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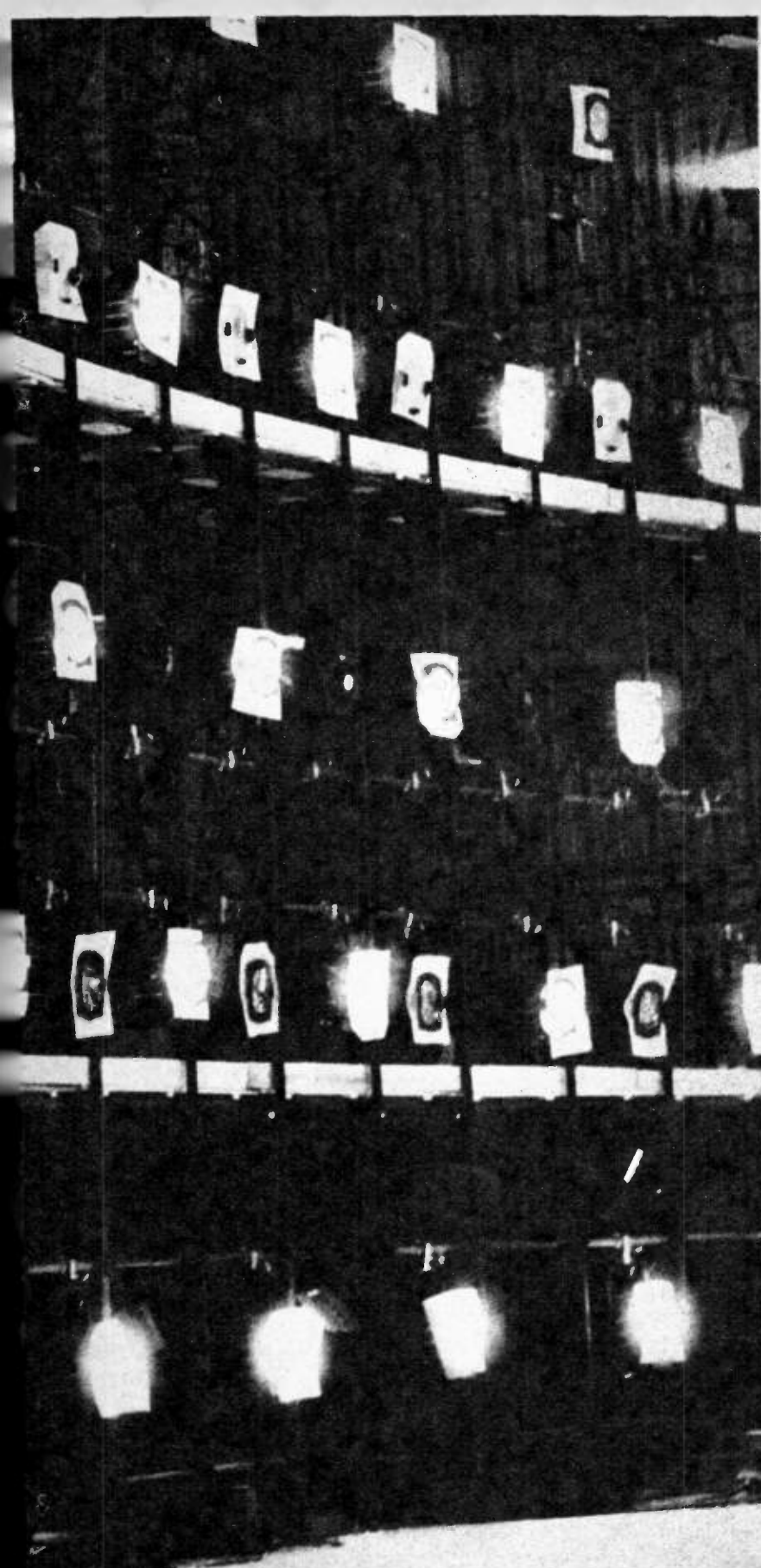

FRANK SINATRA, the undisputed King of the entertainment world and of the TV specials, is also a top-notch dramatic actor. No one, of course, took Frank seriously as an actor until he won his 1953 Oscar for a supporting role as Maggio in "From Here to Eternity." Before that he was a bobby-sox idol on the skids. After that he zoomed to unprecedented heights. A multimillionaire businessman, he also wears the hats of director, producer, owner of Reprise Records and numerous other enterprises. Frank was born in Hoboken, N.J., on Dec. 2, 1915. He started as a newspaper man, turned crooner, signed up with the Harry James and Tommy Dorsey Bands and made it as a single. Movies first got him with "Higher and Higher" in 1943. Frank wed Nancy Barbato in 1939. They had three children, Frank Jr., now 23, Nancy, 27, Christine, 18, and were divorced in 1951. In Nov., '51, he wed Ava Gardner. They were divorced in 1957. Frank wed Mia Farrow July, 1966. They separated in Nov., 1967. Frank's CBS Special this year will be "Francis Albert Sinatra Does His Own Thing."



■ What kind of year will it be on TV? A year like every other year—as far as regular evening programming is concerned. There will be the usual run of the mill situation comedies: "The Doris Day Show," "Blondie," "Mayberry RFD," "The Good Guys" on CBS; "Julia" on NBC; "The Ugliest Girl In Town" and "That's Life" on ABC. More action and adventure (with violence hopefully toned down): "Hawaii Five-O" on CBS, "The Outsider" and "Name of the Game" on NBC; "Mod Squad" and "Here Come the Brides" on ABC. NBC's "Ghost and Mrs. Muir" and ABC's "Land of the Giant" provide a bit of fantasy. ABC's "The Outcasts" and "Lancer" are the lone westerns. NBC's "Phyllis Diller Show" adds a bit of variety and only "The Don Rickles Show" on ABC promises to be a bit different. But to make up the dearth of originality the networks are going all out with specials and there will be over two hundred including entertainment, culture-oriented specs, informal and sports events. Here's what CBS promises: Sept. 11, "From Chekhov with Love" . . . Sept. 15, "Barbra Streisand: A Happening in Central Park" . . . Sept. 22, "Vladimir Horowitz at Carnegie Hall" . . . Oct. 23, "America's Wonderland—The National Parks" . . . Oct. 24, "It's a Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown" . . . Oct. 24, "Girl Friends and Nabors," starring Jim Nabors with guest stars . . . Nov. 25, "Francis Albert Sinatra Does His Own Thing" . . . Dec. 1, "Ann-Margret & the Men in Her Life" . . . Dec. 3, "Second National Geographic Special" . . . Dec. 8, "A Charlie Brown Christmas" . . . Dec. 20, "The Nutcracker" . . . Dec. 22, "Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas" . . . Dec. 25, "New York Philharmonic Young People's Concert" (first of four) . . . Jan. 22, "The Enchanted Isles" . . . Feb. 18, "Third National Geographic Special" . . . Feb. 20, "He's Your Dog, Charlie Brown" . . . Feb. 20, "Andy Griffith Special" . . . April 13, "Charlie Brown's All Stars" . . . Apr. 14, "Fourth Nat'l Geographic Special" . . . June 9, "You Are In Love, Charlie Brown." Also in the group: Four CBS Playhouse Specials: "The Royal Shakespeare Co.," "Danny Thomas Special" and "Dick Van Dyke Special" among others. Impressed? ANDY WILLIAMS began his career as part of a quartet—the other three members being his three older brothers. The boys, known as The Williams Brothers, toured clubs and theatres in the U.S. and abroad for 6 years but, when the act broke up in 1952, Andy went out on his own and soon snagged a job on Steve Allen's old "Tonight" TV show. He was promoted to his own show in 1958 and, since then, has won numerous awards including the Emmy. A native of Wall Lake, Iowa, the handsome singer wed French actress Claudine Longet on Dec. 15, 1961, and is the proud pop of a daughter, Noelle, 4½; and a son Christian Jay, 3½.

PERRY COMO's easy, effortless style of singing and performing has a hypnotic influence on TV viewers—a continuous one, too, as year-after-year ratings of his specials show. Born in Cannonsburg, Penna., May 18, 1912, he was a barber at 15, then sang with a local band, made Ted Weems' orchestra as vocalist in 1936. Records for RCA Victor, then movies, added to earlier night club fame, made him hot and his former weekly TV show made him a super-star. A constant male vocalist award winner, he keeps his wife, the former Roselle Bellini and children, Ronnie, 28, David, 21 and Terri, out of the spotlight.



BARBRA STREISAND was a recording star at 19, a Broadway star at 21 and is now considered one of the entertainment world's all time greats. Born April 24, 1942, in Brooklyn, N.Y., she won a talent audition shortly after graduating from high school and was signed to sing at the Bon Soir in Greenwich Village. From there it was a short hop to B'way's "I Can Get It For You Wholesale" and she hit the top with "Funny Girl," which she is now repeating in films. Barb's married to actor Elliott Gould and has a son, Jason Emanuel.



SPECIALS '68'69

BOB HOPE had a Congressional Medal of Honor awarded him and proved once again he deserved it in Viet Nam the past few Christmases. Born in Eltham, England, Leslie Towne Hope grew up in Cleveland, started his career in vaudeville and made it to Broadway in "Roberta" and "Red Hot and Blue." Paramount got him for "The Big Broadcast of 1938" and he did double duty as the star of his own radio show, later switching to TV. Bob wed Dolores Reade in 1932, and between 1940-1946 they adopted Linda, Tony, Nora and Kelly. Bob's 64 years old, and will be seen in a series of specials this season.



NBC's list of specials is equally impressive. Although they haven't set exact dates, here is what you can expect to be seeing in the months ahead: September and October: "Johnny Carson Discovers Cypress Gardens," Two "Bob Hope Specials," "The Brigitte Bardot Special," "The Mitzi Gaynor Special," the "Bing Crosby Specials," Prudential's "On Stage," "Miss America," "Fabulous Shorts, Barbar," "Campaign and the Candidates," "Urban Crisis," "Dr. Ginott—Between Parent and Child." November: Two "Bob Hope Specials," "Tennessee Ernie Ford Special," "Jack Benny Special, The Cowsills," "The Monkees Special," "Hallmark Hall of Fame," "Heidi," "The Mouse on The Mayflower." December: "Bob Hope Special," "Elvis Presley Special," "The Supremes," "Peggy Fleming," "Andy Williams Christmas Show," "Perry Como Christmas Show," "Pinocchio," "The Hallmark Hall of Fame," "Rudolph The Red-Nosed Reindeer," "The Little Drummer Boy," "Bell Telephone Hour Christmas Special." January through March: Repeat of "The Fred Astaire Show," three "Bob Hope Specials," "Andy Williams Special," "The Alan King Special," "The Jack Paar Special," "The Bill Cosby Special," "Experiment in Television," "Children's Letters To God." A repeat of the classic film, "The Wizard of Oz," "Lions Are Free," "Children's Theater," "Bill Cosby's Animated Special," "Ice Capades," "Barnum & Bailey Circus," "The Rose Bowl Parade," "Fabulous Fashions," "Project XX," and two additional dramas on "The Hallmark Hall of Fame" as well as two more Prudential "On Stage" original drama specials.

ABC may have fewer specials than either CBS or NBC, but they certainly have the longest and most prestigious one of all. ABC will devote 44 hours to the exclusive coverage of the "Summer Olympics" from Mexico City from October 12-27. Jim McKay and Chris Schenkel share the announcing honors. On Sept. 8, ABC officially tees off the new season of specials with "Around The World of Mike Todd" narrated by Elizabeth Taylor and Orson Welles. No dates have been set for their other specials which include: "Hemingway's Spain," "Sophia Loren," "Rachel Carson's Sense of Wonder" with Helen Hayes, "The Lennon Sisters' Special," "Gettysburg," "The Secret of Michaelangelo," two "Carol Channing Specials," "Christ Is Born," "Endless Summer," "A Guide to The Swinging Bachelor" with Joey Bishop, Dean Jones and Noel Harrison, "The Tom Jones Special." And for drama there's "Miriam" starring Mildred Natwick, "Thanksgiving Visitor" with Geraldine Page, "Silent Night" starring James Mason & Kirk Douglas and "Arsenic and Old Lace" with an all-star cast.



