

THANKS VERY MUCH GENTLEMEN FOR YOUR WORK ON THIS PROJECT AND WE ARE SURE SOME-THING SENSIBLE WILL BE FORTHCOMING FROM THE DIRECTORS. OUR THANKS ALSO TO ALL THE MEMBERS WHO COOPERATED BY SENDING THEIR COMMENTS AND IDEAS TO THE COMMITTEE. AMONG THESE WERE WILLIAM THOMAS, W3RV; KARL KRECH, W3BS; REGINALD CARLES, W1NR; HAROLD DINGER, W3KH; HARTLAND WILDER, VE2SF, AND OTHERS.

YOCB-II REGRETS TO REPORT (BELATEDLY) THAT PAUL G. WATSON, W3BO HAS BECOME A SILENT KEY. PAUL WAS A FREQUENT CONTRIBU-TOR TO "SPARK-GAP TIMES". WHEN WE WERE TRYING TO GET SGT GOING ON A NEW FOREMAT WE PUBLISHED AN ARTICLE ABOUT HIS TUBE COL-LECTION. WE GOT THE MATERIAL FOULED UP BADLY WHICH WAS VERY DISTRESSING TO PAUL. HE CALLED US ON THE LAND-LINE AND WANTED THE ISSUE SQUELCHED BUT IT WAS TOO LATE AS IT HAD BEEN MAILED ALREADY TO THE MEMBERS. PAUL WAS AN ARDENT COLLECTOR OF VACUUM TUBES AND WILLED HIS MARVELLOUS COLLECTION (ONE OF THE FINEST IN THE WORLD) TO THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTE. THE ARTICLE ABOUT THE COLLECTION APPEARED IN THE APRIL 1964 ISSUE OF SGT. PAUL WILL NEVER BE FORGOTTEN FOR HIS COLLECTION IN THE INSTITUTE CARRIES HIS NAME.

OUR FINE SECRETARY HAS BEEN BADGERED AND BESIEGED WITH INQUIRIES ABOUT THE BLUEBOOK. SHE HAS DONE HER BEST TO ANSWER THE MANY MEMBERS BUT THE MATTER IS NOT IN HER HANDS. FIRST LET ME SAY THIS, THAT IF YOU HAVE PAID IN YOUR THREE DOLLARS FOR THE BLUE BOOK OR YOU WILL EVENTUALLY GET THE BLUEBOOK OR YOUR MONEY WILL BE REFUNDED.

HAVING BEEN THE BLUEBOOK EDITOR FOR THE FIRST EDITION WHICH WAS PRODUCED IN 1962 AND 1963, YOCB-II KNOWS WHAT A MOUNTAINOUS TASK IT IS TO PRODUCE THE BLUEBOOK. STARTING FROM SCRATCH IT TOOK 1½ YEARS FOR US TO GET IT OUT AND WE ONLY HAD ABOUT 300 MEMBERS AT THE TIME. YOCB-II WAS STILL THE BLUEBOOK

EDITOR WHEN CLINE, WAPPZ, OUR BELOVED PRESIDENT WENT S.K. IT WAS THEN THAT THE PRESIDENCY, THE "SPARK-GAP TIMES", THE BLUEBOOK WERE ALL IN OUR LAP. REALIZING THAT "SPARK-GAP TIMES" MUST BE CONTINUED AT ANY COST WE ASSUMED THE ACTING EDITOR-SHIP OF IT TEMPORARILY. INCIDENTALLY WE HAVE NEVER FOUND ANYONE WHO WOULD ASSUME THE EDITORSHIP. OUR TIME BEING CLAIMED BY SPARK-GAP TIMES WE HAD TO LET THE BLUEBOOK SLIDE AND IT WAS NOT UNTIL THE SUMMER OF 1964 THAT WE WERE ABLE TO FIND ANOTHER BLUE-BOOK EDITOR TO TAKE OUR PLACE. YOCB-11 MOANED AND GROANED SO MUCH ABOUT THE BLUEBOOK THAT ROB-ROY, WOHR, TOOK PITY ON US AND VOL-UNTEERED TO TAKE OVER THE BLUEBOOK. TIME THE MEMBERSHIP GROWTH OF OOTC WAS VERY HEAVY AND ROB-ROY NEVER HAS QUITE CAUGHT UP WITH THE GROWTH. ROBIE HAS TO WORK FOR A LIVING AND AS A RESULT JUST HASN'T HAD THE SPARE TIME TO QUITE FILL THE GAP. IT WOULD COST ABOUT \$3000 TO HAVE THE BLUEBOOK DONE BY A COMMERCIAL ADVERTISING AGENCY AND WE DOUBT IF THEY COULD DO IT. ROBIE VOLUNTEER-ED TO DO IT GRATIS, THE EDITING AND THE PRINTING, AND WITH THE 425 INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP, TWO YEARS ISN'T TOO LONG FOR THE JOB. BESIDES WE HAVEN'T \$3000 TO SPEND ON THE BLUEBOOK. IF THE TRUE COST OF THE BLUE-BOOK WAS PAID BY MEMBERS, INSTEAD OF \$3.00, IT WOULD BE \$10.00 OR \$12.00 AT TODAY'S PRICES. PLEASE BE PATIENT GENTLEMEN! THE BLUEBOOK IS ON THE FIRE - COOKING - AND IF ANYBODY HAS AN IDEA HE CAN GET IT OUT ANY MORE QUICKLY THAN ROBIE (AND WILL PRINT IT GRATIS) THEN STEP RIGHT UP AND YOU'LL BE PROMPTLY ELECTED BLUEBOOK EDITOR & PUBLISHER SO QUICKLY IT WILL MAKE YOUR HEAD SWIM. YE OLDE COPY BOYE II WAS TOLD THAT THE CLUB HAD BEEN WAITING SOME TWELVE YEARS FOR A BLUEBOOK (AND HAD THREE OR FOUR BLUEBOOK EDITORS) BEFORE HE GOT OUT THE FIRST EDIT-ION. PEACE BE WITH YOU!

FLASH: SPARK GAP TIMES SHOWS PROMISE OF BREAKING EVEN

A THORO OVERHAUL OF THE SGT MAILING LIST WAS COMPLETED IN MAY. A POST CARD SHOWING YOUR SUBSCRIPTION STATUS WAS SENT IN JUNE. REGARDLESS OF STATUS, EVERYONE ON THE LIST IS TO BE SENT THE 8-66 ISSUE.

WITH SILENT KEYS TO KEEP TRACK OF, NEW MEMBERS BEING ADDED EVERY WEEK, MEMBERS MOVING WITHOUT NOTICE, REQUESTS FOR ADDRESS CHANGES, UNDELIVERABLE COPIES COMING BACK EVERY WEEK, THE MAILING LIST FUNCTION HAS BECOME SO COMPLEX THAT SOME FIRM NEW RULES MUST BE MADE.

