The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was founded by our first president Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous members the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that both informs members of the society's business and that has supported the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

The Beginner

The BEGINNER will be a feature article in the Call Letter for the next six months courtesy of member **Bud Larson**. Bud is a Chief Electronics Technician, U.S. Navy Retired.

It seems to me that experimental circuits don't get much press nowadays. When I was young the Boy Scout Handbook had radios in it and many youngsters built their own radios. One can learn much by building simple circuits and, who knows, it may make us appreciate the technical advances brought out by our predecessors in the hobby. The circuit pictured below is a simplified modernized version of circuit used in the days of Marconi. I have been able to hear stations as far away as Mexico and Salt Lake City on it. In a future article I'll describe how to modify the set to get short wave, CW and Single Side band. Reception of China and South Africa needs a little more help!

In this particular radio two tuned circuits provide selective tuning; primary circuit (L1 and C1) tunes the antenna to frequency (fairly broad); and secondary circuit (L2 and C2) select the station. By sliding L1 in and out the volume and sharpness of tuning are varied. The primary coil is about 60 turns of fine insulated wirer (24 to 30 gauge) wound on a salt box (about 3" diameter). The Secondary Coil is 40 turns wound in the same direction. Wind the secondary on the left (closed end) of a 4" oatmeal box. Make holes in the end of the salt box for the rods that guide the salt box back and forth. Wooden ends on the rods would be better, but are time- consuming to make. Use flexible insulated wire to connect the sliding coil.

A few suggestions for winding the coils: First, make 2 holes about 1/4" apart to hold the wire fast leaving several inches for connections. Have someone else hold the wire spool while you turn the form keeping the wire snug, trying to make the winding as neat as possible. When finished, hold the winding securely, cut the wire leaving roughly a foot. Thread the tail through one of the holes and back out the other and the winding should stay neat and snug. A little practice makes this process go easier.

For the base and sides find a piece of wood about 10" x 12". If you don't have a wood shop, craft stores sell decoupage boards which look nice. Next, two pieces of 1" x 4", cut to the match the width of the base board, will need two holes in each for the coil guides. If you don't have piano wire, or welding rod, you can use a straightened coat hanger. Nail or glue the three pieces of wood together. Center L2 at the rear left side and cement in place. When L2 is securely fastened, slide guide rods through L1 and secure them. Mount the tuning capacitors on the base board and wire according to the diagram.

For the antenna a ham 80 or 160 meter antenna works fine, but so will a well-insulated wire in the air strung from house to tree, or other object that is safe. You can use lamp cord or stranded hook-up wire for lead in. Listen in a quiet room as the signal received actually provides the audio.







Atmospherica