MITZI GAYNOR, who has been concentrating on nightclub work lately, came to TV for her own special last season and was quickly signed for another. Mrs. Jack Bean was born in Chicago, Ill., on Sept. 4, 1931, and was a teenage dancer with the Los Angeles Light Opera Company when a scout for 20th signed her for her film debut in 1950's "My Blue Heaven." She worked steadily after that, but it was really "South Pacific" which showed off her talents.

DICK VAN DYKE was born in West Plains, Mo., on Dec. 13, 1925. Briefly in advertising, Dick formed a comedy-pantomime act, "The Merry Mutes," in 1947 and toured the nightclub circuit for six years. From '53 to '56 he did TV in the South, then network TV out of N.Y. This led to guest shots on big-time TV, Broadway and his own TV show. Now he's doing specials and major movies.



THE LENNON SISTERS, Dianne, Peggy, Kathy and Janet signed for a series of ABC specials this year. Discovered by Larry Welk, Jr., they made their first appearance on Christmas Eve, 1955. A month later they were signed as regular members of the Welk show. Dianne left the group to be married in October, 1960, and rejoined her sisters in the fall of '64. Peggy became the wife of bandman Dick Cathcart in May, 1964, and on March 17, 1965, added little Julianne to the growing roster of children of the family. Chris was born Feb. 27, 1966 and Joseph on June 29, 1967 and Michael, 1968. Dianne and her husband, Dick Gass, are parents of two little girls, Mary and Dianne and a son Thomas. Janet wed Lee Bernhardt in May 1966, had a son, William, on June 29th, 1967. Kathy became the bride of Mahlon Clark in June, 1967. All are Californians. Dianne was born on Dec. 1, 1939, was 28 April 8; Kathy celebrated her 26th birthday Aug. 22, and Janet was born June 15, 1946.

NEW ON NB

the beautiful phyllis diller show

PHYLLIS DILLER, who is back on TV with her new comedy-variety hour on Sunday night, rose to fame via her guestings on the old Jack Paar show. She was quickly signed to cafe appearances and suddenly the former housewife and mom of five found herself a star. Born in Lima, Ohio, on July 17, 1917, Phyllis "wowed them in the laundromat and PTA," before making a cafe debut in San Francisco's Purple Onion in 1955. Most of her humor centered around her husband "Fana" (Sherwood Diller), but on Sept. 3, 1965, she decided that 26 years with him was no laughing matter. The divorce was quickly followed by a wedding and separation and reconciliation with actor-singer Warde Donovan. Phyllis had a previous series, "Pruitts of Southampton," has done several pix including "The Adding Machine."



NEW ON NBC



ROBERT STACK, born in Los Angeles on Jan. 13, 1919, spent so many of his early years abroad he couldn't speak English until he was in his teens. Bob went dramatic in high school, then made a series of "firsts": he gave Deanna Durbin her first kiss in his first film, 1939's "First Love." Bob gave up his bachelor status to wed Rosemarie Bowe in 1956. They have 2 children, Charles, and Elizabeth. Bob of course is still internationally famous via re-runs of "The Untouchables."

ANTHONY FRANCIOSA was plucked from an acting class by Shelley Winters and cast as her leading man in "Hatful of Rain" on B'way. He went to H'wood in 1957 to duplicate the role and stayed to make such films as "A Face In The Crowd," "Rio Concho." Born Oct. 25, 1928, in NYC, he's a new dad, has been wed 3 times and divorced (once from Shelley). His most recent ex-wife is Judy Balaban. Tony's also remembered from his first TV series, "Valentine's Day."

GENE BARRY who rode to the heights of popularity as TV's Bat Masterson and later scored in "Burke's Law" is a product of N.Y.C. (June 14, 1921). An all-around entertainer, he began as a band singer and quickly graduated to stage roles. In 1949, while appearing off-B'way in "Idiot's Delight," he won the Critics' Award for the "best performance by an actor." He launched his H'wood career in 1951, has been married 24 years to Betty Kolb and is the dad of two.



SUSAN ST. JAMES was a top model, when she was signed to a long term Universal contract without any previous acting experience. But that came when the studio cast her in their TV movie "Fame Is The Name Of The Game" and several movies and television shows in a row. Now she's a series star. Susan was born in Los Angeles June 17, and when her family moved to Rockford, Ill., she was educated at Sacred Heart Academy For Girls. She's 5'8", weighs 115 lbs. and is a hip chick.

MARTY MILNER, who stars in this new NBC series is a screen veteran. He had made several dozen movies before "Private Lives of Adam and Eve" brought him stardom, and has appeared in over 150 TV shows including the popular "Route 66." Marty was born in Detroit, Mich., naturally became interested in movies because his dad was a film distributor, started acting at age 10. He married Judy Jones, TV actress and singer in 1957. They have 2 children.

KENT McCORD who co-stars as Officer Jim Reed was assigned to play football on Rick Nelson's team in a game against the Elvis Presley gridders in 1961. A close friendship between Rick and Kent led to his being cast in 45 segments of "Ozzie and Harriet" and after he returned to college he realized he wanted to make acting a full-time career. McCord, who's real name is McWhirter was born in L.A. on Sept. 26, is wed to Cynthia Doty, has a daughter, Kris.

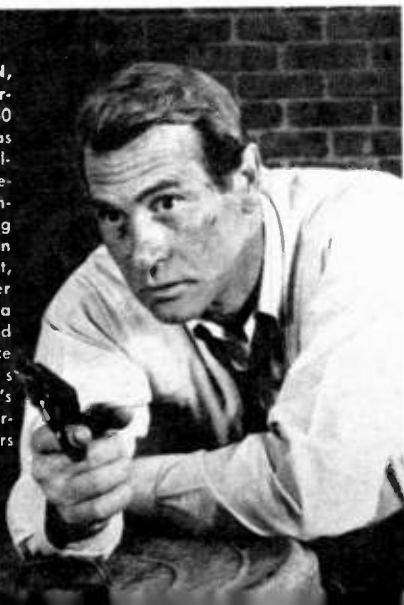

DARREN MCGAVIN, who piloted "Riverboat" back in 1960 on NBC-TV, started as a paint boy in a Hollywood studio, became a scenic designer before the acting bug bit him. He won a Columbia contract, but had to start over after war service, via Broadway, films and live television. Once also seen as MCA-TV's "Mike Hammer," he's wed and a dad. Darren was born 46 years ago.



HOPE LANGE was born in Redding Ridge, Conn., as a young girl lived in New York City where her mother, an ex-actress, ran a small restaurant. At 12, Hope made her Broadway debut in "The Patriots" her film debut in "Bus Stop." In 1956 she married Don Murray. They had two children before marriage ended. Hope wed Alan Pakula on Oct. 19, 1963. For the past year she has been limiting her professional activities but she couldn't resist the role of "Mrs. Muir."

EDWARD MULHARE "The Ghost," made his film bow in the Israel-made "Hill 27 Doesn't Answer," and soon after was imported to Broadway to replace Rex Harrison in "My Fair Lady" (Rex played the "Ghost" in the movie). He stayed to do "Mary, Mary" and then Hollywood called the tall blonde charmer for roles in, "Our Man Flint," and "13." A real ladies man, Eddie was born in County Cork, Ireland, planned to be a doctor, then was bitten by acting bug.



RITA SHAW a vet of stage and screen, appears as the housekeeper. Rita, plump, gray-haired and full of life has lived in such movies as "Sanctuary" and "Pajama Game" which she also appeared in on Broadway. Rita was born in South Paris, Maine, on Sept. 13, 1912. After three years at Boston Leland Powers Theater she went on to stock and in 1939 came to N.Y. for cafe work. Then came B'way. She has a 12-year-old daughter, Kathy.

DAHANN CARROLL makes her series debut in this comedy-drama starring as a young widowed mother who works as a registered nurse. This is quite a change of pace for Diahann, who's celebrated for her talents in the musical comedy and cafe fields. But Diahann digs new challenges and one of her biggest career ambitions is to star in a revival of "My Fair Lady." Born in New York City in July 1935, the daughter of a subway conductor and a nurse, Diahann won a Metropolitan Opera scholarship when she was 10, but dropped the singing lessons because it interfered with her desire to become "the roller skating champion of the world." After attending P.S. 46, she entered the High School of Music and Art, started modeling at 15, later won top honors and \$1,000 on "Chance of a Lifetime." Bookings at top night-clubs and a B'way debut at 19 in "House of Flowers" followed. Diahann appeared in movies, "Carmen Jones," "Porgy and Bess," "Paris Blues," and then was starred on B'way in "No Strings" which Richard Rodgers wrote just for her. Then it was back to Hollywood and "Hurry Sundown," plus spots on every top TV variety show. Diahann is divorced from musician Monte Kay, has a daughter, Suzanne, 8.

MARC COPAGE, who plays "Julia's" six-year-old son, Corey, made his screen debut in "Tammy and the Doctor" as a baby. Marc was born June 21 in L.A. His dad's an actor.



LLOYD NOLAN will co-star in the role of Dr. Morton Chegley. Lloyd was born Aug. 11, 1904 in San Francisco. At Stanford University he took part in dramatics, then apprenticed at Pasadena Community Playhouse. Broadway followed, then film debut in "Stolen Harmony" in 1934. He starred for 2 years in TV's "Martin Kane," made dozens of films, been wed 35 years to Mel Elfrid, has a daughter, Melinda, son, Jay.

TED CASSIDY is remembered as the butler in "The Adams Family." Ted who is 6'7" tall and weighs 250 lbs., was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., started in radio and TV, came to Hollywood in 1963 and was signed for "Lurch" a few months later. Now he's "Injun Joe." Cassidy is wed to Margaret Jesse, has a son and daughter.

MICHAEL SHEA, who plays Huck, was born in Glendale, N.Y., Nov. 4, 1952; made his acting debut off-Broadway in 1965, and the same year made his video bow as Maureen O'Hara's son in a "Bell Telephone Hour" Xmas special. This led to Hollywood where he was kept busy on TV and in films before getting this series.

LU ANN HASLAM, who makes her TV debut as Becky Thatcher, was born in Pasadena, Calif., Mar. 28, 1953; made her acting debut at the Glendale Center Theater, worked as a model before being signed for this role. Lu Ann attends Rosemont Junior High in La Crescenta where she lives with her family of six.

KEVIN SCHULTZ, who was seen as Little Twin in "The Monroes," now stars as Tom Sawyer. Kevin who has been acting almost since birth was born Sept. 16, 1953 (together with brother Keith) in Santa Monica, Calif., made his movie debut in "The Long Gray Line," and has been in constant demand for movies and TV.



