Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.



# **Left:** Antenna Lamp and Antenna Balls – display by Dan Howard (left to right)

- The Morris Collapsible Ball Antenna incorporates a large glass insulator in its base. The antenna was sold as part of a kit with matching insulators so that the guy wires could serve as part of the antenna system.
- The Aerial Insulator Co manufactured combination lamps and antennas in various styles in the mid to late 1920's. It was a sister company to the Super Ball Antenna Co, also of Green Bay WI.
- Super Ball antennas incorporated a patented insulator base that allowed the antenna mast to be capacitively-coupled to the antenna and serve as part of the antenna system.


#### Right: Antenna Lamp – display by Dan Howard

Combination radio antenna and lamp made by Aerial Insulator Company, Green Bay WI ca. 1928. The frame of the lamp was the antenna. Additionally, the antenna was capacitvely-coupled to the line cord so that the house wiring also functioned as an antenna. These lamps were produced in several styles through the mid to late 1920's.

#### Sony Antennas - display by Ray Holland



Around 1960, Sony made televisions small enough that they could be operated in a car. A special bracket was provided so that the TV could hang from the back of the front seat. These are two styles of car antennas used with the TVs. Rubber suction cups are used to hold the antenna to the car roof without marring the paint.



Interior view of the Sony VCA-2 car TV antenna box. Ray Holland purchased this antenna new in 1960 so that his children could watch their Sony TV in the car during the family's move from Florida to Seattle. TV reception was pretty good all the way across the county, except for the most-rural sections. Note the tube of Sony "Bond Master" compound used to help the suction cups adhere.





**Left: Jackson Bell Loop – display by Alan Shadduck**An interesting and beautiful rotatable loop that plugs into a socket in the top of a Jackson Bell Model 5 AC radio made in Los Angeles ca 1929.

#### TV Antennas – Sonny Clutter

#### left-to-right:

- Telescoping monopole antenna with maroon and gold base.
- Green "tape measure" rabbit ears. Twisting the dial extends and retracts the antenna elements which are constructed like a steel tape measure.
- White and brown RCA rabbit ears antenna with UHF loop antenna.

#### Clif Watson, 1937

Clifton H. Watson, the cofounder of the Portland radio firm of Hallock and Watson, made the newspapers twice in 1937. Watson's duties included running down any interference with the reception of police radio station KGPP (Government Portland Police) from all electrical devices that cause static.

During January, Clif Watson cited the operator of a diathermy machine that interfered with police radio reception. The warrant was for the arrest of Alfred Rudden, director of Western State College, at 538 SE Alder. No word appeared in the Oregonian whether the arrest occurred or the offending electrical device was seized or destroyed. In addition, the Hallock and Watson Company renewed its' corporate status after its lapse in 1936 for the last time.

In a bureaucratic struggle, between the Portland Police Department and the Portland Building Bureau Watson was in the middle. In the Oregonian newspaper the head of the Portland Building Bureau H.E. Plummer on October 8, openly criticized radio engineer Watson for disobedience to city Commissioner Orland Bean in a letter made public.

"Watson should either be suspended or transferred to the Police Department, Plummer wrote." The police should be told to layoff since Watson is in the building bureau and takes his orders from there".

"Mr. Watson has not filed a daily report since June 9, (four months) despite repeated orders to do so", wrote Plummer. "Watson seems willing to obey orders but just doesn't. No discipline can be maintained in the bureau of buildings if an employee ignores the instructions of his superiors".

However, the Oregonian also wrote to noted that C.H. Watson has done a good job for both the Police Department and general radio listener. No further word on any transfer or status of Watson appeared in the Oregonian newspaper in 1937 or 1938.

We consider the PSARA's annual August swap meet to always be one of the best events on the Northwest radio calendar and hate to miss it. So, we packed up and set out for Seattle on Saturday morning.

The Clark County Ham Fair in Salmon Creek, WA was a bonus and logical stopping-off point on the first leg of our drive north. Although the focus was entirely ham radio, the American Legion hall was sold out and there were lots of tools, books, tubes, parts, etc. to choose from. One or two NVRS members had tables and there were some nice radios to see, especially if your interests include ham or military radios.

After making a couple of purchases, we headed on north. We were stunned to see that virtually all of the antique shops in Kalama, WA have closed. The large malls were always worth looking forward to. On Saturday we found one or two small shops open on the main street but everything else was vacant – truly sad.

Shoreline Community College continues to be an excellent venue for PSARA's outdoor swap. This year we were blessed with clear and sunny weather with a high in the low 70's. Yet the shade of the mature firs lining the parking lot was very welcome. The campus closes overnight. So, sellers are allowed to start lining up to get in at 5:30 am. A number of PSARA members were in and set up when we were allowed in at 6:00 and, with twenty-or-so additional cars waiting to get in, the action started quickly. As used to happen with the legendary shows back east, sellers continued arriving and setting up throughout the morning. So, there were new offerings every time you made the rounds. Close to 80 sellers offered everything from broadcast studio gear, wireless equipment, old telephones and very collectable radios and speakers to parts, records, magazines, guitars, mics and amps, and tubes. With folks coming from throughout the Northwest and a few from British Columbia, this PSARA Swap Meet is always a great place to buy and sell. Sure, traffic was as terrible, and we missed seeing several friends. But, the 2017 show was definitely not eclipsed.



Deco Detrola – A very stylish and collectable late 1930's Detrola deco set for only \$15! A little veneer work and knobs would make this bargain into a real knockout




Zenith Cathedral – This gorgeous, and tiny, Zenith model 805 cathedral dates from 1935. Seldom seen and beautiful, this model came out right at the end of the cathedral craze of the early 1930's, being replaced by the Zenith "cubes," "tombstones," and "Waltons."

Service Equipment – On the left a Simpson Mirrorscope saves bench space by mounting the CRT vertically and projecting the image on a mirror. It's just plain cool. 
