

# Radio Roundup

## CD 103.1's New Sound

The day of April 24 marked the beginning of a new age for KACD/KBCD. The former jazz/new adult contemporary formatted station switched to a hot adult contemporary sound, trading light jazz for hits of the '70s, '80s and '90s, including new releases.

Longtime L.A. radio pros Rob Edwards and Bob Darling of Apex Consulting tested six or seven formats in the 25 to 54 target audience to find one with the greatest potential appeal. The "core" artists include the Steve Miller Band, Elton John, the Doobie Brothers, Genesis, Tina Turner, Madonna, Sting and Boyz II Men, according to Edwards. KACD's signal is strongest on the Westside and in the L.A. basin, while KBCD covers Orange County. The combined signals are available to more than five million people. A revised lineup brings L.A. radio vet Kenny Noble back from San Francisco and into the starting position from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. China Smith takes charge of middays until 3 p.m. followed by Operations Manager/Music Director Manon. Alex Tostado hosts the evenings, and Jeff Shade, Bill Nesbitt and Nicci Ross handle the weekend shifts.





## Good Guys Kevin & Bean

KROQ's morning duo may profess a careless cynicism on the air, but in spite of their best efforts to maintain this image, they occasionally get caught doing something too nice for mere words to express. Over three years the team's KROQ Christmas Cassette has raised \$100,000 for the Starlight Foundation, a charity that grants requests to severely ill children. Whether they like it or not the cool team earned the organization's "President's Award." Since the Kevin and Bean show was on vacation when the ceremonies were held at the Century Plaza Hotel in March, the station sent in a videotaped acceptance speech. The average cost of a wish granted by Starlight runs about \$1,200, so KROQ made about 90 dreams come true.

## KBIG's \$7 Million Giveaway

The National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) chose KBIG from 45 finalists to receive one of 10 Crystal Awards for outstanding community service. The dollar value that the popular adult contemporary station donated in promoting non-profit organizations came to \$7,706,000. K-BIG also raised \$2.4 million for charitable organizations during 1994. After the Northridge Earthquake, the station compiled an Earthquake Assistance Guide and put licensed psychologists on the air to help listeners deal with the aftermath. The K-BIG Van "BIG Fun Crew" gets out to festivals, fairs, charity benefits and the like to help build awareness of local organizations within Southern California's diverse communities.

## KOST Forgets About "Remember"

KOST has replaced Dick Clark's weekly show "Rock Roll and Remember" with another Dick Clark show: The "U.S. Music Survey," which features a countdown of today's adult contemporary hits. The survey show airs Saturdays from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. KOST also recently welcomed Jacque Gonzales and Marina Wilson to their weekend lineup of air personalities.

## Broadcast Archives Come to L.A.

Since 1976, New Yorkers have been spoiled by the presence of a fabulous resource for anyone interested in broadcasting. Now the Museum of Television and Radio (formerly known as the Museum of Broadcasting) has announced it will open its long-awaited West Coast facility this year in Beverly Hills. The new museum will use state-of-the-art technology to link up with a collection of 60,000-plus programs covering 70 years of radio, television and cable, including documentaries, entertainment, news, children's shows, sports, commercials and the performing arts. Radio fans will be able to hear old radio dramas, famous newscasts and samples from pioneer DJs such as Allen Freed. The museum's board formed the Southern California Advisory Group, a committee of distinguished broadcasting leaders to provide information to the radio community and entertainment industry. Among the broadcast heavyweights are: Norman Pattiz, chairman of Westwood One; George Nicholaw, KNX vice president/general manager; Howard Neal, vice president/general manager of KFI/KOST; Ben Hoberman, former president of ABC Radio; and Gordon Mason, president of the Southern California Broadcasters' Association.

## Sex For Three Hours

The age of AIDS has driven many into platonic affairs, phone sex or cyberspace for libidinal satisfaction. 710 Talk KMPC has hired an expert on sex, Suzi Landolphi, to offer honest discussion and straightforward answers regarding safe sex. KMPC Operations Manager Al Brady Law calls her show "upbeat, positive and healthy." Landolphi has lectured on safe sex issues since 1982 and is an advocate for HIV/AIDS patients. Her show airs weeknights from 9 p.m. to midnight, replacing Yolanda Gaskins in the time slot.

## Raiders Go Classic

The last issue announced KMAX's decision to convert to an all-sports talk

format by summer. Now sports fever has penetrated another citadel of the FM world. Classic rocker KLSX (97.1) announced that it will carry Raiders football starting with the 1995-96 season. Joel Myers will do the play-by-play. Some might find it unusual to find live football on FM radio and on a rock station, but Robert K. Moore, vice president and general manager of KLSX is no stranger to Raider radio. He presided as GM at sister station KRLA when it carried the Raiders from 1985 through 1988. The station also attracts a large male audience. KLSX is now the flagship station for the football franchise, replacing KFI.

Since the Rams are moving to St. Louis, KLSX has a radio lock on pro football in L.A. Originally, the Raiders were carried on KNX.

## Food, Glorious Food

If you ever enjoyed dining at City Cafe on Melrose Avenue or City Restaurant on LaBrea Avenue or the Border Grill in Santa Monica, you can meet the two master chefs of these highly acclaimed restaurants via 89.9 KCRW every Friday at 2 p.m. during a half-hour show called "Good Food." Susan Feiniger and Mary Sue Milliken once hired Cafe L.A. host and former KCRW music director Tom Schnabel to put together music mixes for their restaurants. The cooking duo authored the cookbooks "Mesa Mexicana" and "City Cuisine."

