Corporate News

Storer Broadcasting Company reported a record-breaking 1964 second quarter. Gross revenues increased to \$11,192,173 in the second quarter of 1964 from \$10,147,147 for the similar period in 1963. Net income for the 1964 period increased to \$1,990,433 or \$.98.6 per share, from \$1,304,437, or \$.61.3 per share. The 1963 figure included a non-recurring loss of \$256,247 on disposal of assets.

Revenues for the first six months of 1964 were \$21,430,-332, up from \$19,917,858. Earnings increased to \$3,585,213, or \$1.78 per share, in 1964 from \$2,931,654, or \$1.28 per share, in 1963.

George B. Storer, Jr., President, said gross revenues were up 10.3% for the second quarter of 1964 and up 7.6% for the first six months of the year over the similar 1963 periods. He noted that first quarter revenues were inflated because of newspaper strikes in New York and Cleveland, two of the Company's largest operating areas. Storer revealed that second quarter television revenues increased 10.5% and radio revenues increased 9.5%. He attributed much of the radio stations' increases to the fine showing now being made by the Company's New York station, WHN, which was purchased in 1961 for a record \$11,000,000 price.

Mr. Storer said that the increases in television were due to the continuing growth trend of the industry, particularly in the larger markets.

The Board of Directors of Storer Broadcasting Company voted to increase the quarterly dividend to fifty cents per share on its Common Stock and twenty-five cents per share on its Class "B" Common Stock. The quarterly dividend is payable on September 9, 1964 to stockholders of record as of August 21, 1964. Previous quarterly dividends were forty-five cents and twelve and one-half cents per share, respectively.

The declaration marks the forty-third consecutive quarterly dividend paid on the stock since it went public in November, 1953. Since July, 1955 the Storer Broadcasting Company Common Stock has been listed on the New York Stock Exchange. Class "B" Common Stock is not listed.

The Board Action also marks the 188th dividend payment made on Storer stock since it was first issued in 1930. The Company was founded in 1927.

In Memoriam

Storer Broadcasting Company has been deeply saddened by the deaths of two long-time employees—Gayle V. Grubb and Carolyn E. Groves.

Gayle V. Grubb served the Company as a Special Representative in San Francisco, California. He first entered broadcasting in 1924 with station KFAB, Lincoln, Nebraska, following his graduation from Nebraska University. Four years later he joined WKY, Oklahoma City, as General Manager. In 1945 he moved to ABC as General Manager of KGO, San Francisco, and in 1949 became head of KGO-TV when it went on the air.

In 1953, he joined Storer Broadcasting as Vice President and General Manager of WJBK-TV. He returned to San Francisco in 1956 to head up the Storer TV Sales office.

He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Ben Clark of Los Angeles, and a son, Gene Grubb of Denver.

Carolyn E. Groves, Chief Accountant for Storer Broadcasting Company, was employed as a bookkeeper and office manager in 1945 when the forerunner of

Storer Broadcasting, the Fort Industry Company, moved the accounting department from Detroit to Toledo.

During the first months on her new job, Mrs. Groves kept the books for WHIZ and WAGA. Later she took over the Home Office payroll and top company financial statements. She was with Storer's first television station, WSPD-TV, when it went on the air. Mrs. Groves was made Chief Accountant in 1951, and moved to the Miami Home Office in the spring of 1954.

She was married to Edward L. Groves in 1961. She is survived by her husband, a daughter, Mrs. E. George Curdes, Jr. of Toledo; a step-son, Edward L. Groves, Jr., of Miami; two grand-daughters and a grandson.



The burning question for some 12,000 Brooklyn residents and their families received support from WHN-Radio via the station's broadcast of a special program in the series DOCUMENTARY 1050 titled "Will They Scuttle the Brooklyn Navy Yard?"

Senators Jacob Javits and Kenneth Keating, along with Brooklyn Borough President Abe Stark, plus a group of workers at the Navy Yard who are members of the Brooklyn Metal Trades Council, were heard.

Members of the Brooklyn Metal Trades Council printed and passed out over 100,000 handbills publicizing the show and two of Brooklyn's largest department stores used newspaper ads to urge the public to listen.

The program received an enthusiastic response, and as a result, WHN repeated the half-hour program.

Drawings of Presidents Garfield and Lincoln never before seen on television were featured in the WJBK-TV special, "Portrait of the Assassins."

The half-hour program was written, produced and



directed by WJBK-TV Director Dick Dietrich. Dietrich's research turned up intimate and seldom-told details in the assassinations of Presidents Lincoln, Garfield, McKinley and Kennedy. The program actually painted personal portraits of assassins Booth, Guiteau and Czolgosz through the use of rare drawings and photographs. Film and videotape of the Kennedy assassination

were vital segments of "Portrait of the Assassins."

