The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

A New Super-Receiver



A great deal has been written about superhetrodyne circuits and a great deal more will be written in the future.

During the last five months, Thomas J. Langhorne has experimented with fifteen types of supers in his laboratory, (316 old Commonwealth Building corner SW Sixth Avenue and SW Stark building demolished in 1948) using material of his own design as well as that of other manufacturers. Some of these wonder circuits proved to be very good, some indifferent and others a travesty on using the name superhetrodyne.

The radio fans of the West Coast who build their own receivers have always looked forward to the circuits perfected in the East. They lose sight of the fact that these receivers are tested under conditions far different from Pacific coast conditions.

We are giving to the fans the hookup of this new super



circuit, which has been thoroughly tested by a number of local fans, which report wonderful results.

There is nothing entirely new in this hookup, as some of the fine points are taken from standard circuits, which are now on the open market. It will be noted the first tube works at a low radio frequency, ahead of a modulated tube, which does not carry any high B+ battery voltage. This tube has not been balanced out by condenser capacities nor is it stabilized by the use of a potentiometer; still it is impossible in this circuit to force this tube into oscillation. For DX reception, it is well understood among radio authorities that radio frequencies has proved to be best method of detection before the natural detector and then add audio frequency to build up the received signal.



The transformers used in this hookup are tuned to a wavelength of 6300 meters (48 kHz), and are of the air core type. Capacity and resistance have been figured to such an extent that they will tune down to the noise level, with very little intertube noises and retain the extreme selectivity, which is a very important detail. This eight tube receiver has within one mile air line of KGW tuned through to KFI and KLX without any interference from the local station, using either loop inside or outdoor aerial.

One of the characteristics of this receiver is the clear deep tone, something that is not always achieved by superhetrodyne receivers.

The next question is DX or distance. Langhorne, the designer has a certified list of stations received, so that even the most doubtful of fans will have to admit that this circuit certainly "does step out".

Blake Dietz Zenith 6S128. This 1937 6-tube set resides in an oversized cabinet with horizontal bars across the speaker area and five small wooden balls along the base of the speaker grille.

Jay Johnston NORCO Model 1. This TRF set was manufactured in our very own Rose City. Please read Art Redman's excellent ARC article for an informative description of this manufacturer.

Mike Parker 1925 SOMERSET Model Shelbourne 4B. It is a 4 tube TRF battery set made by the National Airphone Corp. Mike acquired it from the late Del Dixon collection.

1927 Pierce Airo (not Pierce Arrow) 6-tube TRF battery set panel chassis. It has one dial tuning and a double stage resistance coupled audio section with an audio transformer final stage. The chassis is purportedly working- and was quite a steal at \$10!

Dave Wise Zenith H500 Transoceanic from the Dell Dixon sale. It has a beautiful exterior, but Dave hasn't tried playing it yet.

General Radio 1656 Impedance Bridge. This instrument achieves a 10x improvement in accuracy by the simple expedient of swapping the 1650-B's CGRL rheostat for a decade resistor. Of course the innovative "Orthonull" feature of the 1650-A and 1650-B could not be included, so it was not a free lunch. Besides the scratchy switches and pots, there was what had to be a factory assembly error in the decade box; missing washers allowed gears to ride up their shafts and lose mesh. The four alkaline D batteries in the holder were dead but not visibly leaking. Dave was still suspicious so he put in some vinegar... it foamed like crazy!

A Little Portland Local Color

WELL KNOWN OREGON DISTRIBUTOR CELEBRATES 50TH ANNIVERSARY

In September, 1894 the Stubbs Electric Company of Portland, Oregon was founded by Mr. O. B. Stubbs, who is still the owner and active head of the firm, and now, in the fifty-first year of their business, they are one of the leading wholesalers and distributors of radio parts, electric supplies and appliances in the North West.

This concern has had an interesting history. During the Spanish-American War they wired boats with ordinary water pipe for the Government. In 1915 they started wholesaling wireless supplies, and in 1922 they entered the wholesale distribution of radio parts and now are the oldest established radio parts distributor in Oregon.

In the same year of 1922 they built Station KQY, the first broadcasting station in Oregon. It was built next to their elevator shaft because it was the only possible source of supply of 500 volt D.C. current which was required to operate the 7 1/2 watt station. A short time after building the station the wattage was increased



to 25 watts. Programs consisted of a one hour evening news program at five o'clock, followed by two hours of the latest Brunswick records. The actual construction of the station was handled by Mr. Wilbur Jerman who is at the present time the owner of radio station KWJJ in Portland. The station was later sold to the Benson Polytechnic and is still in operation.

As can be seen in the photograph above, the Stubbs Electric Co. has a large and modern establishment, which contains an attractive and up-to-date radio parts department, managed by Mr. William Endsley; Mr. Hugh Hanna is general manager of the company.