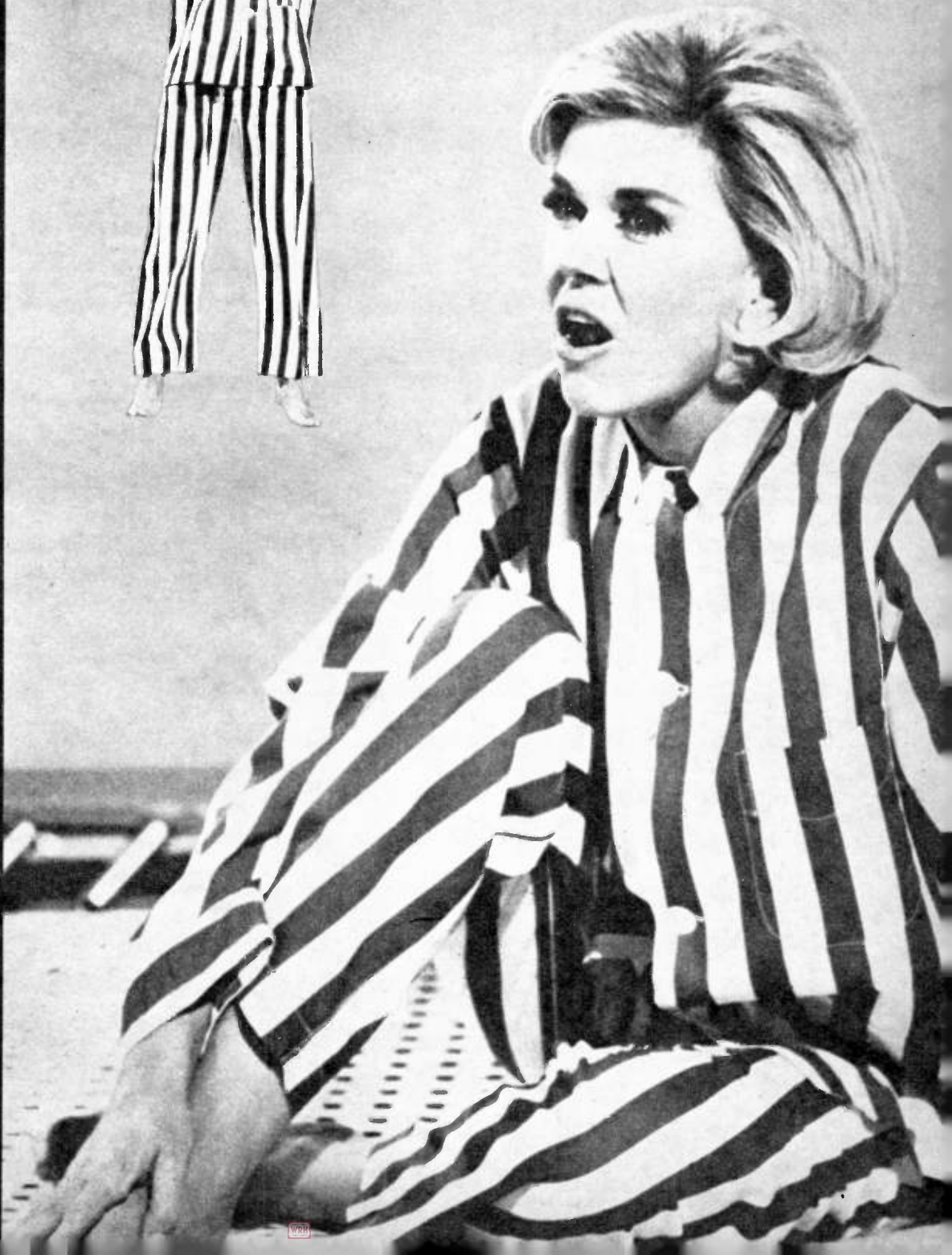

DORIS DAY, long a TV hold-out makes her debut as the star of this sparkling comedy. Doris plays a young widowed mother in the show originally created by her late husband Marty Melcher. One of the all-time top box-office movie stars, Doris was born Doris Kappelhoff in Cincinnati, Ohio April 3, 1924. She originally wanted to be a dancer but turned to singing after suffering a back injury. She began on local radio shows, then joined the Charles Rapp and Les Brown bands, wound up on radio on the old Hit Parade and was soon signed to a Warners contract. Doris made her screen debut in "Romance on The High Seas" in 1948 and has since scored in dozens of films including the current "With Six You Get Egg Roll." Twice divorced from Al Jordan and George Wilder, she has a son Terry, 26. She wed Marty in 1951 and he managed her career until his death last spring.

JACK LORD, is as versatile as a man can be. Besides being an actor, he is a painter, with five paintings on permanent display at the Metropolitan Museum, an accomplished photographer and writer. He attended N.Y.U. on a football scholarship and upon graduation received offers from professional teams. Born and raised in New York, he studied acting at The Neighborhood Playhouse. Jack was seen in dozens of films and as TV's "Stony Burke."



JAMES MacARTHUR, who plays Danny Williams, has a proud theatrical heritage. The adopted son of star Helen Hayes, famous author-playwright ("The Front Page") Charles MacArthur, it was only natural that Jamie should leave Harvard, go on the stage. Married since 1958 to blonde, button-nosed actress Joyce Bulifant, they're parents of son, Charles, and are now in Splitsville. The Los Angeles-born, 30-year-old Jamie was in "Bedford Incident."



RICHARD DENNING was two when he was brought to Hollywood from Poughkeepsie, N.Y., in 1916. He grew up, went to Woodbury College, did little theatre work and in 1937 was signed by Paramount as the result of a radio-acting contest. "Buccaneer" in the 1937 version was the first of over 5 dozen films he's been in. Wed to Evelyn Ankers, he has a daughter. He was TV's Mr. North and Michael Shayne; plays the Governor in this show.

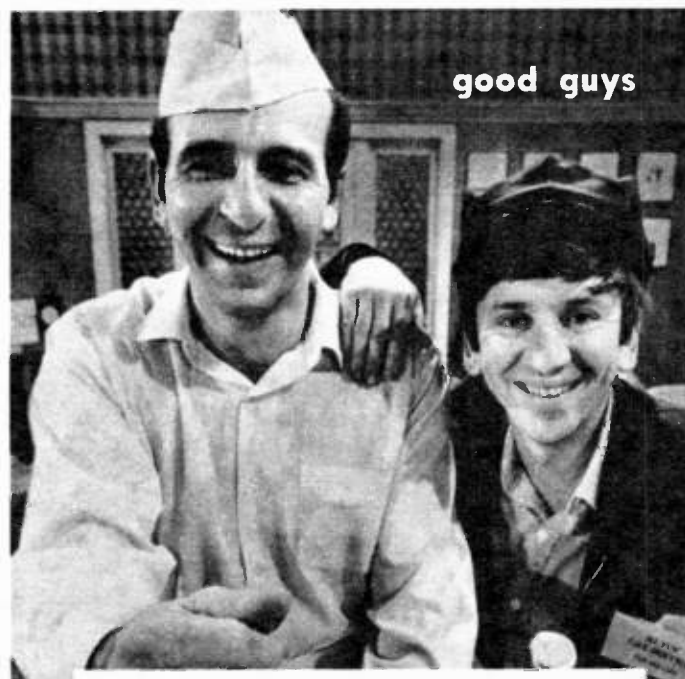
JIM BACKUS (Mr. Dithers) was born in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1913, moved on to New York to study at The American Academy and eventually settled in the big town to devote his time to a career in radio. Twelve years later, he took a crack at films and TV, is the voice of Mr. Magoo, was on "Gilligan's Island." **HENNY BACKUS**, Jim's wife, is his wife on this series too. An experienced actress in her own right, Henny has appeared on stage, in dozens of TV shows. Henny was born in Bryn Mawr, Pa., Mar. 21, made her pro debut at 11. Wed Jim in 1943.



PETER ROBBINS, who plays Alexander Bumpstead, was born in Encino, Calif., on April 10, 1956 and delivered his first dramatic performance on a TV commercial at age 8 months. Since then he's been on dozens of shows, is the voice of Charlie Brown on the "Peanut" Specials. **PAMELYN FERDIN**, who plays Cookie, was born in L.A., on Feb. 4, 1960, turned pro at 4 after acting in a Christmas Play at the Shatto Drama Center.

PATRICIA HARTY, who plays Blondie, is a Broadway vet by virtue of her featured performances in "Fiorello" and "Sail Away." She is a dancer-turned-actress from Washington, D.C. whose first appearances were in choruses of the "Perry Como," "Garry Moore" and "Pat Boone" shows. She has fulfilled acting assignments in several TV series, and movie, "Harvey Middleman—Fireman." Divorced, she wed Michael Callan on June 1, 1968.

WILL HUTCHINS, who plays Dagwood, is not only a talented actor—he's also smart and strong. The possessor of a Masters degree and a Phi Beta Kappa key, he once planned to become a boxer, later switched to acting and became famous as the star of the "Sugarfoot" TV series. Married and separated from Carol Burnett's sister Chris, Will has a daughter, Jennifer Jane. He was born in Los Angeles, Calif., on May 5, 1932. He's 6'1" tall.

BOB DENVER became familiar to TV viewers as Maynard, the kooky star of "Dobie Gillis," and he then went on to star in "Gilligan's Island." Born in New Rochelle, N.Y., Jan. 9, 1935, Bob's first ambition was to become a lawyer. Bob is father of three children by Maggie Ryan.

HERBERT EDELMAN, who plays Bert, was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., Nov. 5, 1933, attended Brooklyn College, was a radio operator aboard an Army ship while in service, made his Broadway debut in 1962 in "Lorenzo" then did "Barefoot in The Park." Herb's wed to Louise Sorel.

JAMES STACY, who plays Johnny Madrid, was born Dec. 23, in Burbank, Calif., played football at Glendale College and became a pro with the Vancouver Lions. He then went on to work as a ski instructor and surfing teacher before making acting his career. TV roles, movies like "Summer Magic" and a short-lived marriage to Connie Stevens followed. Jim is now wed to Kim Darby and is a new dad.

ELIZABETH BAUR, who plays Teresa O'Brien, is a native of L.A. Born Dec. 11. At 10 she had her oil paintings on exhibit in Mexico City and although her father is a casting director at 20th-Fox, she wasn't interested in an acting career until she did a TV commercial with Jimmy Durante. Naturally, dad helped launch her in TV and movies.

WAYNE MAUNDER is a Canadian lad (born Dec. 19, in Four Falls, New Brunswick) who grew up in Bangor, Maine. His dream of becoming a professional baseball player fell apart when he kept getting hurt, so one day he took off for Hollywood and decided to try his luck at acting. After a long struggle, he landed a role on "The Monroes," went from there to the lead in "Custer." Wayne's a bachelor.

DEAN MARTIN, TV's most relaxed entertainer, was born Dino Crocetti in Steubenville, Ohio, on June 17, 1917, worked for years as a millhand, a professional boxer, and a croupier in a gambling casino before hitting the nightclub circuit as a singer. He was still unknown until a chance meeting with 19-year-old Jerry Lewis led to their teaming up as a zany act in Atlantic City's 500 Club. A smash hit, the new act went on to the Copa in New York, where moviemaker Hal Wallis signed the boys up for films. Their first movie, "My Friend Irma," led to 15 more (all successful), a TV series, many hit records for Dean. In 1956 the team split

up and Dean scored on his own in "The Young Lions," "Toys in the Attic," "Career," "Some Came Running," other top films. Now well established as a dramatic actor as well as a singer (record sales frequently top 1,000,000), Dean lives in Beverly Hills with his second wife, former model Jeanne Beigger, and their three children, Dino, 17; Rickey, 14; Gina, 10. By his first marriage, to Betty McDonald, he has four children: Craig; Claudia, 23 (who was married briefly); Gail, 22; and Deana, 19. He's currently in several movies: "Five Card Stud," "Bandolero," and "The Wrecking Crew."

the smothers brothers

TOM AND DICK SMOTHERS are both natives of New York City, were born Feb. 2, 1937 and Nov. 20, 1939, respectively. Sons of an Army officer, they spent their early years in the Philippines, became interested in show biz while at San Jose State College near San Francisco. Their big break came when they landed a job at S.F.'s "Purple Onion" nightclub and their folk singing-comedy act turned out to be a howling success. Their first TV series on CBS, a couple of seasons ago, failed to make it. But soon after they returned to the air in January 1967 in this new format, and they hit the top. Tom is divorced, father of a son Tommy IV. Dick and wife, Linda, have been wed seven years, have three children, separated last spring.

JACK BENNY, seen above with the Smothers, also does his own Specials. Jack is one of the great perennials of comedy in all media. Though not 39, as he still jokingly claims, he has a 39-year-old's energy on his weekly CBS show. Born Benny Kubelsky in Waukegan, Ill., Feb. 14, 1894, he started as a fiddler, did Navy service in WW I, then did revues, vaudeville as comic, hit major stride with Sunday nite radio show. Movies followed, then TV. He's married to Mary Livingston, has 1 daughter.

GEORGE BURNS was a success from the time he was ten. The New York born lad, known then as Nathan Birnbaum, organized a children's singing group. Before he was out of adolescence, he was a vaudeville comedian of some repute. He and the late Gracie Allen teamed professionally in 1922, and were a smash on radio and early TV. They had two adopted children, Sandra and Ronald. Now, George is limiting himself to night clubs and guest shots.



