Newsletter consolidation.

The question was raised by members prior to the January meeting. "Could we mail one newsletter for our society and the Seattle Club?" The ideas were discussed at the January meeting, and many seemed to be in favor of consolidation.

Your editor has looked into the matter and found the following.

Three newsletters would have to merge; The Puget Sound Antique Radio Society, The Northwest Vintage Radio Society and possibly the California Historic Radio Society. This would raise the number of "subscribers" to over 400, a minimum for reducing costs and upgrading quality.


This consolidation would benefit our society in the following ways:

- 1. allow photographs to be used;
- 2. allow mailing under Bulk Rate;
- 3. permit type setting of materials for more density and quality of type;
- 4. enlarge the readership of our want ads by 300 per cent;
- 5. increase the number of contributing writers while minimizing editorial work.

Our society will potentially host the combined newsletter and will therefore be the one responsible for the financial matters. Each club would pay according to it's number of members.

Meeting Minutes



The January 15th meeting was called to order at 10:00 am by incoming President Dick Karman.

The 1985 officers were introduced. The minutes of the December meeting were approved as published in the CALL LETTER. The Treasurer's report was given and accepted. The current balance is \$445.29.

GOOD AND WELFARE:

Dick Karman reported that Harley Perkins had died about a year ago on the east coast. Harley was one of the earliest organizers of the club and was the first president.

OLD BUSINESS:

Dick Karman requested that a committee be formed to prepare plans for future swap meets and to present them to the membership. Bill Devey volunteered to join Jerry Talbott and Dan Wills on the committee.

Two 2-drawer file cabinets have been purchased for use by the Call Letter staff. Repayment of the cost of \$81.00 was approved.

Radio Sale lists were passed around. These were lists of radio collections that are for sale which we requested by mail.

NEW BUSINESS:

Members were informed of the upcoming joint Antique Wireless Association and Puget Sound Antique Radio Association swap meet to be held in Seattle on March 17th.

Dan Wills resigned from office of Corresponding Secretary. Robert Teague's offer to fill the vacancy was accepted. Members who wish to have complete information (special interests, vocation, etc.) included in the club roster were urged to submit the information as soon as possible.

Dick Karman stated that in view of the declining membership, he feels the need for a membership committee to welcome new members and actively promote membership in the club. No action was taken.

The possibility of consolidating the News Letters of our society, the Puget Sound Antique Radio Association, and the California Historic Radio Society was discussed. Action was deferred pending further information.

The matter of unlimited free advertising in the SWAP SHOP section of the Call Letter was considered. A motion limiting the personal ads to one quarter of a page and to leave further limitations to editorial discretion was passed. In connection with this and at the request of the Call Letter editor an advisory committee consisting of Bill Devey, Robert Teague, Art Redman, and Sonny Clutter was formed.

The problem of what to do with donations of equipment to the society was briefly discussed and tabled for later consideration.

Wally Kelly and Bill Devey volunteered to conduct the next club auction, to be scheduled by the president.

Decreasing membership and increasing costs may require changes in procedures. Increased dues, increased paid advertising and possibly bi-monthly news letters were mentioned.

Jerry Talbott and Chuck Kibler offered to arrange for a club exhibit at the special old radio and phonograph Flea Market in Salem on February 17th. All members wishing to display or sell should contact Jerry or Chuck.

Joey Tompkins reminded the membership that there is a lot to be gained by a membership in the AWA and encouraged all of us to consider the benefits.

LEADS and NEEDS:

Larry Callahan asked for possible sources of dry cell batteries suitable to power early battery sets.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:05.

Joseph V Tompkins, 76, of Salem, died Friday.

He was born in Warren and grew up in Grand Island, near Dayton. He attended Dayton and Amity schools, Willamette University and Oregon State University. He was a commercial photographer and a retired cameraman for KGW-TV. He was known for his feature stories around Salem and was the official photographer for the Oregon State Fair for 15 years.

He was a charter member and past president of the Northwest Salem Lions Club, charter president of the Rose City Press Photographers Association, American Legion Post 136 and a Marine Corp veteran of World War II.

After his retirement he collected old radios and and was active in the North-west Vintage Radio Society.

Survivor include his wife, Evelyn, Daughter, Cyndi Thompkins, Honolulu; and Lynelle Tompkins, Billings, Montana; son, Joeseph E., Portland; sister, Lorene Reierson, Manzanita; twin Brother Russell, Eugene.

Memorial services are pending at Howell-Edwards-Doerksen mortuary.