NO. 1. WHENEVER A COPY COMES BACK MARKED UNDELIVERABLE THAT SUBSCRIBER'S ADDRESS PLATE WILL BE MOVED TO THE INACTIVE SECTION AND SGT WILL STOP.

NO. 2. IF YOU REQUEST YOUR ADDRESS BE CHANGED, REQUIRING THE MAKING OF A NEW PLATE, A FEE OF 50¢ MUST BE SENT.

NO. 3. IF YOU HAVE TWO ADDRESSES, YOU MUST REMIT WITH YOUR NEXT RENEWAL 50ϕ ADDITIONAL FOR THE EXTRA PLATE.

COMPLICATIONS ARISE WHERE MEMBERS
REQUEST SGT BE MAILED TO VARYING ADDRESSES. AS THE MAILING DATE OF EACH ISSUE
CANNOT BE ACCURATELY FORECAST AND AS NO
MEMBER CAN BE SURE OF THE PRECISE DATE
HE WILL ARRIVE AT OR DEPART FROM A GIVEN
ADDRESS, SOME COPIES ARE RETURNED BY THE
POST OFFICE 8¢ OR 10¢ COLLECT MARKED UNDELIVERABLE. SUBSCRIBERS SHOULD LEAVE
FORWARDING ADDRESS AND MONEY WITH EACH
POST OFFICE CONCERNED, TO PREVENT HIS
ADDRESS PLATE FROM GOING "INACTIVE".

CANADIANS, OR OTHERS OUTSIDE THE COUNTRY SHOULD REMIT IN U.S. FUNDS OF THE EQUIVALENT AFTER ALLOWING FOR THE EX-CHANGE RATE AND CHECK COLLECTION CHARGES.

DESPITE THE GENEROSITY OF OUR PUBLISHER WHO PRINTS SGT BELOW COST THE MAGAZINE IS ISSUED AT A LOSS. WITH THE ABOVE
RULES IN EFFECT AND THE DISTRIBUTION LIMITED TO ACTUAL SUBSCRIBERS THE LOSS GAP
WILL BE CLOSED. A CONSIDERABLE PRECENTAGE
OF SUBSCRIBERS ARE PAID YEARS AHEAD BUT
THESE PREPAYMENTS, INCLUDED IN THE SURPLUS,
ARE ACTUALLY CONTINGENT ASSETS.

FEW MEMBERS APPRECIATE THE SWEAT AND STRAIN EXPENDED TO GET OUT EACH ISSUE. EDITED IN TENNESSEE (OR CALIF), PRINTED IN OHIO, ADDRESSED IN MAINE, SENT BACK TO ANOTHER OHIO PLACE FOR MAILING, HARDLY EVER HAS SO MUCH WORK BEEN DONE BY SO FEW FOR SO MANY. HERE'S THE JUNE DISTRIBUTION:

THE ROSTER OF MEMBERS? MAILING LIST CORRECTIONS, TAKING PRECEDENCE, TOOK OVER 100 MAN HOURS. ROSTER PRODUCTION WILL TAKE ANOTHER 125 M.H. A COPY WILL BE ENCLOSED IN A FUTURE ISSUE OF SGT. IT'S HOPED SPACE IN EACH SUBSEQUENT ISSUE WILL BE DEVOTED TO ROSTER CHANGES. EVEN THEN NEVER EXPECT ACCURACY BETTER THAN 90%. TOOMANY MOVING WITHOUT NOTICE, UNREPORTED S.K.'S., NEW MEMBERS, ETC.

CRITICS MAY SAY: "CENTRALIZE YOUR OP-ERATIONS!" MOST OF THESE CRITICS ARE LIKELY TO LIVE IN THE POPULOUS STATES OF CALIF., N.Y., MASS., N.J. AND FLA. WITH AN AGGREGATE MEMBERSHIP OF OVER 275 OR 40%. YET MEMBERS IN THAT GROUP OF STATES ARE DOING LESS THEN 2% OF THE WORK. THE REAL VITALITY OF OOTC SPRINGS FROM THE WEAKER STATES. HOW COME? 'NUF SED.

HOW THEY ARE PAYING DEPARTMENT

Here is the chance to look at ourselves in a figurative mirror. Last year-end a notice was sent to all members showing 60% not paying for Spark Gap Times. People unable to pay were asked to send as little as ten cents as a contribution against the cost of production. No dimes came back, but there was a mighty uprising of subscription money as witness table below:

Paid into 1975 - 1 Paid through 1966 98
Paid into 1973 - 1 Expiring in 1966 82
Paid into 1971 - 3 Expired in 1965 33
Paid into 1970 - 12 No pays 107
Paid into 1969 - 22 Complimentary
Paid into 1968 - 45 TOTAL 643
Paid into 1967 - 223 Percent no pay 16.6%

What a formula! Mebbe we ought to ask for more dimes next Christmas.

Now don't get too excited when you see that surplus in the June 30, 1966 Balance Sheet. Of that surplus is \$1300 reserved, representing advance SGT payments. The trend is upward and in a few months will be around \$1500. Exactly that sum is in a bank account earning 5%. So we are "cushioned" in part against future production costs. It is a sort of trust fund. Pon't try to tap it.



IN THE FIRST PLACE, IT SEEMS TO ME
THAT THERE IS ALREADY, OR WE ARE APPROACHING, A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN "PIONEERS" AND
50-YEAR MEN, AND THAT, AS THE YEARS PASS,

THIS DIFFERENCE WILL BECOME GREATER.

IN MY HUMBLE OPINION, THE STATUS OF "PIONEER" SHOULD BE BASED ON EITHER HAVING OBTAINED A LICENSE WHEN THE GOVERNMENT REQUIRED IT IN THE YEAR 1912 (AMATEURS LISTED IN THE 1913 GOVERNMENT CALL BOOK, WHICH WAS THE CRITERION USED BY THE VARIOUS ORGANIZATIONS THAT HONORED PIONEERS AT THE TIME OF THE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY OF LICENSING IN 1962) OR SOME ALTERNATE CRITERION THAT WOULD REQUIRE PROOF OF HAVING OWNED AND OPERATED AN AMATEUR WIRELESS SENDING AND RECEIVING SET PRIOR TO 1913 (1910, IF YOU WISH). THE LATTER CRITERION IS SUBJECT TO SOME UNCERTAINTIES AND DIFFICULTIES OF PROOF.

"50 YEAR AMATEURS" WILL BE INCREASING
YEAR BY YEAR (EQUIVALENT IN 1966 TO STARTING
IN 1916). THEY MIGHT BE CLASSIFIED AS
"PIONEERS" BUT ! THINK THAT IS STRETCHING
A BIT AND CERTAINLY EACH YEAR WILL BE
STRETCHING A BIT MORE.