PAT PAULSEN was born in South Bend, Washington, and raised in San Francisco, where he attended City College, got his café start at The Purple Onion. A number of appearances at The Ice House in Pasadena led to his standout weekly spot with the Smothers Brothers. 5'8" tall, Pat weighs 130, has black hair, hazel eyes, lives in Orange, Cal., with wife Betty Jane, three children.

red skelton show

RED SKELTON was born Richard Bernard Skelton in Vincennes, Ind., on July 18, 1913; his father, a circus clown and college teacher, had died two months before. After going through 3rd grade, Red quit school to dance for pennies on the street. At 10 he joined a medicine show as a guitar-playing, singing "midget"; at 12 he joined a traveling stock company, went on to vaudeville, showboats, minstrel shows. Emceeing walkathons followed during the Depression. After making a hit on Chicago radio, he won a movie contract in 1940, debuted in "Having a Wonderful Time," followed by the lead in "Whistling in the Dark." In 1941, he returned to radio, leaving for the Army in 1943. Discharged in 1945, after playing some 3,800 shows in the war zones, he married second wife Georgia Davis. A daughter, Valentina, was born May 5, 1947; a son, Richard, died of leukemia on May 10, 1958. Now beginning his 18th consecutive TV season, Red has also appeared in over 30 motion pictures.

jonathan winters show

JONATHAN WINTERS has had ups and downs in late years, but it's obvious from the success of his weekly CBS-TV series that his great comic talent is undimmed. Born Nov. 11, 1925, in Dayton, Ohio, he started as a commercial artist, then became a disc jockey. During this stint he began to work out monologues and learned to imitate a variety of sounds. Married, with a son, he's done revues, guested on TV and appeared on specials before being rewarded with his very own variety hour.





the ed sullivan show

ED SULLIVAN will soon be celebrating his 21st year as a top-rated television emcee. His CBS "Ed Sullivan Show," initiated on June 20, 1948, as "Toast of the Town," has vastly augmented the already considerable measure of fame that Ed enjoyed as a columnist for the New York Daily News. For over thirty-five years a top journalist, starting on the old New York Graphic, Ed began his Daily News column in the early 30's, became one of NY's outstanding by-liners with his column, "Little Old New York." Father of one daughter, Betty, grandfather of five, Ed lives with his wife of 38 years, Sylvia Weinstein, in New York, travels abroad often in search of fresh talent, has helped many newcomers. Ed was born in N.Y.C. on September 28, 1902.



hollywood palace

BING CROSBY, who was the first guest host on "Hollywood Palace," is set for a series of appearances this season. Bing was born in Tacoma, Washington, on May 2, 1904, got his start as a drummer for a group called the Musicaladers. He landed his first singing job with Paul Whiteman, was first seen on the screen in "The Big Broadcast" of 1932. Bing, whose real name is Harry Lillis Crosby, has four sons by his first wife, Dixie Lee (who died in '52), two boys and a girl by Kathy Grant. He won an Oscar in 1944 for "Going My Way."



the tonight show

JOHNNY CARSON started his career in show business as an amateur magician, amusing buddies with tricks he picked up from a magic course. He was born on October 23, 1925, in Corning, Iowa. In 1933 his family settled in Nebraska. After a stint in the Navy during WW II, he went from an Omaha radio station to a job as a writer for Red Skelton. He won his first kudos as a comedian when he went on to sub for Red. His first starring show was "Carson's Cellar," and before he took over as host of NBC-TV's "Tonight," in Oct. 1962, he was the popular emcee of a day-time quiz, "Who Do You Trust?" He wed his second wife, Jo Ann-Copeland, in 1963, has three sons Chris, Ricky and Corey from his first marriage.



the joey bishop show

JOEY BISHOP started out in a small way; at 2 lbs., 4 oz. he was the smallest baby ever born at Fordham Hospital in the Bronx, where he was registered as Joseph Gottlieb. His father, who ran a bicycle shop, soon moved the family to Philly where Joey attended South Philadelphia High. After graduation, Joey formed the Bishop Brothers Trio with two friends and played a succession of second-rate nightspots before spending a year at Cleveland's Club El Dumbo as a single. LAWRENCE WELK played the accordion for church socials at 13 in his native Strasburg, N.D. At 21, he began his career as a soloist, though he couldn't read music. He formed his own band consisting of drums and accordion. Later his band, augmented by saxophone and piano, was invited to play on WNAX. Radio work was supplemented by one-night stands, which led to long-term engagements. In 1955 he and his band were signed for ABC-TV. Wed 37 years to his wife, Fern, he is dad of a son, Larry, 29, daughters, Shirley and Donna; has five grandchildren. Welk, who just celebrated 44 years in show biz, was born Mar. 11.

JO ANN CASTLE, whose ragtime piano has made her a Welk Show favorite since 1959, began singing and dancing when she was only 3, was performing at banquets in her native Bakersfield, Calif., by the time she was 8. She turned pro at 15 and her debut on Ted Williams' radio show was followed by TV. Blonde Jo Ann is divorced from Dean Hall, has a daughter, Deanna. She is now wed to Bill Roeschlein.



DICK DALE, a member of good standing as an instrumentalist and vocalist in the Welk organization joined the band in 1951. Before that Dick was with a group called "Six Fat Dutchmen." A graduate of Algonia, Minn., High School, he started working with bands as a saxophonist in 1942, found the going rough for a while but then clicked. Dick's been wed 20 years; is a dad.



TANYA FALAN originally wanted to be a veterinarian even though she was singing on TV at the age of five. JIM ROBERTS was serving in the army in Guam during W.W. II when he made a hit in a G.I. show touring the Pacific. After his discharge in 1946, the handsome Kentuckian decided to be a singer, studied at the Herbert Wall School of Music and joined the Earl Carroll organization as a soloist and there met his future wife, Jane Silk. When the theatre closed Jim went into musical comedy, then joined Welk.

CISSY KING was catapulted into fame when Bobby Burgess discovered her and chose her to succeed Barbara Boylan. Born on Jan. 3, 1946, in Albuquerque, N. M., Cissy has been on her toes since she was 3 and has chalked up countless honors. A junior at the U. of New Mexico until her call to arms by Bobby, Cissy's a champagne blonde.

JOE FEENEY was born August 14, 1931, in Grand Island, Neb., where he was a boy soprano in the church choir. A former Horace Heidt winner, he was featured vocalist on an Omaha radio show, was chosen for the Welk show when his boss sent a recording to Welk himself. Joe met his wife, Georgia Lee, while attending the U. of Nebraska. The Feeneys have three children.

ARTHUR DUNCAN launched his career at the age of 13, when he was "drafted" for a special number in a junior high school show. He enjoyed it so, he started taking dancing and singing lessons. He began winning nightclub and TV bookings, quit school in order to devote every minute to his career. Born Sept. 25, in L. A., Art's wed.

BOBBY BURGESS was born in Long Beach, Calif., started taking dancing lessons at 3, had appeared on some 60 TV shows and commercials by the time he reached his teens. While in 9th grade, he joined the Mouseketeers, dancing with Barbara Boylan with whom he later teamed on the Welk show. He also has been in movies, night clubs. Bobby attended Long Beach College. His birthday is May 19.



ANDRA WILLIS was born in Danville, Virginia, in 1943, began singing at local civic events with her two younger sisters at the age of 9. NORMA ZIMMER, the lovely Champagne Lady, was born in Larsen, Idaho, on July 13. Although her father was a violin teacher, Norma's interest was in voice, and after graduating from high school, she headed for Los Angeles and a career. For a while she sang with groups like the Norman Luboff Choir, finally struck out as a soloist and landed her present job. Norma's married, has 2 sons, Randy, 19, and Mark 17.



SANDI JENSEN sang a song on Art Linkletter's radio "House Party" at the age of 5, liked appearing before an audience so much she set her heart on a show biz career then and there. A native of Northridge, Calif., this pert redhead was active in school theatrics at Brigham Young U., which is where she met up with Salli and formed their duo. Performances in Vietnam and Disneyland preceded Welk contract.

SALLI FLYNN is an Ontario, Oregon, lass who used to sing "for kicks" at church and school talent shows in her hometown. After meeting Sandi at Brigham Young, she dropped out of school to become a professional, enjoys her career so much she's sure she made the right decision. A fan of Broadway music, she admits she's looking forward to getting married and having a family, but insists she's in no hurry.

EDIE ADAMS, born Edith Enke, grew up in Tenafly, N.J. While studying for a career in opera at N. Y.'s Juilliard School of Music and Columbia U. the blonde Edie began winning beauty contests like "Miss U.S. Television," and became a popular entertainer. The widow of comedian Ernie Kovacs and the bride of Marty Mills (wed., Aug. 16, 1964) she has been on Broadway and in many Hollywood films. Edie has just become a proud and happy mother.



PETULA CLARK was a big star in Europe long before her recording of *Downtown* made her famous in the U.S.A. Born Nov. 15 in Derby, England, she made her showbiz debut at the age of 9, on Britain's BBC. At 12, she had snagged a movie contract and by the time she was out of her teens she had traveled all over Europe and records in six languages. Pet is married to Claude Wolff, has two daughters, Barbara and Cathy. Is in *Finian's Rainbow*.



NANCY AMES is the socially prominent daughter of a Washington physician and the granddaughter of a former President of Panama. After attending Bennet college Nancy went into Junior League theater work. She landed a part in Broadway's "Tenderloin," and then she hit it big in nightclubs. A Liberty Records contract followed plus a spot as a TV regular in the late lamented *That Was The Week That Was*. Now she's happy guest-starring at top rates.



BOBBY DARIN is a singing star who wants to be known as an actor and it looks as though he can give his vocal cords a rest. Sandra Dee's ex-husband and the father of their son, Dadd, was born in New York on May 14, 1937, attended Hunter College, then went on the singing route. He made it big at the Copa, other clubs, and on discs, film debut in *Come September*. His big hit record this year has been *Talk to The Animals*.



PAMELA AUSTIN, a frequent "Laugh-in" guest, is known as Pamela Joan Akert to folks back home in Nebraska. Born in Omaha on Dec. 20, 1941, Pam spent her early years traveling through Europe with her soldier father. She graduated Sacramento State College, started her show business career as a dancer in Tony Martin's nightclub act. She made her film debut in Elvis' *Blue Hawaii*, has done much TV, made it big as "The Dodge Rebellion Girl."



SAMMY DAVIS, JR. must believe in having a number of talents going since he's a singer, dancer, musician, actor and impersonator and has scored in all branches of entertainment since he started with the Will Mastin Trio. Sammy was born in New York City, Dec. 8, 1925. Separated from May Britt, they have 2 kids (one adopted). He is wowing them in London in his hit musical *Golden Boy*. Sammy's current movie is *Salt and Pepper*.



HARRY BELAFONTE is active in every branch of show business now but he'll always hold the title of King of the Calypso singers. He started the trend, was its sole survivor. Harry was born in New York, spent the war years in the Navy, later worked as fry-cook before getting his first nightclub break. Divorced from Marguerite Byrd, mother of his daughter, he's now wed to Julie Robinson, formerly a dancer, and has a son David.



JOHN DAVIDSON, the son of a Baptist minister, planned to follow in pop's footsteps, changed his mind when he was cast in a musical show while attending Ohio's Dennison University. He headed for New York after graduation, landed a job in a Broadway show. A former regular on *The Entertainers*, John was in movies *The Happiest Millionaire* and *The Family Band*. He was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 13, 1941, is still single.

BOBBIE GENTRI became an overnight sensation when the recording of her own song, *Ode To Billy Joe*, swept the country. Bobbie was also rewarded with a Grammy and all the club and TV engagements time would allow. The 24-year-old slim and sultry brunette hails from a small Mississippi farm and has been supporting herself since she was 17. Her song-writing talent means more to her than her singing, but it looks as if she'll be doing both for some time.

But at 17 she raised her voice in song and was a hit off-Broadway in "Best Foot Forward" on-Broadway in "Flora The Red Menace" for which she won a Tony. Liza made her film debut in "The Good Old Summertime" with her mother. Her adult movie first was "Charlie Bubbles." Wed to Peter Allen.

