L.A. Orchestra on KUSC

KUSC's Allan Chapman started hosting the broadcasts of the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra from Westwood's Veterans Wadsworth Theatre Nov. 3. The series continues every Friday from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. through the end of the season in mid-April on 91.5 FM.

Sci-Fi Classic on KCRW

Isaac Asimov's brilliant science fiction epic, "The Foundation Trilogy," is running on KCRW-FM 89.9, Saturdays from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. The BBC-produced, eight-part series began Nov. 4.

'California Report' on Public Radio

It took two years and a million-dollar grant from the James Irvine Foundation, but Southlanders can catch up on state news. "The California Report" airs Friday evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. on KCRW-FM 89.9, followed by Warren Olney's "Which Way, L.A." Hosted by **Maia Krache**, the show is produced by KQED-FM in San Francisco and carried on 20-plus public stations, statewide. Many local station reporters will contribute to the program. KPCC-FM 89.3 also airs the show Fridays at 5:30 p.m. and KUSC-FM 91.5 runs it Fridays at 7:30 p.m.

Traffic Angel Switch

Citing KNX traffic anchor Jim Thorton's additional announcing duties at KCOP-TV, a KNX spokesperson said the afternoon-drive reporter switched with morning counterpart Jill Angel. Angel continues to serve with the California Highway Patrol; she was recently promoted to the rank of lieutenant. Angel is the ninth woman to become lieutenant since women joined the CHP in 1974.


O.J.'s Radio Fallout

'Straight Sports—No Attitude'

KWNK 670 AM with 5000 watts daytime and a kilowatt at night is going it alone with the One on One Sports Network based in Chicago. XTRA Sports 690 out of San Diego had leased the signal of the Simi Valley radio station for three years to boost its coverage north of Los Angeles. The new format, calling itself Sports Radio 670, emphasizes straight reporting rather than opinion and controversy.

"We didn't need to buy the station," said XTRA Program Director Howard Freedman, who added that XTRA plans to raise its power to 77,000 watts from 50,000.

AM Power Play

L.A. radio stations seeking to up their punch at the transmitter are KFWB (5,000 to 50.000 watts), KPLS (2,500 to 50,000 watts). KGRB (500 to 5,000 watts) and KIEV (from 15,000 to 25,000 watts).

"Scott Ferrall is one of the new mavericks changing the face of talk radio," said Westwood One Entertainment President Greg Batusic. "It's sports talk 'in your face,' as Ferrall puts it."

Hewitt Trades KFI For God

Harvard grad, natural resource lawyer, law professor at Chapman University and panelist on KCET-TV's "Life and Times." Hugh Hewitt resigned from his Sunday night show on AM 640 KFI to concentrate on his PBS series: "Searching for God in America" slated for next spring. The former Reagan administration deputy director of the Office of Personnel Management was even considered for CEO of Orange County. Hewitt said he would seriously look at an offer of a full-time radio show on KFL

"They are great people," he said. "David Hall [program director] knows what he is doing. He and Howard Neal [general manager] have created a great product," said the moderate conservative of his former employers.

For Hewitt, the ideal political talk show would be a cross between KABC's Michael Jackson and Limbaugh.

KFI weekender Wayne Resnick (Saturdays, 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.) replaced Hewitt in the time period.


Geno Michellini, former DJ for rock station KLOS, has taken to talking on KFI every Saturday and Sunday evening from 6 p.m to 9 p.m.

K-JOY Buds To Reunite

EBS Changing Its Tune... er Tone

So far, the only panic caused by the EBS (Emergency Broadcast System) has been among broadcasters who fear losing their audience when the infamous tone comes on following the "this a test..." spiel by the somber announcer. According to the FCC, that announcement will soon be history as the EBS gets a major overhaul and a new name.

Since most people expect to see grilled cheese in the mirror before they ever get to hear directions to one of the city's non-existent bomb shelters during a nuclear attack from a renegade thirdworld dictator, the EBS test has served as grist for standup comedians. In one famous EBS snafu, the system inadvertently went off in 1971, prompting many stations across the country to sign off. Many more chose to disregard it, however. (The FCC corrected that problem long ago.)

The digital revolution in communications nationwide prompted the FCC to Implement Its new plan.

"We had no digital signaling protocol for EBS; the new EAS gives us that protocol," said Frank Lucia of the FCC's Compliance and Information Bureau.

