TELEVISION FILM PRODUCER AND DISTRIBUTOR PERSONALITIES

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JOHN L. SINN, president of Ziv Television Programs, Inc., and World Broadcasting System, and executive vice president of Frederick W. Ziv Co., guides the destiny of the firms in the production of filmed television shows. He is responsible for everything from the original idea to the picture on the viewer's set. John set out in life to become a lawyer, but after a year at the University of Chicago, he decided that his true vocation was in the entertainment field, and switched to Cincinnati University. After graduation, he gained a solid foundation in his chosen field by a stint at WLW, where he put in an eighteen-hour day, seven days a week. After a short career as a free-lance writer, John joined the Ziv Agency, where he has been ever since.

CARL STANTON, vice-president of NBC, of NBC's subsidiary, the Kagran Corporation, and head of NBC Television Films, came to the network as director of the Television Talent and New Programs department in 1949. He had gained experience with the advertising department of Sears, Roebuck & Co., on the West Coast. In 1934 the Stanford U. graduate joined the Lord & Thomas advertising agency as radio-producer-director. Among the programs for which he was responsible were the memorable "Amos 'n' Andy," "Lum 'n' Abner," and "Bob Hope" shows. After being named account executive for the American Tobacco account, he was named radio director when the firm became Foote, Cone & Belding. After six years with Dancer-Fitzgerald-Sample and its predecessors, Bob joined NBC, and within three years was named national program manager for the TV network programs. He was subsequently appointed director of the Film Division, and elected VP in 1953.





RALPH M. COHN, vice-president and general manager of Screen Gems, Inc., television subsidiary of Columbia Pictures, was born into show business, and has served apprenticeships in all its branches. Ralph is the son of Jack Cohn, executive vice-president of Columbia Pictures Corp., and was born in New York on May 1, 1914. After attending Cornell, he spent a year and a half in the legitimate theatre, and then headed for Hollywood, where he shortly became a producer. In 1941 he became executive producer of Darmour Productions, and turned out the "Ellery Queen' and "Crime Doctor" feature films. After service in the Signal Corps during the war, he formed Triangle Productions with Mary Pickford and Charles Rogers, and later Pioneer Telefilms, which became the Columbia subsidiary, Screen Gems, in 1951.

MICHAEL M. (MICKEY) SILLERMAN, executive vice-president of Television Programs of America, Inc., was founder, and president, from 1938 to 1949 of the Keystone Broadcasting System, a network of more than four hundred stations. From that position Mickey, a native Baltimorean, joined the Frederic W. Ziv Company as a radio programs account executive, and a year later was appointed director of station relations of the World Broadcasting System, Inc., the Ziv affiliate. Prior to founding KBS, he was in the advertising agency field for five years. In addition to his heavy schedule with TPA, Mickey finds time to conduct the Sillerman "Sales Clinic."





MERLE S. JONES, executive vice-president of Columbia Broad-casting System Television, had the unique distinction of being one of the nation's busiest commuters a few years ago. As general manager of two CBS owned and operated stations in Los Angeles, he was constantly shuttling between headquarters in New York and the coast. In addition to these duties, he was head of the Columbia Pacific Network. With his appointment as vice-president, Merle assumed the varied duties of manager of the CBS owned stations, department handling of national spot advertising for a selected list of network stations, and became head of the Television Film Sales Unit before becoming executive V.P.



DAVID V. SUTTON, vice-president of MCA-TV Ltd. in charge of film division, is a lawyer turned broadcaster. A graduate of the University of Virginia and the University of West Virginia Law School, Dave never practiced law. Instead, he entered broadcasting with WBBM, Chicago, in 1940, as a salesman. He became Eastern sales manager in 1942, but was interrupted by a stint in the Marines. Doffing his uniform, ne joined KMOX, St. Louis, as Commercial Manager, and then moved to CBS Radio Sales, after which he was in rapid succession general sales manager and vice-president in charge of sales of CBS-TV. The 43-year-old West Virginia native then moved to MCA as VP and member of the board of directors.

REUB KAUFMAN, president of Guild Films, is the man who gave Liberace to the American public. Reub, an alumnus of the University of Chicago, saw the possibilities in the unknown piano player, and in 1952 personally toured the country selling a film of Liberace to local stations. The rest of the story is history. Born in Russia in 1903, Reub's family moved to Tulsa before he entered school, and after graduation from college, he formed his own agency, Kaufman & Associates, and was responsible for the success of Jay's Potato Chips, with the slogan "A Pip of a Chip." In 1952 he formed Guild Films, and today has acquired a library of almost 700 Hollywood features and shorts, and almost 200 Looney Tunes cartoons.





