The raise of hands appeared to be a unanimous yes with no desenting vote.

Special thanks too to Glenn and Ramona Fitch who stayed over to clean the meeting room and who helped organize the meet!!!





After the last "Bulletin" was mailed, I became aware of the closing of a fine restaurant which, coincidentally, happened to be The Laughners' cafeteria on Washington Street where we have been having our "Awards Banquets" the last few years. I was about to approach the "Old Country Buffett" in the shopping center on the south side of the street when, past president, Glenn Fitch suggested to Herman that we use the facilities just north of the clubhouse where we

have been having our annual "Fall Foliage" meets. There is plenty of room to even hold some of the activity indoors. President Gross has the details in his message so read on. There are a number of details that will need to be resolved such as the location of the Awards Banquet and indeed, whether there will be an "Awards Banquet". What sort of entertainment will be available and other questions. so stay tuned as I mentioned above. There is a listing of Motels in the vicinity although there are none "on campus" or at the gate as the saying goes. However, none are so far away as to provide any hardship as you will see from Herman's writeup.

The subject of Auctions has appeared in this column before and will probably continue but, for now, I wanted to add some comments of my own from recent experiences. Last year, I had the pleasure of attending the Lionel Haid estate auction in Richmond. It was well prepared, organized, advertised and attended. True collectors were on hand to bid on and buy many items of their choice. It seemed to me to be a role model of the action suggested by the AWA *Old Timers Bulletin* in their November 1999 article written by Robert Lozier. There was a wealth of good items available as could be seen in our review of the event in the Winter 1999 (Vol.28, #4) edition of "The Bulletin". One thing that was evident to me was the fact that Lionel was indeed a collector who was in the hobby to "Preserve Radio History for Posterity" which parallels our club's purpose.

By comparison, I went to a recent auction in Fort Wayne. There were only 4 or 5 true treasures. The most notable shortcoming seemed to be the removal of tubes from the equipment, (probably with the intent to sell the tubes separately). Much of the material on hand showed either poor storage techniques or improper packing etc..

It did not seem as though the material had been collected from the viewpoint of any Historical interest.

Although this auction described was advertised and promoted in a better fashion, the merchandise didn't meet the expectations. Members Bob Shuck and Mike Feldt did encounter a third auction that was held at an old TV Shop in Baker's Corner, just west of SR31 and slightly north of 146th St.. There were some items of interest and Bob bought a set of Rider's manuals at a good price. Bob and Mike avoided bidding conflict by agreeing ahead of time as to what each was hoping to acquire. In this case, the material was there but someone failed to get good advertising out in publication, they had the market to themselves. Now all of this opens up to looking at why our last auction at the "June Spring Fling" was not a success. We took advantage of a number of suggestions and decided to allow free attendance, (only the dealers paid admission), advertising was utilized, and even told the story of what the auction was all about on the radio. Perhaps it would behoove us to not use the regular newspapers and to use The Antique Weekly. We did have the show information available in Antique Radio Classified but there was not the response anticipated or needed. Fred Prohl now has a listing and a site on the NET and perhaps since we hear that so much of our type of trading is now going on via Internet, it may help our cause. May we hear from you on this subject??? (Please!!!).

Now back to the topic of the election and my appointment as editor. I do appreciate it and consider it an honor accordingly, I need to state that my service in this position is to last until the next election in September, 2001. 
#### Indiana Radio History - September 15, 1953

### Four Million Model 740-T Radios Now History

Reported in the Arvin Folks, November 1953


"Four million radios . . . On September 15 the four millionth 4-tube Arvin radio came off the assembly line. Its cabinet was a sparkling bright coral, one of the "Rainbow" series, model 740T.

The four millionth 4-tube radio is a direct descendant of the first one which was made in 1938. Its appearance has changed to keep abreast of changing designs but the cabinet is the shatter-proof type that brought fame to Arvin. There have been engineering changes, too, through the years, to keep the radio among the leaders."



As expected with an employee publication the remainder of the above article profiles sales and assembly employees involved in the 740T production. The title, "Four million Model 740-T Radios . . . . seems to indicate there were four million 740T's assembled. The article clears this up by stating there were 4 million four tube radios assembled by Arvin as of September 15, 1953. Dan Howard wrote in the January 1993 ARC that the 740T was also available in cherry, citron, green, ivory, and tan in addition to coral to complete the rainbow color series. He adds that the 740T is a difficult collectable to find. (Dan's article is a excellent reference on Arvin metal radios.)
