

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$15.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year.

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was founded by our first president Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous members the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that both informs members of the society's business and that has supported the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held monthly (except July and August) at the Northwest Vintage Radio Museum, 7675 SW Capitol Highway (at 32nd street) in Portland Oregon. They generally convene at or about 10 AM and for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings)

Other Society functions include radio sales, auctions, and "swap meets" which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held at various facilities in and around Portland.


Acquisitions


The Volt Ohm Meter

One almost indispensable tester all of us should have is the Volt Ohm Meter (VOM). It can check AC and DC voltages, resistance (ohms), and DC milliamperes (mils).

Most tests can be made with an inexpensive (less than \$25) instrument. The meter pictured below is analog. It follows

changing conditions better than the more modern digital meters.


To learn how to use the VOM first inspect it carefully. Is there a fresh dry cell battery in the ohm meter? An old cell usually drifts on resistance checks. Make sure that the test leads make secure connections to the jacks and the wires are not broken or frayed.



To test the meter begin on the low ohm setting. Touch the probes together and adjust the knob to so that the meter reads "0". **CAUTION:** Never apply voltage while the meter is on the ohm settings less the windings be destroyed, or the fuse link be blown. Experiment with some low value resisters between the probes. The reading you get should be somewhat close to the value indicated by the color code. The newer inexpensive meters are surprisingly accurate, compared to the cheap VOM of several years ago. The Ohm reading should be within 10 to 20%. Not precise but close enough for equipment testing. A

loud speaker should read about 2 ohms, even though it says 8 ohms. 8 ohms is the AC impedance, not the DC resistance.

A simple test you can do yourself is an antenna check. --Have your receiver signals disappeared? Does your signal strength meter "wave" erratically? The antenna or a connector may be loose or shorted. Soldering the connectors may have melted the insulation. On a dipole or ground plane antenna there should be a open circuit (infinity) measured between the outer conductor and the center pin of the connector. If a low ohm reading is observed, you have a problem. Disassemble and inspect for an internal short. If it looks OK test the cable as before. If there is still a low ohm reading the cable may be bad or there is a short in your antenna. Disconnect the feed line from the antenna and test again with the wire ends well apart. The problem can usually be isolated by testing one thing at a time. The cable should show a near "0" reading from the braid's lower end to the upper end. The center conductor will show a little more resistance depending on the cable type.




