The Board Meeting of the NWVRS was called to order by President Mark Moore at Elmer's Restaurant at 9660 SE Stark St. at 6:30 pm. The minutes of the August 8, 2012 meeting were not printed in the *Call Letter* so President Moore will forward them to Board members and we will vote on their acceptance at our next board meeting. 

The Video Broadcasters Company

Two executives of the Video Broadcasters Company came to Portland on November 2, 1948 to announce that their television equipment for a television station would be arriving on February 1, 1949 in an article which appeared in the Oregonian. The company secured the only construction permit authorized by the Federal Communications Commission for television on channel three, one of the four VHF channels allocated for Portland at the time.

Wes Turner, the technical director of the firm said" there is no way of forecasting how many television receiving sets will be installed in Portland by the time first programs are broadcast. Manufacturers and distributors have promised receivers will be shipped here for sale well in advance of the first broadcasts to allow time for installation." Catalog prices the Oregonian noted for receivers range from about \$170 for small table model receivers with 6.5 inch by 4.75 inch direct view screens up to \$800 for a 20-inch by 15-inch reflecting screens. Also ornate cabinets and other considerations may drive the price as high as \$3000.

Charles B. Brown, the general manager said, "one of the purposes of the Portland visits to look for available studio facilities." He went on to state "more space is required since actors cannot huddle around a microphone as in a conventional radio. One answer is the difficulties of extensive studio on other stations have been the considerable use of films which would be followed in Portland."

Outdoor pickups, Brown stated will include "athletic events, parades, and various types of meeting and ceremonies. 'Live' studio production will include forum discussions." No definite plans were announced for the types of programs the station will present, or the hours, it will televise. Among the owners of the company were three producers of package radio shows and a film company. It was never stated later in the Oregonian why television failed to make its appearance in Portland by March 1949. Station KRSC was already on the air in Seattle. It appears that Video Broadcasters only secured construction permits and construction never started.

Television came to Portland in October 1952 when KPTV on channel 27 went on the air; the first UHF channel in the nation. It interesting to note that the FCC also granted besides channel three; channels 6, 10, and 12, for use in Portland in 1948 and that KPTV on UHF channel 27 went on the air before any of these four VHF channels.



Shunting Heater Current

Many thanks to Mike McCrow for his fine article in last month's *Call Letter* on "Tube Substitution in AC-DC Radios". During the swap meet, Mike and I discussed other methods used during tube shortages. Let's continue the "Gas Gate" example seen in the last few publications, with the schematic being in the September issue.

Mike and I think that substituting a higher filament voltage tube, with its weak emissions in sensitive circuits such as in the mixer or I.F. stages, would not be ideal. Performance for the Gas Gate tube was not degraded as the circuit didn't contribute much other than being a simple diode, and to inflate the tube count!



As seen in fig. 1, we have resistors along the top to represent our seven tube filament string. R1 and R2 being the dual filaments for the 35Z5. Ohms law, voltage/current gives us our resistors. One example is the 35L6 output tube with a 35 volt filament. This tube being in the 150 mA string, for example, 35 volts/.15mA gives us our 233 ohm equivalent resistor.

Let's say the original 6T7 tube, with its 150 mA, 6.3 volt filament, had burned out. An exact replacement is not available. We find a 6Q7 tube in the caddy having the same characteristics as the 6T7, only using the higher 300 mA filament. How do we get 300 mA to this tube and still provide 150 mA to all the other tubes? The problem is simple: We use a shunt.

Give current two parallel equally resistive paths in which to travel, half the current flows from points A to point B (fig. 1) and the other half flows through our shunt resistor. Hey, that would satisfy our 150 mA tubes, and the full 300 mA available to our new 300 mA tube. Adding up all the filament resistances from A to B totaled 719 ohms. The closest common value resistor of 710 ohms was selected for our shunt. The wattage rating is found (volts X amps), 108 Volts (A to B) X .15 mA gives us our 16 watts. As a rule always double this to allow for safety.

The last tube in the string the 12SQ7, with its 150 mA filament would be damaged with 300 mA. You guessed it, use a shunt to steer half the current around the 12SQ7. As before, just use the same resistance as the tube filament 84 ohms for the shunt and we are done. Wattage is found by (12.6 volts) X.15 mA = 2 watts.




Fig. 2 shows what our more experienced members may do instead of using the big resistor. A *non-polarized* (NP) capacitor rated about 6 uF, with a working voltage of at least three times the line voltage, this time without any heat at all. The math is a little complex, so trial and error works for me. Most of the time we end up using between 6 and 7.5 uF anyway when using NP caps for voltages and current reduction. One tip, going down in capacitance affects the drop more at line frequencies. These NP caps can be purchased from fellow club member, Blake Dietze, from whom I am grateful to have learned this valuable technique.

You may wonder about the radio with a 300 mA tube string. This time, one of the 300 mA tubes is replaced with a 150 mA tube. All we do is shunt the tube with a resistor. Suppose a 25L6 has burned out. It uses a 300 mA heater as do all the rest of the tubes in the string. A 50L6 with a 150 mA heater is at hand. We just shunt 150 mA of current around this tube. Can you figure out the shunt required? Yes, 50 volts /.15mA give us our 333 ohms required.

A series resistor would need to be lowered in value by half to compensate for the difference between the old 25 and the new 50 volt tube. These resistors were sometimes found in the line cord, but modern restorations use a conventional resistor. All this shunting stuff is pretty simple once we think about it. My passion for shunting all started with making meters work with higher currents. Maybe this is something for a future article.

Officer's Roles

The President