EYDIE GORME, (Mrs. Steve Lawrence) the petite, bubbling songstress with a golden throat, started out to be a Spanish interpreter for an importer. Her first singing engagement was in a department store talent contest when she was 3. She later sang at school functions, was regular vocalist with a high school band, followed a year of interpreting with stints alongside Tommy Tucker and Tex Beneke. ROBERT GOULET was known as "Canada's only matinee idol" before he came to America for *Camelot*. His extreme good looks and singing voice made him a sensation in this country as well. Wed to Carol Lawrence (mother of his two sons), Bob has a daughter, Nicole, by a former marriage. "I'd Rather Be Rich" and "Honey-moon Hotel" were his films. He was born November 26, 1933, won a Tony this year for B'way's musical "The Happy Time."



DONALD O'CONNOR, who plans to star on TV and films next season with a bang, is a vet of over 30 years in show business. Born in Chicago, Ill. JACK JONES is considered by Frank Sinatra to be "one of the major singing stars of show business." The son of Allan Jones and Irene Hervey, Jack was born Jan. 14, 1938 in Los Angeles, got his start singing in his pop's nightclub act. Branching out on his own, he made a movie, *Juke Box Rhythm*, and started recording. A two time Grammy Award winner, he is the father of a girl from first marriage, is now wed to actress Jill St. John.



NANCY SINATRA, Frank's first born, saw the light of day in Hoboken, N.J. just before Frank became a singing idol. Frank gave her a start on his TV show and she decided to make entertaining her career. She appeared in several movies including "Marriage On The Rocks" with dad. When her marriage to Tommy Sands went on the rocks, she started to record in earnest, sold over a million platters of *Boats*. She's 27. Her "Moving with Nancy" spec was a smash.

CAROL LAWRENCE who guest stars on her own as well as with husband Robert Goulet hit the big time on Broadway when she created the role of Maria in "West Side Story." That led to leads in "Saratoga" and on dramatic TV and she replaced Mary Martin as one-half the cast of "I Do, I Do." Carol originally started out as a dancer in 1951, then scored in the singing and acting areas. She was born in Melrose Park, Illinois 34 years ago.



CONNIE STEVENS, last in Way, Way Out was born Concetta Ann Ingolia, took the name of her dad, musician Teddy Stevens. Born in Brooklyn, Aug. 8, 1938, Connie started singing with a trio, got a movie break in "Rockabye Baby." A hit in TV, "Hawaiian Eye" and on records led to stardom in "Parrish." Connie is divorced from James Stacy, made her bow on Broadway in "Star Spangled Girl." She's the mom of year-old Joely Fisher.

STEVE LAWRENCE was born in Brooklyn in 1935, learned singing from his father, a cantor. He went on to win the Arthur Godfrey Talent Scouts contest, was a regular on the Steve Allen Show, had a short lived series of his own on CBS, but was quite successful on Broadway in "What Makes Sammy Run" and the current "Golden Rainbow" in which he co-stars with wife Eydie Gorme. Steve and Eydie are the parents of two little ones.



LESLIE UGGAMS first made it big as a singer on Mitch Miller's "Sing Along" but this performer with a big, big voice who can handle rock 'n' roll, blues or pop equally well is a TV vet of many year standing, having made her debut with Johnny Olsen's "TV Kids" at seven. Born in a show business family, on May 25, 1943 Leslie studied at Juilliard School, won this year's Tony Award for Broadway performance in "Hallelujah Baby." Wed.

MICHELE LEE is a vet of 2 B'way musicals and several top TV shows, and is much in demand for others. Born June 24, 1942 in Los Angeles, California, she made her show biz debut at 17 in a musical revue entitled "Vintage '60." After appearing in several other West Coast productions, she won a starring role in B'way's "Bravo Giovanni," went into the stage production of "How to Succeed" then did the movie. Michele is wed to Jim Farnham.



LESLEY ANN WARREN'S got more offer—both professional and social—than she can shake a stick at. A brunette beauty with huge, velvety brown eyes and a graceful, swan-like neck, Lesley Ann first wowed audiences as the ingenue lead in B'way's "110 in the Shade." She went cross-country with the road company, returned in time for TV spec "Cinderella." Now on the road to stardom, was born August 16, 1946 and is the bride of Ann Paterson.



GUESTING TONITE



SID CAESAR grew up (to 6 feet and 206 pounds) in Yonkers, New York, starting Sept. 8, 1922. At 14 he was bouncer at his father's luncheonette, along with his brothers. After high school he studied the sax at the Juilliard School of Music. At 19 he joined the Coast Guard, where Max Liebman discovered him in "Tars and Spars" for TV's "Your Show Of Shows." And he's done two other comedy shows. He and his wife Flo have 3 children.



GODFREY CAMBRIDGE was born in New York City 36 years ago, attended Hofstra College on a scholarship where he first began working with drama groups. After leaving school he landed a \$15-a-week job in an off-Broadway show in which he was required to sweep the stage in addition to emoting. Later he went on to "The Blacks," "Purlie Victorious," cracked TV with Paar's help. Godfrey now has movies, cafe stints to his credits.



ART CARNEY will guest-star with Gleason in four "Honeymoon" specials this season and also spread his various talents around the other variety shows. Born in Mount Vernon, N.Y., 48 years ago, Art went to work on radio impersonating voices of Roosevelt, Eisenhower, etc. After a stretch in the army he was first hired by Gleason, went on to star in movies and on B'way. IMOGENE COCA appeared at nine as a tap dancer, hasn't been out of show business since. Born in Chicago, May 20, 1920, George is married to the former Alice Huecke, his high school sweetheart, has three children. A boy soprano, he sang on NBC's National Barn Dance and other shows, played bits, went into the service in World War Two, became a pilot and developed comedy routines. CHET HUNTLEY abandoned medical ambitions when a scholarship won for speech and debating set him to thinking of newscasting. RICHARD C. HOTTELET has covered the United Nations for CBS News since 1960, has been on the scene for various crises, the most recent being the Arab-Israeli war and its aftermath. He was born in New York City in 1917, is married and has two children, was once arrested by Hitler on trumped-up espionage charges, spent four months in solitary in Nazi jails. But in spite of the perils he prefers action reporting to a comfortable studio job.



PETER JENNINGS, handsome roving reporter for ABC-TV, has personally covered the major breaking stories throughout the world. He has interviewed Prime Minister Wilson in London, traveled to India, Moscow and spent several weeks on the Vietnam battlefield. Before joining ABC, Jennings had built a career as a newsman in Canada, serving as a writer, producer and commentator. 6'2", Peter was born in Toronto, Canada, on July 29, 1937.



JIM JENSEN is CBS's handsome anchorman. He joined the network in January 1965 and has served as a reporter-correspondent on news stories both in and out of the studio. HARRY REASONER does an able job reporting "The Sunday News with Harry Reasoner," plus co-hosting "CBS Reports" show. He has presented news on CBS radio and subs for Cronkite whenever Walter's on special assignment. Born in Dakota City, Iowa, April 17, 1923, he attended Stanford, served in the Army, then worked for the U.S. Information Agency. He is married to Kathleen Carroll, is the father of six attractive children.



FRANK REYNOLDS, ABC's White House correspondent for the past three years, took over anchorman on the net's evening news last May. Frank hails from East Chicago, Ind., attended Indiana U., started his broadcasting career in 1945 after his discharge from service, and went from 12 years in a Chicago TV station to major network assignments all over the world. He and his wife Henrietta are parents of five sons, Dean, James, John, Robert and Tom.



MORLEY SAFER, the CBS News correspondent who's received six major awards for his reporting from Vietnam, was born in Toronto on November 8, 1931. He worked as a reporter on newspapers in Canada and in England, joined Reuters in 1955, came to CBS in 1964. He's based in London, is a bachelor, won wide acclaim for recent documentary, "Morley Safer's Vietnam," hopes to continue to do that kind of television reporting.



RAY SCHERER, top White House correspondent for NBC-TV, is noted for analytical mind, sharp, incisive reportage. A graduate of Valparaiso University in Indiana, he began his journalistic career on the Fort Wayne, Indiana, Journal-Gazette, joined NBC in 1947. Married to former Barbara Hetzner, he is the father of two children, lives with his family just outside Washington, has had close acquaintanceships with Presidents Eisenhower and L.B.J.



ERIC SEVARIED, who has added to his many laurels as author and news commentator with his latest CBS News assignment, was also noted for his "CBS Reports" programs, has won many broadcasting awards. 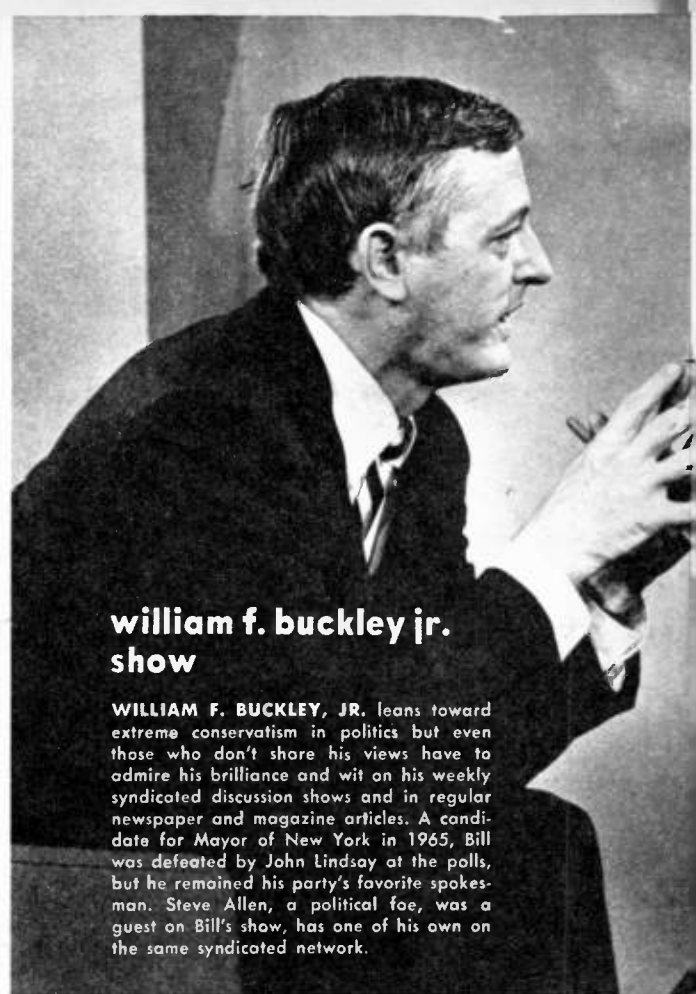