One of the architects of the new system is KFWB's Engineering Manager Richard Rudman, who said that the new system will incorporate all the new technologies of the information superhighway. Specially-equipped consumer products, such as pagers, CD players as well as radios and TVs, will be able to receive an EAS alert and can even provide warnings when they are shut off.

EAS will use a shorter tone during those pesky on-air tests and eliminate the famous "this is a test" preamble.

In many ways, the new technology brings to fruition the dream of Southland broadcast pioneer Loyd Sigmon, whose "Sigalert" is still heard 24 hours a day during traffic reports in the Southland.

KIIS-FM Gets Big Rig

KIIS-FM's Nastyman learned his lesson well earlier this year when rowdy Bruin fans folded, spindled and mutilated the station van after UICLA won the NCAA basketball championship. KIIS-FM 102.7 purchased an invincible "Megacruiser," a 46-foot, 18-wheeler equipped with a hydraulically-operated interactive stage and a sound system capable of shattering glass from 100 feet away. Inside there are two levels with

broadcast studios. "green room." restroom, and mini-kitchen. The \$250,000-plus Megacruiser is a one-ofkind facility, able to continue broadcasting in the event of major disasters. Should the next earthquake topple the KIIS studios in Burbank — no problem! The Megacruiser will allow the station to cruise the Southland and to broadcast until civilization returns — or it runs out of gas!

Music Meisters Move Up

KIIS Music Director Tracy Austin is so good at picking the hits that she was promoted to assistant program director. Program Director Steve Perun is so adept at conducting the KIIS Top 40 symphony that he advanced to national program director of all Gannett radio stations across the nation.

Marconi Awards

The National Association of Broadcasters sponsored the Marconi Awards in New Orleans in September. The powwow presented honors to stations and personalities across the country. KROQ-FM 106.7 walked off with "Rock Station of the Year." Rush Limbaugh, heard on KFI-AM 640, was named "Personality of the Year." KKLA-FM 99.5 won the "Best Religious/Gospel Radio Station of the Year" title.

ometimes the very thing you lack is what makes you stand out. Mr. KFI lacks a real name, phone screeners, a producer and an agenda. There are no

contrived topics, no prerecorded comedy and no planted callers: "just little old Mr. KFI and a 50,000-watt microphone to pummel you into submission."

His words are fresh and instinctively well-chosen, and like a seasoned comedian, he punches key phrases quickly.

"Nefarious? Well, it depends. Do you consider world domination nefarious? You do? All right, then."

He's a guy who knows when to dance around issues, but he generally faces each caller with a kind of blunt benevolence. He's polite in the most impolite way.

"Ah, it's another Mr. KFI hussy tonight. Well, thank you, ma'am, and welcome, welcome to the show." verbal sparring match.

"Did you say chili from a pump? Mmmm, you can just taste that botulism. I guess Mormons love chili from the pump. Is that right?"

"Ask Mr. KFI," broadcast on KFI-AM 640 weeknights from 9 p.m. to midnight, is light and comedic with serious undertones. The host covers a broad range of headline news and popular culture.

"When I do the show, it's the very best part of my day," he said. "I love sitting behind the microphone and talking to people. It's the most natural thing I do. I can have a crappy day or be tired, but the minute the microphone turns on, none of it matters."

On the air, the mystery man, who never reveals his real name to his listeners, becomes a larger-than-life persona.

"Part of the reason I'm somewhat anonymous with my name is because I can be more honest that way," he admitted. "I don't have to worry about my personal security or my family. People really

Mr. KFI darts across the lines of political correctness in a way that startles unsuspecting listeners.

"Sir, sir, sir, do you stutter in Portuguese too? Oh, you do: O.K., then."

His style of teasing captures your attention.

"Hey, whoever has the gun to your head making you talk about O.J." please, make them put that gun down!"

He's skilled at being confrontational in an acceptable way.

"My hidden agenda? My agenda isn't hidden; it's out in the open, or haven't you noticed that yet?"

His callers genuinely amuse him, but he takes every opportunity to initiate a think they know me; and, for the most part, they really do. Sometimes someone will call me up and say, 'Remember when your mom did that?' They're remembering something I said six months ago. It's funny how much I reveal of myself. It's all true, and it's all honest, and people respond to that."

Once in a while his vivid imagination teams up with his relentless quest for the funny quip, giving birth to another Mr. KFI legend.

