messages are counted as instructed in Rule 7.

COUNTING OF WORDS, etc.

10. Every isolated figure, letter or character counts as one word.
11. Words joined by a hyphen or separated by an apostrophe are counted as so many separate words.
12. Signs of punctuation, hyphens and apostrophes are not counted or paid except upon formal request of the sender, in which case they will be charged for as one word each.

Dear Sir-

Regarding the shipment of salmon to Fischers mill and the Bell St Dock from the Curacao Voyage 20. I do not know how the check came out with the day checker, I was six cases short of Fish-hawk brand and three cases over of Mid-Ocean brand. I understood the dock man to say there were some over on the day check so the brands were very likely mixed and will check OK.

The people at the Bell St Dock refused to sign for salmon discharged at that dock on account of so many cases broken by rope slings while being discharged. Mr Schultz was going down next morning and get a check on them but as he was not around sailing day I did not get to see him. I was at the Bell St Dock at seven P.M. Aug 28th. after trying to find the ship since six P.M. they told me at the dock she would be there in a few minutes but she did not get there until eight thirty or eight-forty and it was at that time I relieved Mr Schultz.
