The Aspiring Radiotrician

From The Road: Hugo Gernsback (1884-1967)

This month finds Belen and me with an accepted offer to our future home near the town of Hebo between Tillamook and Pacific City. I may have made mention of this at our last meeting. We won't take possession until early to mid Oct, so it is back to living in the back of a car down by the river! It was also at last month's meeting that our librarian, Robbie, held up the latest addition to our library. I don't recall the title, but it had the much familiar Hugo Gernsback (HG) editor on the cover.

He was born in 1884 in Luxembourg. His interest in electricity started at the age of six when his nanny gave him an electric bell and a coil of wire. I am certain that many of us share similar stories. I was about this age when I tried to polish my dad's pride and joy TV picture tube with his car polisher. Needless to say, all of the picture tube wires wrapped around the

buffing wheel and electric drill. Wires were torn from the chassis and tube. The set never played again as was typical for my formative electronic endeavors. Some could make a similar contemporary statement of me. After recovery from martial punishment, I was free to dismantle said set for parts, something I am much better at. I flinch to this day when seeing a car polisher!


HG soon was on the trail to perfect a better battery to power his little bell. After immigrating to America, he began manufacturing automobile ignition batteries. His company flourished until the depression of 1907 when he closed shop. was at this time he became acquainted with Louis Coggeshall who was a wireless operator. That same evening they decided to go into business selling electrical supplies from a small catalog. suggested the name of Electro Importing Company, which became the world's first wireless amateur supply. Taking a small office in downtown New York, they took out a one inch advertisement in the Jan 13, 1906 edition of Scientific American Magazine. This was the very first time a radio set was offered to the public. set used a single battery, where the popular Marconi design used separate batteries for the coherer and another for the decoherer. Mr. Coggeshall, who was an artist with a flair for beautiful women, evident by the early covers of the first ever Gernsback publications of Modern Electrics. The first issue coming out in April 1908, ceasing publication with the Dec 1913 issue, and merging with another HG publication Electrician and Mechanic. HG went on to publish over fifty magazine titles such as the popular Radio News, Radio Craft, and Short-Wave-Craft being just a few of many successes, along with lessor known titles such as Scientific Detective Monthly, and Science Wonder Stories.

Several writers contributed their articles in the early years of Modern Electrics magazine. John F. Rider (1900-1985), and

Alfred P. Morgan (1889-1972) were just two of many. John F. Rider started his own publishing company around 1931, becoming famous for his technical books and the Perpetual Troubleshooting Manuals (1931-1954). Morgan wrote 50 books, with outstanding self-illustrations, the most famous titles being "The Boys First Books" a series of radio and electronics.
