## REFINISHING CABINETS by Herb Brams

Remove the old finish with a liquid stripper using steel wool or a stiff brush. Do not use scrapers as they may leave scratches. Allow the stripped cabinet to dry for a day. Fill small holes and other defects with a wood filler. Allow the filler to dry then sand the cabinet by hand, first with medium, then with very fine sandpaper. Do not use a power sander or sanding block as, typically, the wood curves slightly upwards near edges and it is easy to sand right through the veneer. Always rub in the direction of the grain. After sanding, remove all dust.

stripped cabinet will now probably be The much lighter in color than before and should be stained to improve its appearance. Some parts of the cabinet may have beautiful mahogany or walnut veneers. These woods will be revealed clearly when the cabinet is wet with thinner. The fine woods are best left unstained. A clear yellow stain, such as Minwax Golden Oak may be used, however, to give the wood a mellow tone. Dark stains should be avoided as they often give a course, grainy appearance. Parts of the cabinet with fine woods should be stained and have a coat of finish applied to protect them before other parts of the cabinet are worked on.

Other parts of the cabinet may be made of plain, light-colored woods. These often have prominent, irregular grain patterns that do not stain well. To make these areas presentable, stain the wood with muddy, pigmented stain such as Minwax Special Walnut. The opaque pigments will darken the wood effectively and tone down the unsightly grain patterns. Two coats of stain are usually necessary. Some parts of the cabinet may not look good even after staining. These usually include the edges and base of the cabinet, and the inside of the speaker grill. I paint these areas a dark brown enamel paint obtained by mixing brown with black. The paint can also be used to accent lines and various pieces of trim.

For the final finish I use a satin Polyurethane finish, applying it with a brush. Avoid glossy finishes; they tend to be too shiny and show brush strokes. Also avoid colored finishes; they too will reveal brush strokes. Before starting, make sure all stained and painted surfaces have dried for at least a dav. Sand the wood lightly to smooth it, but take care not to remove the paint or the stain. Remove all dust. Lay the cabinet down so that the working surface is horizontal. Brush the finish on to cover the wood completely, then go over again holding the brush so that it touches it the wet surface very lightly. This will even and remove air bubbles. the coat Avoid slopping on a thick coat of finish. The excess will run and form sag marks. Let the finish dry undisturbed for a day or more. Sand the first coat carefully with fine sandpaper and apply a second coat. Be particularly careful here to apply the liquid sparingly as it will not soak into the wood as quickly as before but will have a tendency to run, forming sag marks. You will find it easiest to do all staining & finishing on one side of the cabinet at one time. Be sure to wipe up immediately any spills of stain. paint, or finish that run onto a previously-treated surface.

[Your editor prefers natural finishes like shellac, varnish, or tung oil, over polymers.]

## SAMPLE BALLOT

### Duties of the Office

(article 5 of the constitution of NVRS)

**President:** The president shall preside at all regular & special meetings of the membership, and at the Board of Directors meetings. The Treasurer shall supply the membership chairman the names of all members in good standing, to be available to the membership at the second regular meeting of the year.