"There are a lot rumors circulating about who I am and what my background is all about," he pointed out. "Most of the myths have been started by me. Sometimes people choose to believe I am in prison or that I'm out of prison due to an overturned conviction. The top

myth is that I'm much older than 28. People are usually surprised by my age and think I'm much older."

The truth is 28 years old seems young to have reached the lofty position that Mr. KFI established for himself. It didn't come easy. While completing a political science degree at UC Santa Barbara, he worked his way up in radio. His first job at Santa Barbara radio station KTMS gave him the opportunity to learn the business.

"At a certain point early in my career 1 realized that I'd done every job in that radio station that they were going to let me do," he explained. "The only way 1 was going to become program director was if the program director died. And, well, he was in pretty good shape, so 1 quit."

The next thing he knew, he was a 23year-old with his foot in the door at KFI. Once inside, he made the most of every opportunity in the big-time environment. Working his way through the ranks, he eventually pitched an idea for a show to Program Director David Hall. That was about three years ago, and, as a result, "Ask Mr. KFI" was launched from the dubious 2 a.m.-to-4 a.m. time slot.

Mr. KFl grins at the decision now.

"I guess David's philosophy was that if the show blew up on the launching pad — under the cover of darkness — no one would know," he said. But the show survived liftoff.

"I chose the name Mr. KFI because it's easy to remember," the answer man said. "I knew it would stand out. And if the show failed miserably, I figured I'd get another shot using my real name."

But he didn't need another shot.

"My voice and what I do is distinctive enough that you just know it's me," he explained. "I think a lot of people who are on the air are nasty, unhappy people and it comes through on the air. If you listen to me for any amount of time, you know my true colors and my true beliefs. You can't fake that kind of stuff, because sooner or later you get trapped. There are a lot of people out there who are disingenuous — a lot of phonies. But you can't run from who you really are when you do talk radio long enough."

And when you do it long enough, it looks easier than it really is.

"Sometimes people think I have the easiest job in the world," he said. "You sit down and talk three hours a day. How hard can that be? But what they don't take into consideration is that I'm prepping all day."

The mystery talk lock reads six newspapers every day; he checks online services, reads the newspapers, reviews the tons of stuff sent to him daily by fans, and scans a huge range of magazines from *Time* to *Playboy* to *Self*. That's all before showtime. He works at home,



which he shares with his 11-month-old daughter and his wife, a morning news announcer at KEZY-FM. His Job may seem easy, but it requires that he ration his energy for the intensity of the threehour nightly air shift.

The struggle to maintain the upperhand and cope with the never-ending assault of the unknown caller is one of Mr. KFI's favorite aspects of his on-air performance. Without a call screener, Mr. KFI never knows what to expect. He cannot choose from a menu of callers and their interests displayed on a computer screen. Never knowing what to expect requires a special approach. For many, the fun of getting through to Mr. KFI is the chance to knock him off balance during the three hour verbal jousting match.

"If there's someone I really disagree with, or someone who really bothers me, instead of yelling at them or calling them idiots or blowing them up. I like to just give them as much rope as possible and

let them hang themselves," said the verbal executioner. "Radio is at its best when someone has been given too much rope."

He's skilled at providing callers with rope, but the most unique thing about "Ask Mr. KFI," is not what he does but what he doesn't do.

"I'm not an activist; I'm not trying to change the world," he said. "I'm just trying to do an entertaining show for three hours a night so that it will compel you to come back."

Recently Mr. KFI fielded a call from Stephanie Miller, whose recent departure from the 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. shift opened the door for his full-time schedule on the station. She sounded wistful even as she was embarking on her long-sought televislon comedy show.

"I miss you," she said.

And between shifts, so do thousands of his "minions" across 14 states. But that's the magic of the mystery man: "llttle old Mr. KFI and his 50,000-watt microphone."



King of Confidence Confesses

As a rule, Rush Limbaugh avoids interviews, but for the first annual Museum of Television & Radio Festival Oct. 25, he made an exception.

"Remember, it's always 'no,' first," he said. "Then I'll think about it."

Perhaps because he was among his peers, he let down his defenses a bit. In spite of his reputation for self-affirming bombast on the air, Limbaugh revealed some of his insecurities to the group of radio industry pros.

"I go in every day and think I have to prove myself," he admitted.

Although he's acclaimed as the highest rated national talk show in the country and heard on 666 affiliates, the star of the Excellence in Broadcasting Network can't ignore those liberals and leftists who openly despise him.