790 KABC's Diane Worthington, host of "California Foods" (Saturday mornings at 10), was nominated for Best Culinary Radio Show by the James Beard Awards for the second consecutive year. Last year the show won the award, considered the Oscars of the Culinary World. Worthington has written several books, including "The Cuisine of California" and "The California Cookbook."

## Fistel Returns to KABC

Iran Fistell returned to KABC airwaves March 27 after a five-week suspension prompted by the talk host's involvement in a traffic fatality Feb. 17. L.A. District Attorney Gil Garcetti did not file manslaughter charges against Fistell. KABC management issued a statement stating that it would be "appropriate" to allow Fistell to return to his all-night program. He still faces

felony hit-and-run charges for allegedly leaving the scene of the accident before police arrived. He wanted to get to his show on time.

### **KIEV Kicks Up Power**


In March KIEV co-owners and brothers Fred and Ron Beaton "pulled the switch," boosting the station's signal to 15,000 watts of power. The Beaton family patriarch, William Beaton, bought the station with his sons in 1961. The station was established in Glendale in 1928. The station boasts George Putnam as their political commentator.

### **Perot to Go**

Ross Perot will terminate his weekly show on Tribune Radio Networks reportedly because of the billionaire's demanding schedule, according to *Radio & Records*. The one-hour show will continue on KABC Sunday nights at 9 p.m. through June 4. According to Tribune Networks GM Kenton Morris, Perot doubled the ratings for the time he was heard on 160 stations across the country. Does this mean that the one-time presidential candidate is clearing the deck for another White House bid? Ollie North, on the other hand, having failed to win a seat in the Senate, is taking his views to the air via radio syndication. So far, the conservative is airing on WWRC in Washington, D.C. and KKHT in Houston. There is no word on whether any local stations are interested.

### **Veep Praises Sancho**

Vice President Al Gore recently praised KPCC's "Sancho Show" as an example of how public radio is not elitist. In a recent speech directed at the congressional foes of public broadcasting, Gore said that Sancho's show "teaches kids in poor minority communities the value of staying in school—that's the opposite of elitism." Although KPCC receives money from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, Daniel Castro (Sancho's real name), is not paid for his weekly Saturday night show. (The Chicano DJ was featured in the previous issue of the *Los Angeles Radio Guide*.)

### **KIIS Van-dalized**

KIIS radio lost one of their 12 vans when riotous UCLA Bruins fans overturned the vehicle after the NCAA championship win over Arkansas. While helping to celebrate the basketball team's first championship in 20 years, Nastyman suffered three fractured ribs and a minor concussion in the melee.

"I arrived at about 7:45 p.m. and stood on top of the KIIS van handing out 'UCLA is No. 1' T-shirts," the afternoon KIIS DJ said. "I went to take a leak, and when I came back it looked like a different city. I saw a couple of guys running down the street with our center console. The van was overturned, and kids were on top of it. It looked like a pancake."

That night police declared a tactical alert, bringing in officers with riot equipment to restore order in Westwood. Just a week before, KIIS radio personalities had organized a pep rally that sent the UCLA players off to victory in Seattle.

### **Ratings Rulers**

Arbitron winter ratings show a considerable shakeup in the L.A. radio stations rankings. Spanish language radio continues to dominate, but has switched horses, so to speak, with "romantica" (love ballads) KLVE hitting the top spot, displacing former leader KLAX, which dropped to third.

The O.J. trial bumped KNX up a point and a half and into the top 10 ahead of KFI. KABC dropped out of the top 10 overall, but remains a top contender in the mornings with Ken and Barkley in sixth place. KLVE Pepe Barretto and Lupita Pena scored top honors in the

morning competition, followed by KIIS superjock Rick Dees who tied with KNX Linda Nunez and Tom Haule (includes O.J. coverage) in second place. Every rock station declined in overall ratings in L.A. with the exception of KCBS (Arrow 93FM), which remained constant.

### **KAEV Caves in to KGGI**

Inland Empire urban contemporary KAEV crumbled under pressure from KGGI 99.1 and has found new life as alternative rocker KCXX "X103.9." The new station is focusing on reaching young adults 18 to 34 with "core groups" such as INXS, U-2, R.E.M., the Cure and Depeche Mode. Operations Manager Steve Hoffman, who also manages sister AM outlet KCKC, is doubling as afternoon air talent.

"We are not targeting any ethnic group; we're just going after people who love this music," said Hoffman, who worked at San Diego's XHRM. "Besides, we're the only one in the Inland Empire playing this stuff. We're not KROQ, and we're not KSCA."

### **KLON Loses Classic Jazz Expert**

The Sunday morning host of "Jazz Classics" on KLON 88.1, Bob Epstein, died of a heart attack April 8, just eight days after observing his 16th anniversary with the station. KLON program director Scott Willis has not named a replacement, but will cover the 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. slot in the interim.

"Bob was a fixture at the station; the place will not be the same without him,"

Willis said. The show's material was largely drawn from Epstein's large collection of jazz recordings. "We won't be able to do his show the way he did it; I'll be focusing on more contemporary jazz."

Epstein, who taught radio and TV at Loyola Marymount University, was 56 and is survived by his two children.

### **KPFK Highlights**

The Pacifica Radio outlet continues to undergo changes in programming. From 6 a.m. to 7 a.m. weekday mornings, KPFK is now airing the Julianne Malveaux Show, a news and interview program live from Washington D.C. over the Pacifica Network.