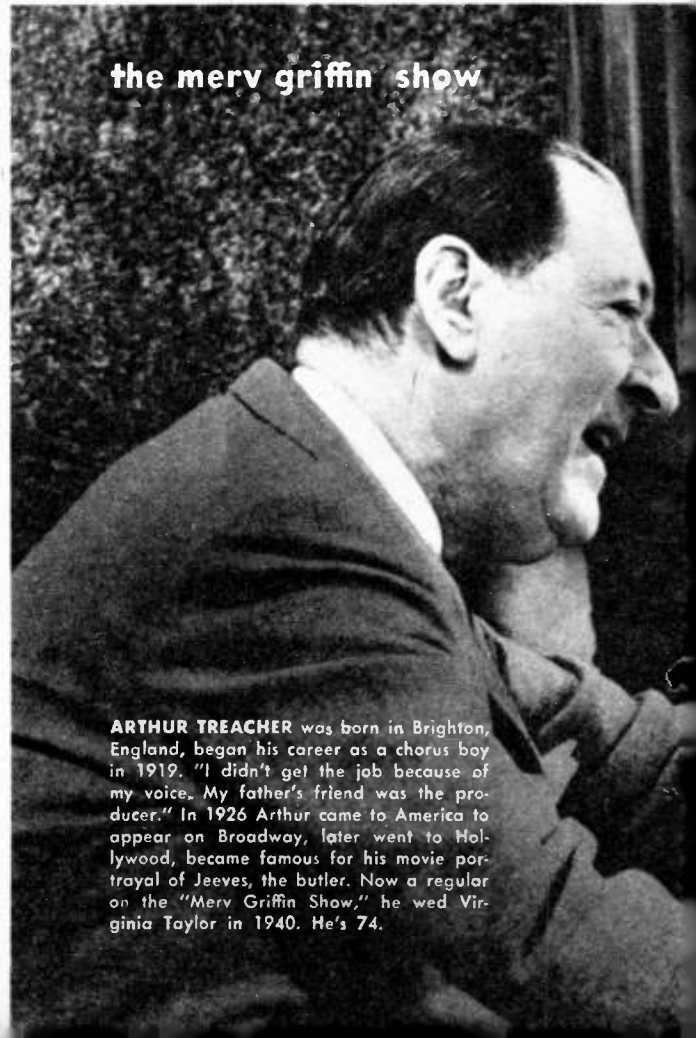

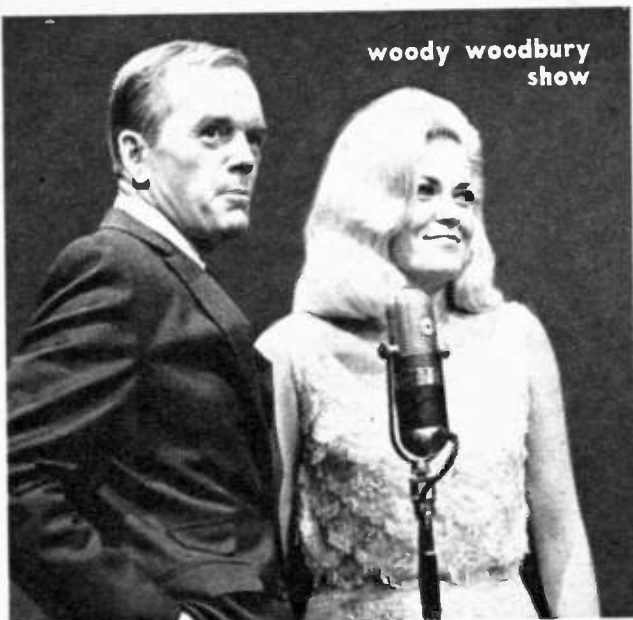
les crane show

Divorced from Tony Walton, Julie has a 5-year-old, Emma Kate. In: *The Star*, *Darling Lili*.



ANN-MARGRET, born A. M. Olson in Stockholm, Sweden on April 28, 1941, came to this country at five, grew up in Wilmette, Ill. She hit the night-club trail as a singer with a college combo, was spotted by George Burns and after working with him in Vegas, she was on her way. She made movie debut in 1961's *Pocketful of Miracles*, has been active ever since. Annie wed Roger Smith in 1967. You can see her TV special *Ann-Margret and Her Men*.



ANNE BANCROFT won a 1962 Oscar for *The Miracle Worker*. She is a New York City girl, born Anna Italiano on Sept. 17, 1931. She became interested in acting when she got a lead in a high school play; broke into TV under the name of Anne Marno, was later signed to a contract at 20th. After numerous bad roles and an equally bad marriage, she returned East, where she shot to stardom in *Two For The Seesaw*. She married comic Mel Brooks, Aug. 5, 1964.



BRIGITTE BARDOT, the French actress movie-goers prefer to see the most of in more ways than one, is over 33 but she's still thought of as the sex-kitten bebe. A native of Paris, BB was a dancer-model until Roger Vadim met, won and married the blonde in 1952. They were divorced in 1956 after he launched her with *And God Created Women*. She wed Jacques Charrier, had a son, got a divorce. Gunther Sachs, whom she wed in 1966, was #3.



WARREN BEATTY is a 33-year-old non-conformist who's Shirley MacLaine's kid brother. Kazan gave him his big break in *Splendor in the Grass*, and he made the most of it. A Broadway vet (featured in *Loss of Roses*), Warren wants to do more stage plays and also produce his own films. He's an elusive bachelor from Richmond, Va. who has traveled the whole world over. He was last in *Bonnie and Clyde*, produced under his own company banner.



SENTA BERGER enrolled in a ballet school at the age of six and spent ten years preparing for a dancing career. Her interest eventually turned to acting and it was while she was performing in Vienna's famed Theatre in de Josefstadt that she was discovered and cast opposite Richard Widmark in *The Secret Ways*. Senta was born May 13, 1941, in Vienna. She wed Dr. Michael Verhoeven Sept. 27, 1966 and makes her home in Europe.



INGRID BERGMAN was a star in Sweden before becoming an American favorite via *Intermezzo* in 1939. Born in Stockholm on August 29, 1916, she trained at the Royal Dramatic Theatre, is the winner of two Oscars (for *Gaslight* in 1944 and *Anastasia* in 1956). She has a daughter, Pia, by first husband, Dr. Peter Lindstrom, twin girls, Ingrid and Isabella, and son Robertino by second spouse Rossellini. Is now wed to Lars Schmidt.



DIRK BOGARDE is the most popular bachelor in British films, and Number One at the box-office as the result of top-notch performances in such pix as: *The Servant* and *Darling*. Born in Hampstead, Eng., March 26, 1920, he began as a call boy at London "Q" Theatre; worked as a stage manager for a while, then switched to acting. He served five years in the Army in WW II. Single. His latest films include *The Fixer*.



STEPHEN BOYD got his first acting job at ten. Posing as a 16-year-old, he tried for, and got, a part as a 60-year-old man. Born in Belfast, Ireland, on July 4, 1928, Steve made his American debut in *Man Who Never Was*. 6'1" and 185 pounds, he's the youngest of nine kids. Wed and divorced from Mariella di Sarzana in 1959, he's content playing the field. He has become an American citizen. In: *The Bible*. Next: *Shelako* with B. Bardot and Sean Connery.



CHARLES BOYER, noted for his polished, sophisticated roles in films like *How To Steal a Million*, won all hearts with the warmth of his acting. Born in Figeac, France, in 1899, he went on French stage, made first American movie, *Caravan*, in 1934. Separated from Pat Paterson, his son Mike, 19, died tragically in 1965. Charles alternates between French and American films. He celebrates his birthday on Aug. 28. In: *Madwoman of Chailot*.



MARLON BRANDO was one of the first to bring "method acting" to the screen. He was born in Omaha, Nebraska, April 3, 1924, decided on becoming an actor after he was expelled from high school. He hit Broadway first, broke into movies in 1950 with *The Men*, carted home an Oscar in 1954 for *On the Waterfront*. Formerly wed to Anna Kashfi and Movita, he has 3 sons. New: *Candy* and *The Night of The Following Day*.



YUL BRYNNER made his movie debut in 1949 in *Port of New York* but wasn't considered box office material until 1956, when he was given an Oscar for his performance in *The King and I*. The product of an island called Sakhalin, shiny-domed Yul was born July 11, 1915, appeared on Broadway before cracking the film industry. He's been married twice, is the father of a son, Rocky, and a daughter, Victoria. In: *The Madwoman of Chailot*.



RICHARD BURTON started life as Dickie Jenkins in Wales on a chilly Nov. 4, 1925 and went on to become the world's hottest actor. Former actor Philip Burton trained him and Richard went on to make his mark doing Shakespeare and working on the B.B.C. In 1948 he movie bowed in *Last Days of Dolwyn*, was brought to Hollywood for *My Cousin Rachel*. Divorced from Sybil Williams, Richard has daughters, Kate, 11, Jessica, 9. He wed La Liz Mar. 15, 1964.



MICHAEL CAINE, can hardly be called an overnight success since it took him ten years of playing bit parts to be discovered. He hit it big with *The Ipcress File*, now has producers all over the world bidding for him. Born 35 years ago in London. He served in the British Army. Caine chalked up his experience in repertory, has been acclaimed for his *Alfie*. He is divorced and the dad of a daughter. In: *Deadfall*, *Play Dirty* and *The Magus*.



CLAUDIA CARDINALE made her initial impact on American audiences in 8½. Born in Tunis 29 years ago of a French mother and Italian father, she planned to become a teacher. Then she won the title "Most Beautiful Girl in Tunis." Discovered by Carlo Cristaldi, she had first success in *Big Deal on Madonna Street*. She has a son. Now appearing in movies *Once Upon A Time In The West*. She'll next star for husband Cristaldi in *The Red Tents*.



LESLIE CARON was a French dancer (born July 1, 1932) who was discovered by Gene Kelly for *An American In Paris*. She came to America and became a movie star in pictures like *Lili*. She settled in Hollywood, married George Hormel. When the marriage failed, she went back to Europe, wed English director Peter Hall, and settled in London and had two daughters. Now she's also divorced from Hall. She was last seen in *Head of The Family*.



JULIE CHRISTIE won the 1965 Oscar for her stunning portrayal of *Darling*. The daughter of a tea planter, blonde Julie was born April 14, 1941 in Assam, India, was sent to school in England at the age of 6. At 16, she went to France, modeled for a while, took up acting because, "I wanted a way to express myself." She was given an 11-minute bit in the film *Billy Liar*, which launched her career and led to a role in *Young Cassidy*. Julie was also in *Petulia*.



JAMES COBURN has worked his way up from throat-slitting feature roles to full-fledged stardom. Born in Laurel, Nebraska on August 31, 1928, James arrived in Hollywood with his family at the age of 5 but didn't get hooked on acting until 1953, when he enrolled in Los Angeles City College. SEAN CONNERY was born Thomas Connery in Edinburgh, on Aug. 25, 1930. He left school at the age of 13, worked as a coffin polisher then spent three years in the British navy. At 22 he won a chorus job in *South Pacific*. London plays, a movie debut in 1957's *Action of the Tiger* led to better things. Role of James Bond in *Dr. No*, *From Russia With Love*, and *Goldfinger* made him. Sean wed Diane Cilento in 1962. They have children, Giovanna and Jason.



JOAN CRAWFORD began her career as a chorus girl in Chicago, went on to become one of the most glamorous stars in Hollywood. Born Lucille Le Seur, March 23, 1908, in San Antonio, Texas, she left home in search of fame at 14, found it in 1925 after making her movie debut in *Pretty Ladies*. The winner of an Oscar for 1945's *Mildred Pierce*, Joan's been married four times (was widowed by husband Al Steele), has 4 adopted kids.



TONY CURTIS used to be known as Bernie Schwartz back in the old neighborhood in New York where he was born July 3, 1925. He got his first taste of acting at a local Y.M.C.A., found his way to Hollywood and made his movie debut in *City Across the River*. A great favorite with the ladies, Tony has two daughters, Kelly and Jamie, by his first wife Janet Leigh. Allegro and Alexandra, by Christine Kaufman. Is now wed to Leslie Allen. In: *The Boston Strangler*.



BETTE DAVIS, who was born April 5, 1908, left her home town of Lowell, Mass. to try her luck as an actress, got her first break on the B-way stage. She went to Hollywood in 1931 for her first movie, *Bad Sister*, became firmly established with *The Man Who Played God*. Divorced from Harmon Nelson, Bill Sherry, Arthur Farnsworth and Gary Merrill, she has three kids, Barbara, Margo and Mike, two Oscars won for *Dangerous*, 1935 and *Jezebel* in 1938.



SANDRA DEE was discovered by Ross Hunter when she was a tender 14, made her film debut on loan-out to MGM in 1957's *Until They Sail* and became an overnight teen-age favorite. Born Alexandra Zuck in Bayonne, N.J., on April 23, 1942, Sandra started her career as a child model. She's 5'4", 98 lbs., has brown eyes and blonde hair. She divorced Bobby Darin on Aug. 12, 1966 and is mother of adorable Dodd Mitchell.



OLIVIA DE HAVILLAND was born in Tokyo on July 1, 1916. The sister of actress Joan Fontaine, she was spotted by a Warner Bros. scout while appearing in a Hollywood Bowl production of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, went on to win two Oscars, for *To Each His Own* in 1946 and *The Heiress* in 1949. Twice divorced, she has a son, Benji by Marcus Goodrich and a child by French ex-husband Pierre Galante. Olivia makes her home in Paris.



KIRK DOUGLAS is from Amsterdam, N. Y. where he was born Issur Danielovitch on December 11, 1916. He met up with the acting bug while attending college, appeared on Broadway before making his movie debut in 1946 in *Strange Loves of Martha Iver*. Since then, he's become one of Hollywood's greatest. Twice wed, he has 2 sons by first wife Diana Dill and 2 more by Anne Buydens, the present Mrs. Douglas. Next: *The Brotherhood*.



