The Northwest Vintage Radio Society

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$15.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month (except July and August) at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio show, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.

What We Did This Summer

During our recent visit to Kentucky & West Virginia, by chance it happened to be the weekend of the meeting, swap meet and auction of the "Museum of Radio and Technology" in Huntington, WVA.

We were warmly welcomed and spent the morning visiting this wonderful facility and visiting with a number of it's members. This friendly group's facility claims to be the largest in the nation dedicated to the radio collecting hobby. This fantastic collection is the best display of vintage radio and related that I have seen (with the possible exception of the AWA museum). The "Museum of Radio and Technology" is housed in a 10,000 sq. ft. building (formerly an old school house). It is clean, well kept, and all the people we met and talked with were warm, friendly and outgoing.

When you start your tour of this well laid out and spacious Museum and walk down the long hallway, you will find each of it's many rooms devoted to a particular theme or era. Among the many rooms, one contains a complete and working vintage transmitter and radio studio. Another has vintage hi-fi equipment, and yet another is a 20's - 30's era re-creation of an electronics classroom and they hold classes in it once a week! You will find a fantastic library and bookstore in one of the rooms, and there is also a room dedicated to communications gear. The auditorium is used for their indoor swap meets, auctions and meetings. They also have a workshop where repairs can be performed for those who may not have the ability or facility to do so at home. The "Grand Showroom" contains a plethora of examples of Vintage Radio and Television from the 20's - 50's, very nicely displayed. The equipment displayed here is not a bunch of discards or dregs from the collection of others; quite the contrary, it is full of some of the best examples of vintage radio you will find.

We attended the pre-auction sale where I purchased a few items. Since packing and shipping while traveling by air is not only a big hassle but it also gets expensive, to avoid the temptation of having even more to pack and ship, we left before the auction started.

If any of you readers find yourself in the area of Huntington, West Virginia and you love vintage radio, please don't pass up the opportunity to visit this wonderful facility. It's located conveniently just off interstate 64. For those interested, I have phone numbers and contacts. Feel free to contact me if you plan on being in that area or wish to become a member. Gets Permit To Radio Pictures

Wilbur Jerman technician at radio station KWJJ has been granted a license for television transmission according to word received this morning by Edwin W. Lovejoy, supervisor of radio in the seventh district.

Jerman has been assigned call letters W7AXO and authorized to transmit pictures by radio on frequencies between 2750 and 2850 kilocycles which are in the short wave band and using 100 watts the supervisor advised.

Jerman has not been officially notified of his license. He said this morning that the television set he built during the summer has been partially dismantled, but that he probably could begin experimental television broadcast this month.

The technician pointed out that the license could not be used for commercial purposes but confined to experimental use on the short wave bands. He said the public could take advantage of the broadcasts by watching for announcements of his television broadcasts.

At present Jerman is busy on KWJJ broadcasting equipmentinstalling apparatus for the commission in the reallocation November 11. (The Federal Communications Commission shifted all wavelengths 30 kilohertz)

Jerman ultimately expects to broadcast moving pictures on the television license on short waves to use the projection machines in the Broadway theatre for pictures and KWJJ broadcasting station to broadcast the sound accompaniments, he said.

Pictures probably will be three inches square unless some new method is introduced whereby larger pictures could be satisfactory sent.

The broadcasting of talking movies will be an interesting experiment he said and especially with the short wave set sending the pictures and KWJJ handling the sound. The movie broadcast experimentation is rather distant he intimated.






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

Meeting Location!

Our monthly meetings are held in the Abernathy Grange Hall, located at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City. Here are instructions for getting there and a map.

- 1. Take the OR-213 exit, exit number 10, towards PARK PLACE/MOLA-LLA.
- 2. From the South, turn RIGHT onto SR-213, or from the North, keep RIGHT at the fork in the ramp and merge onto SR-213.
- 3. Turn LEFT at the first traffic light onto CLACKAMAS RIVER DR.
- 4. Turn RIGHT onto S FORSYTHE RD.
- 5. Turn LEFT onto S HARLEY AVE. The Abernathy Grange Hall is a little past S. Taylor Lane.

The written instructions came from "Map Quest" on the Internet; the map is scanned from a AAA map with much detail removed for the sake of clarity.
