

## The Northwest Vintage Radio Society

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in radio-related historic preservation. The dues are \$15.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st.

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was founded by our first president Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous members the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that both informs members of the society's business and that has supported the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held monthly (except July and August) at the Northwest Vintage Radio Museum, 7675 SW Capitol Highway (at 32nd street) in Portland Oregon. They generally convene at or about 10 AM and for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings)

Other Society functions include radio sales, auctions, and "swap meets" which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held at various facilities in and around Portland.

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



The location is the Multnomah Arts Center, in the heart of Multnomah Village, at 32nd and Capitol Highway.





## Tech Tip Polishing a Chassis

#### From Gordon Phillips

At our April meeting of the Society, after the demonstration of radio dial repair and restoration, Gordon Phillips showed the members a demonstration of how the product Rub and Buff could help restore an old rusty radio chassis after the rust is removed. With a small amount of Rub and Buff marked Silver applied to your finger or a soft cloth, rub it on the radio chassis. after it has dried you can buff it with a soft cloth. There are several different colors. I ordered Silver Leaf, Gold Leaf and Autumn Gold (which looks like copper). Our President, Ed Pittaway introduced me to this product which can be obtained at some art supply stores or craft stores. If it is not available, the store can order it for you through C2F Wholesale (they only sell to retail outlet stores). The Rub & Buff catalogue numbers are (Silver Leaf #AMA 76370k) and (Gold Leaf #AMA 76361A) and (Autumn Gold #AMA 76372M). The Autumn Gold looks like copper.

### Transmitters

#### From Dick Karman, Editor

Early transmitters were breadboard-type affairs. They were easily adapted, inexpensive to build, gave the vision of commercial rack mounted gear. Because transmitters were subjected to high voltage, they radiated considerable heat and RF energy. Spark set were the worst, but CW tube sets were nearly as bad.

Frequently the RF section and its power supply was separated from the modulator and its power supply. Although your reporter is quite ignorant of the circuit itself, The "Hartley Circuit" was in wide use in the late 20's and was documented in the August 1928 edition of QST magazine. The QST article was written by Ross Hull who reportedly coined the phrase "the 1929 Transmitter." This expression and the Hartley Circuit were aimed at establishing a new standard of stability and was designed to upgrade Ham bands from squeaks and squawks and mush to a more pleasant sound with less QRM producing signals. At this time most Hams were still using self-exciting oscillators.

Although amateurs stayed with their breadboards and flexible designs, commercial transmitters like the one shown in the photograph on the cover were made to fit the standard rack mount. This transmitter, part of Dick Howard's collection was used by the Portland Police Bureau as its first dispatch unit. It was displayed with similar period memorabilia when our Society hosted a 30-day museum display in the World Forestry Center.

## The Passing Parade

As a group of radio historians, we often remember what happened in radio, not just between the tubes and the batteries. The men and women we remember here made radio what it was in its "golden age."

On March 21st, 1994, Macdonald Carey lost a long-running battle with lung cancer. Although you might have noticed it in the news, Mr. Carey was credited therein as being Dr. Tom Horton on the soap opera, "Days of Our Lives." His soap opera career actually started in Chicago radio in 1937. His first part was in "First Nighter Program," but that quickly led to a series called "Young Hickory." His suds credits included "Stella Dallas, Backstage Wife," "John's Other Wife," "Just Plain Bill," and "Young Widder Brown." Mr. Carey's voice was also a regular on Arch Obler's "Lights Out."

Henry Aldrich's own Ezra Stone died of a heart attack on March 3rd. A mature man with a broken adolescent voice came into our living rooms for over 14 years, a record for a radio situation comedy. If you don't remember Mr. Stone's contribution to radio, you may remember his work in television. He directed "the Flying Nun," "The Munsters," "Lost In Space," "Lassie," "Love, American Style," " the Debbie Reynolds Show," and many more. But his radio recordings will be the part that will live in the hearts of radio historians for generations to come.

Wendel Niles, announcer for countless radio shows in the 30's and 40's, died on March 30th.

Vincent Pelletier, radio announcer with shows like the "Carnation Contented Hour," "The First Nighter," and "the Nat King Cole Show," passed away on February 24th.
