The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio show, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.



#### Local AM Radio Shuffle

With encouragement by NWVRS member Rudy Zvarich, I have agreed to try to define just what has happened to Portland's AM radio scene during this most recent turn of events. Perhaps "charade" would be a more appropriate term. For better or for worse, we, as the club members interested in broadcast radios should take note of what is happening with Broadcast Radio.

This recent "shuffle", as I like to call it, could perhaps rank with several other major historic events in Portland AM radio such as the arrival of the Network stations in the 1920's or the great frequency shift of 1941 or the day KALE became KPOJ or the advent of "Top 40" rock stations (KISN) in the 1950's and 60's.

Like many of us, my life was formed around those familiar radio station call letters. While I was growing up here in the Portland area, we had our familiar stations and starting from the left side of the family Philco slide rule dial, it was KGW, 620... KXL, 750... KOIN, 970... KWJJ, 1080... KEX, 1190... KALE, 1330... KPAM, 14 something... and KGON, 1520. We were lucky to have such a wide selection of stations. At that time, my grandparents lived right at the Ocean in Rockaway. Before they got the Gilfillan, I well remember an old Philco cathedral with an outside aerial and in the daytime it was all static unless you turned the dial to the high end until it stopped, then you got KTIL, 1600! At night, a few stations would drift in and out from California or Seattle. I craved receiving those strange call letters from far away. So,

basically, we associate those call letters with our lives. We can not think of how it would be if they all changed suddenly!

But then, a couple of years ago or so, that very thing started here in Portland. I like to think of it starting with the loss of KGW. Here was the oldest, successful broadcast station in the Portland market, on the air since March, 1922 and one fine day, it was GONE! New format, new call letters... KOTK... K-Oregon Talk. Forget tradition, it's not important, it's the hard sell, the big money, not what we think is historic!

Now, I can see that the reason was mostly to further the advent of "Talk Radio" and in defense of that, I will admit that I like talk radio. Whether you like it or not, it has virtually saved the AM band from extinction. I listen to a fair cross section of it every day and it is not the content of what they are talking about but the familiar sound of their voices that hook me. Paul Harvey, Don Imus, Lars Larson, Tom Leykis, Mike Segal and Art Bell all speak to me just about every day and night. Others will come and go such as Rush Limbaugh, Dr.Laura, Bill Gallagher, and the money advice guys, Bruce Williams and Don McDonald. All of these people come over the airwaves on certain stations with their own distinct call letters and I associate this to them. To not have that familiar association is practically a traumatic experience, as I found out recently.

After KGW became KOTK, the new station struggled along and I listened. They had Imus in the Morning, then Dr. Laura and shock jockey, Tom Leykis late afternoons. KXL dared to carry Rush Limbaugh and had Bill Gallagher in the afternoon. I got familiar with this pattern. Then all of a sudden, KOTK vanished and became KEWS or K-NEWS as they call it, but they cannot have 5 call letters! this station was started by KEX as a sister station and Rush Limbaugh dominated it through the day with Bill Gallagher on later in the day. KXL had Lars Larson during the day. Imus and Tom Leykis were off the air in Portland... just like that!... no previous notice!... Gone.

Well, loyal fans were not going to take this for long and then one other fine day, KOTK re-appeared in place of KWJJ, 1080, yet another long time set of Portland call letters, gone to FM only. If that wasn't enough, other shenanigans started to take place. I am not Scandinavian, but I like accordion music and had been listening to Bob Anderson and his Scandinavian Hour on KKEY, 1150 Sunday mornings. Suddenly, it was gone!, a program that perhaps was the longest continuous running program in Portland. It was reported to have been started in 1925 and Bob himself had hosted the program since 1942. KKEY, although only a 5000 watt station, was one of the only outlets for local programming in the Portland and Vancouver area, a market that should not be ignored. KKEY sold out and became KKGT... Great Talk! Great Mistake would be more

appropriate. Too little, too late and a low power station with a frequency so close to 50,000 watt KEX that only a superhet will drag them in. With nobody special hosting any of their new programs, who cares. They are a disservice to the community.

Even more quirky changes took place with Sunny 910, KKSN, oldies music station trading their center of the dial spot with sports KFXX 1520... "The Fan" and country music KUPL 1330 taking over another center dial spot at 970. The religious stations such as K-Love, KEZF 1040, KPDQ 800, (a long running Portland station who has managed to keep it's same frequency and call letters for many years), K-Praise, KKPZ, now 1330 and KKSL 1290, now have some new competition at KPAM, (second version) at 860 Khz., more or less of a high energy Christian music station. What is the fascination with having a station frequency near the center of the dial? Do they think that it's a prestige thing, or that we are too stupid to tune near the end of the dial?

In spite of the above described changes in the Portland AM radio selection, we do have a good variety of AM stations. I have not mentioned business radio KBNP 1410, with up to the minute market reports, or KBPS 1450 a Benson Polytechnic School radio station since the 20's. Then there is National Public Broadcasting radio at KOAP 550, KUIK 1360 in Hillsboro, KVAN in Vancouver and the two Spanish language stations, KMUZ and KWIP 880. That leaves KXYQ 1010, which I can only get with a good superhet and KRRC, Radio Reed College, which I have never knowingly received on any radio! I may have left out a few others and any pirate stations!

Is there prestige in having a 3-letter call? The answer is very definitely yes, you just can't get 'em anymore. I don't know why not, there must be plenty of 3 letter combinations available. Portland has two very old 3 letter calls, KEX and KXL. You can bet that each is waiting for the day when they can boast of having the only one in town.

The way things are changing, that may very well happen. Or there will be no more AM radio as we know it. There are folks out there that are advocating Digital radio. Our treasured collections of AM broadcast radios will be rendered useless and will receive only... STATIC!

You are as welcome as the flowers in May to add anything to this column, anytime, that I might have mistaken or missed.





- . Exit I-205 at SR-213 (Exit 10 to Molalla) and head south on 213.
- 2. At the first intersection (the traffic light), turn left onto Clackamas River Dr.
- 3. Turn right at Forsythe Rd.
- 4. Turn left onto Harley Ave. The Grange Hall is on the left about a block and a half.
