



The Purloined Bookcase

Broadcast station KQY was located on the third floor of the building occupied by Stubbs Electric Co., 6th and Oak Streets in down-town Portland, Oregon. In a special section honoring the firm's 50th anniversary, the Sunday Journal of September 21st, 1947, contained the following information.

"In 1898 an Army quartermaster came to O.B.Stubbs, a Portland hardware dealer, and discussed the possibility of lighting and ventilating a ship for transporting horses. Stubbs formed a partnership with W.O.Fouch, an electrician. They designed the system, devised the supplies, and manufactured them from improvised materials. When the system was turned on everything worked perfectly. The U.S.Army shipped horses to the Philippines using this system."

From this beginning the company grew to be one of the largest electrical supply firms on the Pacific coast. The company began selling wireless spark transmitters and parts in 1912. Working in the store in 1914 was a teenager, Wilbur J. Jerman, who in later years was W7AXO and owned broadcast stations KFWV and KWJJ. In a most interesting interview with Wilbur the inevitable question came up as to when he first became interested in radio. He first heard music over the air when Olfan DeGuire of Silverton, Oregon transmitted voice and music over his modulated arc transmitter in 1910. Two years later Alfred Adams sold Jerman his first audion tube and a hole was cut in the table to hold it.

Wilbur's interest in radio never sagged. While at Stubbs in 1921 he constructed a little 5 watt transmitter and at night would place the set on the counter and play phonograph records. The station was not licensed at this time. In reminiscing of the event Wilbur explained that the plate voltage was supplied by the elevator's power supply-a motor generator delivering 500 volts. It was not so much fear of the radio inspector that kept the set off the air during working hours-he had no power when the elevator was in use.

In the spring of 1922 a studio was constructed in the building and the station became licensed. Had he secured a broadcast license a



short time earlier, he could have become the first in Portland. The new set-up now called for more power and a new transmitter was built. In searching for something to contain it, he kept eying Mr. Stubbs' bookcase. As Stubbs was out of town the manager thought it would be alright if it was used for the radio. Out went the books and in went the new set, complete with a pair of 50 watt tubes and a speech amplifier. For broadcasting orchestras and large groups, a ply-wood horn was attached to a Wonderphone carbon mike. The station was now being heard all over the United States and foreign countries. When Mr. Stubbs arrived home he was so pleased that no complaint was ever made about the bookcase.





NWVRS President's Page

Very near the CALL LETTER Deadline I received a tentative report from the museum committee. It is too long to include in its totality so I trust that they will not be offended by a summary of the material.

Frank Rasada met with the interim committee and explained that he has been seeking a location for a radio museum in several parts of the country. He and his wife share the hobby and they have made a significant investment in a building in the Multnomah district of Portland. They will take the time and effort to make a showplace for vintage radio whether NWVRS wishes to participate or not. They see no conflict with the operating philosophy of NWVRS nor our participation.

At the meeting, logistics of how the building will be used were also explained. The larger, more formal area will be a private museum, shown by appointment and perhaps open to general members on certain occasions. Frank plans to set up a "full library" in one portion of the building, and has offered to reserve a portion of the lower floor as a meeting area which could be used by NWVRS for meeting, swap meets and functions.

In regard to cooperation between Frank and the NWVRS, he is willing to give unlimited use (within reason) of a portion of the building, and limited access to other portions of the building. Frank will be handling the insurance, maintenance and utilities for the building, and for the time being, is only asking for volunteer labor to assist in some of his planned structural and design changes.

Frank welcomes any amount of participation the NWVRS wishes to have and has offered us meeting space as early as March.

I appreciate the members of the interim committee who took time to meet and Tom Moore for formalizing the meeting notes. We will again discuss this and other business at the January meeting, and I have have asked for a full re port for the February CALL LETTER.





N W V R S MEETING MINUTES

December 1990

The December meeting was called to order at 10:05. The treasurers report was given and accepted.

OLD BUSINESS:

January is our annual business meeting, and the Society would like maximum attendance. The part of the meeting minutes published in the Call Letter having to do with the museum we are looking into were changed. sentence reading "restoration of the building" should have been "remodeling of the building". Copies of other Society newsletters were brought in for members to look at. Additional people were encouraged to join the society. Don't hesitate to sell a membership. Nominations for next years Board were asked for. Twenty seven members were present for

Volunteers for cleanup committee were requested. This position comes with a free membership. Volunteers for refreshment committee were

requested also.

The committee to help the Vice President with events and activities

A special committee to look into the new location for the club was discussed. This would be a 60 day tentative committee, and afterward a permanent museum committee would be appointed by the board. The museum being look at is on 31st and Capitol Highway in the Multnomah Village area. It is complete with kitchen facilities, and room for Society meetings and displays. The Board feels that the occupancy should be on a written one to three year tenure. Volunteers for the tentative museum committee are Doug Davee, Tom Moore, Kim Brickman, Ed Buhite, and Sonny Clutter. This group will be of a fact finding nature, and will investigate the potential situations that the Society may come into, as well as what the museum owner would like from this agreement.

The next item of discussion was changes to the constitution. Article 2, section 3 will read "New members may join the Society by submitting a written application, and payment of [current] dues. Article 3, section 3 will read "New members will pay the annual dues prorated based on the

month of their entrance into the society"

The changes to the by-laws are as follows: Article 1, section 4 "New members" individuals may become regular associate, or honorary members of this organization by submitting a written application for such membership to any officer of the organization. New membership shall be conditioned upon (for regular and associate members) the payment of one years dues assessed against the particular class of the new member [prorated by the month of payment]. Article 2, section 1 "General: The officers of this organization shall be: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary [(also known as Secretary)], Corresponding Secretary [(also known as Correspondents)] and Member at large...". The Board agreed that copies of the constitution be printed and given to new members. The Board also encourages membership dues to be paid no later than the February meeting. This will ensure that member of registration in the roster, and keep him in good standing. Election of next years board was completed.

NEW BUSINESS:

The first item was permission of leeds in the newsletter. It was motioned, second, and opened for discussion. It was agreed by a vote of 17 to 5 that a disclaimer of the leeds be printed on that page in the newsletter. Arrangements for the tables at the Salem fairground show were brought up. A motion that the Society display be on separate tables from the sale items was passed by a unanimous vote. Doug Davee would be the committee chairman. Volunteers to be on the display committee with Doug are: Kim Brickman, Dave Rutland, Scott MacGregor, and Dave Rutland. Leeds and needs were given. Meeting adjourned at 11:19.