"It's tough to go home and say [to my wife], 'Honey, half the people hate my guts — I feel great,' " he told the audience of 200. "Nobody ever hated me. I was totally amazed. I was devastated."

When the president of The Museum of TV & Radio, Robert Batscha, asked the star of the two-week festival to define his show, he replied, "When you try to figure out what you do, you tend to become a caricature of yourself."

But the guest of honor offered his analysis of his immediate superstardom.

"Finally, there's someone who didn't make fun of them," he explained. "Here's someone saving what they thought."

He believes the second key to success was his combination of "irreverence and seriousness," which he said was a new concept in talk when he entered the arena.

The man who discovered Rush and made him into today's nationwide phenomenon, Ed McLaughlin, credits the conservative gadily with creating the first successful nationwide political talk show. When he first heard his local show in Sacramento, the radio businessman knew he had struck gold.

"He truly transcended what you had to do with a national show," McLaughlin reflected. "That's how he skewed his program; it was what interested him. It was not a local show. I wanted him in daytime."

Although the former ABC Radio Network president had plenty of contacts in the business, McLaughlin had

difficulty selling Limbaugh's show as a daytime program. Most stations preferred to put on national talk shows, such as Bruce Williams, at night or during the weekends.

"I was turned down by every major station I pitched," McLaughlin recalled. "When we started, no one was giving a national voice to conservatism on talk radio."

However, Limbaugh insisted that his career ambition, rather than politics, drove him.

"I didn't come to New York to be a political force: I came to be a broadcaster," he told the audience. "I had no agenda, but to be the most listened-to talk show in America."

McLaughlin granted his wish.

Limbaugh's boss insisted that the man whom many believe played a major role in bringing the Republicans to power in the last congressional elections is a genuine conservative and not an opportunist.

Only a few of the other radio professionals disagreed with McLaughlin. Both liberal and conservative New York radio hot shots heaped credit on the broadcasting icon.

Political Republican consultant and syndicated talk host Jay Severin, who is heard on KCKC AM 1350, lauded Limbaugh as "the Michael Jordan of radio."

"He was in the right place at the right time," noted WABC-AM's Lynn Samuels, one of New York radio's few liberal and female — talk hosts who spoke at the festival. She also noted that "Rush wannabes" have imitated him by flying solo, without guests.

Another festival panelist, Ed Koch, the former New York mayor-turned-talk host, emphasized that although Limbaugh is more about entertainment than politics, he has had an impact on the political thinking of his listeners.

Veteran syndicated host Barry Farber of Major Networks called Limbaugh "the volcano that illuminated the sky— like the toppling of Stalin."

But the object of their awe maintains that his monumental celebrity status does not faze him.

"You're not going to believe it: I'm not energized by it." he told the audience. "I stay away from photographers."



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KNX Spans 7 Decades of Los Angeles Radio History

From its humble beginnings as a fivewatt radio station operating out of a back bedroom of a private home in Hollywood to today's 50.000-watt clear channel powerhouse, the oldest radio station in LIA. celebrated 75 years of broadcasting.

KNX was born in the home of radio amateur Fred Christlan, an ex-Marconi man and shipboard wireless operator 1919.

"At the time when I had KNX [1920-'24], the general trend of thought was that news was just a novelty that would run its course and fade away." Christian said. "However, I felt differently about it."

The Department of Commerce assigned Christian the call letters 6ADZ. On Sept. 10, 1920, he broadcast his first program of recorded music, using phonograph records lent to him by record stores in exchange for an on-air mention. Radio advertising as we know it did not exist.

By day, the pioneer broadcaster was manager of the Electrical Lighting and Power Company, which sold radio parts used to build receivers. Commercial, preassembled radios weren't available until 1923. Christian's only earnings from the endless hours of transmitter design and operation of the station was through the sale of parts.

In 1923, Christian was licensed to broadcast on 833 KC with the call letters KGC under a new Commerce Department classification for radio stations engaged in broadcasting entertainment.

By 1922, he was broadcasting live from the California Theatre in downtown Los Angeles, using his new call letters, KNX. The following year, the station upgraded its power with a 500-watt transmitter and brought the music of Carli Elinor's 60-piece orchestra into the homes of Southland radio fans.

Christian sold the station to Guy Earle, owner of the Los Angeles Evening Express newspaper. In 1924, KNX broadcast from the Hoffman Building at Hollywood Boulevard and Gower. In 1929 the station's power was raised to 5,000 watts and three years later was sold again to Western Broadcasting, which operated KNX with 10,000 watts from studios at Vine and Selma. By 1934 the station, housed at 5939 Sunset Boulevard (now The Old Spaghetti Factory restaurant),

broadcast with 50,000 watts, the maximum power allowed for U.S. AM stations.

