- 5- Amateur receivers and SW converters

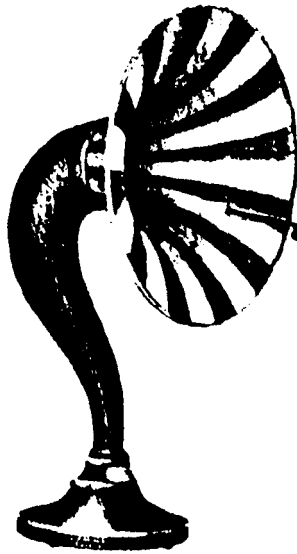
There will be a 1st, 2nd, & 3rd place ribbon awarded in each category. Each contestant may enter radios in three of the five categories.

Judging will be conducted by everyone attending the combination Radio contest and Picnic. 5 tickets will be given each person present, one for each category. To vote, place a ticket in the dish near the radio of your choice. The radio with the most tickets will be awarded 1st place, the second most popular will be given 2nd place etc.

After the monthly meeting and the Club Contest, we will have our annual Pot-luck picnic. The Power Supply will furnish punch, iced tea, coffee, and hot bread.

Please bring your silverware and a hot or cold dish. Also, we can always use extras like pickles, olives, dips & chips, vegetable sticks, etc.

Do plan to stay after the meeting for the picnic. It's always more enjoyable if we have a good attendance.

Tom James who recently passed from us, had been a contributing writer or editor of the Call Letter since 1974. Tom's early works of poetry were labeled TOM JAMES' POETRY HOUR by the first editor.

To be more formal, Tom gave a single title to all his contributions. First, in the April 1976, ATMOSPHERICS appeared at the head of the poetry. Later ATMOSPHERICA was used and has been in every issue since 1977, making Tom the longest (and only) continuous contributor.

To continue this nearly ten year old tradition, the Call Letter has obtained permission to use Tom's writing in his absence, and is seeking permission to award Tom James the title of EDITOR EMERITUS (posthumously).

Funeral for Thomas W. James, a southeast Portland resident and retired radio station engineer, will be at 1 pm Wednesday in Holman's Funeral Service. Mr James, 72 died Sunday in a Portland Hospital (Providence).

Born in Riverside Washington, Mr James had been a Portland Area resident for nearly 50 years. He retired more than 15 years ago after working 22 years for radio station KPOJ. He was a member of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society (and Marconi's Cronies).

Mr. James is survived by his wife, Dorothy; a son, John, of Portland; two daughters, Valerie James, Portland, Margret Sorino, Arturas, California; eight grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.

Burial will be in Rose City Cemetary. The family suggests memorial contributions to the Oregon Heart Association.

There is little time to get prepared for the Puget Sound Antique Radio Association's annual Radio Contest. The date is Sunday, August 19th. Many NWVRS members attended last year's contest and invitation Swap Meet and enjoyed a day of good radios, and good company.

PSARA categories

- 1- Crystal Sets
- 2- Battery Sets, less than 4 tubes
- 3- Battery sets, 4 tubes or more
- 4- A.C. Table Model radios
- 5- Plastic Radios
- 6- Novelty Radios
- 7- Consoles (all)

PSARA Rules

No radio which has taken first place in past contests may be entered.

Plaques and accessories may be entered and displayed with the radios as long as the owner's name is not visible.

Contests sets must be registered before 1:15 pm.

PSARA Agenda

- 11:00 am begin swap meet
- 1:00 pm last call for contest entries
- 1:15 pm contest judging begins
- 2:15 pm contest judging closes
- 2:45 pm contest results announced
- 15 minute photo session begins
- 3:00 pm announcements and check out

(Although there is no limit to the number of sets a contestant may enter, PSARA recommends approximately 4 per participant)

The PSARA contest judging:

Judging will be conducted in a similar manner as last year. Each club member will be allowed to fill out one Judging scorecard. The scorecards along with specific instructions will be handed out at the time of judging. Generally, each club member will be allowed to vote for the top three sets in each category and vote for the top three choices for best of show.

The votes will be tallied as follows: Three points will be given for each first place vote. Two points will be given for each second place vote. One point will be given for each third place vote. Additional points will be added for within each category for best of show votes. The highest scoring radios in each category will win first place second place and third place ribbons. One ribbon (only) will be awarded for best of show.

Judging criteria will be in the minds of the beholder, however consideration should be given to condition, authenticity, and desirability. Individual voting and honesty are required to maintain a fair contest. voting in groups or discussion while voting will not be permitted. Radio ownership should not be taken into account during the judging process.

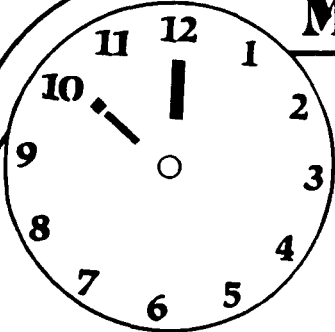
PSARA Invitational Swap Meet

Members were informed that the Puget Sound Antique Radio Association swap meet will be held at the Ronald School on N. 175th Ave., just west of Aurora Ave., Seattle, on August 19th at 11:00 a.m.

NEW BUSINESS:

Members were reminded that the annual Club Picnic will be held at the Club House after the August meeting. The Power Supply was authorized to purchase miscellaneous supplies and get-well cards, and to be reimbursed from the treasury.

The 10th anniversary dinner will be held in November at a location to be determined.

The membership authorized the purchase of a videotape (VHS) of the Antique Wireless Association's Museum at a cost of approximately \$30.

Dick Karman advised of the proposed establishment of an advertising museum in the Portland downtown area by the Portland Federation of Advertisers, and suggested that Club members provide items for inclusion in the radio advertising section. Reaction was favorable.

Needs and leads were given, and the meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m., followed by a lively auction.

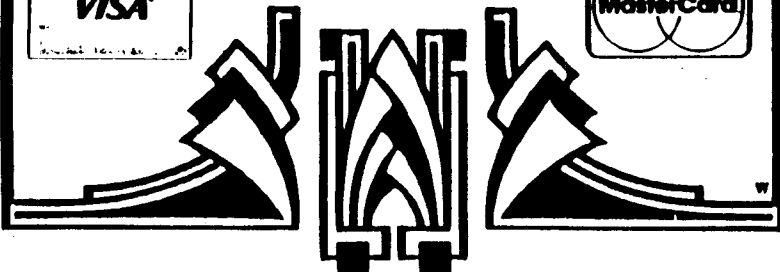
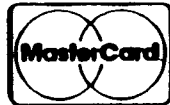