WHY NOT HAVE A DISTINGUISHING EMBLEM FOR "PIONEERS" AND, IF NECESSARY, A DIFFERENT PIN FOR "50 YEAR AMATEURS"? I BELIEVE THE PIONEERS WOULD BE WILLING TO PAY THE DIFFERENCE.

AS FOR CALLING THE ORGANIZATION "PIONEERS OF AMATEUR WIRELESS", IN VIEW OF THE 40 YEAR EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENT, OUR ORGANIZATION WOULD BE CLASSIFYING PIONEERS AS AMATEURS WHO STARTED IN 1925. 

STATIONS AT STOCKTON, CALIFORNIA, AND ON THE GREAT HIGHWAY AT THE SAN FRANCISCO OCEAN BEACH, 70 MILES APART, WERE USED IN THE EARLY EXPERIMENTS. NONE OF THE VERY FEW "WIRELESS" BOYS IN SAN FRANCISCO AND THE BAY AREA A SMALL "FRATERNITY" - WERE WELCOME AND THIS ATTITUDE DID NOT SET WELL WITH THEM. (CONTINUED NEXT PAGE.)

FORD KING CONT'D

THE GROUP DEVELOPED INTO THE FEDERAL TELEGRAPH COMPANY AND LATER MACKAY RADIO AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY - ITT WORLD COMMUNICATIONS, INC. FEDERAL BUILT STATIONS AT PORTLAND AND CENTRAL POINT, OREGON, SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO AND LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA, AND PHOENIX, ARIZONA. LATER AT HEEIA, OAHU, HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

THE TICKER RECEIVER SECRET LEAKED OUT THROUGH ONE OF THE PERSONNEL AT THE EARLY SAN FRANCISCO STATION. THE TICKER WAS A SMALL INDUCTION MOTOR WITH A 3/16" THICK BRASS DISC MOUNTED ON THE SHAFT WITH A V SHAPED GROVE CUT INTO THE EDGE. THE ENDS OF TWO SPRING WIRES (AS TWO LEADS) RODE IN THIS GROOVE AS IN INTERRUPTER.

Now deceased are Ralph Wiley - "RW" THEN CHIEF OF THE SAN FRANCISCO DEPARTMENT
OF ELECTRICITY AND CHARLIE KELLOGG - "CM"
- AN OPERATOR AT THE AMERICAN DISTRICT
TELEGRAPH (ADT ALARM SYSTEM). THEY HAD
ASSEMBLED A TICKER AND I MET WITH THEM IN
THE EVENING AT KELLOGG'S HOME. AT MIDNIGHT WE GAVE UP - NO RESULTS - AND I TOOK
THE TICKER HOME TO KEEP ON TRYING. IN
ADDITION TO THE TICKER AS THE RECEIVER
PLENTY OF INDUCTANCE (FINE INSULATED WIRE
#22 ON AN 8 INCH CARDBOARD CYLINDER) WAS
REQUIRED AND A LEAD WITH TWO PIN OR PROBE
TERMINALS TO "SEARCH" FOR THE PROPER VERY
LONG WAVE "TUNE".

I SOON WORKED OUT THE PROBLEM AND THEN PLACED THE TICKER IN THE CLOTHES CLOSET ALONGSIDE BY WIRELESS TABLE, LED OUT THE LEADS, AND LOCKED THE DOOR. MEMBERS OF OUR FRATERNITY WERE WELCOME TO COME TO MY HOUSE AND "LISTEN" BUT THE SECRET OF THE TICKER WAS STILL NOT RELEASED.

INAUGURATION DAY FOR TRAFFIC BETWEEN SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO AND HONOLULU (HEEIA) SEPTEMBER 1912 WAS COMING UP BUT HOW COULD ACTUAL OPERATION OR SIGNALS BE MONITORED BY THOSE ON THE OUTSIDE. WORD GOT AROUND THAT KING WAS RECEIVING FEDERAL'S SIGNALS AND THE LOCAL MANAGER OF THE GREAT MARCONI COMPANY - LATER RCA - (JUST IMAGINE) ASKED ME IF HE COULD SEND TWO OPERATORS OUT TO MY HOUSE TO MONITOR THE INAUGURATION FOR TWO DAYS. INSTEAD OF READING THE STORY IN THE NEWSPAPERS THEY WERE "IN" ON THE WHOLE SHOW.

ALSO RECEIVED A CALL FROM THE LOCAL

MANAGER OF THE GREAT WESTERN UNION (AGAIN JUST IMAGINE) ASKING WHAT THE VOLUME WAS ON FEDERAL'S TRAFFIC.

A SIDE LIGHT ON THESE EARLY FEDERAL DAYS WAS A HORSE RACE - BOOKMAKER ANGLE WHICH DEVELOPED. A PERSON IN AN ELEVATED POSITION WITH FIELD GLASSES OUTSIDE THE TRACK AT CENTRAL POINT DETERMINED THE WINNER OF A RACE, QUICKLY FILED THE MESSAGE TO SAN FRANCISCO AT FEDERAL'S OFFICE WHERE IT NATURALLY RECEIVED FAST SERVICE AND PROMPTLY REACHED THE CONFEDERATE WAITING FOR IT IN FEDERAL'S SAN FRANCISCO OFFICE. HE IN TURN GOT A BET DOWN AT THE BOOKMAKERS BEFORE WESTERN UNION'S NORMAL OR SLOWER TRANSMISSION REACHED THE BOOKIES. IT WAS TOO GOOD TO LAST. THE VICTIMS SOON GOT WISE.

"NAR" - THE U. S. NAVY'S STATION AT KEY WEST, FLORIDA, ABOUT 3000 MILES FROM SAN FRANCISCO, COULD NOT BE HEARD AT SAN FRANCISCO EVEN AT NIGHT UNDER NORMAL CONDITIONS. SHIP OPERATORS BOUND UP THE PACIFIC COAST FROM THE PANAMA CANAL COULD READ HIM BUT THE SIGNALS WERE LOST OFF OF LOWER CALIFORNIA. TWIN PEAKS - ELEVATION 910 FEET - IN SAN FRANCISCO IS KNOWN FOR ITS WEST WIND AND FOG. IN AN ATTEMPT TO GET NAR I BUILT TWO 7 FOOT "KING" KITES (COMBINATION BOX AND FLAT) WHICH WERE VERY RELIABLE FLYERS.

WE USED THESE IN TANDEM TO PUT UP 1500 FEET OF HEAVY CORD TO WHICH WAS SECURED APPROXIMATELY THE SAME LENGTH OF #18 COPPER WIRE SECURED TO THE LINE WITH TIES ABOUT EVERY 25 FEET. THESE WERE LAUNCHED LATE AT NIGHT TO GET MAXIMUM SIGNAL STRENGTH CONDITIONS - THE KITES GOING UP AND OUT OF SIGHT IN THE THICK FOG - BUT NEVER FAILING TO MAINTAIN A STEADY ATTITUDE AND ELEVATION. WE HEARD READABLE SIGNALS FROM "NAR".

