PART OF **PORTLAND** RADIO PASSING AWAY


He was not born in Portland, nor will he be laid to rest in Portland, but John Salisbury has been part of broadcasting in Portland since 1955. He came to Portland to be program coordinator for KLOR-TV. Two years later he moved to KPTV where he stayed for three years. In 1961 he joined KXL as news director and executive director of news and public affairs.

After 19 years at KXL Mr. Salisbury retired, retaining the title of senior news analyst. Recently John Salisbury could be heard giving a series of live reports from EXPO 86.

His years on the air started while he was in high school in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1933. His education continued at the University of Minnesota, class of 1941.

After a hitch in the Army during WW II, he returned to the post of administrator for the National Academy of Broadcasting at Washington D.C. From 1950 to 1953 he was an administrator of the Beck School of Broadcasting, Minneapolis.

Salisbury died of a heart attack on June 27th at his home in Portland.

Technical Tips

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Not all Bad!

Some folks assume that if a tube tests bad, it is bad through and through. It is not so! Before throwing it away or using it to "hold a place", use masking tape on the tube and socket to prevent mixing up the leads. Unsolder the leads very carefully and remove the tube from the socket.

Clean out the socket parts and clean the leads. Run a small bead of epoxy cement around the socket. Replace and resolder the leads.

Several "no good" 01As have been saved this way. Corrosion forms around the wires with the pins of the socket and prevent a "good" test. New solder works miracles.



A good way to preserve the gloss on panels & brass parts is to spray lightly with AMWAY spray shoe polish. This gives a fine coat that brightens the panels and parts, and also protects the item against deterioration. The spray is clear and last for several years. It may be obtained from AMWAY dealers. You will be surprised at the luster it adds. It is easily removed with water.