Computer hackers and neophytes are the intended audience of "Digital Village" with Dorom Berens and Rick Alan. Sunday mornings from 10:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. On Friday mornings at 7:15 a.m. Mark Cooper hosts "The Nation Hour," a news and opinion program from the pages of the The Nation magazine.

### **Millions a la Kazan**

Dick Kazan made millions in the computer leasing business, and now his talents are turned to a weekly Sunday morning show called "The Road to Success," on KMPC 710 AM from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m.). Kazan offers advice to entrepreneurs, investors, mortgage holders, retirees and people pursuing a career. He is outspoken and well-informed on current affairs. Kazan also interviews highly successful individuals about their own paths to success.

### **The Beat Wakes Up Industry**

The National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) took note of KKBT's aggressive community outreach programming by placing the station among 45 finalists for the 1994 NAB Crystal Awards for excellence in community service. Specifically, the Sunday morning show "Street Science," which shies away from preachy condescension, impressed the judges. Host Dominique DiPrima addresses the issues facing minority communities in Los Angeles, such as welfare cuts and affirmative action.

The NAB also noted KKBT's "No Color Lines" message and the Beat's Street Team, which builds awareness of worthwhile community projects by phoning in live reports on the air.

The San Francisco local rap and hip-hop music scene has been hot for years. "Local rap and hip-hop artists can make \$90,000 a year without any radio airplay or exposure in clubs and without a label," said 24-7 Entertainment president *Greg Matteosian*, whose company brought rap artists Rappin' 4-Tay into national prominence last year. "They just sell on word of mouth."

This vitality led to a special program on local station KMEL called "The Wake-Up Show" featuring the "purest and truest underground" music. Since 1993, Bay area DJs King Tech, Rapper Sway and Joe Quixx have shared their music with L.A. sister station KKBT. They used to commute between the two cities for their weekend shows and later simulcast the show on both stations ( Saturdays, 9 p.m. to midnight). The Wake-Up Show crew is reaping awards from the industry in recognition of their work. The Gavin Conference, sponsored by the prestigious radio industry newsletter, *The Gavin Report*, honored them in twith the 1994 "Best Rap DJ Personalities" award. In addition, the magazine *Rap Sheet* named them "Radio DJs of the Year."

### 'Newsradio' Based on KNX?

Producers from the new NBC sitcom "Newsradio" came to observe the operation at his station and to take pictures last year, according to KNX News Director **Bob Sims**.

"I get a few good laughs from the show," Sims said. "But the set doesn't look much like our studio, and there aren't enough people around. News radio is very labor-intensive. It's much busier [at KNX]. There's much more fighting the clock to get stories on the air on time. But, of course, it's a sitcom; and it's just for fun."

A recent episode depicting the new news director and his assistant struggling with the ethical ramifications of their budding office romance brought some pangs of recognition to Sims, prompting him to recall a similar situation from his own past.

"We went through a whole thing about how to handle dating in the workplace, he said. "We decided that if we were to continue, one of us should resign. Most office romances don't work out but as it happened she became my wife." Who resigned? She did.

### Digital Radio Demo

Imagine AM radio sounding as good as FM and FM sounding as clean as a CD. The developing technology of digital radio promises to reduce AM radio's static and to eliminate FM's annoying "multi-path" tendencies, which cause stations to interfere with one another.

At April's *National Association of Broadcasters Conference* in Las Vegas, a bus transported broadcast engineers and executives around the city while they listened to a mobile demonstration of USA Digital Audio Broadcasting or DAB, one of two major industry consortiums working on the new system.

This system is sometimes confused with satellite digital radio, prompting broadcasters to distinguish it as "terrestrial" digital. USA DAB uses the existing radio frequencies (IBOC: or In Band-On Channel) and radio stations will be able to broadcast analog and digital at the same time. Group W, CBS and Gannett make up USA Digital while AT&T and Amati comprise the other consortium. The bottom line is: You don't have to buy a new radio — yet.

### Star 98.7 Helps Oklahoma

In less than a week, Star 98.7 jumped on the disaster relief bandwagon for the Oklahoma victims. The hot adult contemporary station donated \$7,100 to the Red Cross several days after the bombing. Morning show hosts **Jim and Melissa Sharp** wanted to take some action.

"We received a fax from one of our listeners suggesting that we play 'Say It and Win' for the Oklahoma City victims," Jim Sharp said. Players win \$100 for each time they repeat "Star 98.7."

### Howard Makes Headlines

The National Hispanic Media Coalition has protested **Howard Stern's** bit on the death of *Selena* — playing her song to the sound of gunfire. The group so far has persuaded three sponsors, Acapulco Restaurants, Pizza Hut and Magic Mountain, to pull their spots from KLSX 97.1 as part of its boycott. Earlier in his career at WJFK in Washington, Stern made off-color remarks about the crash of a passenger jet in Washington, D.C. His comments contributed to his dismissal from that station.

New Jersey Republican Gov. *Christine Whitman* recently honored the syndicat-

ed shock jock by putting up a plaque depicting him peeking out from behind an outhouse at the entrance of a rest stop on Interstate 295. The following Saturday, according to New Jersey State Police, witnesses reported seeing three men in their 20s steal the plaque from its modest location at the far entrance of the facility.