IN THESE EARLY YEARS OF WIRELESS I LIVED IN THE THIRD STORY "FLAT" AT 163
BELVEDERE STREET, BETWEEN FREDERICK AND WALLER, AN EXCEPTIONALLY LONG BLOCK. MOST OF THE BUILDINGS WERE THREE STORY FLATS - WALL TO WALL - ON 25 FOOT WIDE LOTS. I DECIDED TO PUT UP A REALLY LONG AERIAL BUT HOW COULD THIS BE DONE WITHIN YOUR OWN PROPERTY AREA. IT COULDN'T. OUR MOTTO IN THOSE DAYS WERE HEIGHTH AND LENGTH.

IN THE MIDDLE FLAT BELOW OUR FAMILY LIVED ARTHUR STREET WHO WAS A VERY EARLY STARTER IN "WIRELESS" AND WHO STARTED ME. WE MADE FRIENDS WITH THE FAMILY IN THE MIDDLE BUILDING OF A SOLID LINE OF 17 HOUSES. ONE OF US WENT TO THE ROOF OF THIS MIDDLE BUILDING AND THE OTHER SHOT A CORD OR LINE WITH A BOW AND ARROW FROM THE ROOF OF OUR FLAT AT 163 TO THE MIDDLE HOUSE. THEN ONE OF US WENT TO THE LAST HOUSE AT WALLER STREET (ALSO FRIENDS) AND THE PROCEDURE WAS REPEATED FROM THE MIDDLE HOUSE. THEN WE USED THE CORD OR LINE TO PULL A WIRE - #12 - STRANDED - PHOSPHOR BRONZE - OR THE AERIAL OVER THE 17 HOUSES OR FLATS. IT WAS 375 FEET LONG. ONLY THE FAMILY IN THE MIDDLE HOUSE KNEW THE WIRE WAS OVER THEM AND IT RESULTED IN SOME VERY GOOD RECEPTION (PARTICULARLY FROM THE SOUTH) QUITE A LONG TIME. SUCH A LONG AERIAL WOULD HAVE BEEN EASY ON A FARM BUT IN A BIG CITY WE CONSIDERED IT QUITE A FEAT.

EACH DAY AT NOON IN THESE EARLY YEARS THE NAVY'S STATION AT POINT ARGUELLO, CALIFORNIA - "TK" - SENT A "TIME TICK" TO THE NAVY'S STATION ON THE FARALLON ISLANDS - "TH" - ABOUT 28 MILES OFF SAN FRANCISCO. THIS TRANSMISSION WAS 240 MILES OVER OPEN SEA AND WAS POSSIBLE IN DAYLIGHT BUT IT COULD NOT BE HEARD IN SAN FRANCISCO UNDER NORMAL CONDITIONS IN DAYLIGHT. THE LONG WIRE AERIAL OUT OF 163 AND THE DIRECTIONAL SOUTH FEATURE PERMITTED US TO PICK UP THESE SIGNALS.

LOOKING BACK ON THE DAYS OF LONG AGO AND RECEPTION IT IS AN INTERESTING REALIZATION THAT AT THAT TIME ALL WERE ON THE SAME BASIS OR "CUT DOWN TO SIZE". A DETECTOR, TUNING INDUCTANCE AND A PAIR OF PHONES - NO AMPLIFICATION. INCIDENTLY I WAS THE PACIFIC COAST AGENT FOR BRANDES HEAD PHONES IN THOSE EARLY DAYS.

ON THIS BASIS I COULD AT TIMES READ THE POSITION REPORT OF A VESSEL ON ITS LAST NIGHT OUT OF THE ORIENT AT ABOUT 4 A.M. - PACIFIC COAST TIME - WORKING "KPH" AT DALY CITY (SAN FRANCISCO) WITH ITS ADVANTAGE OF A 250 FOOT AERIAL. THE DISTANCE WAS PROBABLY OVER 5000 MILES.

NOTE: I HAVE USED TIME REFERENCES IN YEARS - NO MONTHS OR DAYS - AND SOME OF THESE MAY BE A LITTLE

OUT OF LINE. WHEN I CAME TO HONOLULU FROM SAN FRANCISCO IN 1922 I LEFT BEHIND MY RECORDS OF THE EARLY YEARS AT THE FAMILY HOME AND THEY WERE LATER DESTROYED.

VU2JA, ONE IN FOUR HUNDRED MILLION

THAT'S MY GOOD PAL, JOE FAITHFUL, VU2JA NOW RETIRED IN BANGALORE, INDIA, AND HE'S ANXIOUS TO USE HIS VAST KNOWLEDGE AND EXPERIENCE TO BECOME GOOD FRIENDS WITH ALL OF US OVER THE AIR. JOE IS AN OLD, OLD TIMER QUALIFIED FOR HIS FIFTY YEAR MEMBERSHIP. HE IS AN ACTIVE AMATEUR AND IS NOT AT ALL A "HAS BEEN".

JOE FINISHED HIGH SCHOOL IN CALCUTTA AT THE END OF 1912, LEARNED THE CODE AND JUMPED HOME IN 1914 ABOARD A HAMBURG-AMERICAN LINE SHIP BOUND FOR HAMBURG ONLY TO BE TAKEN PRISONER OF WAR BY THE GERMANS IN THE SAME YEAR AND WAS ASSIGNED TO WORK IN THE IRON ORE MINES NEAR KASSEL. HE ESCAPED IN 1919, REPORTED TO THE BRITISH WHO GAVE HIM A HUNDRED AND FIFTY POUND (MONEY) GRANT, AND SENT HIM THROUGH THEIR SCHOOL OF WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY WHERE HE OBTAINED A FIRST CLASS CERTIFICATE OF PROFICIENCY.

IN 1921, HE WAS STATIONED IN KARACHI AND WAS LATER TRANSFERRED TO THE PERSIAN GULF AREA GAINING EXPERIENCE WITH ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT. HE BECAME INTERESTED IN DEFOREST AUDIONS AND USED THEM TO COPY NEWS FROM GBR ON LONG WAVE LENGTHS. HE SAYS DX IN 1921 TO 1927 FROM THE GULF AREA WAS CONFINED TO BRITISH SHIPS WHO WERE AS KEEN AS HE WAS TO REPORT HIS SIGNALS FROM A FORD COIL DRIVEN BY BATTERIES AT DISTANCES OVER ONE HUNDRED MILES.