SAMANTHA EGGAR was born March 5, 1939 in Hampstead, London. Because her parents were opposed to a theatrical career, she first took up fashion designing but finally managed to pursue her real love, acting. Having attracted attention at London's Royal Court Theatre. She scored a smash hit in Hollywood's *The Collector* and is now in demand. She lives in a Chelsea flat with her husband Tom Stern and their 2 children. In *The Molly Maguires*.



ALBERT FINNEY scored this year in movie *Charlie Bubbles*, Broadway's *Joe Egg*. Albie was born in Salford, England 31 years ago, attended the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. At 21, he was playing *Macbeth* at Stratford-On-Avon. A film debut in *The Entertainer* was followed by stardom in *Saturday Night and Sunday Morning*. HENRY FONDA started out to be a journalist, couldn't get a job, and switched to running a gym and selling ice cream before he took up acting permanently. Born in Grand Isle, Neb., May 16, 1905, he went from Broadway to Hollywood in 1935 in *The Farmer Takes A Wife*, has done great pix such as *Mr. Roberts*. Wed five times, dad of three, his bride is Shirlee Adams, whom he wed Dec. 3, 1965. Coming up: *Once Upon A Time In the West*.



JANE FONDA, Henry's little girl was born December 21, 1937 in New York City. Janie received her early schooling in Los Angeles, later dropped out of Vassar in order to study art in Paris. She developed an interest in acting, enrolled at the Actors Studio and soon won her first movie role in *Tall Story*. Now a vet of films, TV and the B'way stage, beautiful blonde Mrs. Roger Vadim is in *Barbarella* and is expecting her first child this autumn.



GLENN FORD's been employed in Hollywood since 1939, when he made his movie debut in *Heaven With a Barbed Wire Fence*. Born Gwyllwn Ford, May 1, 1916, in Quebec, Canada, he got his early training in a Little Theater group. He divorced Eleanor Powell in 1959, but is still close to 19-year-old son Peter. A swinging bachelor for years, Glenn wed Kathy Hays on Mar. 27, 1966 but the marriage is shaky. Glenn's latest movie is *Heaven With a Gun*.



AVA GARDNER seems to be back in movies for good, having returned to work after living in self-styled exile in Europe. A North Carolina girl, she was born on a farm on Dec. 24, 1922, was a New York model before becoming a movie star. She made her film debut in 1941 in *We Were Dancing*, found fame in *The Hucksters*. Divorced from Mickey Rooney, Artie Shaw, Frank Sinatra, Ava's "at liberty" where romance is concerned. She's in: *Mayerling*.



JAMES GARNER was born James Bumgarner in Norman, Okla., April 7, 1928, drifted around until he was signed for a bit in Broadway's *Caine Mutiny Court Martial*. WB signed him, cast him in *Toward the Unknown* and *Sayonara*, gave him the title role of TV's *Maverick*. He broke loose from the series, went on to star in films. AUDREY HEPBURN won an Oscar in '53 for *Roman Holiday*. A bit player in British films, Audrey embarked on a big-time career when the late French novelist Colette happened to see her and decided that she would be perfect as the stage *Gigi*. Born in Brussels, Belgium on May 4, 1929, Audrey lived through the German invasion of Holland, modeled before turning to acting. She wed Mel Ferrer in 1954 (they're divorcing). They have a son, Sean.



CHARLTON HESTON has been affectionately dubbed "king of the Hollywood spectacles." Born in Evanston, Ill. on Oct. 4, 1924, he took up acting at Northwestern U., got his first experience in summer stock. He worked his way to Broadway and decided to give movies a whirl in *Dark City* in 1950, won the Oscar 9 years later for *Ben-Hur*. Married for 24 years to Lydia Clark, Chuck has a son Fraser, adopted daughter, Holly. In: *Will Penny*.



WILLIAM HOLDEN has a real Hollywood success story, having been spotted by a talent scout at Pasadena. He made it big with his first movie, *Golden Boy*, in 1939, has been going strong since. Born April 17, 1918, in O'Fallon, Ill., tall, dark and handsome Bill is married to the former Brenda Marshall, is the father of three. *Sunset Blvd.* is one of his more memorable pics but he won the Oscar in 1953 for *Stalag 17*. In: *The Wild Bunch*, *The Devils Brigade*.



ROCK HUDSON has come a long way since he made his film debut in 1948's *Fighter Squadron*. Slowly groomed by Universal in a dozen tiny roles, he showed he had the stuff of which stars are made in *Magnificent Obsession*, and became one of our biggest box office stars. DEBORAH KERR was born in Scotland on Sept. 30, 1921; hit America—via British films—26 years later with *The Hucksters*, went on to be nominated a half-dozen times for an Oscar. A 5'7", 138 lb. blonde, Deborah originally trained for a ballet career and originally was married to Anthony Bartley, father of her daughters, Melanie, and Francesca. She is now Mrs. Peter Viertel, is in *Prudence and the Pill*. Deborah makes her home in Switzerland.



BURT LANCASTER was a basketball player and a circus performer before accidentally landing a role on Broadway. Born Nov. 2, 1913, in N.Y.C., rugged Burt found himself a movie star in 1946 after appearing in a film called *The Killers*. Hits like *Come Back Little Sheba* followed and he got the Oscar in 1960 for *Elmer Gantry*. Married to Norma Anderson since 1946, he has five children, is now divorcing her. New: *Castle Keep*, *Gypsy Moths*.



JACK LEMMON was born Feb. 8, 1925, in Boston, Mass., showed first signs of comic ability at Harvard U. Deciding on show biz, he first tackled N.Y., landed jobs in soap operas and TV dramas. He was launched in *It Should Happen to You* and his work in Mr. Roberts won him a supporting Oscar in 1955. Wed to Felicia Farr in 1962, they have one baby. He has a son, Chris, by first wife, Cynthia Stone. Last in *The Odd Couple*. Next: *The Job Hunter*.



VIRNA LISI was born Virna Lisi Pieralisi on August 11 in Ancona, Italy. She originally planned to take up a business career, but became an actress after being spotted by Italian movie director Francesco Maselli. An established star in both France and Italy, she made her American movie debut in *How to Murder Your Wife*. Virna is wed to industrialist Franco Pesci, has a son. Prefers to make her home in Italy. See her next in *Better A Widow*.



SOPHIA LOREN happily walked off with an Oscar in 1961 for her work in *Two Women*. An illegitimate child, she was born Sophia Scialone in Rome, Italy, on Sept. 20, 1934, and as a teen entered a beauty contest which led to film bits. Carlo Ponti groomed her for stardom. She wed Carlo in 1957, the year she made American debut in *The Pride and The Passion* and *Boy on a Dolphin*. The marriage was annulled but Sophia re-wed him in France in April, 1966.



SHIRLEY MacLAINE was hoofing in the chorus of Broadway's *Pajama Game* when she was tagged by Hal Wallis for the starring role in his pic *The Trouble With Harry*. She hasn't seen a chorus line since. Born Shirley Beatty (Warren Beatty's her brother) April 24, 1934, in Richmond, Va., she won Oscar nominations for *Some Came Running*, *The Apartment* and *The Children's Hour*. Shirley is wife of Steve Parker and mom of Steffi. Next: *Sweet Charity*.



JAMES MASON considers his meaty role in *Georgy Girl* his best since he first came to the attention of American viewers in 1945's *Seventh Veil*. Born in Huddersfield, Eng., May 15, 1909, James gave up a career in architecture in 1931 to appear in repertory. After that it was British plays, films. Mason divorced from Pamela Kellino, has a daughter Portland, son Morgan. Now working in Europe and Australia, his newest film is *Age of Consent*.



LEE MARVIN won an Oscar for 1965's *Cat Ballou*. Born and bred in New York City, the prematurely gray actor admits he was a high school dropout. He worked as a plumber's assistant and as a fruit picker, finally joined up with a summer stock group as an apprentice. After several years of playing small roles he drifted out to Hollywood, where he was tagged for films. In 1952 he wed Betty Edeling; the divorce came in 1965. They had 4 kids.



WALTER MATTHAU has been seen in a couple of dozen films (*Charade*, *Fail Safe*, etc.), 19 plays (*A Shot in the Dark*, *The Odd Couple*, etc.), *Fortune Cookie* for which he won an Oscar and more than 200 TV shows. Born on October 1 in New York City, burly Walt once toiled as a factory worker, took up acting after a 4-year stint with the Air Force. His first B'way role was in *Anne of a Thousand Days*. Wed to Carol Marcus, he's the father of five.



STEVE McQUEEN was born in Slater, Mo., on March 24, 1930, ran off to L.A. as a youth, ended up at the Boys Republic in China. He left school, worked on an oil tanker, in a lumber yard and carnival. After a stint in the Marines, Steve went to N.Y., made his stage debut in *Ha! of Rain*; screen debut in *Never So Few*. Married to Neile Adams in 1955, he's the father of Terry, Chad. He's in *Bullitt*; *The Thomas Crown Affair*.



MELINA MERCOURI was born in Athens, Greece, about 47 years ago and her granddad was former mayor there. She wed at 17, then joined an acting academy. The marriage soon ended but her career zoomed via the French stage and screen, was nominated for Oscar for *Never On Sunday*, directed by her husband Jules Dassin, did it on B'way as *Illya Darling*. The provocative blonde charmer will next be seen in *Gaily, Gaily*.



HAYLEY MILLS started her career at 12 when she won a lead in her father John Mills' film *Tiger Bay* and became a super star a year later after *Pollyanna*. She won a special Oscar for her performance. Hayley's family are all talented. Mother, Mary Hayley Bell, is a writer, sister Juliet an actress. Blonde-haired Hayley was born in London, April 18, 1946. She just completed *Twisted Nerve* under the direction of Roy Boulton the No. 1 man in her life.



ROBERT MITCHUM was born in Bridgeport, Conn. on August 6, 1917. After a regular "run of the mill" childhood and the usual service period, the rugged dreamboat drifted out to Hollywood where he admittedly planned to be a "bum." Movie scouts had other ideas and before he knew it, he was in a series of westerns, went on to become a star. Wed to Dorothy Spence. Father of 2 grown sons, young daughter. In: *Five Card Stud*, *Secret Ceremony*.



PAUL NEWMAN has been in demand since his Broadway debut in *Picnic*. His first film, 1954's *The Silver Chalice*, was a flop but *Somebody Up There Likes Me* clicked. Born in Cleveland, Ohio, on Jan. 26, 1925, Paul received his training at the Yale Dramatic School. First marriage to Jackie DeWitte ended in divorce. They had three children, Scott, Stephanie, Susan. He and Joanne Woodward (whom he wed in 1958) have daughters Eleanor, Tessa, Cleo.



DAVID NIVEN, who won an Oscar in 1958 for *Separate Tables*, started his career in repertory and stock in the British Isles, entered films in 1939 in *Without Regrets*, and slowly fought his way to top stardom after a series of mediocre "other man" roles. David was born in Scotland on Mar. 1, 1911. His first wife died. Several years later he wed Hjaridis Termeden, had two little Nivens. Is in *Before Winter Comes*, *Prudence* and *The Pill*, *The Impossible Years*.



KIM NOVAK demonstrated refrigerators in her home town, Chicago, before finding fame as a Hollywood star. Born Marilyn Novak on Feb. 13, 1933, she arrived in the movie capital as a model, proved she could act in her first film, *Pushover*, in 1954. Formerly a confirmed bachelor girl, Kim changed her mind briefly when she met handsome actor Richard Johnson. The two were wed March 15, 1965 and divorced on May 26, 1966. In: *Lylah Clare*.



PETER O'TOOLE was born in Dublin, Ireland, 36 years ago. Quitting school at 13, he got a newspaper job. After two years in the British Navy he won a scholarship at the Royal Academy. Two years later he was touring the provinces and was on his way. He walked off with the role of Lawrence of Arabia, won an Oscar nomination for that and Becket. Peter is married to Sian Phillips and has two children. In: *The Great Catherine* and *Lion In Winter*.



