The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio show, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.

Lee de Forest In Lents 1911

Doctor Lee de Forest took his room key from C.H. Doane at the Bethel Hotel, 109 North Main (now SE 92nd Avenue) and shook his head.


A wireless station had been installed recently one half mile from the center of Lents, Oregon (now Southeast Portland beyond SE 82nd Avenue) and was capable of receiving messages from San Francisco. Director of the Paulson wireless system and employed by the independent Federal Telegraph Company, de Forest had come from California to see what was causing trolley lines at Lents to interfere with the messages.

"In all my experience with Wireless," he told Mrs. Doane, "I have never encountered a condition like the one here." DeForest figured the problem stemmed from the O.W.P. Cazadero Line and a nearby hightension line of the local streetcar system. As cars came along the tracks at Lents, wheels attached to the trolley wires flashed sparks, thus interfering with the wireless waves. The only disturbance-free time was when the cars stopped running between three and four in the morning.

"It is as though the cars are trying to send indecipherable messages all on their own," he muttered on his way upstairs.

The next day, de Forest met with officials from Portland Railway, Light and Power Company out at the station to discuss grounding or fencing off waves. The first method involved placing two resistance coils one-quarter of a mile apart on the streetcar line near the station to ground the sparks. If that didn't work, wires would be strung parallel with existing wires to catch the sparks and hold them prisoner.

In 1906, 33-year-old Dr. de Forest had invented the audion (later called the triode) making long range reception possible and providing the foundation for the modern electronics industry. Because of his invention, sometime in the future, voices would be sent through the air shrinking the globe and changing forever the lives of people living on our planet. It has not been revealed which method cleared up the airwave interference at Lents, but it does represent one of the steps that led to our modern conveniences: long distance telephone, radio, AM/FM bands, television and surround stereo.
