

The E.H.Scott Historical Society (EHSHS), a non-profit tax exempt corporation, was founded Jan. 27,1992 and is dedicated to the preservation of the history and radios of the E.H.Scott Radio Laboratories (formerly the Scott Transformer Company) which existed in Chicago, IL from 1925-1953.

The primary goals of the EHSHS are: (1) the education of the public in regard to the history of this company and E.H.Scott; (2) to provide a forum for the documentation and preservation of E.H.Scott radios; (3) to develop a collection of E.H.Scott radios, memorabilia and related items, based primarily upon donations, for public display and education; (4) to develop an institution devoted to the procurement, care, study, and public display of such a collection.

We are now accepting memberships and donations and want to encourage anyone with an interest in E.H.Scott and/or his radios to join the EHSHS. As an EHSHS member you will also receive our quarterly newsletter, the Scott News. Each issue will include articles of interest to E.H.Scott collectors, including repair and restorations hints, as well as historical articles and more. Membership in the EHSHS is only \$20 / year, prorated to the time of year you join. All memberships expire the last day of each year. 

All Wave Radio Marvel Fits in Clock Case



HERE'S a dandy one tube set that'll bring in the distance on either short or long waves. It uses headphones, eliminating those noisy DX squeals so annoying to the family, and will fit in a clock case.

All parts are on a 1/32" aluminum sheet bent to form both chassis and panel. Drill holes as indicated, and bend panel to shape. Mount wafer type sockets diagonally so that large "F" holes are toward the lower front corners of sel.

The tuning control, a .0001 mfd. midget variable condenser (23 plates) is mounted in center. A 50,000 olnn variable resistance goes in front of tube socket. Antenna condenser may either be bought or made. Tube is type 30.

Mount midget fixed condensers, grid leak, and 15 ohm filament resistor under chassis.

All connections in A+ B— circuit go to

the chassis. Make all wiring short.

Coils wound with No. 34 enameled copper wire. Wind L1 and L2 in same direction. Reverse P and P1 if receives will not oscillate. Coils 6 and 7 are for broadcast band 5 for police and airplans, others for short wave annature.

Two flashlight cells will last several weeks as A batteries.

To operate this regenerative receiver, turn knob on tuning control until plates are closed. Slowly turn potentiometer until a "plop" is heard. Turn past this point, and go back until set is about ready to "plop" again. Now turn tuning control until a station is heard.—Thomas A. Blanchard.




HOW TO STORE YOUR TUBES

I've been buying vacuum tubes for many years. They are resting in dozens of cartons in the garage. I've spent hours trying to find a tube that I need to repair a set. I knew there was a better way.

I was in the Box Shoppe the other day and saw a box made to hold sports cards. The box is 13 X 15 inches and is divided into 4 compartments. Each compartment is 3 inches wide.

I mounted the boxes vertically on a wall 90 degrees from a door. You can still open the door and not interfere with the boxes. Each box will hold from 40 to 120 tubes. The photo below shows two boxes on the wall.

CLINTON RADIO

JULY 25, 1992 AUCTION submitted by M. Feldt

One of the best sources of finding antique radios and related items are the old established TV radio repair shops. Unfortunately, few of these shops are still around today. They are quickly disappearing. On July 25, another shop became only a memory. Because of failing health, Art Schwenk, who had been a radio and TV repairman in New Castle for over 50 years, had to sell the contents of his home and business.

In front of the shop were two rows of tables. One row consisted of '50s and '60s radios and the other row was old tubes and parts. Along the side of the shop was a long row of tables containing old car radios. Inside the shop were '50s and '60s TVs and old test equipment. (A number of collectors, who knew Art, also knew he had some radios from the '20s and '30s and they were expecting to see them at the auction. They were disappointed to learn that Art had sold those sets to an antique dealer a couple of years ago.)

Most of the items in the auction went for a few dollars. The only items that had strong bidding were a catalin radio, boxes of N.O.S tubes, and a set of Riders Manuals.

TECH TIP

You may not realize it, but a crystal set could be in a pile of junk right under your nose. Olson Radio had a small cylindrical device, #RA367, that plugged into the microphone jack of P.A. Systems. It had one white wire coming out of it which was for connecting to an antenna, while the P.A. supplied the ground. There was a knob on the end opposite the ½ inch phone plug end. This knob moved an iron core in and out of a coil which tuned in thr stations. As usual selectivity and sensitivity vary with the length of the antenna. Mine works fine with adapters for direct connection to headphones. If no signals are heard you may have to replace the diode as I did, but you'll have a nice compact unusual receiver. 

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JAMES WILLIAM GRANT 1911 - 1992

James W. Grant died on Thursday, August 27 at his home in Evanston, Illinois where he had been a resident since 1960.

Mr. Grant developed the first hand-held, transistorized, timing light while Vice President of Peerless Instruments (now Echland Manufacturing).

Mr. Grant was preceded in death by his wife of over fifty years; Dorothy nee Nelson died September 30, 1990. Survivors include two sons: James (Patricia) of Arizona and Tom (Holly) of Skokie, Illinois; his daughter, Judith (the Rev. Donald) Oglesby of Akron, Ohio; eight grandchildren; and his sister, Lois Butler of California.

Services were held in Skokie, Illinois and the internment was at Pleasant Township Cemetery in Iowa.

To his family and close friends he was known as "Louie" or "Jim". He waited tables, hauled fruit, and did surveying for the U.S.C.G.S. to work his way through Iowa State University during the depression. He became a well-known electronic engineer. He spent his retirement years as a nationally recognized technical historian and was a respected member of many related associations. He had been an active member of the Indiana Historical Radio Society since the mid-1970s.

Don and I first met Jim at a Mid-West Tool Collectors Association, Inc. meeting in the early '70s. We prized Jim and Dorothy's friendship and they will both be grievously missed at IHRS, Illinois and AWA meetings.

Indiana Historical Radio Society made a memorial contribution to the American Heart Association.

IHRS' Members extend their sympathy to the family.