FOR MANY YEARS DURING HIS LIFE AS A COMMERCIAL OPERATOR, JOE WAS STATIONED AT BAHRAIN ISLAND AS CHIEF OPERATOR CONTINU-ING HIS AMATEUR EXPERIMENTS. VU2JA IS WELL KNOWN THOUGHOUT THE WORLD FOR HIS FINE DX WORK WITH VERY LOW POWER. HE USES A VERY EFFICIENT QUAD ANTENNA HE BUILT HIMSELF, AND MOST OF THE YEAR HE CAN BE HEARD IN THIS COUNTRY BOTH EARLY MORNING AND EARLY EVENING PREFERRING



MARCONI - THE FATHER OF WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

MARCHESE GUGLIELMO MARCONI was born at Bologna, Italy on April 25,1874, the youngest son of an Italian father and an Irish mother. As a boy he showed a very keen interest in electrical science. In 1895 he became convinced that telegraphy through space could be accomplished by means of electromagnetic waves since it had been seen mathematically by scientists such as Maxwell, Hertz, Lodge and others as early as 1864.



Marconi was the first to devise the practical means by which electromagnetic waves could be made to provide wireless telegraphy communication. In 1895 Marconi conducted a number of experiments near Bologna and in this year wireless messages were transmitted over distances in excess of a mile.

In 1896 Marconi went to England to demonstrate his invention. These demonstrations were first carried out on the roof of the General Post Office, St. Martin's - le Grand, London. Later experiments for the Post Office were carried out on Salisbury plain and across the Bristol channel from Penarth to Breandown, near Weston-super-Mare, ranges first of two, then of four, and afterwards of nine miles were obtained. In June 1897, at the invitation of the Italian Government, Marconi went to Spezia, where a land station was erected and communication with Italian warships

was established up to a distance of 12 miles. He was then invited to demonstrate his apparatus in Rome, where successful tests were carried out in the presence of the late King Humbert and Queen Margherita. Other tests also took place at the Italian Chamber of Deputies.

The time was now almost ripe for wireless telegraphy to be applied to commercial and utilitarian purposes and in July 1897 a company was formed in London to acquire patents and organize a communication system which was to include both ships and land stations. This company was called the Wireless Telegraph and Signal Co., Ltd., which in 1900 changed its name to that of Marconi's Wireless Telegraph Co., Ltd. For some time the Company's efforts were confined to furthering Marconi's pioneer work. A number of interesting tests and demonstrations were undertaken round the the coasts of the British Isles and abroad. Permanent stations were erected at Alum Bay in the Isle of Wight and at Bournemouth, this station being subsequently removed to Poole.

In 1898 wireless telegraphy had become employed as a means of communication between British Light ships and the shore, a distance sometimes of 12 miles. In this year Marconi also established communication across the English Channel, a distance of approximately 20 miles.

By the year 1900 Marconi had covered distances up to 200 miles with his great invention.

The accompanying picture shows Marconi on December 12, 1901 as he made his most exciting and successful attempt at transmitting and receiving wireless signals across the Atlantic Ocean from St. John's, Newfoundland to Poldhu in Cornwall, England.

Marconi enjoyed greater and greater success with each passing year, more patents, greater spans of miles, many contributions to World War I, serving in both the Italian Army and the Italian Navy. He was awarded many medals and prizes among which were the Nobel Prize for Physics(1909) the Albert Medal of the Royal Society Arts, together with the Franklin and John Fritz medals in the United States.

Marconi lived to be about 63 years of age. He died in Rome, July 20. 1937.

ALL QUITE, NOT A PEEP OR SCRATCH, AND VN BREATHED EASIER. BUT WE SPEAK TOO SOON, FOR SUDDENLY THE AIR WAS AGAIN RENT ASUNDER, WORSE THAN EVER, WITH THE DARNDEST SCRATCHING AND SPUTTERING AND UP-AND-DOWN SHIMMY TONES EVER HEARD. "SURE ENOUGH, THAT'S A FORD SPARK COIL OR I'M A BOOB," SAID VN.

MAD CLEAR THRU, HE THREW THE JUICE ON HIS OLD STONE-CRUSHER AND WITH THE BUG KEY GAVE A SNAPPY QUICK "QRA?" AND LISTENED.

NOT A SCRATCH TO BE HEARD. THE USUAL 2'S, 3'S, AND 8'S WERE POUNDING IN BUT NOT A SOUND FROM THE QRM-ER. "JUST AS I THOUGHT, SAID VERMILYA; THAT BIRD IS SITTING THERE WAITING FOR ME TO GET BUSY WITH SOMEONE OUT IN OHIO BEFORE HE MURDERS ME WITH HIS COIL." BUT AFTER A LONG PERIOD OF SILENCE FOR BOTH THE BIG DX STATION AND THE NEWBORN "FRIEND", VN LOOKED IN THE DIRECTION OF HIS MESSAGE HOOK AND REALIZED THERE WAS LOTS OF WORK TO BE DONE. SO HE STARTED IN TO CLEAR THE HOOK AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE.

NO MORE WAS HEARD FROM THE NEW-COMER SO THE NIGHT PROGRESSED WELL FOR DX WORK. THE NEXT DAY, TRY AS HE MIGHT, VAN COULD NOT FORGET THAT NEW NOISE. MARION IS SO FAR FROM CIVILIZATION THAT ONE COIL IS A BIG MATTER, ESPECIALLY WHERE HUNDREDS OF MESSAGES ARE HANDLED EACH MONTH AND A GOOD CLEAR PATH IS ESSENTIAL. WELL DID 1HAA REALIZE THAT HE ALREADY HAD HIS HANDS FULL WITH THE CONTINUAL QRM HE GETS FROM THE HIGH POWER STATION NOT A MILE AWAY FROM HIS SHACK RADIATING FOUR HUNDRED AND FIFTY AMPERES. Here he was going to "make" someone get a license and the first thing he knew a little girl had come along and he had passed out like a little boy sent to bed without his supper. "Darn her anyway. Gee she's fresh, telling me she is going to see me tomorrow night. I'll be darned if she will. I'm going out to a dance tomorrow night and I'll lock this old coop up tighter than a drum."