New Jersey has an unusual tradition of naming rest stops on its highways after well-known figures. When Stern pledged

his support to the first-term governor during the election campaign, candidate Whitman promised that she would name a rest stop after the publicity-hungry celebrity. A local New Jersey newspaper, *The Courier-Post*, noted wryly that the governor delayed the installation of the plaque for two months until she went on vacation. Stern's show originates from WXRK in New York City and is also carried by Philadelphia station WYSP, which is heard in southern and central New Jersey.

Stern's longtime sidekick, Robin Quivers, has just published her own book: "Quivers: A Life," now available in bookstores. — BY SANDY WELLS

# Traffic Angels Foretell Future for Millions of Commuters

Buzzing over the world's busiest freeways, through the Cahuenga Pass, weaving their way south through the downtown skyscrapers like a scene out of the movie "Blade Runner," traffic reporters Rudy Grande and Jorge Jarrin are navigating the Southland skies in search of accidents, stalls in the left lane, car fires, flat tires, closed lanes — anything and everything that prevents an otherwise flawless freeway system from delivering its mobile guests to their destinations on time.

So far the 101 below is free of any incidents. Through his headset, Captain Jorge gets word from the ground of trouble to the south. Metro Traffic Control redirects their flight path toward the problem area. There is report of an overturned big-rig at the intersection of the Harbor Freeway and the 405. As the aircraft whizzes over East L.A., Jarrin points down to four gang members with their hands up, cornered by police officers in a deserted parking lot.

Minutes later the chopper is over the junction of the Harbor and 405 freeways. Sure enough, a huge green tractor-trailer is flopped over on its side up against the right embankment of the highway. A few lanes are open for cars to pass. KABC's Captain Jorge blames the congestion on what he calls the "ripple effect." He explains that when

just a few drivers slow down to look, the traffic can back up for miles. Thanks to years of experience, reporters like Jarrin can quickly predict the length of the delay.


While in his copter, Grande gives separate traffic reports for five stations (KLSX, KRTH, KMPC, KCRW, KZLA), requiring him to go on the air every two and a half to three minutes. His colleagues call Grande the "traffic god." While broadcasting, he is able to quickly and accurately identify streets, landmarks and major thoroughfares.

Besides observing from the helicopter, Grande monitors information he receives through his headphones from KNX reporters Jill Angel or Jim Thornton, the Metro producers on the ground and other airborne traffic reporters.

Up for five hours a day, overlooking the city, they are in a good position to cover breaking news. From their vantage point, 1,000 to 3,000 feet above the ground, airborne reporters can see the problems firsthand.

Los Angeles county freeways carry more traffic than any other highways in the nation, according to Caltrans.

The congestion on the 909 miles of freeways and highways is increasing at a rate of 15 percent a year. Few take advantage of the available bus, train or carpool services. Most Angelenos travel alone. It's the Southern California lifestyle.



The volume of vehicles puts more pressure on traffic reporters who must quickly prioritize the information coming at them from multiple sources. They must walk a fine line between maintaining accuracy and keeping listeners informed with up-to-the-second updates.

KFI/KOST traffic anchor Mark Denis is constantly concerned about accuracy. It's not easy being right 6,100 times a year (the number of reports Denis figures he gives per year). He always qualifies his announcements with: "We hear," "We believe" or "We are getting reports of," rather than "It's right there in the left lane."

"I think I've missed not being on top of something 13 times," Denis said. "That's why we put a high priority on two-way radios and people who call us because things can change so quickly."

Generally, traffic reporters take great care to remain neutral. When describing an accident, they are careful not to suggest blame or mention the makes of the vehicles involved.

There are three traffic services available to Southland stations: Metro Traffic Control, Shadow Broadcast Services and Air Traffic. They offer their services free of charge in exchange for commercial time that they sell to their own advertisers. Each reporter who works for these services is typically heard on several stations in the region, and they must tailor their delivery to fit each one. They need to be aware of what the DJs are saying just

before they go on to maintain the flow of the show.

Some stations, such as KFI, KOST, KNX and KIIS, have in-house traffic anchors. KNX has Jill Angel (who's also CHP sergeant) in-studio during the morning drive and Jim Thornton for the afternoons. However, during off-peak hours such as middays, nights and weekends, live reports come in from the anchors at Metro Traffic (Metro Networks is the parent company.) In spite of their physical distance from the stations on which they are heard, many anchors, such as Metro's Dona Dower, heard middays on KNX or Shadow's Allen Lee who is the morning voice of traffic on KFWB, are closely identified with the stations they serve.

Shadow's Lisa May is heard every morning on KROQ's Kevin and Bean show. She said people are surprised to learn that she's not in the studio with them.

"This is like a third body or second body on the air for them," she said. "And it's almost like you happen to do traffic too. But, really, a lot of times what you're there for is to be someone for them to talk to about a topic. It makes a big difference."

Air Traffic's director of operations, John Quinlan, praised Nancy Bond, who has reported traffic on the Riverside/San Bernardino station KGGI for six years.

"After reporters have been on the station for a year or more, they feel part of the station," Quinlan said. "They are part of the station's success. That's where you

find the bond."

Reporting traffic on the ground requires a mind like an encyclopedia, according to Bill Keene, who worked at KNX from 1976 to 1993.

"You've got to get all that data coming in all the time," Keene said. "I stared at the computer with the screen display of all the freeways, with the CHP computer, telephones, and I've got contact with the cell phones as they call in. We had two aircraft that were usually up during rush hour."

Using the information he gathered, Keene developed his own system using typed cue cards with one- or two-word hints. His key words were CHP codes and locations, such as 1125 for a stalled car; 1183 for a crash, or 1141, meaning an

ambulance has been dispatched.

