



Meeting Minutes

The regular monthly meeting of NWVRS was held on September 10, 1983, convening at 10 A.M. with President Jerry Talbott presiding.

There were no corrections or additions to

the minutes of the meeting of August 13, as published in the Call Letter.

In the absence of Treasurer Ed Charman, the Treasurer's report was presented by President Talbott and was adopted.

GOOD AND WELFARE: Nothing to report, guests were introduced.

OLD BUSINESS: The Club jackets, as ordered, had arrived and were distributed.

NEW BUSINESS: Jerry Talbott reported on advertising for the upcoming October Swap Meet. An ad is now appearing in "Old Stuff" and will appear in "Nickle Ads" and as public service announcements on Channels 2, 6, and 8. Flyers were distributed to the membership to be placed in high traffic areas.

Suggestions on having a Radio Show in conjunction with the 1984 family picnic were discussed. This would be a "beauty type" contest with awards based on the decisions of a panel of judges. Ed Buhite suggested that a more concise definition of old radio be available in judging such an event. Dick Howard agreed to furnish a copy of the guide lines AWA uses for their shows. The matter was tabled for future consideration.

Our participation in the Forest Grove Auto Concourse was discussed. If we enter in the future it was agreed that better security and more advertising for the NWVRS display should be provided by

the Concourse. Dick Karman agreed to write Forest Grove. More information will follow.

Jerry Talbott presented a menu from the Speak Easy Restaurant and asked for suggestions and discussion on having a Club social dinner there. Speak Easy is the former Butcher's Bistro where Club members enjoyed an evening dinner on July 18, 1980. It is reported that the old radios featured by Butcher's are still on display. Members present seemed, generally, to approve of such an event but no definite action was taken and the matter will be presented again at the October meeting.

Dick Karman reported on the status of advertising in the Call Letter and urged members to promote new advertising wherever possible.

Bob Campbell suggested using commemorative electrical stamps (a series of four different stamps), on Call Letter mailings. This should appeal to stamp collectors.


Jerry Talbott reported that Woodcrafters at 212 N.E. 6th Ave., Portland, was a good source for iron-on veneer.

1877: Grand-daddy of all microphones was Alexander Graham Bell's
box telephone, into which Thomas A.
Watson shouted and sang in the first
intercity demonstrations of the infant
art of telephony.



1920: Telephone scientists developed the first successful commercial mike damped type. Used first in public adeas; systems, it later became the acry symbol of broadcasting.

The microphones shown on these two pages were manufactured by Western Electric (o. They are the same as ones the station used where I first worked as engineer (excepting the 1877 mod., and the '20 and '21 models) The quality was much better than contemperaneous radio receivers could supply.

From 1946 Bell Labs. advertising. (tj)

1935: The first non-directional mike — the famous Western Electric 8-Ball, designed by Bell Laboratories. Small, spherical, it provided top quality single mike pick-up of speech or music from every direction.



1936: Directional with slide-an baffle, non-directional without it, the Salt Shaker gave highest quality pick-up at low cost. Widely used in studios and remotes as well as in high quality sound distribution.



1921: The condenser microphone, designed by Bell Laboratories for sound measurement in 1916, entered the public address and broadcasting fields. It provided a wide frequency tange and reduced distortion.



1931: Bell Telephone Laboratories developed the Western Electric moving coil or dynamic microphone. The first of its kind, it was rugged, noiseless, compact, and needed no polarizing energy. Many are still in use.



1938: Cardioid directional microphone, with ribbon and dynamic elements, was the first mike ever to combine 3 pick-up patterns in one instrument. The later 639B, with 6 patterns, is also one of the finest all-purpose mikes ever made.



1937: The Western Electric "Machine Gun" mike does for sound pick-up what the telephoto lens does for photography. Sharply directional, ups" at unusually long range.

It is the feeling of the board that the active members should have more involvement in this process. It is the hopes of the board members that new names, new ideas and new directions may be generated out of this and other similar ideas.