NOT DARING TO MENTION HIS EXPERIENCE ON THE AIR TO A SOUL, NEXT NIGHT VN WENT OFF TO A DANCE IN A NEIGHBORING TOWN. MANY OF HIS FRIENDS WERE THERE; ALL SEEMED QUIET AND EVERYTHING WAS GOING ALONG IN FINE SHAPE; THE MUSIC WAS GOOD AND SO WERE THE DANCERS. NOW IN THESE SMALL COUNTRY PLACES STRANGERS ARE EASILY SPOTTED, AND IT WASN'T LONG BEFORE VAN NOTICED TWO VERY TALL PEOPLE ENTER THE HALL -- A FELLOW AND A GIRL, LOOKING MUCH LIKE BROTHER AND SISTER. BUT AS THEY STOPPED TO SPEAK TO BRAD CLEVE-LAND, AN OLD FRIEND OF VAN'S, HE DECIDED THEY BELONGED THERE AND THAT HE HAD JUST NEVER NOTICED THEM BEFORE. A LITTLE WHILE LATER VN WAS SITTING ALONGSIDE OF BRAD AND IN THE COURSE OF CONVERSATION HE ASKED BRAD WHO THAT TALL COUPLE WAS THAT HAD COME IN A SHORT WHILE BEFORE. YOU COULD HAVE KNOCK-ED HIM OVER WITH A FEATHER WHEN HE WAS TOLD THEIR NAME WAS RANDALL AND THAT THE GIRL WAS IN THE WIRELESS BUSINESS SOMEWHERE UP BOSTON WAY. "HOLY SMOKE," THOT VN, "I'LL BET MY LAST NICKEL THAT THAT'S THE ONE I HAD ON THE AIR!" HERE SHE CAME, MAKING FOOT-PRINTS OVER THEIR WAY AND UP JUMPED BRAD SAYING "VERMILYA, I WANT YOU TO MEET MISS EUNICE RANDALL. SHE IS DEEPLY INTER-ESTED IN WIRELESS AND WORKS UP IN THE AMERICAN RADIO & RESEARCH LABORATORIES AT MEDFORD HILLSIDE." VN TRIED HIS BEST TO SAY SOMETHING BUT THE BEST HE COULD DO WAS A SOUND THAT RESEMBLED "MO". "No," SAID MISS RANDALL, "YOU WON'T NEED YOUR DIREC-TION FINDER NOW; YOU CAN PUT IT AWAY. I HAVE FOUND YOU AND MET YOU AS I PROMISED I WOULD DO LAST NIGHT. I'VE HEARD ABOUT ENOUGH ABOUT 1HAA WITHOUT KNOWING HIM, ESPECIALLY WHEN YOU CONSIDER THAT MY HOME

IS IN MATTAPOISETT, ONLY ABOUT FIVE MILES FROM YOUR STATION. WHILE I DON'T LIVE THERE DURING THE WEEK, I MANAGE TO GET DOWN WEEK-ENDS ONCE IN A WHILE. I AM WORKING UP IN THE AMRAD PLACE AS DRAFTLADY AND NOW, TO BE TRUTHFUL WITH YOU, I WANT TO LEARN THE CODE AND THEORY OF RADIO SO I CAN BE 'ONE OF THE BOYS'".

"LOOK HERE, MISS RANDALL, IF YOU ARE IN EARNEST AND REALLY WANT TO LEARN THE CODE AND ALL ABOUT RADIO FROM ONE END TO THE OTHER I WILL HELP YOU ALL I CAN. BUT IF YOU JUST WANT AN ADVENTURE YOU'RE GOING TO BE PLAIN OUTTA LUCK. NOW WHICH IS IT?"

"I TELL YOU I AM REALLY INTERESTED AND IF YOU HAD SEEN ME SHINNING UP A TREE PUTTING MY AERIAL IN PLACE YOU WOULD BELIEVE ME A LADY OF MY WORD".

"VERY WELL," SAID VN," I'LL GIVE YOU A NOTE TO A GOOD FRIEND OF MINE WHO RUNS A RADIO SCHOOL IN BOSTON, WHERE YOU CAN LEARN IN A GOOD THORO MANNER ALL THE INS AND OUTS OF RADIO, AS WELL AS CODE. YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE A MIGHTY HARD STRUGGLE, I CAN WARN YOU, AND BEING A GIRL YOUR TRIALS WILL BE MANY AND HARD, BUT I WANT YOU TO KNOW I ADMIRE YOUR GRIT AND NERVE AND I CAN SEE RIGHT NOW THAT YOU ARE GOING TO SUCCEED. WHEN YOU COME OUT, BRING A FIRST GRAD COM-MERCIAL LICENSE WITH YOU AND THEN IF YOU'RE NOT TOO BUSY LET ME KNOW HOW YOU LIKED IT ALL AND WHETHER YOU THINK THAT AFTER GET-TING THAT FAR AND BEING THOROLY BITTEN BY THE LITTLE RADIO BUG YOU WILL EVER WASTE ANY MORE TIME THINKING OF THE THINGS THAT MOST OTHER GIRLS THINK ABOUT. YOU'RE ONE IN A HUNDRED FOR THE PICK YOU ARE TAKING AND I WANT TO WISH YOU SUCCESS. BUT MEANWHILE PLEASE DON'T OPEN UP ON THAT SQUEAK BOX AGAIN UNTIL YOU CAN HANDLE AT LEAST FIFTEEN WORDS PER MINUTE. BY THAT TIME YOU WILL BE AN HONEST DYED-IN-THE-WOOL O.W., AND BEL-IEVE ME IF YOU MAKE GOOD I'LL SEE THAT YOU HAVE A STATION THAT WILL PUT MATTAPOISETT ON THE MAP. "

"GOSH," THOT VN," SHE ISN'T SO BAD AFTER ALL. IN FACT I'LL HAVE TO TAKE MY HAT OFF TO HER. SHE HAS THE PROPER SPIRIT FOR A REAL HONEST TO GOODNESS SHEMALE RADIO BUG. OTHER DISTRICTS HAVE HAD THE HONOR OF BOASTING AN O.W. LONG ENOUGH, BY HECK; WE'RE GOING TO HAVE ONE OF OUR OWN UP HERE NOW."

63 YEARS YOUNG - 46 YEARS IN COMMUNICATIONS

CYP FERLAND RETIRES

CYPRIEN FERLAND KNOWN AS "CYP", #14 OF A FAMILY OF 18 (16 PLUS 2 ADOPTED ONES) WAS BORN AT ST. JEAN CHRYSESTOME LEVIS ON SEPTEMBER 16TH 1899. AFTER LEAVING PRI-MARY SCHOOL IN HIS HOME TOWN, ATTENDED LEVIS COLLEGE UNTIL THE SPRING OF 1916, THEN LEARNED TELEGRAPHY AND BEGAN WORKING FOR THE GREAT NORTH WESTERN (G.N.W.) AS EMERGENCY RELIEF COMMERCIAL LAND-LINE TELEGRAPHIST AT GROSSE ISLE IN OCTOBER 1916. DURING THE WINTER, LEARNED THE WIRELESS UNDER THE WATCHFUL EYE OF THE OFFICER-IN-CHARGE, Mr. L.J.A. CHEVRON. HAVING SUCH A CAPABLE INSTRUCTOR, PROGRESS WAS RAPID AND ALTHOUGH UNDERAGED, BUT DUE TO A SHORTAGE OF WIRELESS OPERATORS CAUSED BY THE WAR, WAS ENGAGED BY MARCONI WIRELESS TELEGRAPH COMPANY OF CANADA AND ASSIGNED TO GROSSE ISLE STATION.

THE EQUIPMENT IN THOSE DAYS CONSISTED IN A ONE-CYUNDER VERTICAL ENGINE WITH A COOLING TANK ON TOP, TO CHARGE TWO BANKS OF OPEN JAR ELECTROLITE BATTERIES, A TWELVE-INCH RUHMKOFF INDUCTION COIL FOR TRANSMISSION AND A MAGNETIC DETECTOR AS THE RECEIVER, WITH A RANGE OF APPROXI-MATELY SIXTY MILES.