"It's all ad-lib, because there is no way you can script it that quickly," he said.

The pro recited one of his favorite quotes from his radio scrapbook: "They spilled a load of fish on the Harbor freeway and the CHP arrived. What do you have? Fish and chips."

While working at KNX, Keene went up on the roof of the CBS building on Sunset every day with a portable microphone to give his 7:40 a.m. traffic and weather report.

"I could see the Hollywood Freeway from there," he recalled. "I'd just bull pucky around with them. I'd get the traffic reporters to buzz me while I was there. We made a production out of it. We did it every day just as a gimmick: 'The Rooftop Report.'"

"Shortly after we started, all of the TV stations got the idea: 'We'll take a camera up on the roof.' By the time I left, everyone in town was broadcasting from their roofs. I figured I was completely roofless in my career," joked Keene, offering another of his puns that endeared him to his listeners.

"One of the things that they did, which really made a difference in the traffic flow in L.A., was to put teams of tow trucks out on the freeways. If anything happens to an automobile, a tow truck is there almost immediately to take them off the freeways. So instead of getting a stalled car

backing up traffic for 10 miles, it probably backs up one-fourth of a mile now."

Keene retired right before the onslaught of the L.A. plagues, during which traffic reporters had little time for fun and games. They worked beyond the call of duty during the disastrous fires, floods, riots and earthquakes.

During the riots, Captain Jorje recalled being airborne for 20 hours straight. When he came home late, his kids thought he'd been camping, because he smelled so strongly of smoke.

"We'd eat on the run, refuel and we'd go back up," he said. "Because the people had guns and could have shot us, we didn't want to irritate them."

During such crises, Jarrin and Grande described days when 12 helicopters were in the air covering the same story. To keep out of each other's way, the pilots communicated constantly on two-way radios. Without them, pilots are in constant danger of a mid-air collision, such as the one that occurred over Dodger Stadium in 1965, taking the life of Captain Max Schumacher, an early reporter/pilot for KMPC. That accident was attributed to the lack of direct radio contact between two pilots who happened to be covering the same story. Because of this tragedy, the Professional Pilots Helicopter Association was formed, which established a common radio channel for helicopters.

Pioneer traffic pilots such as Schumacher inspired Mike Nolan, who flies for KOST/KFI. As a boy, he would hang around the hangar at the Van Nuys Airport, waiting for a chance to go up in the chopper and ride with Schumacher, his real-life hero. Now a pilot/reporter in his own right, Nolan belongs to the elite few who pilot their craft while broadcasting.

Nolan said that while piloting his plane he's the only one in the air who monitors the CHP scanner.

"With the scanner, I hear the CHP give the details," Nolan said. "I might know that it is a spilled load of dog food on the freeway that is causing a backup."

Along with Nolan, KLOS' Scott Reiff

("Skylord") and KIIS' Chuck Street are among a select group in the nation who double as pilot and reporter.

Commander Street, who has been with the top 40 giant for 12 years, recalled seeing a bizarre incident while flying over the Pasadena Freeway. He got a report of a delay involving a rattlesnake. Arriving at the scene he saw that the snake was loose in the back seat of a woman's car. Another time he witnessed a couple of motorists pulled over to the side of the road tying someone to the guard rail. But the aftermath of the earthquake left the commander with sights he'll never forget.

"I could not believe the extent of the damage as it just kept unfolding before me," recalled Street. "I could see big fireballs, which were within 500 feet from my helicopter. I could feel the heat through the plexiglass. [Later] I could see camps spring up in parks and little fires when people started pulling out their barbecues."

Whether it be an earthquake or a tied-up lane, all traffic reporters emphasized the importance of on-the-spot updates from drivers calling the station from their cars. KNX reporter Jim Thornton finds tipsters invaluable.

"You only have so many sets of eyes," Thornton said. "Especially in areas the CHP doesn't cover, like the Pacific Coast

Highway or big canyon roads where you're trapped in there with no way out if you get stuck. Unless we know about closures there, we cannot send in our airborne. Sometimes they cannot fly because of weather."

When Thornton announces tipsters' findings, he gives them credit.

"We have a lot of regular tipsters; we give their names on the air," Thornton said. "Mack Barns is a guy we call the Eastside Spy. He drives a bus, and has a big sign saying 1070 on the top of it. They are wonderful, friendly folk."

Denis also has a group of loyal traffic spotters. One owns a paving company and travels 300 miles a day; another drives all over in her big red truck selling hardware to the police department and movie studios. The woman's business contacts and friends keep track of her by hearing her tips on KFI. He even gets tips from reporters at other stations.

"The bottom line on this thing is, 'Let's make it work,'" Denis said. "They may be in a position to help you sometime."

The importance of the job and the gravity of some of the accidents they see or hear about make it all but impossible for traffic reporters to remain unmoved.

May's job led her to buy a Saturn, which she considered to be the safest car she could afford.

She has seen this type of car resist

being crushed under a 16-wheeler, saving the lives of the occupants. An airbag and anti-lock brakes are a must as well, she added.

When driving, May keeps a healthy distance from big-rigs, tanker trucks or car haulers.

If her car gets a flat tire on the freeway, she will drive it off the freeway and risk ruining the rim rather than pull over to change it on the freeway.

"People get hit like that all the time," she warned, "It's a \$50 item; get off the freeway."

