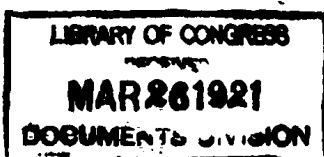

MISCELLANEOUS.

CHANGE IN THE METHOD OF LICENSING COMMERCIAL RADIO OPERATORS AS APPROVED BY HON. J. W. ALEXANDER, SECRETARY OF COMMERCE, FEBRUARY 12, 1921.

Licenses to radio operators after June 30, 1921, will certify to—first, efficiency in radio communication (class); second, duration and quality of service (grade).

## EFFICIENCY.

The standards of efficiency established by international conventions are as follows:

*First class (Article X, Radio Convention 1912).*—(a) Adjustment of the apparatus and knowledge of its functioning.

(b) Transmission and acoustic reception at the rate of not less than 20 words a minute.

(c) Knowledge of the regulations governing the exchange of radio correspondence.

*Second class (Article X, Radio Convention, 1912).*—Ability to transmit and receive at a rate of only 12 to 19 words a minute but who, in other respects, fulfill the requirements mentioned above.

*Watchers' class (Article XXXV, Safety at Sea Convention, 1914).*—Ability to receive and understand the radiotelegraph distress signal and the safety signal.

*Extra first class.*—In addition to these the Department of Commerce will continue the issue of licenses certifying to—

(a) Adjustment of the apparatus and knowledge of its functioning.

(b) Transmission and acoustic reception at the rate of not less than 30 words per minute, Continental Morse, and 25 words per minute, American Morse (five letters to the word).

(c) Knowledge of the regulations governing the exchange of radio correspondence which will be designated commercial extra first class.

## SERVICE.

Hitherto the duration and quality of service has been shown by the indorsements on the license of the operator. These indorsements will be made as heretofore, and license of the several classes above enumerated will be graded also as follows:

*Third grade.*—Less than 6 months satisfactory commercial service and a speed of 12 words a minute.

*Second grade.*—Six months or more satisfactory commercial service in the third grade and a speed of 20 words a minute.

*First grade.*—A year or more satisfactory commercial service in the second grade and a speed of 25 words a minute.

Satisfactory service as an operator in any branch of the Federal service shall be deemed equivalent to like commercial service.

## OUTSTANDING LICENSES.

Outstanding licenses will be valid until they expire when the renewal will show the grade to which the operator is entitled.

## CHANGE IN RATES FOR BELGIAN CONGO.

The charges in part 3 of the nomenclature, applicable to radiotelegrams originating in or intended for Belgian Congo and exchanged directly with the coast stations of that country, have been modified as follows:

## CHANGE IN RATES FOR DUTCH EAST INDIES.

The coast stations of Balikpapan and Tarakan radio are now open to general public service.

Beginning February 1, the charge for radiotelegraphic coast stations in the Dutch East Indies, with the exception of Soerabaja, is 0.80 franc per word, with a minimum charge of 8 francs per radiotelegram.

Finally, the table of inland charges of the Dutch East Indies figuring in part 3 of the nomenclature is to be completed in the following manner:

## CHANGE IN RATES FOR ITALY.

Beginning February 1, the charge of the Italian radiotelegraphic coast stations is raised from 0 franc 30 per word to 0 franc 60 per word.

Beginning the same date, the charges indicated in part 3 of the nomenclature, applicable to the ordinary radiotelegrams originating at or intended for Italy and exchanged directly with the coast stations of Italy are as follows:

*Ordinary radiotelegrams.*—0 franc 25 per word, with a minimum charge per radiotelegram of 2 francs.

*Urgent radiotelegrams.*—0 franc 75 per word, with a minimum charge of 6 francs per radiotelegram.

## SPECIAL CALL SIGNALS.

The call signal KSBV has been assigned as a general call for all United States Shipping Board vessels, and call signal KSOC has been assigned as a general call for all vessels owned by the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey.

