NVRS History (Part 2)

June, 1977:

The CALL LETTER of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society announces the resignation of the society's founder Bob Bilbie. The story cited personal and health reasons for the resignation. Bob's departure moved, then Vice President, Tom James into the President's role, and Alan Shattuck to Vice President.

This headline was not the only thing that caught the eye of the 132 paid up members in 1977. This CALL LETTER was the first to come out in the "half fold format" that we are used to today. This was the work of the new editor Bob Hay. For nearly 16 years we have had the 8 1/2" by 5 1/2" CALL LETTER, but that spring it was quite a change from the format which Bob Bilbie originated and passed on to Tom James. Bob Hay only kept the position of Editor for about a year, but the format change stood the test of time.

Then President, Tom James, took over the editor's post again in June 1978. At that time member Doug Eggert was printing labels on a main frame computer and did most of the copying of the publication on a Xerox machine, but the editor was generally responsible for folding, stapling, labeling and mailing the CALL LETTER.

Although Dorothy & Tom James, Bobbie Kibler, Hugh & Virginia Ranken, and Joey Tompkins continued to be valued contributors to the CALL LETTER, editorship changed hands many times. In January 1980 when Bill Devey took the helm. In January 1981 Jim Mason took it on for a couple years. Your current editor picked up the paste-up job in February 1983. In 1987 Edwin Buhite, of PSARA, directed the word processing; and in 1992 your current editor returned to the post.

No matter who has his name on the editor's line, the CALL LET-TER has been a quality monthly publication for 19 years. It is something to look forward to and it always has been a friendly reminder of meetings, business and camaraderie. Thanks currently to Scott MacGregor (reporter), F.W. Sloat (writer), VP Gordon Philips (bindery strawboss, and his crew), and President Speed Feldschau (encouragement and support), who make it all possible.



KBPS 70 Years Old


Last Month KBPS celebrated its 70th birthday. KBPS was licensed to begin broadcasting on March 23rd, 1923. Even among those who argue about what stations were first, second, third, etc, this station ranks up there; about number two.

In October of 1986, Andy Bell, and I, armed with radio gear from several members, put on a display of early radio equipment at the birth place of the station: a stately home at NE 22nd & Hancock Street. It was part of a reception given by supporters of National Public Broadcasting for KBPS. We enjoyed the opportunity and the publicity that our society received. (For details see November 1986 Call Letter, page 10.)

KBPS, the only AM station to be owned and operated by a school district, was moved to Bensen High School when the students themselves purchased the station's license. At first it was part of the engineering course at Bensen. It has continue to train young engineers and broadcasters ever since. An estimated 8,000 students have some small part in its operation each year.

Now with educational budget cuts they are threatening to take KBPS off the air. Parents, students, and faculty all have voiced their dismay over this unique educational opportunity possibly falling to the "budget ax." Many former students, now in the broadcast profession, have raised their voices in protest. What can be done?

KBPS is part of radio's past; part of Portland's future; and most assuredly part of vintage radio. Take a few minutes to write to the station's General Manager Patricia Swensen, at 515 NE 15th Avenue, Portland, Oregon, and offer your support. Never have members of the NVRS had a better cause to stand behind than preserving a call sign that has been around for nearly 70 years.
