Greetings to our members,

You all know that May and October are our favorite radio months. This year, we have some exciting news about our first Sale and Show of the year on Saturday May 12 at the American Legion Hall in Aurora. There are eight table model speakers and horns: Atwater Kent, Peerless, Radiola and RCA are represented.

In addition, there is a Seeburg Symphonia Jukebox, made in the 1930s. It was the world's first light up jukebox and perhaps the most iconic jukebox ever produced. There is a Crystal Set made by Kilbourne & Clark Mfg. Co. of Seattle with Brandes Headphones. There is a Heathkit RF Signal Generator and some miscellaneous items and parts as well. In memory of a true craftsman, our Society is having a radio restoration competition.

At the November 10th regular meeting, the Don Iverson trophy shall be awarded to the best example of craftsmanship in radio restoration. The tech. committee to preside over the competition includes Sonny Clutter, Blake Dietze, George Kirkwood, Esteban Mendoza, and Dave Wise. Your humble Vice President acting as alternate.

Here are the rules as approved by the tech. committee:

1. Restoration to have been started no earlier than November 1st 2011.

2. Restoration to be performed by contestant only. Reproduction items such as dial lenses, dial faces, knobs, radio backs, etc. are allowed.

3. Contestants should have before and during pictures of the radio. Also a written explanation of what was done to the radio electronically.

4. A tech. committee of five judges and one alternate shall preside over the competition.

5. Entries shall be judged on:

a. Cosmetic restoration and authenticity.

b. Electronic restoration and how it plays.

6. Each judge shall rate each entry on a 1-10 scale with 10 being the best possible for each category. The radio that receives the highest total will be declared the winner.

7. If a judge is entered in the contest he or she can not vote on their own radio. The alternate will take their place.

8. The alternate judges score will decide the winner in the event of a tie.

Let's make this a fun competition! Start getting your projects ready, November will be here sooner than you think.

From The Bench of WRNO

One Hot Signal Source

As you may recall from last month's, *From the Bench*, we were looking at a low volume complaint from a typical ac/dc radio. After our repair of the *wrong value* plate load resistor and returning the radio to service, we now have a *no-sound* complaint. It is time to make a quick

assumption. With the radio plugged in and all the tubes a-glow, the *audio* section working yes or *no*. Sounds like a Christmas poem!

There is a neat trick that can help answer this question. Our *plugged-in* soldering iron is a good 60 cycle signal source, putting it within hearing range and the volume control an easy place to identify a working audio circuit. There are three terminals grouped together on the control. The high side being furthest from the chassis grounded end. Turning the volume control up, then touching the iron to the high side of the control, a loud 60 cycle growl from the speaker should be heard.

If yes, we pretty much have confirmed that the *dead radio complaint* is not located in the audio section. If not heard, we move the hot iron to the grid terminal of the power tube, in this case pin 5 of the 50L6. A growl should also be heard from the speaker, but less loudly than before. Why less? We are only amplifying with the power tube instead of both the first audio and power tubes. If no sound comes through, the problem is in this stage. Replace the tube with a known good tube and try again. If no sound, we measure both voltages and resistance on this stage. The negative voltage lead is connected to common negative. This is easy to locate, as it is always the negative side of the filter caps.

The positive lead checks the 50L6 terminals for *normal* voltages found from our schematic or tube manual. The checks here would include cathode, plate, screen and control grid voltage. Incorrect values would steer us to nearby component failures.

Of course the output transformer or speaker may be the problem. A *rule out* test of the audio transformer and speaker is made with our old analog (*digital will not do*) ohmmeter. Unplugging the radio and placing the ohm scale on Rx1 or Rx10. Locate the primary side of the output transformer. The wires are sometimes red and blue. Touching the meter leads to the ends of these wires will produce a scratchy sound in the speaker. If yes, we can assume the transformer-speaker is not the cause of our *no-sound* complaint.
