The business meeting was succinct. The Ballot was rounded out and filled in to perfection. Guests received complimentary CALL LETTERS & new memberships resulted.


As a combination of new members, table fees, and those who sold enough to pay dues for the coming year, the treasurer did a land office business. It's nice to see the society in the black.

REMEMBERING
Paul Frees
1900-1986

Paul got his start in radio in a 1932 impersonation contest on the home town station. He was once billed as America's most versatile actor while being the star and only actor on "The Player" a radio program which could be heard in 1948 and 49. But early radio may better remember him as the announcer on one of the great anthology series, "ESCAPE". He was active in the escape cast from 1947 until it's last show in 1954. Frees was one of the flunkies around Blair medical center on DOCTOR KILDARE, heard on DANGEROUS ASSIGNMENT, a supporting actor on A MAN NAMED JORDON and had the title role in the GREEN LAMA.

Paul made a smooth transition to TV. Producers would call on him when they needed a voice, & wanted quality. Walt Disney called upon him to be Ludwig Von Drake and Pillsbury got him to be the Doughboy. Mr. Frees played over a million different voices in his 54 year career.

Mr. Frees appeal was universal. For years he was Boris Badenov on the Rocky and Bullwinkle show, & you may remember the little people on the "Jolly Green Giant" commercials.

If you don't recognize these, you may remember the cultured voice of the announcer for Mobile Oil and Foremost Dairies and the voice of the TV tycoon on the "The Millionaire".

Though we won't miss the seldom-seen white mustache or shocks of unkempt white hair, we will remember Paul Frees when we hear the voice of Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer, and Frosty the Snowman. Death came on November 3rd, 1986.

Sixty Years with **KEX**

An AM Radio station that has become as much a part of Portland as the Steel Bridge, the Willamette River, or the perpetual rain, is turning 60 this year.

On Christmas eve of 1926 authority to operate was granted and **KEX** began broadcasting from studios in the Terminal Sales Building. Government regulations were still being established & licenses would not be issued until July 1927. At this time **KEX** was assigned 670 on the AM band, with 2500 Watts of power.

Finances and equipment malfunction, as well as two frequency changes nearly foretold the downfall of the station in 1927. The holding company, Western Broadcasting Company, was owned by Seattle's Northwest Radio Supply Company which also owned Seattle's **KJR**. Financial difficulties were overcome for a short while when Adolph Linden of the Puget Sound Savings Bank pumped money into the parent organization. Linden started the American Broadcasting Company in early 1929 and fed six half hour programs per week from **KJR** to **KEX** and five other west coast affiliates. There was more financial troubles and ABC was abandoned. By December 1929 **KEX** had joined the NBC-blue Network chain and Western Broadcasting became a subsidiary of NBC. In 1931 the pacific area stations became the Gold network and later went back to the blue .

In 1933 the Oregonian Publishing Company desired a sister station to **KGW** in Portland, so they leased **KEX** from Western and soon after purchased it. The assigned frequency was 1180. After more frequency changes, **KEX** finally (in 1941) became established at 1190 (where it remains to this day). After a fire did

substantial damage, the The terminal sales building studios were rebuilt and reequipped. Shortly thereafter the FCC's duo-poly ruling forced the Oregonian to sell **KEX**. Westinghouse bought the Blue-affiliated station for \$400,000. In 1945, less than a year later, the Blue network became ABC.

The forties continued to be growing years. The chief engineer was Harold Singleton, "traffic" was handled by Ralph Greer, Barney Keep started his morning show & Abe Bercovitz was music director. With a fixed frequency, a new owner, and a solid network, maximum 50,000 wattage came in 1947. **KEX-FM** at 92.3 Megacycles went on the air in 1948. The FM station had a classical format and could only be called non-commercial. AM air sales supported the FM counterpart. In the Fifties **KEX** dropped their ABC affiliation (1956) and moved the studios to a 2 story building at 2130 SW 5th Ave (1959).

Gene Autry's Golden West Broadcasters bought **KEX** in 1962 for \$900,000 and by 1964 **KEX** was an independent middle-of-the-road music and news station. Late night broadcasting still included many old radio shows. In that same year **KEX-FM** was donated to the State of Oregon and became KOAP, Portland's PBS affiliate on the FM band. Chief engineer was Norm Herman.

In 1973 **KEX** took up an affiliation with ABC for the third time. Also in the seventies they began AM stereo broadcasting, and once again picked up an FM sister station KQFM in 1977. The seventies saw national recognition for award winning news and entertainment under program director Eric Norberg and news director Jim Howe. It was during these years that old time radio programs were only heard in concentrated

"festivals" 4 times a year.

In November of 1978 the studios were moved to "Golden West Broadcast Center", 4949 SW Macadam Ave., only months before Barney Keep retired from over 30 years on KEX. Chief engineer was Paul Matthew.

The 80's brought change again. Both the AM and FM were sold to Taft Broadcasting for \$8,000,000. The FM side is now known as KKRZ and it's format is "contemporary hit radio". KEX has for some time been known as Radio for Grown Ups with an official format of Adult Contemporary. As much Portland as the west hills, and the Columbia gorge, we look forward to KEX being around another 60 years. Happy Birthday KEX.