The WJW-TV-CBS Press Room maintained an "open door" policy practically twenty-four hours a day during the 1964 Governors' Conference. All types walked in to say hello; including a governor that nobody recognized, various newspaper and media people and governors' aides and families.

At one point, during a lively discussion of Pennsylvania Governor William S. Scranton's qualifications and actions, a lovely shoeless lady walked into the suite asking if she could use a phone. She was politely told that as soon as the phone was free, she was welcome to use it. Meanwhile, the Scranton discussion continued. However, it immediately ceased when the visitor was overheard to say on the phone, "Hello, this is Mrs. Scranton. May I speak to the Governor? I am locked out of my room."

The embarrassed newsmen quickly apologized and the gracious lady said that she had not overheard a thing. It seems all the Scrantons are politicians.

WJW-TV's Joel Daly was on hand to cover the 1964 Republican Convention in San Francisco. In addition to the vast coverage of the Convention by CBS, Mr. Daly's film and telephone reports supplemented a local touch to the excitement for WJW-TV viewers.

Throughout the summer season, WSPD-Radio is carrying name bands direct from Cedar Point at Sandusky, Ohio. Each Saturday night WSPD-Radio broadcasts such famous bands as Buddy Morrow, Glenn Miller, Sy Zentner, Jimmy Dorsey, Count Basie, Ralph Marterie and Skitch Henderson.

At the request of Michigan Governor George Romney, WJBK-TV produced a half-hour special program entitled, "Michigan Massacre." The program dealt with the alarming rise of traffic deaths in the state of Michigan, and was used to kick off a traffic safety campaign.

The realistic and shocking special contained film shot at the actual scene of fatal accidents. It clearly showed the aftermath of high-speed collisions . . . the wrecked vehicles, the dead and the badly injured.

Response to the program was overwhelming, and the station subsequently made prints of the show available for private showings throughout the state of Michigan.

WSPD-TV recorded another "first" in Northwestern Ohio when it presented "Cancer and Women." Channel 13 journeyed to hospitals, laboratories, and private homes incorporating the use of the new portable machtronic tape recorder and the cameras in an effort to obtain an in-depth report on this vital subject.

The program, narrated by Frank Venner and David Drury, showed dramatically how a simple, completely painless test used to detect uterine cancer has brought the disease to the point where it is virtually 100 per cent curable. The famed "Pap Test" has developed the prospect for complete recovery whereas a few short years ago the diagnosis was generally filled with despair.

WJW-TV's "Goulardi" has recently returned from a trip to California where he filmed a segment of CBS-TV's Gunsmoke which stars Jim Arness. "Goulardi," played by Ernie Anderson, will be seen in a character role on the program which is to be telecast early this fall.



WHN-Radio has launched a new late night sports program, "Marv Albert's Sports Report." Host of the show is Marv Albert who, at 22, is the youngest full-fledged sportscaster on any major New York radio station.

Mr. Albert's "Sports Report" spotlights the latest sports news, along with interviews of the day's sports headliners.

At 19, WHN's young sports voice was already

calling play-by-play for International League ball games over Mutual Broadcasting System's WFBL in Syracuse. At the age of 20 he broadcast Knickerbocker Basketball and Ranger Hockey from Madison Square Garden.

WAGA-TV newsman Vic Lambert has been invited to make a two-week tour of U. S. and NATO defense installations in Western Europe. The trip, at the invitation of the National Guard, will take Lambert to Germany, France and Italy. He will send back special filmed reports, to be aired on Channel 5 newscasts, of the Air National Guard's "Operation Ready-Go." Airmen from 22 states will take part in this operation and Air Guard personnel from Georgia will play a vital role in the exercise. For the Guardsmen, the European deployment will be their annual two-week field training. Purpose of the exercise is to demonstrate the Air Guards' capability to move anywhere in the world in a matter of hours. Lambert is one of two radio and television reporters from Georgia invited to cover the exercise.

Mr. Lipson stated further, "Beautiful Music on AM and FM, together with the award-winning WJBK news organization, will be immensely more productive in the Detroit market for advertisers and the Station. The response we have had from influential members of the community makes all of us proud to introduce the new WJBK."

WJBK went on the air in 1925 and became a Storer Station in 1947.

The new programming will not result in major staff changes, which, Mr. Lipson indicated, was an important factor in their planning. Morning man Marc Avery, long established Clark Reid, Bob Lee, Alan Thayer and Bob Layne will continue to serve WJBK-Radio listeners. The news staff will be augmented under News Director Bob King.