ON HIS VERY FIRST NIGHT DUTY ON THAT STATION HE TELLS US, HE CONTACTED THE SS CASSANDRA (MED) 90 MILES DISTANT. HE WAS CALLED ALL SORTS OF NAMES THE FOLLOWING MORNING FOR HAVING DONE WHAT WAS THEN CONSIDERED IMPOSSIBLE, FORTUNATELY FOR HIM, THE FEAT WAS DUPLICATED AND EVEN SURPASSED IN THE FOLLOWING FEW DAYS, SO HIS "FIRST"-WAS QUICKLY FORGOTTEN.

A FEW WEEKS LATER, HE WAS TRANSFERRED TO FATHER-POINT (VCF) AT WHICH STATION HE RECEIVED HIS FIRST SOS FROM THE SS SINGAPORE, BADLY ASHORE AT METIS-POINT. THAT INCIDENT HAPPENED ON A SUNDAY WHEN THE OFFICER IN CHARGE WAS ATTENDING CHURCH SERVICES SO THE ENTIRE RESPONSIBILITY WAS CAST UPON CYP WHO HANDLED THE SITUATION LIKE A VETERAN AND WITHIN TWO HOURS, FIVE SHIPS WERE STANDING BY.

IN THE FALL OF 1919, CYP GOT HIS FIRST APPOINTMENT AS A SHIP'S OPERATOR, HE WAS ASSIGNED TO THE SS CANADIAN RECRUIT ON HER ILL-FATED VOYAGE IN DECEMBER WHEN SHE WAS CAUGHT IN THE TREACHEROUS ST. LAWRENCE ICE PACKS AND WRECKED AT VACHE-POINT. THE DISTRESS CALLS WERE SENT AND CYP REMAINED AT HIS POST, COMMUNICATING WITH VCF VCC AND THE SS CANADIAN SPINNER. AFTER THE ENGINE (CONTINUED NEXT PAGE.)

CYP FERLAND RETIRES CONT'D

ROOM WAS FLOODED AND DYNAMO STOPPED, HE REMAINED AT HIS POST, UNABLE TO TRANSMIT BUT STILL LISTENING FOR IMPORTANT DESPATCHES FROM THE COAST STATIONS. FINALLY THE SKIPPER SENT FOR HIM, AND THEN EMBARKED INTO THE LAST LIFE BOAT FROM THE SINKING SHIP. ALL PERSONAL EFFECTS WERE ABANDONED BUT THE ENTIRE CREW WAS SAVED, LANDED AT VACHE-POINT AND RESCUED BY TADOUSAC PEOPLE. THREE DAYS LATER, PICKED UP BY THE ICEBREAKER LADY GREY AND TAKEN TO QUEBEC.

AFTER SIGNING OFF, CYP WAS SENT BACK TO GROSSE-ISLE UNTIL AUGUST 1920 THEN APPOINT-ED IN CHARGE OF HEATH-POINT ANTICOSTI (VCI), THE MOST IMPORTANT AND THE BUSIEST GOLF STATION, COMMUNICATING WITH FAME-POINT, POINT-RICH, HARRINGTON, CAPE-RAY, CAPE-BEAR, GRINDSTONE, NORTH-SYDNEY AND ALL SHIPS AND ALL SHIPS WITHING RANGE, DOING RELAY WORK TO AND FROM THE ABOVE MENTIONED STATIONS AND SHIPS. ON THAT STATION, HIS MAIN WORRY WAS TO KEEP HARMONY AMONG THE STAFF MEM-BERS, OPERATOR W. R. STURTON (GYP THE BLOOD), OPERATOR S. R. REID AND COOK W. BRYSON. THEY ALL HAD BEEN STRANDED ON THE ISLAND THE PREVIOUS WINTER HALF STARVED AND READY FOR MUTINY. MANY HAVE HEARD OF "GYP-THE BLOOD", HIS BULLDOG, HIS SNAKES, FROGS, TOADS, HIS RIFLES, REVOLVERS AND KNIVES. IT REQUIRED A LOT OF TACT TO KEEP THOSE FELLOWS UNDER CONTROL BUT CYP DID IT.

AFTER HEATH-POINT (VCI) FOLLOWED A SERIES OF SHIP ASSIGNMENTS, SS SABLE-ISLAND SS MAPLEDAWN, SS LORD STRATHCONA, SS CANADIAN RANGER, SS ROSE-CASTLE, THE FLAGSHIP OF THE DOMINION COAL COMPANY AND THE SS CANADIAN SQUATTER.

HE HAD ANOTHER TRAGIC EXPERIENCE ON THE CANADIAN SQUATTER, THE SHIP SPRUNG A LEAK FIVE-HUNDRED MILES EAST OF CAPE-RACE, PUMPS COULD HARDLY KEEP UP. THE CARGO OF APPLES, FLOUR AND A DECK CARGO OF LUMBER HAD TO BE JETTISONED TO LIGHTEN THE SHIP AND RAISE THE DAMAGED PART ABOVE THE WATER LINE.

THE NEIGHBORING SHIPS WERE KEPT ON THE ALERT FOR ASSISTANCE, FORTUNATELY THE SHIP WAS ABLE TO MAKE PORT AND AFTER A MONTH AT MOUNT STUART DRYDOCK IN CARDIFF FOR NECESSARY REPAIRS, THE SHIP WAS ABLE TO RESUME HER NORMAL RUN.

MARCONI VETERAN STAN W. BRAZILL CELEBRATES HIS GOLDEN WEDDING 1912-1962

THE FOLLOWING APPEARED IN THE DAILY NEWS - ST. JOHNS NELD.

Spaniard's Bay - Stanley W. Brazill and Lavina (Lilly) Myles were united in Holy Matrimony at Terrenceville, Fortune Bay, on October 12th 1912. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. A. T. Tulk.

TODAY, MR. AND MRS. STANLEY (STAN) W. BRAZILL ARE CELEBRATING THEIR GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY AT SPANIARD'S BAY WHERE THEY ARE LIVING IN THEIR HOME, APPROPRIATELY NAMED "BATTLEDOR", A DERIVATION OF BATTLE HARBOUR, LABRADOR.

STAN WAS JUST A YOUNG MAN WHEN HE MET AND MARRIED LILLY MYLES AT TERRENCEVILLE, WHERE HE HAD GONE TO WORK IN THE POST AND TELEGRAPH OFFICE IN 1912, HAVING HAD BY THEN SIX YEARS WITH THE POST AND TELEGRAPHS IN TWO OTHER PREVIOUS APPOINTMENTS AT EPWORTH (BURIN), SOUND ISLAND, P.B.