In 1936, broadcast entrepreneur William S. Paley purchased the station for his rapidly growing Columbia Broadcasting System. KNX soon became the network's West Coast nerve center.

The popular "Lux Radio Theatre" program originated from CBS' Vine Street Playhouse (now the Doolittle Theatre). "The Screen Actors Guild Show" was broadcast from Earl Carroll's Theatre (now the Aquarius). "Big Town," "The Paul Whiteman Show" and "Silver Theatre" were broadcast from the Wilshire Ebell Theatre.

In 1938, KNX opened its present facility at 6121 Sunset Boulevard, which was designed by the distinguished American architect William Lescase. The building at "Columbia Square" still houses a firstrate radio theatre now modified for videotape storage and for KCBS-TV's use as a studio.

In its heyday, the most popular CBS Radio Network programs included "Irma," "Carnation Hour," "Lucky Strike Hit Parade" and "The Saint."

Before the Golden Age of network radio came to an end in the mid-'50s, KNX was also the source of popular local programs.

"My time at KNX was my happiest radio time," recalled Bill Ballance, whose late night "Ballance of the Night" show

was a magnet for Hollywood celebrities in the early '50s. "It was more damn fun. I had Sammy Davis, Jr. on in one of his first local appearances in 1954. I had a live audience and he really brought them to their feet with his impersonations. It was before the big stars canceled their radio shows and went to TV."

KNX tried different combinations of entertainment, talk and news before committing to the all-news format in 1968. Its affiliation with one of America's premiere news organizations elevated KNX to the role of a trusted source of news and information for Southern Californians.

In the troubled decade of the '90s, KNX's local news staff has reported on earthquakes, riots, devastating fires as well as gavel-to-gavel coverage of the "trial of the century" from the county courthouse in downtown L.A. And KNX, still the network's West Coast center, broadcasts the 5 p.m. (PST) CBS newscast to the nation.

KKGO's Music Maestro Marks 50 Years of Bringing Mozart (and others) to the Masses

It's true: Tom Dixson has lived radio — nearly 50 years of it. As the host of "Evening Concert" on KKGO-FM, Dixson is the grand old man of L.A. radio, with an intelligent and commanding vocal presence.

he 80-year-old announcer celebrated his birthday in September: and Dixson reminisced about the "lucky accident" that introduced him to the

radio world: Through a friend, Dixson "stumbled into radio." He described his first job at KHJ as his "lucky accident."

The eager apprentice gained a solid grounding in the radio business.

"I was a file clerk; I made sound effects for radio plays; I also picked out music to separate acts in the dramas," he recalled. "I learned so much those early days."

Once he became an on-air announcer he was called upon to emcee dance recitals, big band performances and even some early TV shows.



ixson enjoyed his "freelance" work and never thought about settling down to a steady gig. In 1946, he joined the

announcing staff at classical music station KFAC-FM. Dixson expected the job to last only a few months, but he loved the work and ended up staying for 41 years. He particularly enjoyed broadcasting live from the L.A. Philharmonic the very place he heard his first concert as a boy with his father.

KFAC-FM was sold in 1989 and became KKBT (the Beat). After a brief spell at KUSC, the veteran announcer settled down at KKGO-FM.

While he loves all forms of classical music and is an advocate of programming new artists as well as old composers, Dixson is a self-proclaimed "Mozart addict."

"I love the form — the graceful melodic feel to his work," the music expert enthused. "Mozart always composed joy — joy to be had no matter what the circumstance. I hear Mozart, and I realize that life is an adventure waiting for us."

Dixson was only 9 when he heard his first concert — Handel's "Messiah" at the L.A. Philharmonic.

Throughout his childhood in "rural" Brentwood. Dixson attended many concerts and recitals in Los Angeles, all feeding his appetite for classical music.

"People think I've formally studied music, but it's all been self-taught," Dixson explained. "To me, music was my own discovery — it still is fun and wonderful."

Dixson, who once aspired to be an actor, finds a certain kind of escape in the aural universe created by the great masters.

"Classical music reminds me of a quote from Sir Thomas Beacon: 'Great music releases one from the tyranny of conscious thought.' That's so true. Great composers take us places we never imagined."
