

## The Northwest Vintage Radio Society

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$20.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.


Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month (except July and August) at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. ## Northwest Vintage Radio Society Meeting Minutes

President Cliff Tuttle called the meeting to order at 10:01am.

There were 35 members, and no guests, in attendance. The March meeting minutes, as written in the April, 2004, Call Letter were accepted as written.

#### Reports

Editor: Cliff reported that Rick Walton had been hospitalized and was back home. He said Rick sent his thanks to the Society for the flowers and well-wishes he received. Dick Karman published the April Call Letter. Rick will be back to publish the May issue.

Treasury: Ed Charman reported our current balance was \$265.51.

Swap meet: Tony Hauser reminded members that tables were still available for next month's swap meet and asked again for volunteers for Friday evening setup and Saturday afternoon teardown. Members discussed the possibility of including a separate auction for "higher price" radios during the swap meet with a percentage of the sales going to the Society. Tony will make the final decision on including this in the May swap meet.

#### Old Business

Pat Kagi needs the chassis for a General Television miniature piano novelty radio.

Seven members displayed 13 tube radio/phonographs and accessories. The feature at the June meeting will be tube clock radios.

Cliff adjourned the meeting at 11:07.

## Topica to Yahoo - The E-mail List

On April 24, I began the promised switchover from the e-mail list on Topica back to the list on Yahoo!Groups. I had never managed to close out the Yahoo group because there were so many who were never able to get messages from Topica. As of this writing, over twenty of you from Topica have responded and joined the Yahoo group bringing total group membership to forty-two.

On the 24th I sent out the invitation notice to join the Yahoo group to the list of members from the Topica group along with the names of members who gave me their e-mail addresses at the March meeting. There were forty-three e-mail addresses that should have received the invitation. I've received notice from two or three people thus far who didn't get the invitation.

Another way to join is to go to <a href="http://groups.yahoo.com/">http://groups.yahoo.com/</a> and in the search block enter nwvrs and click the Search button. When the description of the group appears, click on "nwvrs" and that will take you to a page that has a big button labeled "Join this group." If you are a Yahoo member, I'll get a notice that you want to join the group. If you aren't a member, Yahoo will require you to join up first before you can join the mail list. One possible way to avoid joining Yahoo (although I havent been able to verify this) is to just send an e-mail to nwvrs-subscribe@yahoogroups.com. If those methods fail, I will simply add the remaining names to the group after making sure that's what you want me to do. Yahoo limits me to ten names a day using that method. I hope I can do it all in one day!

### Looking Back

#### On the first Show and Tell

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society Monthly Newsletter Number 3 (the Call Letter name had yet to be used) documents the first Show and Tell for the Northwest Vintage Radio Society. This landmark event occurred at the February 8, 1975 meeting.

Alan Shadduck brought a little Paramount cathedral radio described by Bob Bilbie as "quite rare, first one we've ever seen." I wonder if Alan still has that set. Bill Baker showed an EI Company crystal set from the Electric Importing Company owned by pioneer radio publisher and science fiction writer, Hugo Gernsback.

I brought an "ancient microphone" described in the Newsletter as "a real find" which I still own. I showed this carbon microphone again to the NWVRS membership on April 2000. The microphone is a Western Electric model 389W patented on March 6,1920 for which I paid ten dollars. The microphone can be seen on the NWVRS web site under the Call Letter "Vintage Sets as would be shown at our First Monthly Meeting".

Joey Tompkins brought a battery radio set; he usually acquired one a month. Bob Bilbie stated "Joe probably has the largest collection of rare battery sets in the whole state of Oregon."

I cannot remember what battery sets Joey brought, but it very well may of have been one of the five battery radios which I bought from him in the late 1980s: a Claratone made by the Equitable Radio Corporation, a Gold I Medal model Five-Sixty made by the Consco Electric Company, a three tube Tri-City set model TT Deluxe, a Klitzen battery set made in Racine, Wisconsin, or a 1924 five tube Carnival model made by Peter Kardon of the Diva Radio Corporation. I still have all these battery radios except the Carnival, which I sold to Mike Parker.

The Show and Tell feature, which started in early 1975, continues to this day and is the most popular and one of the longest on-going activity of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society.



## One Tube Radio That Will Operate a Speaker

#### by George Kirkwood

The coils are very important in that they need to be spaced at 1.75" from lip to lip. Use 2" pill bottles that you can get from a pharmacy. I put octal sockets in the bottoms but this is not necessary for a standard Broadcast receiver. The best tube for this operation is a 6AC7. It will give the best gain.

The antenna is fed into the cathode of the tube. The cathode choke is 5mh, however l0mh would work. R2 and the 220ufd cap establish the bias. The 150pf cap, C6, to the first grid prevents distortion, and R3 allows C6 to work when you are at the low end of the volume pot. Chl isolates the audio portion from the RF portion of the signal. C4 removes any RF at the output transformer.

L2 and LI are identical. 85 tums wound on a 2" plastic pill bottle. The caps C2 and C11 are trimmers to allow correct tracking. C8 is the RF adjustment to the driver coil. This should be adjusted for max gain. LI has the highest Q and therefore sets the selectivity. L2 has a broader bandwidth due the action of D1 and it's load.




The radio could have agc but it does not give the best results. If you wish to try agc then reverse Dl and change Rl to l0 meg and attach its ground end to the junction of Dl and the 100K resistor. I found this not to be that satisfactory. However, it did reduce the distortion due to the million watt blow torch in Hillsboro's bog south of town.

Nothing is critical in construction however, the radio should have a good common ground plain. A good antenna is required and an earth ground.