SHORTLY AFTER HIS MARRIAGE AND IN THE SAMEYEAR, MR. BRAZILL RESIGNED HIS POSITION WITH THE POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS AND JOINED THE CANADIAN MARCONI CO. AT ST. JOHNS AND WAS IMMEDIATELY SENT TO FOGO TO TAKE CHARGE OF THE COMPANY'S OPERATIONS THERE.

THE NEXT SUMMER MR. BRAZILL WAS POSTED FARTHER NORTH, AND WHEN THE SS KYLE MADE HER MAIDEN VOYAGE WITH CAPTAIN JOHN PARSONS AT THE WHEEL ON JUNE 2ND, 1913, HE WENT TO HOLTON, LABRADOR, WHERE HE SPENT THE SUMMER. THAT FALL MR. BRAZILL WAS TRANSFERRED TO BATTLE HARBOUR, WHERE HE AND HIS FAMILY TOOK UP RESIDENCE AND WHERE HE WAS IN CHARGE OF THE CONTROLLING STATION FOR THE NINE OTHERS OPERATED BY THE CANADIAN MARCONI COMPANY. HIS APPOINTMENT THERE LASTED THIRTY-TWO YEARS, AND IN 1945, HE WAS TRANSFERRED TO ST. JOHNS WHERE HE WAS RADIO TECHNICIAN IN CHARGE OF LABRADOR STATIONS.

STAN GREW UP WITH RADIO. IN 1921 HE PURCHASED AND BEGAN TO OPERATE THE FIRST AMATEUR RADIO RECEIVER AND TRANSMITTER IN LABRADOR, AND IN 1928 HE COMMENCED OPERATING FOR THE CANADIAN MARCONI THE FIRST BROADCASTING STATION THERE. STUDIOS WERE NOT QUITE AS ELABORATE THEN AS THEY NOW ARE, NOR WERE THE STATIONS ON THE AIR TWENTY HOURS (CONTINUED NEXT PAGE.)

STAN W. BRAZILL CONT'D

A DAY. MR. BRAZILL'S BROADCAST PERIOD
LASTED THIRTY MINUTES AT A TIME WHEN HE
READ THE NEWS, LOCAL AND FOREIGN, AND GAVE
THE WEATHER AND ICE REPORTS. THIS WAS A
NECESSARY AND AN IMPORTANT SERVICE, OF
COURSE, BUT DRAB; SO TO BRIGHTEN UP THE
PERIOD AND TO FILL IN HIS AIRTIME, HE AND
MEMBERS OF HIS FAMILY PUT ON A BIT OF
LIVELY MUSIC BY PLAYING THEMSELVES THE
ACCORDIAN AND THE FIDDLE, TOGETHER WITH A
FEW JOKES.

IN HIS YEARS AT BATTLE HARBOUR, AND INDEED BEFORE THAT PERIOD AND SINCE THE BRAZILLS HAVE MET PEOPLE IN ALL WALKS OF LIFE
AND OF MANY NATIONALITIES, AND MANY ARE
THE INTERESTING TALES WHICH HE CAN TELL.
HAVING SERVED FORTY-FIVE YEARS WITH THE
CANADIAN MARCONI COMPANY (THE BEST PEOPLE
UNDER HEAVEN TO WORK FOR, HE SAYS) HE WAS
RETIRED ON JANUARY 1ST, 1957, WHEN THE
STATIONS OF THE COMPANY WERE TAKEN OVER BY
THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORT. SINCE HIS RETIREMENT HE HAS BEEN OPERATING A GENERAL
STORE IN SPANIARD'S BAY.

MR. AND MRS. BRAZILL HAVE FIVE SONS AND FOUR DAUGHTERS; EARL, THE ELDEST, IS RADIO OPERATOR WITH THE DOT AT SEVEN-ISLANDS; STAN JR. HOLDS A SIMILAR POST WITH THE DOT AT GANDER; HARRY, CLIFFORD, AND HOGARTH LIVE IN SPANIARD'S BAY; MAY (MRS. HAYWARD PIKE), THE ELDEST GIRL, LIVES IN ST. JOHNS; JUANITA (MRS. LEO WALSH) LIVES IN ST. JOHNS; GRETTA (MRS. FRANK DURANO) LIVES IN WASHINGTON D.C. AND MAUD (MRS. NORMAN O'ROURKE) IN FLORIDA. THEY HAVE TWENTY-FIVE GRAND-CHILDREN.

The Most Unusual Event of My Wireless Career

After the erection of a new and more modern wireless station at Grosse-Isle Que, (The Quarantine Station) in 1920 under the supervision of Government Inspectors, and while testing the Marconi & KW transmitter, SOS signals were sent, followed by the LettersMTN which was the "RMS Tunisian's" CALL SIGN.

ALTHROUGH THE AERIAL AND GROUND WERE DIS-CONNECTED FROM THE NEW TRANSMITTER, THE SIGNALS WERE PICKED UPBY OPERATOR O. HAMEL ON DUTY AT THE OLD STATION, 2000 YARDS

THE TUNESIAN HAD PASSED GROSSE-ISLE OUT-WARDS THE PREVIOUS NIGHT, THEREFORE WAS (CONTINUED NEXT PAGE.)

THE MOST UNUSUAL EVENT CONT'D

NORMALLY STILL IN CONTACT WITH THAT STATION.

WITHIN THREE MINUTES, THE WHOLE ISLAND

WAS IN A TURMOIL, THE SIRENS OF THE TWO

GOVERNMENT STEAMERS WERE BLOWING CONSTANT
LY, CALLING THE MEMBERS OF THE CREWS WHO

WERE ON SHORE, BOYS CLIMBED TELEPHONE POLES,

MEN AND WOMEN ON HOUSE-TOPS WITH BINOCULARS

SEARCHED THE RIVER.

Mr. H. Coade (The Government Inspector) and myself, noticing the excitement, decided to investigate the cause.

WE STOPPED THE GAS ENGINE AND PROCEED-ED TO THE OLD STATION. ON THE WAY, WE WERE TOLD THAT A BIG PASSENGER SHIP WAS SINKING AND THAT THE LOSS OF LIVES WAS HEAVY.

Upon our arrival at the station, we saw about a hundred people outside waiting for news and Mr. A. Chevron, the Officer in Charge who had taken over from Operator Hamel, was trying desperately to contact the "Tunesian". Only then, did we realize that we were the cause of all the excite-

MENT AND PROMPTLY ADVISED THE AUTHORITIES OF THE MISTAKE WHICH HAD OCCURRED.

THERE WERE HEAVY PENALTIES FOR SENDING FALSE DISTRESS SIGNALS AND THE INCIDENT MIGHT HAVE HAD SOME VERY BAD REPERCUSSIONS, BUT, FORTUNATELY FOR ME, THE
WHOLE MATTER WAS HUSHEDUP SOME MONTHS
LATER AFTER A COMPLETE INVESTIGATION HAD
BEEN MADE BY THE FEDERAL AUTHORITIES.