GREGORY PECK was born on April 5, 1916 in La Jolla, Calif., got into show biz as a barker at the World's Fair in 1939. He hit B'way (in shows like *The Willow and I*), eventually H'wood stardom in 1943's *Days of Glory*. Formerly wed to Greta Price, with whom he had 3 children, he's now the spouse of Veronique Passani and has 2 more kids, Anthony, 8, and Cecelia, 6. Greg won the Oscar in 1962 for *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Next in: *The Stalking Moon*.



GEORGE PEPPARD comes from Detroit, was once a Marine, has a B.A. from Purdue, and attended the Drama School at Carnegie Tech. Peppard came to N.Y., studied with Lee Strasberg, got Broadway jobs such as the one in *The Pleasure of His Company*, was signed by MGM. He recently starred in *House of Cards* and *Pendulum*. Divorced from first wife Helen, they had 2 children. George married Elizabeth Ashley in '66. They've a baby son.



SIDNEY POITIER, who won 1963's Oscar for *Lilies of the Field*, has been kept busy constantly in films. This huge talent was born in Nassau, B.W.I., Feb. 24, 1934, struggled to break into the theater, but once he did, was in top demand. In 1949 he screen debuted in *No Way Out*. Divorced from his wife Juanita he has 4 children. See him next in *For the Love of Ivy*. Now he wants to produce and direct on Broadway and in Hollywood.



ELVIS PRESLEY parlayed a wiggle and a shake into a multimillion-dollar success and he turned into a fine actor to boot. Born in Tupelo, Miss., Jan. 8, 1935, he moved to Memphis (where he still keeps a home). In 1955 he cut a record which brought him to the attention of Col. Tom Parker, who started the ball rolling via an RCA contract, guest shots, movie debut in *Love Me Tender* in 1956. Elvis is wed and dad: In: *Live a Little, Love a Little*.



ANTHONY QUINN was born April 21, 1915 in Mexico. One of the finest actors in films today, he has two supporting Oscars on his mantelpiece (for *Viva Zapata* in 1952 and *Lust for Life* in 1956) has been seen on Broadway. A man who refuses to worry about what people think of him, Tony is divorced from Katherine DeMille (with whom he had 4 kids). Has 3 children by Yolanda Adolori whom he wed in Jan. 1966. Next: *Shoes of the Fisherman*.



ROBERT REDFORD, a knockout with femmes, was born near Hollywood but went 3,000 miles away to learn his craft. Bob was discovered by a talent agent visiting the school where Bob was studying and he landed a Broadway role in *The Highest Tree*. While vacationing in Calif., Bob did *War Hunt* then returned East for Sunday in N.Y., *Barefoot in the Park*, which he repeated in films. Wed Lola Van Wagenen in 1958. Dad of 2. In: *Willie Boy*.



DEBBIE REYNOLDS, born Mary Frances Reynolds in El Paso, April 1, 1932, came west as a tot, grew up to be "Queen of Burbank" made screen debut in 1949's *Daughter of Rosie O'Grady*. Dropped by that studio, she was picked up by MGM for *Three Little Words* in 1950, became a star in 1951's *Singing In The Rain*. Debbie and Eddie Fisher were divorced in Feb., 1959; had two children, Carrie and Todd. Wed Harry Karl on Nov. 25, 1960.



ROSALIND RUSSELL, who was born June 4, 1912, in Waterbury, Conn., was a Broadway star (in *Garrick Gaieties*) before making her movie debut in 1934 in *Evelyn Prentice*. Married to producer Frederick Brisson since 1941 and mother of a 27-year-old son, Lance, she's noted for comedy as well as drama, is one of the most respected stars in show business. Last seen in *Where Angels Go, Trouble Follows*. She was Oscar-nominated many times, never won one.



EVA MARIE SAINT won an Oscar for her first movie, in a supporting role in *On the Waterfront*. Eva and TV got started together. She did everything from commercials to color tests, to starring roles in *One Man's Family*, *Studio One*, others. Broadway came next. Kazan whisked her into films. Born July 4, in Newark, N. J., she wed Jeff Hayden, has a son, Darrell. She was last in *The Russians Are Coming* and will next be in *The Stalking Moon*.



JILL ST. JOHN, at the age of 28, can look back on a stormy off-again-on-again, off-for-good marriage with Woolworth heir Lance Reventlow (her second try) and a career which included movie debut in *Thunder In The East* the first of a score of films. Jill's a Los Angeles girl, born Aug. 19, a radio actress when she was all of six. She's as brainy as she is beautiful, is now wed to Jack Jones and her real name is Oppenheim.



MAXIMILIAN SCHELL won the Oscar in 1961 for *Judgment at Nuremberg* in a part he created on TV in 1959. Max, born in Vienna, on Dec. 8, 1930, of a show business family including Maria, Imy and Karl, was brought up in Switzerland; turned to acting after leaving Zurich U. He was on the Paris boards when signed for U. S. debut in *Young Lions*. In *The Castle*, dark-haired, dark-eyed Max, in spite of some very hectic romances, manages to stick to bachelorhood.



GEORGE SEGAL, who scored in *No Way To Treat a Lady*, used to play in a jazz band, but decided he'd rather try his luck in acting. He went to work in New York's Circle-in-the-Square theater as a janitor, worked his way up to full-fledged actor. After appearing in two Broadway plays, *Gideon* and *Rattle of a Simple Man*, he turned to films in *Act One*, *Ship of Fools*. He's married to Marian Sabel, has a daughter; still digs banjo. New: *Southern Star*.



PETER SELLERS was born into a theatrical family in Southsea, England, on Sept. 8, 1925. He began his career doing impersonations while serving with the R.A.F., went on to become a radio, TV and movie star. Considered one of the most versatile actors in show biz, Pete is quiet and serious off-camera, has two kids by first wife, Anne Hayes, one by Britt Ekland, whom he recently divorced. Currently appearing in: *The Party* and *I Love You Alice B. Toklas*.



OMAR SHARIF, who scored in the title role of *Dr. Zhivago*, is a 35-year-old former timber salesman from Cairo who's being touted as another Rudolph Valentino on the basis of his smash hit performance in *Lawrence of Arabia*. Omar spent five years in his dad's lumber business before he took up acting and became a mid-east sensation, starring in 23 films. He's divorced; has one son. He's currently starring in *Funny Girl*, *The Appointment* and *Mayerling*.



JEAN SIMMONS was discovered by a talent scout in a dancing school when she was 14 and put in a film called *Adam and Evelyn* with first husband-to-be, Stewart Granger. Born in London, England, Jan. 31, 1929, she was the youngest of four children. Her big break was a role in *Hamlet*, with Laurence Olivier. She's worked in the U. S. since 1950. Now wed to Richard Brooks, she has 2 children. She recently appeared in *Divorce, American Style*.



ELKE SOMMER, a gorgeous, blue-eyed blonde, came to this country in 1963 for *The Prize*, climaxing a career that included 17 previous movies made abroad. Born in Germany, Elke, who speaks five languages, learned English working as a mother's helper in Britain. She found her way into pictures when she was chosen Miss Viareggio and that led to a contract. She's 25 years old, married to Joe Hayams. Next in *The Wrecking Crew*.



TERENCE STAMP, who made his film debut as *Billy Budd*, was a commercial artist in his home town of London before being bitten by the theatrical bug. He studied drama, made the tour of the provinces in repertory and then managed to get a few small roles on the London stage. Peter Ustinov spotted him in something called, *Why the Chicken*. Great in *The Collector*, Terence is single, recently was in *Far From The Madding Crowd* and *Blue*.



ROD STEIGER was born in Newark, N. J., April 14, 1925. He joined the Navy at 16, stayed five years before going in for a theatrical career. A powerful actor, he made his name on TV, originating such roles as *Marty*. Recent films include *Dr. Zhivago*, *The Pawnbroker*. Wed to Claire Bloom since Sept. 19, 1958, they have one child, Anna. Rod won last year's Oscar for *In The Heat of Night*. Now: *The Illustrated Man*, *Three Into Two Can't Go*.



JAMES STEWART was well on his way to a degree at Princeton when the acting bug bit. He answered the call, played summer stock and B'way, found himself in demand as a movie star after appearing in *Rose Marie* in 1935. Born May 29, 1908 in Indiana, Pa., Jimmy's an Oscar winner (for 1940's *Philadelphia Story*), has been married since 1949 to Gloria McLean. He's a devoted family man and the father of four. Coming up: *Bandolero*.



ELIZABETH TAYLOR, undisputed Queen of Hollywood, winner of two Oscars, (*Butterfield 8*, 1960, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf*, 1966) was born in London Feb. 27, 1932. She came to this country as a tot, did bit roles before scoring in *Lassie Come Home*. *National Velvet* made her a star and she never toppled, despite scandals, five husbands (Nicky Hilton, Mike Wilding, Mike Todd, Eddie Fisher and Burton). Liz has 4 kids. Next film: *Secret Ceremony*.



ROD TAYLOR, who gave his best performance to date in *The Liquidator*, has been in Hollywood since 1954. A native of Sydney, Australia, he came to play *Long John Silver*, stayed to make films like *Giant* and *The V.I.P.'s*. He also starred in a TV series, *Hong Kong*. A dynamo, he seldom has time to relax, but when he does, he fusses over his beautiful 2½-year-old daughter, Felicia, but his marriage to Mary Hilem has been shaky. Coming up: *The High Commissioner*.



LANA TURNER was born Feb. 8, 1920, in Wallace, Idaho, rose to fame as Hollywood's favorite "sweater girl." Supposedly discovered at a soda fountain, she made her movie debut in 1937's *They Won't Forget*, is as popular today as she was in her youth. Lana's divorced from Artie Shaw, Steve Crane (with whom she had a daughter, Cheryl, 23), Bob Topping, Lex Barker and Fred May, is divorcing husband Bob Eaton, whom she married June 2, 1965.



JOHN WAYNE began life with the unlikely moniker of Marion Morrison in Iowa on May 26, 1908, became one of most popular h-men in Hollywood. Having made an inauspicious movie debut in *The Big Trail*, he hit it big in 1939's *Stagecoach*, has been on top ever since. John's been married 3 times (to Pilar Pallette since 1954), has 7 children and over a dozen grandkids. As brave in real life as he is on screen, he licked cancer. New: *The Green Berets*.



RICHARD WIDMARK was born in Sunrise, Minn., on Dec. 26, 1915, taught drama at Lake Forest College before going to Broadway where he specialized in playing well-bred young men. He made an immediate hit in his first film, *Kiss of Death* in 1947 as a moronic killer, and has remained big ever since. Married to Jean Hazlewood since 1942, they have a grown daughter. Last in *Madigan*, Widmark will soon be seen in *Patch*.



SHELLEY WINTERS won a supporting Oscar in 1959 for *Diary of Anne Frank* and in 1965 for *A Patch of Blue*. Shelley has been alternating between films like *Alfie* and stage plays for the past decade. Her personal life, with three divorces, has been less successful. Shelley was born Shirley Schrift in St. Louis, Aug. 18, '23, raised in Brooklyn. Stage's *Oklahoma!* led to films. She has a girl Vicki, 13, by 2nd mate Vittorio Gassman. New: *The Mad Room*.



NATALIE WOOD has been thrice nominated for Oscars: for *Rebel Without a Cause*, *Splendor in the Grass* and *Love With a Proper Stranger*. Born Natasha Gurdin in San Francisco on July 20, 1938, she started working five years later in *Tomorrow is Forever*—and made the transition from tot to teen to temptress. She wed Bob Wagner in 1957, divorced him in 1963, has had several fiancés since. Brown-eyed, Nat hasn't made a film in two years.



JOANNE WOODWARD, Mrs. Paul Newman, is the Oscar winner in the family, having won hers in 1957 for *Three Faces of Eve*. Born in Thomasville, Ga., Feb. 27, 1931, Joanne understudied in Broadway's *Picnic*, where she met Paul, went to Hollywood with him, did "B" films until the Eve break. She and Paul were wed in 1958 and they have three daughters, Eleanor, Tessa and Cleo. Joanne was directed by Paul in *Rachel, Rachel*, co-stars with him in *Winning*.