## OPERATORS REQUESTED TO REPORT WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The cooperation of naval and merchant vessels is requested in furnishing certain information in regard to weather conditions in the vicinity of the United States naval air station, Coco Solo, Panama, Canal Zone, which information is desired for the protection of aviators flying from that station, especially in view of the many long-distance flights undertaken in that vicinity.

With this purpose in view it is requested that every vessel within radio touch of either "Radio Colon" or "Radio Balboa" will forward

via either one of the foregoing radio stations, to "Radio Coco Solo," at 7 a. m. and 4 p. m., seventy-fifth meridian mean time, her position (latitude and longitude), local barometric pressure, local temperature, local wind velocity and direction, state of sea, and kind and quantity of clouds.—From *Hydrographic Bulletin*, Feb. 2, 1921.

#### CAPE MAY RADIO (COMPASS) STATION RELOCATED.

The United States radio compass station at Cape May, N. J., will be relocated in latitude  $38^{\circ} 56'$  N., longitude  $74^{\circ} 54' 34''$  W., and bearings will be transmitted from this new location beginning March 1, this year.—From *Hydrographic Bulletin*, Feb. 16, 1921.

#### INTERNATIONAL ICE OBSERVATION AND ICE PATROL SERVICE.

For the purpose of carrying on the International Ice Observation and Ice Patrol Service provided for by the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, London, 1913-14, the U. S. Coast Guard cutter *Seneca* has been detailed for this service and will leave New York about February 15, proceeding to the Grand Banks of Newfoundland to locate the ice fields and positions of the icebergs; keeping in touch with the situation; making such observations as practicable on the quantities of ice, its kind, extent, and drift; and obtain any other information that may seem to be of value.

The object of the patrol is primarily to ascertain the location and progressive movement of the limiting lines of the regions in which icebergs and field ice exist in the vicinity of the Grand Banks of Newfoundland and the dissemination of the information so ascertained for the guidance and warning of navigators, and coordinately with these primary duties, in making oceanographical and meteorological observations as will form a contribution toward the knowledge of the causes why the limiting lines assume their observed locations.

During the period of ice observations the *Seneca* will be the only vessel employed on this duty, but when the ice has moved southward so as to make a constant patrol necessary, an additional vessel will be detailed for that purpose. The experience of previous years has shown that a continuous ice patrol should be established about April 1 and should continue throughout the season of dangerous ice conditions.

Upon getting in touch with the ice the *Seneca* will send a report daily to the Branch Hydrographic Office, New York City, at 4 a. m., seventy-fifth meridian time, addressed "Hydrographic, New York." An endeavor will be made to communicate the message direct to coast radio stations. If unable to communicate with any of these stations the message will be relayed through any vessel within reach.

The ice information will be given in as plain and concise English as practicable, and will state the following:

- (a) Ice (berg or field).
- (b) Date.
- (c) Time (seventy-fifth meridian).
- (d) Latitude.
- (e) Longitude.
- (f) Other data as may be necessary.

While on this duty the patrol vessel will endeavor by means of daily radio messages to keep ships at sea advised of the limits of the ice fields, etc.

The *Seneca's* radio call letters are NRE. She will use a wave of 600 meters when communicating with passing vessels.

The radio messages from the patrol ships will be given publicity immediately upon their receipt by the Branch Hydrographic Office, New York, and by the Hydrographic Office, Washington, D. C.—From *Hydrographic Bulletin*, Feb. 16, 1921.

## FADING TESTS DISCONTINUED.

The fading tests conducted by the Bureau of Standards having been completed, the special wave lengths assigned to amateur stations engaged in the test are withdrawn and their use must be discontinued.

## OPERATOR'S LICENSE SUSPENDED.

First-grade license, No. 15588, issued at Norfolk, Va., September 26, 1919, has been suspended for a period of three months on account of the holder of the license violating Article VI of the International Convention, in that he caused superfluous signals to be transmitted.
