#### New Chapter From the Road

Today my wife and I open a new chapter in our lives. We have been living in downtown Portland in no less than three different apartments, and no more than three blocks apart for the past seventeen years. Just ten hours to go and we turn out the lights and lock the apartment door for the final time. We are looking forward to our multi-month road trip together. Our first adventure of this type in almost 35 years of marriage. First stop is beautiful Christmas Valley in eastern Oregon's high desert, then a crossing into California or Nevada. We will focus on Oregon and Washington in which to find our permanent home. The plan is to see as much of the northwest as possible for the next two or three months.

This month's article has less of my usual ramblings, but hopefully is no less useful for you, the radiotrician. When doing alignments have you ever wished for a way to substitute for an output meter? We have all used a sensitive ac meter connected to the speaker's voice coil or the plate of the output tube to indicate peak. In the latter case using a .1 uF 600 volt capacitor to protect our meter from high dc voltages. It finally dawned on me that I already had such an output meter on my smartphone. The human ear just can't discern small changes in sound intensity. Sound levels need to change by a factor of about two before we can distinguish any difference. By that time we may have overshot the peak. Hence the need for a meter. For most of us who use a smartphone the solution is a free sound monitoring application. Living downtown often subjected me to ear damaging noise. The sound meter was my way of letting me know just how dangerous things were at times. These free apps can differentiate very

small differences in sound levels. Just place the phone with the sound meter running near the radio speaker in a room without extraneous noise. You can now see precisely when the peak is reached by the highest dB indicated on your new meter *see photo*, and it also graphs sound vs time. Now how cool is that!

Pat will use a donated laptop computer from Blake Dietze until a decision is made on his computer needs. Since the meeting, it has been determined Pat needs a desktop computer. Pricing, depending on the amount of software required, ranges from \$700-\$1200. A Board vote will be taken at the Speed Feldschau memorial Swap Meet and Picnic to decide which pricing will be used.

Charlie Kent talked about donated radios paying for September swap sale venue jackets. Since the Board meeting an auction took place at the June NWVRS meeting. From a combination of radios donated by Charlie, another donation source, and a club member donation, \$218.00 was raised

A discussion on September swap meet table sales amounts determined two price tier rentals for members and non-members. At the June NWVRS meeting a club vote decided to have one price for all.

Pat Kagi talked about new member dues cutoff dates and amounts. Subsequently, in the June NWVRS meeting, the price structure was ratified.

Ed presented investing \$30,000 of the James Mason funds in a divested mutual basket. Extensive discussion of pros and cons ensued with the Board vote ending in a deadlock. At the June NWVRS meeting a club vote decided to invest \$30,000 of the Mason money in the diversified mutual funds basket. Following that meeting there were members that asked that other companies be considered besides T. Rowe. This is being checked into.
