Edward "Doug" Ludwig, Silent Key

Edward "Doug" Ludwig became a silent key on January 30th of this year, leaving his legacy, and many radios behind. While Doug was known by many as a collector of All American 5 radios, few of us knew the extent of his radio collection. I was privileged to see the collection in his home after he passed away. Doug had devoted one bedroom in his 3-bedroom home to his collection. The room was adorned from wall to wall and shelves in the center of the room, all-in-all about 150 radios. Other radios could be found in his living room, family room, hallways and his personal bedroom. Additional radios awaiting Doug's hand were found in the garage, along with parts, tubes, and test equipment.

Doug collected most of the common brands, but his collection included a substantial number of RCA and Emerson models. I Also had the privilege to meet Doug's brother (heir to the estate) and nephew, who spent days preparing a manifest of the collection. Doug's wishes were that the majority of his collection be returned to the radio collecting community, and made provisions through a professional executor to ensure his wishes were carried out, and that the society would benefit, as well as its members. This was to be Doug's legacy to our organization. His collection was vast enough to require 2-plus auctions to disperse. While I primarily collect wood sets from an earlier era, I appreciate Doug's love of plastic and Bakelite radios as part of Americana, and will happily display my auction purchases, as part radio history and a small tribute to the man who loved them even more.

Doug was born, raised, and spent his early years (through high school), in New Jersey where he played Football and other sports. He graduated from the University of Maine with a degree in Forestry. After serving his country in the Korean Conflict, Doug began his career in forestry with assignments on the west coast; including Washington, Oregon, and California. Along with his passion for the outdoors, Doug enjoyed electronics and his canine friends. Doug leaves behind four nieces, one nephew, five grand-nieces, two grand-nephews, seven great nieces and nephews, and approximately 300 radios!


Negative Feedback - Part 2 of 3

Featured is the '46 Stewart Warner model 61T16 table radio. Notice the tell-tale connection from the audio transformer secondary winding back to the first audio stage. A sure-sign of better performance. This *out of phase* signal enters the screen grid of the12SK7 first audio amplifier tube in what is called Negative Feedback (NF). Very often used in guitar amplifiers delivering less distortion and a flatter frequency response at higher volume, also known as headroom. The small trade off being less gain, but compensated with adequate output power. Less costly filtering components are needed as NF reduces hum produced in the power supply. Even smaller speakers can be utilized due to reduced distortion. NF though will not improve distortion in the earlier stages of the radio. When servicing speakers and output transformers on these NF sets, precautions are required as mentioned in the service literature.

NF is seen more in the expensive transformer sets. It was thought that NF would not benefit simple AC-DC sets due to their simple circuitry, not appreciated by the average listener. Please excuse my lack of theory and being unusually short winded. Next time we finish our discussion of NF with a more graphical explanation. So until next time from your aspiring radiotrician. - Sid

AUDIO OSCILLATION

The audio system of this receiver utilizes a two stage type of inverse feed-back arrangement and, should it ever be necessary to replace the speaker or output transformer, it is to maintain a important definite phase relationship in the feed-back circuit. If the connections to the output transformer are reversed or if the feed-back connection is made to the wrong side of the output transformer secondary, the system will become regenerative instead of degenerative. Under those conditions audio oscillation may result. If that occurs, oscillation may be prevented by reversing the connections to the secondary of the cutput transformer.


