

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage Radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 9:30 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio shows, and radio sales which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held in and around Portland.

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.





Dick Howard Mini Bio and Open House

Dick Howard has agreed to have the first open home right after the February 2020 meeting. This is something that is not new, but we use to do this years ago. The open house was intended to members to get to know each other. They can come by and visit and the host can show off his collection, workbench, etc., whatever is comfortable. This is open to all members. – Pat Kagi

My first exposure to radio came when a neighbor presented me with his late father's Philmore Crystal set, the thirty's nickel plated version. Fortunately at six years of age I soon lost interest and made no "improvements" and it survives today as the first item in my collection.

From earlier than I can remember electricity has fascinated me, always being an object of my attention so when at about ten, when a classmate offered to show me how to make a one tube radio from parts of a trashed Atwater Kent, I was hooked. From that start, I just about wore out the school's copy of Albert Morgan's First Radio Book for Boys. My next textbook was a copy of ARRL Handbook for 1950 that my mother found on the fifty cent table at J. K. Gills. Talk about being in over my head! But the local news stand furnished copies of CQ Magazine and Radio/Television News. So my radio education flourished even if it wasn't formal.

"Misery loves company" or "Water seeks its own level" so I became a good friend with a radio amateur in one of my engineering classes at Portland State. He prodded me into signing up to take the Technician and Novice FCC exams (in those days they were administered by volunteer amateurs.) He called me to come take the exam the day the papers came so I was faced with the necessity of learning the dreaded code!!!! Talk about Burning the Midnight oil!

May 25th, 1958 the envelope arrived from the FCC. A perfectly collectable ARC-5 transmitter was destroyed.

Ham radio generated the inevitable "junk-box" some of which was too nice to "improve" or destroy so the "Collection" began to evolve.

My collection has developed over the years to include the first TV that I disassembled and smuggled into the house and then reassembled since my father didn't want any TV that wasn't Color! (He did like to watch my ancient B&W after all.)

Just like other collectors some things just "Follow you home." What do I collect? Old ham gear, of course! Military, absolutely, especially WW1. Oregon/Washington, I love it especially because some of what I have come from the personal estates of Joe Hallock and Charley Austin.

But the main criterion is that it has a history and its own personality.

It has certainly been fun to be a part of the NWVRS since the very first when the Bilbys ran that ad and gathered some of us "Closet collectors" to see and buy some of their treasures.

To reach Dick Howard's home:

From I-205 take Exit 16, Johnson Creek Blvd; thence East one quarter mile to S. E. 92nd Avenue (traffic signal); thence South one half mile to S. E. Idleman Road (traffic signal); thence East one mile (to top of hill) to S. E. Walnut Drive; thence North one quarter mile to S. E. Tyler Road; thence East two blocks to second left (S. E. French Acres Drive.) Our home is large grey house on the corner (9999 S. E. French Acres Drive.) There is an ornamental lamppost in front.

Another Bench Repair by Sid Saul

A few months back at a club auction I was lucky to acquire a beautiful General Electric model 74 table radio. I could see evidence of past work, so felt safe powering it up via my variac. The radio sounded terrible.

The first audio tube, a 6F5 black metal tested weak. I couldn't find a replacement in stock, so one of our club members graciously handed me a glass replacement tube at our last meeting. I felt safe using glass due to running audio frequencies. Still sounded terrible.

What to do. The first thing was to grab my audio signal tracer. The sound was normal at the signal grid pin 4 of the 41 output tube, which by the way tested good. Now moving to pin 2, the plate of this 41 tube. I would have expected a much strengthened audio signal.

Instead there it was again. That weak and distorted sound heard through the speaker. A reasoned guess led me to the culprits. The previous owner had replaced C24, originally a 10 Mfd 450 volt bypass condenser across R20 the 410 ohm wire wound cathode or bias resistor. The resistor was indeed open, and the replacement cap rated at 20 Mfd tested at 40 Mfd, twice the marked value. The ESR should have been about 1.5 ohms, instead tested at 8.5, please see the table in photo. I'm getting good use of that \$8 LCR meter! Replacing these two items has this radio playing as it did new. Improper biasing and lack of current flow from the open resistor, and perhaps some audio gain issues from the bad cap. Another successful day at the bench

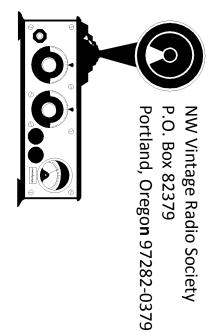
