The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage Radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 9:30 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Tube of the month:

Farm radio tubes -- in Farm radios of the 1930s a popular used tube was the 1A7G/GT which was a Pentagrid converter. In the rural parts of the country there was not AC power hooked up to all parts so people relied on battery-operated radio sets. Many ran on 6volt with a vibrator to run the B+ so they ran in series filament of 1.4 volts with 4 tubes for many radios. For the battery "farm radios" that used 1.4-volt filament tubes, 1A7 Pentagrid converter, 1N5 IF, 1H5 detector/1st AF, and either 1A5 or 3Q5 output.

Hallock and Watson, 1926

Hallock and Watson opened a factory for their two Halowat models the All Wave 5 and the later 1925 version of the TR-5 that featured a wave selector switch. The new factory was located on the third floor of the Wilhelm-Rudie Building at NW Park and NW Everett. "We have procured a space of 2000 square feet which will give us ample room for increasing output more than twofold to 500 sets a day," Joseph Hallock told the Oregonian reporter. Today this address at 733 NW Everett has housing units converted from space within the former warehouse building.

Until now, the firm manufactured its receivers at the then independent town of Multnomah, Oregon. Hallock and Watson gave up the retail line for a few months and hired the Forbes Company to sell the Halowat brand in Western Washington and Oregon. In eastern Washington, Idaho, and Montana, the Interstate Radio Company of Spokane became the chief distributor.

The Lectco Manufacturing firm offered the Hallock and Watson's first radio, the five-tube model RF-12, for \$25.00 in a Radio Renewal or clearance sale during June. The Walker-Toger Company located on SW Eleventh Avenue in Portland took over the Hallock and Watson retail outlet from August 1926 until March 1927 when H&W reopened their old store on SW Park.


The first ad among a series of five for the All Wave Five appeared in the September 12, 1926 Oregonian. The set sold for \$155.00 having General audio transformers for high quality of tone and simplicity of control, endearing the radio to the women market. One other ad mentioned the model TR-5 running on December 5 at a price of \$85.00. The firm offered Bakelite service for the radio consumer cutting, drilling, and engraving to any size and form continuing the service well into 1927.

The Radio Post Office By Dan Howard



In May 1938, the Post Office Department held "National Airmail Week" a campaign to celebrate the 20th anniversary of US air mail service. Post offices nation-wide prepared special "cachets" (commemorative rubber-stamped markings) that were applied to letters airmailed between May 15th and May 21st.

During the run up to Airmail Week, KEX arranged with the Portland postmaster to designate their studios in the Oregonian Building an official post office and station personnel were deputized as postal clerks. From April 30th through May 21st, Saturday night broadcasts were run from 11:00 pm to midnight during which mail dropped off at the station was processed "live on the air" and celebrity guests performed. After sorting, mail from the KEX Radio Post Office was delivered to the Portland airport (then on Swan Island) for delivery.

The stunt was further promoted with celebrity appearances, letter-writing contests between local high schools, and numerous plugs in *The Oregonian* newspaper which owned KEX at the time.

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


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


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
