

IHRS/AWA REGIONAL 26TH ANNUAL "SPRING FLING"

Our big May meet is now part of history. Some 130 attendees signed in from more than 8 states including New Hampshire. The threat of rain kept some away and, eventually, we did see the heavens part to give some moisture. The rainfall here was above the usual average and, there is the hope that we have it out of the way this year in order that the 1998 meet will be blessed with sunshine. The new location and facilities worked out well and plans have already been made to schedule a repeat performance here next year.

The equipment contest yielded some excellent hardware and displays with well planned presentations. The contest winners and their radios or equipment were: (a) INDIANA MADE RADIOS; Michael Feldt, 1st place for his display of a 1925 Slagle model IV and a 1927 Slagle model XX along with supporting material which included: one each of Slagle 1924, 1927, and 1928 advertising folders, an 01-A Slagle tube and two Slagle tube cartons, a photo of Vern Slagle, an original photo of a 1920s Slagle service truck and driver, and other associated historical information. The Slagle XX has a cast aluminum chassis fitted with blue Arcturus tubes. Mike's display was so attractive it also won the "Best of Show" award. George Freeman won 2nd place with his beautiful 1926 Tilman battery set. (b) Communication Equipment through 1948: A first place ribbon was awarded to Robert Drake for his National SW-2 Regenerative receiver. Paul Gregg received a second place ribbon for his FB-7 National unit with the power supply, speaker and coils, (the latter being missing items in most displays). (c) Test Equipment through 1950: First place awarded to Roger Brown for his early Simpson Radio Set Analyzer, the 2nd spot was won by L. Dwight Farringer for his Aerovox L/C checker. (d) Table Sets of the 1920s: Walt Sanders received the 1st place award for his Radiola Senior with the second place ribbon going to Jack Lavelle for his AK-10C breadboard which he had restored. The awards were distributed at the Friday evening banquet and all of the contestants are to be commended for their efforts and entries.







Finally a special thanks to Dr. Ed Tayler for the photographs on some of the IHRS/AWA attendees and the contest.




Indiana Historical Radio Society's second Special Live Performing Radio Contest and Swap Meet at Forest Park, Noblesville, Indiana




Glass enclosed back porch where the contest and luncheon took place.




RCA Radiola 24 and RCA Radiola 26 entered by Walt Sanders Power supplied by A, B, and C batteries **First Place**







The museum is now into its summer hours: Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday. Having the museum open Tuesday and Wednesday will coincide with the Shipshewana Flea Market and its' thousands of visitors that come each week.

New additions to the museum include a great transistor radio display from Charlie Miller's collection, a Stewart Warner tomb stone with a chrome front, a very early Transoceanic with a sailing ship on the front and a unique Dictogram speaker from Serge Krause.

A yard sale was held at the museum with donated items, bringing in over \$200. Many of the items were donated by Ross Smith.

The December 1996 IHRS Bulletin contained a list of its' 13 founding members. One member was Julian Stark. His whereabouts were unknown. On June 4, 1997, his neice Janice Cayot, visited the museum and said Julian was in a nursing home in Crossville, Tennessee. She stated that he still enjoys getting cards and letters and would enjoy hearing from IHRS members. She donated several papers and early radio pictures to the museum.
