

MEETING MINUTES
Portland, Oregon Oct 12, 1991

Ray Nelson, our Vice President opened the meeting of the N W V R S at 10:11 AM.

Ray asked for comments on the September auction. There was disappointment on the number of people attending & that the prices were very low. Richard Dielschneider suggested having a sign out in front of the building, advertising the event. John Otterstedt commented that the Multnomah community was very good in participating in events. More advertising was suggested. While Art Redman was passing out the ballots for voting on the contests, Ray Nelson asked if there were any changes or corrections of the September meeting minutes. The minutes were approved as published. Ed Charman gave the treasures report. The report was approved as submitted. Ray Nelson then introduced a guest: David Palameno.

OLD BUSINESS: Dick Dielschneider mentioned the Christmas party, he said that he and John Otterstedt had discussed the party. They suggested having the dinner at 6:00PM and have the meeting at 4:00PM. A Home-Brew Beer and Sausage Rig


Let me take you back to 1860 and the first recorded attempt to transmit speech by electricity. In that year Phillip Reis, a German schoolteacher, constructed a voice transmitter by hollowing out a beer-barrel bung and stretching a sausage skin over the small end. He fastened a thin strip of platinum foil to the skin. A second foil strip, placed a small distance above the first, had a contact point that was adjusted to lightly touch the first foil strip.

As Herr Reis spoke into the large end of the bung, his voice vibrated the sausage skin, causing the contacts to make and break with with the same frequency as his voice (more or less). That accomplished, he faced the problem of getting a receiver. His solution was simple and ingenious.

To build a receiver, Herr Reis used a violin. He took the violin and stuck a steel knitting needle in the violin's bridge and placed a coil of wire around the needle to make an electromagnet. The transmitter, receiver, and a battery were connected in series. The battery current, modulated by the transmitter, intermittently energized the receiver electromagnet. This caused the violin strings to vibrate audibly—presumably, at frequencies corresponding to those of the original sound.

Did it work? Just barely. A solid tone, as from another violin, occasionally could be reproduced fairly well. When trying to reproduce speech, only a rare syllable could be recognized and very indistinctly at that. Succeeding equipment was slightly more successful but the method of reproducing sound by making and breaking contact never proved practical.

Perhaps it's stretching things a bit to say that our modern microphones are descended fom German beer and sausage (noble as this lineage might seem) but modern equipment would not exist without these early experiments.







Indoor Swap Meet



Contest




