Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio shows, and radio sales which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held in and around Portland.

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.



The party wrapped up and we were out the door at 12:10 pm.



Resistors "Movin' On Up"

This month finds yours truly working on a very simple and useful constant current regulator consisting of just a few Radio Shack A project I will bring to light in a future article and tech-talk. I truly hope that you will find this interesting and useful for vour bench. The problem was that it required a resistor of exactly 12.5 ohms, with the smallest error not acceptable. The closest value at RS was a half watt -10 ohm carbon film So how was I to increase the resistance value precisely? I used an old radio trick often seen with carbon composites, but I had never attempted this with the modern film type before. One must start with a resistor that is below the desired value. Then using a small file remove an area near the center, all the while monitoring the resistance with a very accurate meter. With every stroke of the file, resistance climbs as if by magic. I started with a RS resistor five-pack throwing out the first four due to my overzealous filing. A cursed trait I carry with me to this day! Things happen fast when dealing in thousandths of an ohm, the often not seen milliohm. Like yourselves, I have tested many new modern metal and carbon film resistors, most reading just under their rated value(s). After some investigation it turns out the manufacturing process puts out blanks just slightly below target followed by (you guessed it) a filing process using diamonds or lasers. When seeing the tolerance band rising within limits This method is much more cost effective than the filing stops. producing a zero error resistor, and so helps explain why we seldom see a carbon film or metal film above the nominal value. As you are aware, the old carbon composite resistors climb in value over time. is that moisture expands the composite material separating the carbon particles, hence higher resistances. Baking in the oven may temporarily bring the value back to rated, but not lasting.



Testing several hundreds of 1960 NOS composites reveals to this investigator that errors show no correlation to nominal values as they all climbed together. I strongly suspect that in another 54 years they will all be out of tolerance! So stay tuned for my follow-up report due in the January 2064 Call Letter.

Looking Back

Naming the Society as Remembered in 2003

Harley Perkins wrote To Those Devoted To The Preservation and Restoration of Old Radios on January 11, 1975 on the selection of the club's name that "No doubt there will be as many names as the club has members. Agreement may require our best spirit of compromise. Some important points in my opinion include simplicity, brevity, and a clear identification of the hobby. The name should attract potential new members with interests like ours. It should say to the public at large that the club exists for the preservation and restoration of old radios That someone really cares about that old relic they want to get rid of. Yes that's a tall order for a brief simple name."

These were challenging words by our first president Harley Perkins. Bob Bilbie originally wanted the name Radio Club of America. The problem was that Bob later found that an existing club located in Kentucky took that name. Tom James always wanted or liked the term "Vintage Radio" to refer to the Golden Age of radio before television. Remember, in 1975 few people collected transistor radios, televisions, catalin radios or other plastic sets. The name "Vintage" needed to be included in the name.

One other concern was how big an area should the club include. Definitely it should be bigger than Oregon and there was a need to welcome collectors north of the Columbia River. Why not the whole state of Washington and include Idaho for good measure? Why not the entire Northwest? Some people thought it might conflict with the original Northwest Territories in the early 1800s known as the five states including Ohio but that view was dropped. To include Pacific Northwest seemed too long to me and was eliminated. Our goals were big since we were one of the first unlike the Association limiting itself to Puget Sound.

Bob Bilbie never liked the term "Society" when I mentioned it to him. He wanted to belong to a "club not a society." I got society from the Oregon Historical Society. It had the right "highbrow" ring. Two other names were also submitted which I do not remember, at the first meeting, which I missed on February 8,1975 when the name was picked. One of the other choices had the term "Historical". I was happy to see the name Northwest Vintage Radio Society for the first time on our second monthly newsletter.

Later Mark Moore came up with the name Call Letter for the newsletter. But that's another story.