All the reporters agreed that late Friday and Saturday nights, after the bars close, it's common to find two or three big accidents between 2 a.m. and 3 a.m. Later during the morning, if freeways are congested, no one is going fast enough for an accident. But when people are driving on an open freeway, they tend to go 70 mph.

"In the middle of the night, when you've been drinking, if you have an accident, it's going to be a bad one," said Shadow's Allen Lee. "The rain just tears everything up. There are more accidents than we have time to tell anyone about: people slipping and sliding. That's a day when I'll open a report with, 'It's

bad everywhere; here's some of the worst.' "

Grande in the sky sympathizes with the drivers below him. Some scenes have stuck with him, such as a terrible accident involving a motorcyclist who was seriously injured. He also empathizes with the people stuck in traffic jams.

"When someone's frustrated in their car, you've got to make them feel OK," he said. "They may be people who have lost someone or who might get chewed up for being late.

Shadow Traffic's Chery Glaser's recollection illustrates the flavor of the concrete beat in the Southland.

"I remember one day we had a food day; there was a spilled load of onions, tomatoes and lemons all on the same freeway," Glaser said. "You'll have people having babies —' stork sightings.' Usually, the CHP tries to get the mother to the hospital. But sometimes they don't make it in time, so the kid gets to say, 'I was born on the 405.' It means you are a true Southern Californian."

# L.A.'s Patron Saint of Traffic

When you hear the term "SigAlert" on radio traffic reports you know it means road trouble. The invaluable SigAlert warns motorists about accidents or other emergencies that have tied up lanes on the freeway. This quick relay of information on the radio saves people hours of delay and inconvenience. It also eases traffic congestion and smog because people take alternative routes.

SigAlert inventor Loyd Sigmon has been called the "father of L.A. traffic reporting" by Bill Keene, the former KNX-AM radio personality.

"He was the first guy who ever came up with the concept of reporting traffic and major problems on a citywide basis on the radio," Keene said of his colleague and friend.

In the event of a major news event, such as a flood or a fire, Sigmon would make the information available to the radio stations at the same time.

Sigmon, 85, pioneered traffic reporting in the 1950s. Originally from Oklahoma, he developed the SigAlert and traffic reporting in 1955, while serving as vice president in charge of operations for KMPC-AM. Together with his partner, Gene Autrey, he also started the Angels baseball team and ran five radio stations, Channel 5 and a cable TV station in Santa Barbara. Characteristically trusting in their partnership, they never had a contract. It was all based on a handshake.

Sigmon brought to his management position electronic expertise and political clout. During World War II, he was in charge of communication between the White House and Downing Street (the home office of the prime minister of England) and headed up Army communications in Europe with General Eisenhower. In his Los Angeles home, Sigmon keeps the White House phone which, he says, President Kennedy used to talk to his girlfriends.

Sigmon worked with an electronics company to develop the SigAlert system. In the event of an emergency, a police

officer would push a red "SigAlert" button at the Communications Center of the Los Angeles Police Department, activating special receiving sets at participating radio stations, where a red light would flash to alert the engineer on duty. A tape recorder automatically recorded the announcement from the police department for use on the air.

Some people think the term refers to the word "signal." The origin of the word actually comes from L.A. police Chief Parker's offer to name the system after its inventor, provided that Sigmon share his traffic advisory system with other stations.

"I didn't want to share it with anyone," Sigmon admitted. "As soon as they [the other stations] knew about the SigAlert, they wanted to get in on it in a

hurry. They used to accuse KMPC of having a tie-in with the police, because we got the SigAlerts on the air first."

The SigAlerts caused quite a sensation. Bob Hope made jokes about them, they were mentioned in movies, high society had SigAlert parties and Packard Bell produced SigAlert radios for the public. The mayor proclaimed an official SigAlert Week and stations fought to see which one could get the SigAlert on the air first. The term even made its way into the venerable Oxford English Dictionary.

KMPC drew large listening audiences by its extensive traffic reporting and SigAlerts, which only indirectly benefited Sigmon, who was part owner of the station. The inventor never took out a copyright or patent on the SigAlert and he did not allow commercialization of these traffic advisories during his tenure on KMPC.

"I never made a dime off the SigAlert," said the radio pioneer.

In fact, he lost money because he

used to bet on a horse named SigAlert that never won.

In the 1950s a typical radio station might occasionally rent a helicopter to cover a major accident. Few took traffic as seriously as KMPC, which had its own helicopters and airplanes, mobile units, motorcycles, radio circuit and mechanics. They patrolled and reported back from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Sigmon originally envisioned the SigAlert system as a means of alerting the public in the event of enemy attack. But the idea never materialized, although the radio stations did control all the air raid sirens.

An article in a 1957 edition of *Westways* magazine offered a description of the SigAlert in action: "Several times a day L.A. radio stations are interrupting their programs with the announcement, 'This is a SigAlert bulletin ...' followed by a message from the police or other public authority."

Messages could be smog warnings, a

supersonic plane breaking the sound barrier and knocking out windows and setting off burglar alarms, ships colliding at sea, a train wreck in which doctors and nurses were needed, a leaking gas pipeline, missing children, a pharmaceutical error in which a person was given a deadly drug by mistake, a person losing an outhouse on the freeway or a flasher on the corner (which were great material for radio personalities to joke about on the air).

In 1969, the California Highway Patrol took over monitoring of the highways from the police. Even though few of the original SigAlert hookups are in operation, the term is still used to refer to traffic delays. Today, stations often hire traffic services that monitor many different sources to get their freeway bulletins, and they announce the SigAlerts along

with other traffic news.

