### Grab Bag Boys Are New RB Act

The Grab Bag Boys, "Professor" Freddie Miller and "Baron" George Lloyd, are leaving WLW to appear in the new series of RB Clothes programs on WKRC at 6:45 every night except Saturday and Sunday, beginning Monday (October 12).

The popular laugh team will also sing and gag at 8:30 every morning except Sunday over WKRC in a program under the RB Clothing Company's sponsorship. This is not the first time that a well-known WLW sustaining feature has gone commercial for RB Clothes. Brooks and Rose did it over WKRC last year. They were then sent to Chicago in the spring to finish out an RB contract on Station WBBN there. While broadcasting the RB series they were drafted to Columbia chain programs, in which they are heard frequently now over WKRC.

Last week's RADIO DIAL carried the history and pictures of "Professor" Miller and "Baron" Lloyd. Their nightly appearances over WKRC will satisfy grumblings of male members of the local radio audience who complained because Miller and Lloyd have been only a daytime feature.

### Ohio Radio School Starts October 12

#### Governor White Is Expected to Speak in First Session

The Ohio School of the Air returns to the air at WLW Monday (October 12) at 2 p. m. for the first of its hour-long programs of education that will be broadcast every school day this term and next.

Although the Ohio Legislature this year cut the budget for its radio school by half, B. H. Darrow, director of broadcasting for the state, reports that friends have come to its rescue so that the broadcasting will be continued. The *Courier*, printed loose-leaf manual that last year was sent to teachers as an aid to radio teaching, cannot be printed this year. Mr. Darrow estimates that 400,000 children heard the Ohio School regularly last season.

On the opening day of the school, Governor George White, Frank E. Reynolds (Secretary of the Ohio Education Association), B. D. Skinner (new Director of Education for Ohio) and Powell Crosley, Jr., are expected to speak briefly. Arthur Chandler, Jr., will play an organ recital, and Ford Rush, WLW's Old Man Sunshine, will sing. The program for the remainder of the week follows:

Tuesday (October 13)—At 2 p. m., "Origin of Words," Joseph Ries; 2:30 p. m., Travogue, "Mexico." Wednesday (October 14)—At 2 p. m., "Why Study Physics?"—Dr. D. A. Wells; 2:30, History Dramatogue, "Christobol Colon"; 2:40, Art, "Boyhood of Raleigh," William H. Vogel. Thursday (October 15)—At 2 p. m., "Nature and Man in Ohio," Dr. W. H. McConnell; 2:30, "Japan," Dr. McConnell; 2:40, Children's Stories, Bessie Gabbard.

Tentative plans for Friday programs include talks on Ohio and on Health for upper grades, and stories, plays and rhythyms for lower grades.

### Damrosch Morning Concerts Begin Friday on WSAI

With Walter Damrosch conducting the symphony orchestra, the NBC Musical Appreciation Hours for school children will be resumed Friday (October 9) at 11 a. m. on 61 stations including WSAI.

The first program, for elementary groups, includes "Military March in D," "Dance of the Sylphs," "Spinning Song," "Pastorale" from the suite "For My Little Friends," and polka "Thunder and Lightning."

### Mildred Lawlor Is Blues Singer



Mildred Lawlor, new "blues" singer at WLW, is one of the acts William Stoess, musical director, brought back from a recent talent-scouting trip to New York. Stoess thinks she is "a born blues singer" which made him willing to hire her for WLW even though her only "professional" experience, aside from several appearances over WCAU in Philadelphia, her home town, consists of singing in amateur high school theatricals. She is 19 years old, has blue eyes, and a tremendous amount of bright taffy-colored hair. She will sing with an orchestra at 5:14 p. m., Friday (October 9) and Monday (October 12), and at 5:30 p. m., Tuesday (October 13.)

### Stokowski Will Conduct Six Programs; Philharmonic Will Have 29 Radio Concerts

America's oldest symphonic organization, the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Society, under the batons of Erich Kleiber, Arturo Toscanini, and Bruno Walter will be heard with soloists of world-wide fame in 29 concerts to be broadcast each Sunday afternoon from 3 to 5 over the Columbia network beginning this week (October 11) and including WKRC.

Kleiber will conduct until November 15 when Toscanini will take over the baton. In January, Walter will begin seven weeks as conductor.

During the intermission Olin Downes, distinguished music critic, will describe and analyze the music for the radio audience.

Leopold Stokowski will conduct the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra on Monday (October 12) beginning at 8:15 p. m. in the first of six concerts to be broadcast during the year under Philco sponsorship on the Columbia network including WKRC. The concert will continue until 10 p. m.

The concert series will review seventeenth century music from the founding of modern opera in Italy to the religious and symphonic school of Bach and Handel.

### Sea Romances Spin Galapagos Tale Once Again

Martin ("Red") Christiansen, who, with eight others, was marooned 25 years ago for nearly six months on the uninhabited Galapagos Islands in the Pacific when the trading ship on which they were sailing became becalmed, will take part in a dramatization of the experiences he and his companions underwent, when "Galapagos" is presented over the Columbia network and WKRC at 9:30 p. m. Sunday (October 11), as one of the series of "Romances of the Sea."

