

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage Radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 9:30 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio shows, and radio sales which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held in and around Portland.

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.

Charles Alton ''Chuck'' Forsberg

Chuck Forsberg died on September 24, 2015, in Portland, Oregon. He was 71.

Chuck was a collector of all things electronic. No piece of equipment was unworthy of shelf space, no matter how old or useless.

Chuck said that he always wanted a career in electronics, and he never considered any other profession. He started college at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in New York. After two years at Rensselaer, he transferred to the University of Wisconsin, graduating in 1966 with a Bachelor of Science in electrical engineering. He continued at the University of Wisconsin, earning a Master's degree in electrical engineering.

In 1968, he accepted the invitation from Tektronix, in Beaverton, Oregon. It was a perfect match. It was a company and a position that allowed him to thrive. He had good managers who knew how to use his talents. Yes, Chuck was a talented engineer, but he was also naturally creative, providing Tek with inspired design and forward-thinking innovations.

The company recognized his unique talent and special set of skills. Chuck was quickly given a lot of responsibility, culminating in his assignment as the project engineer for the Tektronix 4014 computer graphics terminal project, a hugely successful product for the company.

Chuck was a ham radio operator for about 50 years. His FCC designated call sign was WA7KGX. He bought the best equipment, and true to form on all things electronic and technical, he just knew stuff. In his later years, ham radio became particularly important to him because it was an enjoyable activity that he could physically handle. He was an active member of two ham radio clubs.

Tucker Car Radios

At Saturday's meeting, I had an interesting talk with Mike McCrow about Tucker car radios. Most have heard the story of the short-lived Tucker Torpedo cars. About 51 cars were produced in 1948 before Preston Tucker's company folded. So, with only 51 cars produced, why are there so many Tucker car radios around? Let me tell you.

A late NVRS member, Don Iverson, once owned a Tucker car radio; made by Motorola. I was thrilled to borrow it for the NVRS "Motorola Milestones" display at the October, 1993 Northwest Car Collector's Show. That's it on the corner of the table.

Though the receiver is a little non-descript (as some car radios can be), you can't miss the control head with "Tucker" spelled-out on the push buttons.

Don told me that Motorola made and sold many more Tucker radios than there were ever cars to put them in. In an effort to raise capital for the cash-strapped company, Tucker came up with a plan to solicit down payments. In exchange for putting cash down on a Tucker, customers received a set of luggage and a Tucker radio to be installed when their car was delivered. Other sources confirm Don's story with slight variations.

"The accessories plan was the brain child of Cliff Knoble, [Tucker's] advertising manager, whose idea was to sell accessories to people who wanted to buy Tucker automobiles, and with the accessories give them a sequence number for getting a car as soon as one with their number came off the line." "[B]uyers are offered...a desirable group of advance accessories including a radio, a set of fitted and immediately usable luggage, and tailored seat covers."¹

So, although Tucker car radios are far from common today, they are not exactly rare, either. If you would like to see a Tucker radio for yourself (installed), check out America's Car Museum in Tacoma.