Now retired, Sigmon keeps up his interest in electronic communication with his amateur, shortwave and police radios at home.

## A Truck Driver's Ode to Sigmon

"There once was a fellah named Sig

A true friend of all drivers of rigs

To him they did listen

When bumpers were kissin

And tempers were flaring up big.

Now Sig had a definite flare

Of his work we would all become aware

When trouble came round

With a car crunching sound

He'd make sure it got out on the air."

Members carry General Mobile Radio Service (G.R.M.S.) radios, enabling them to pass information to each other, the California Highway Patrol and services such as Metro Traffic Control, Shadow Broadcast Services, Air Traffic, KFI, etc. Using repeaters and UHF FM, the handheld units provide on-scene updates, which are often broadcast as part of a radio station report. # New Music: KSCA Evening Jock's Focus

It wasn't too long ago when FM rock stations were noted for avoiding new artists and favoring new releases by established artists. The rock world has recently turned on its head as a new generation of talent has exploded into prominence. Adult Album Alternative KSCA has positioned itself to exploit this new creative surge and they've hired Mimi Chen to judge the new sounds coming out of the L.A. music scene.

"When the DJs like listening to the station where they work, that means the station plays too much new music," joked Mimi Chen, repeating an old adage of the radio business. Nevertheless, KSCA 101.9 is boldly venturing where few L.A. stations have ventured before, a fact that has drawn raves of enthusiasm from discriminating radio listeners, leading *Los Angeles* magazine to elevate the fledgling rocker to 1994 "Best Station in L.A." status.

New artists flock to the tiny 101.9 Music Hall to air their latest compositions and grab some precious exposure from under L.A.'s overgrown radio canopy. Every night at 11 Chen plays a cut from a deserving local band or musician on the "101.9 Local Spotlight."

Chen seems to relish the station's emphasis on the future stars of rock.

"The accusation that we play Joni Mitchell all the time is wrong, but she is one of our

core artists," said Chen. "This is still a baby station with controlled diversity. It doesn't shift like free-form. We'd be more offensive, more gonzo if we were free-form."

She came to KSCA last fall without inside contacts.

"Everyone is surprised to hear that I didn't know [program director] Mike Morrison," she said.

A friend heard about the opening and begged her to send a tape to Morrison. "She was someone who could have used the gig herself ... so much for the idea that women are all catty and back-biting," Chen said. "Now I'm on a station where most of the staff is female. You ask a lot of programmers on the street and they'd be afraid to hire more females. There's a lot of fear in this industry, where if they're not sure it'll work they don't try it."

Chen's sensuous and intelligent voice earned the New Jersey native an early start in radio. She grew up listening to New York radio radio greats Allison Steele and Carole Miller who inspired her as female DJ role models. She was a teen-age DJ at rock station WPST in Trenton, where she worked for six months.

"I started sending out tapes almost immediately and got an offer to be a street reporter for [free-form rock station] WMMR in Philadelphia. I told them I wanted to be a DJ and they hired me.

"I witnessed the death of free-form radio first-hand at two stations!"

She laughed as her long fingers gracefully touched the controls on the console. The KSCA studio is dimly lit by the computer screen on her right and a strip of track lighting above. Her straight black hair falls below her waist, suggesting the appearance of sorceress as she presides over the weekly 7 to midnight time slot.

"WMMR went corporate and they cleaned house," she said. "I headed to

the West Coast, where I went on the air at KSAN in San Francisco. After that station went country, I worked at a bunch of stations part-time until I landed the gig at KRQR."

Working on the the popular San Francisco album rock station, Chen developed a reputation for exposing new Bay Area acts during her evening shift.

"I became a fixture up there," she said.

She was briefly married to rock musician Chis Isaak in the '80s, a phase in her life she does not recall fondly.

One thing Chen has enjoyed about L.A. is her relative anonymity, although that is likely to change with time.

"Since I'm unknown in this town, I don't get hassled [by musicians] with requests for help," she said.

**S**he lives with her second husband, computer software engineer ("the most brilliant man in the world") in Glendale with their dog Albert (after Einstein). Their shared passion for music led to a recent collaboration on a film score for a movie about a llama farmer who gets cancer and in which she plays a musician in a party band. The couple expects their first baby this spring.

"When I first arrived here last fall, I was sick all the time," she recalled. "I thought I had Nicole Sandler's stomach flu. My husband told me that I might be pregnant. But I was in denial. I didn't want to believe it, and I was worried about starting my new job here. Luckily, the managers, Bill [Ward, general manager] and Mike said 'wonderful.'"

"I was listening to an aircheck of myself recently, and I was surprised to here all this slurping and heavy breathing coming out of my mouth. I guess I was snacking too much during my shift. I'm just a slave to my body. But the baby's got to eat!"

Chen smiled and pointed to the small space outside the studio that serves as the "101.9 Music Hall," claiming it will be her "daycare center."

Around the corner are the cramped offices. Morrison occupies a mere cubicle on the floor. There is a kind of democratic camaraderie among the staff that

"Everyone here does double duty," she said.

Morrison doubles as program director and afternoon personality.

Nicole Sandler handles an air shift, in addition to scheduling guest musicians. Merilee Kelly is the music director in addition to her midday shift.

"I'm responsible for listening to all the tapes coming in from unsigned local acts," she said.

Her advice to struggling musicians: "Be true to yourself. Don't get on a bandwagon. What's hot today does not necessarily parallel what's being signed."