Christiansen, about whose adventures Dr. William Beebe, the noted naturalist and explorer, devoted an entire chapter of his book, "Galapagos—World's End," now is working as a janitor of an apartment in Washington Heights, New York City. When the sponsors of "Romances of the Sea" decided to present "Galapagos," someone suggested that "Red" be found to re-enact his adventures of 25 years ago. He already has played in similar re-enactments in several of the old Eveready programs.

## Another Swing May Be Starting

Announcement that two series of full-length symphony programs will take the air during the coming week is more than an item of interest to devotees of serious music. It is slight yet hopeful evidence that the tyranny of time over programs may be cracking.

Ever since broadcasting became commercialized, critics have been railing against this domination. They have pointed out that, from an artistic standpoint, cramming a symphony program into the arbitrary limit of 30 or even 60 minutes is as disastrous as telescoping a Shakespeare play into a single act.

And now come two series of full-length symphonic programs as their reward. One will comprise weekly concerts by the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, beginning Sunday afternoon (Columbia over WKRC), while the other will consist of six concerts by the Philadelphia Orchestra, beginning Monday evening, under the Philco colors (also Columbia over WKRC).

There is pretty general agreement that symphonic music is at its best only when it is free from cramping time limitations. That was proved last winter by Columbia's first broadcasts of the Philharmonic. But we believe also that hard-and-fast time limits on certain other types of programs are about due for shaking off.

There are multiplying indications that the craze for brevity has gone as far as it can safely. Granted, it has been highly beneficial in some ways. However, in others it is already working a definite hardship.

The fact is that the program itself, not the sponsor's appropriation for air time, determines the proper length. In other words, some programs are natural 15-minute affairs, while others simply must have 30, 60 or even 90 minutes to do themselves justice. And here is the important point: the difference is pretty likely to be between casual diversion and firm, sustained interest.

If broadcasting is to be something more than audible vaudeville (with the audience consequences that implies) it will have to offer more of these sustained interest features. So perhaps the pendulum already is beginning to swing in that direction. If so, it is not too soon.

And Walter Winchell now gossips over local backlances under the Gerardine banner (WKRC, Tuesday at 8:45 p.m.). If there's any scandal from Broadway to Hollywood, he's the first to know—and tell.

Answering inquiries about this good feature, Huggie Huggie Harmonies can be found at WLW (870 microcycles), Tuesday at 8:30 p.m. And that quartet's worth a twist of anybody's dial.

For high-grade entertainment, sample Sunday Bright Spots (WSAI, 3:15 p.m.). Jack Pettis and his orchestra do sweet stuff sweetly. That Mariner's Trio knows what it's all about, too.

Lucille Wall, Collier's "Love Story Girl," also the star in the Adventures Of Barbara Wayne (WLW, Sunday, at 8:45 p.m.). Excitement and romance. Is she good? Well, rather.

The Atwater-Kent Hour back on the air for its seventh season (WSAI, Sunday at 11:30 p.m.). A little different in makeup. But still one of the real highspots. Rudolph Friml on the premiere. He can play as well as write.

"Hi" Philips now mastering the ceremonies in the Robert Burns Panatela Show (WKRC, Monday at 10 p.m.). Amusing boy; more than some because he's sly about his fun.

Those Vermont Lumber Jacks changed from a morning spot this season (WSAI, Monday and Thursday at 7 p.m.). A diverting act, with an unusual M. C.

Still another old friend back on the air, the National Battery program of College Memories (WCKY, Wednesday at 8 p.m.). Nice quartet; in fact, much nicer than most fraternity foursomes, if the truth must be out.

And here's just what the gals have been pining for, the Love Story program (WKRC, Thursday at 9:30 p.m.). Thirty minutes of thrills. If it doesn't get over in a big way, it must be because the new hats have changed everything.

Last week WSMK in Dayton, O., joined the Columbia network for the broadcast of the World Series games and the Northwestern-Nebraska football game and also broadcast several Columbia programs before and after the sporting events. Local prognosticators think this brief affiliation with CBS may lead to a permanent hookup with the network for the Dayton station.

Harlon Wilcox, announcer, like Brooks and Ross, was selected for personality plus.

## You Should Know—Jane Froman



This is the latest picture of Jane Froman, whose vibrant contralto voice took her away from her musical studies to make her a radio star, first on WLW, and now on the National Broadcasting Company's programs through a score of different stations.

Movies provide her with relaxation and she doesn't mind sitting well into the second show. Swimming, horseback riding and driving are other diversions that rank equally in favor.

Dogs and cats (of any origin) she likes, and stops and pets any that cross her path. But she doesn't like to walk under ladders and never fails to toss a good-sized handful of salt over the left shoulder if she should knock over a salt shaker.




