





The Northwest Vintage Radio Society

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of “Vintage radio” and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$15.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society’s business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month (except July and August) at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio show, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.



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


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
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A Voice From the Past

This article and the ads mixed with it are from the *Radio Bulletin* of March 23, 1923. As you see from the masthead shown at right, it was published here in Portland. This issue is Vol. 1, No. 41. *Ed.*

Radio Troubles

If you have trouble with your set, look to the small fixed condensers or the grid condenser. There are many cheap makes flooding the market today and, sad to say, a great many of them are almost worthless. Some of them do not make any contact at all, and others are short circuited. Look well into the transformer — whether it be radio or audio frequency. It may possibly be burned out or the ratio of the turns may be incorrect. A cheap amplifying transformer will cause more trouble than anything else in the set.

How about the variable condensers? Do the plates touch each other? What kind of contact do the movable plates have? Here is a very important point. Some of the best makes have poor contacts for the rotary plates, with the result that the condenser does not function and spoils the set. The same thing holds true for a variometer. Frequently the rotor connections are poor and the variometer will not work.

The socket, the receivers, and in fact practically everything that goes into the set must be right or the set will not operate properly and then the poor radio editor will get the blame.

One more point is amateur interference. Here is a subject that would fill a book, but it can only be touched on lightly here. A good radio set of the two- or three-circuit type will eliminate all interference if operated correctly. A set should be able easily to get rid of 200- or even 300-meter traffic if it is tuned to 360 or 400 meters. If you have trouble with your set from interference, do not blame the interfering station. Look into your own cabinet. If you have a single circuit-tuner, remember that it cannot tune sharply. Also remember that while you are complaining of interference, your own receiver is acting like a small transmitter and is interfering with every receiving station within several blocks. In England such sets are not allowed by law. By actual test it has been found that a single circuit receiver, located several houses away caused so much interference that other stations could not be operated on the same wave length. In other words, if this set was tuned to WJZ, none of the other stations could listen to WJZ, but had to go on to some other station.

New Meeting Location!

Beginning with February, we are meeting in a new location: the Abernathy Grange Hall, located at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City. Here are instructions for getting there and a map.

1. Take the OR-213 exit, exit number 10, towards PARK PLACE/MOLLA.
2. From the South, turn RIGHT onto SR-213, or from the North, keep RIGHT at the fork in the ramp and merge onto SR-213.
3. Turn LEFT onto CLACKAMAS RIVER DR.
4. Turn RIGHT onto S FORSYTHE RD. (appears on the map to turn into PARK PLACE)
5. Turn LEFT onto S HARLEY AVE. The Abernathy Grange Hall is a little past S Taylor Lane.

The written instructions and the map came from “Map Quest” on the Internet, with some additions and editing for the sake of clarity and purpose.