# Intelligent Talk Show Lasts a Decade

The second longest running L.A. radio talk show, Larry Mantle's "Airtalk," celebrated its 10th anniversary in April.

Over the years, the KPCC-FM (89.3) popular drive-time talk program has introduced prestigious writers, scientists, politicians, lawyers to its highly educated public radio audience. Some noteworthy guests have included: scientist Carl Sagan, poet Allen Ginsberg, actor Sid Caesar, author Ken Kesey, culinary icon Julia Child and pornography expert Susie Bright.

Mantle creates a fun and friendly atmosphere during "Airtalk," allowing him to connect with his guests on a deep level and to draw them out in intelligent discussions. The program covers a variety of topics, ranging from the earthquake to the Contract with America.

Like Michael Jackson, Mantle is polite and even-handed.

"Mass appeal radio tends to be more hysterical," Mantle said. "But if you look at Michael Jackson at KABC, he does very well even though his ratings aren't as high as Limbaugh."

In contrast to some hosts, the meticulous preparer reads the books of the authors he interviews. To keep focused, he prepares his line of questioning in advance. His intelligent interview style attracts an informed and responsive

audience in Southern California. He often encourages callers by saying sincerely: "That is a very good comment."

Mantle's on-air style derives from his academic study in psychology and a brief study for the Presbyterian Ministry. He realized that he wanted to be a broadcaster after a brief internship at KPCC.

### BRIEF HISTORY

The second Earth Day in April 1971 inspired the name "K-Earth 101." Originally called KHJ-FM, the original intention was to turn the station into a progressive "underground" rocker like KMET. By the time the new call letters were approved, the decision already had been made to make KRTH a "solid gold" rock station. KRTH has kept the same music format longer than any other radio station in L.A. Featuring well-known Southern

California radio personalities with an upbeat presentation of rock and pop oldies from the late '50s, '60s and early '70s, its powerful signal and spectacular contests out-gunned former rival KODJ (now Arrow 93) in a ratings war in the early '90s. K-Earth 101 is a dominant presence in the Southland and one of the top billing radio stations in the country. Three K-Earth personalities have stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame: Robert W. Morgan, Brian Beirne ("Mr. Rock 'N' Roll") and The Real Don Steele.

# The Looney Point of View

I got the top down and the radio turned up loud. I'm the most democratic listener on the road: AM and FM, music and talk. I listen to rock, country, rap, dance music, oldies & newies. He can talk to one caller about the backup goalie for Montreal and then talk to the next caller about the offensive line problems with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Next call is about Nascar, next call about the NBA, next call about DNA. I can't stand him. I listen every day.

Speaking of sports, the **McDonnell/Douglas** show is back on the air during afternoon drive on KMAX 107.1 FM. (The future of talk radio is on FM, by the way, but that's another column for another day.) Remember when KMPC was all-sports? They had one fun, informative, argumentative, silly, fight/show that actually showed up in the rat-

ings. It was Joe McDonnell and Doug Kirkorian. The chemistry between the two was one of those rare radio crap-shoots — when you put them together they come out a 7. KMAX is building their new all-sports format around the McDonnell-Douglass show — as they should! If the duo's show is half as great as their old KMPC show, we'll all have some outstanding entertainment in our homes and cars every afternoon.

If **Gloria Allred** on KABC790 were a man, she'd be either president or heavyweight champion — or both. She's brilliant and tough. She's a truculent defender of women and children (especially famous women and children who get her that all-important television exposure). She's obstreperous and intimidating. If I ever need a lawyer, I'll put on a dress and get breast implants to persuade Gloria to represent me (wouldn't be the first time I've slithered into a silky skirt, but that's another column for another day). Out of the goodness of her heart, Ms. Allred is representing Nicole Brown's family. Consequently, poor Gloria has had to do her afternoon-drive radio show live from the criminal courts building in downtown L.A., resulting in increased ratings and listenership.

**Tom Leykis** on KMPC 710 Talk is probably my favorite. He's the only coast-to-coast liberal on the radio who isn't wimpy. (And he'll be the first to tell you.) John tends to be the realist, which of course, borders on cynicism. Ken tends to be the softy, but never wimpy. They are small-town guys, which has great appeal to the LA market since many of us have moved here from small towns. They have a very impressive radio track record: Elmira, New York; Atlantic City, New Jersey; Po-Dunk, Pennsylvania. Wow. They made an overnight jump from small-market wanna-bes to lighting up the scoreboard in the competitive L. A. radio ratings war. Many of their radio contemporaries in LA are extremely jealous.

(I'd love my own talk show, and I'm not jealous. Honest. Everybody else is, though.)

It's an all-OJ world right now, so I must add KNX-1070 to my list of afternoon drive favorites. **Patti Reising** did a great job for a while, but she's going to have a baby soon, so **Gail Eichenthal** has been reporting live from the criminal

courthouse, joining the crowd with Loyola law professor Stanley Goldman, O.J., Johnnie, F Lee, Robert, Marcia, Chris and Hiz Honor Lance. Remember the Kennedy-Nixon debates? I don't. (I was busy growing in a womb back east.) But, from what I have read and been told, those who listened on the radio thought Nixon won the debate. Those who watched television thought Kennedy took the brass ring. It's interesting listening to the O.J. trial on the radio. Once again, one gets a different opinion than those watching on TV. For example, I thought prosecution witness Candace Garvey sounded a few-french-fries-short-of-a-Happy-Meal on the radio. People who watched on TV thought that she was credible and marveled at her lovely gold hair bow.