GEORGE T. SHUPERT, president of the American Broadcasting Company Film Syndication, Inc., the subsidiary of American Broadcasting-Paramount Theatres, Inc., entered the visual media field in 1938 working for Industrial Pictures, Inc. In 1940 he suggested to Paramount Pictures that they create their own industrial film division, and was hired to organize it and handle sales. In 1943, he entered the television field as assistant to Paul Raibourn, president of Paramount TV Productions. Eight years later, in 1951, he joined producer Edward Small in organizing Peerless Television Productions, Inc., taking the post of vice-president in charge of sales. A year later he became vice-president and general manager of United Artists Television Corporation, the position he resigned in August 1953, to establish ABC Film Syndication.

MICKEY SCHWARZ, president of ATV Film Productions, Inc., started his film careers at the age 14, working summers in the film laboratories. By the time he had finished college he had been through the stages of printing, developing, negative cutting, printing, and editing. His first professional job was with the Meyer Reiger Film Laboratory in New York. Mickey moved back to the coast as an assistant cutter at the RKO Pathe studios, and in 1937 he became a charter member of the Society of Motion Picture Film Editors. He also worked with the Major Picture Studios, and Universal. During the war he served in the Air Force, and returned to produce live television programs, edited TV film shows, and in 1952 entered the film commercial field by forming his own company, the ATV Film Productions.





ELY A. LANDAU, president of National Telefilm Associates, has a long record of achievement for a young man of 35. A native New Yorker, and only nine years in the broadcasting field, Ely did a three year stint in the Army Air Force during the hostilities, and in 1947 joined the production staff for television of Raymond E. Nelson. Two years later he became the TV director of Moss Advertising, and later assumed a similar position for the Emil Mogul Co., Inc., where he was instrumental in building the video department to its present formidable proportions. In January 1954, he formed NTA. In his spare time, Ely authored the booklet, "Television Story."



EARL COLLINS, president and general manager of Hollywood Television Service, Inc., is a veteran of 26 years of experience in the sales and distribution end of the motion picture industry. He brings to TV a first-hand knowledge of how to deliver what audiences want and how to properly service clients, stations and networks. The HTS organization today has a sales representation in 32 key cities across the nation. In addition to the large assortment of features, dramas and mysteries handled by HTS, Earl has also made it known that the company is planning to produce many series of pictures, made expressly for TV, edited to meet the needs of local sponsors. Some of these are now in production and an announcement on the company's plans for these films will be made in the near future.

HAROLD L. HACKETT, chairman of the board, and president of Official Films, Inc., started his career as a sailor in the merchant marine, and is still traveling in his position with Official Films. This year alone he has made seven round trips to Europe, due to stepped-up production demands. After his stint at sea, Harold spent four years with NBC before joining MCA. In his twenty years with the firm, he rose to the position of vice president of radio and television, and gained the experience and background for his present position. He joined Official Films in 1953 in the capacity of president, and in 1955 became chairman of the board. Harold is a member of the NAITB, and of the Association of TV Film Distributors.





DWIGHT W. MARTIN, vice president of General Teleradio, Inc., came to the firm in June 1952, after six years as assistant general manager of the Crosley Broadcasting Corp. A graduate of the University of Cincinnati College of Law, he started his business career as a practicing attorney with the firm of Dinsmore, Shohl, Sawyer, & Dinsmore in 1934 and remained with them as an associate until 1943, when he entered the Navy. He returned to the firm as a general partner in 1945, but left to join Crosley the following year, ultimately becoming a vice president. After Dwight came to General Teleradio, he organized the Film Division, and his present assignment is as a member of the staff, which is concerned with operation of all divisions of the company.

WILLIAM J. GERMAN, distributor of Eastman professional motion picture films, organized two companies, W. J. German, Inc., one chartered in Delaware, the other in California, to handle the firm's trade. Bill's initial association with Eastman was in 1906 in Rochester. After filling several posts he came to N. Y. in 1921 as manager of the G.M. Labs. in Long Island City as well as of the Paragon studios and labs and San Jacq Film Printing Corp. at Fort Lee, N. J. One year later Bill became associated with Jules E. Brulatour and in two years he organized and became V.P. and general manager of J. E. Brulatour, Inc., which took over the sole distribution of Eastman films for movies and T.V. At Brulatour's death, Bill became president of the two Brulatour corporations, and completed purchase of the latter's assets in 1951.





PAUL RAIBOURN, vice president and member of the Board of Directors of Paramount Pictures Corporation, is also Chairman of the Board of International Telemeter Corporation, of Chromatic Television Laboratories, member of the board of the NARTB, treasurer and director of the Allen B. DuMont Laboratories, Inc., and President of TV station KTLA, Los Angeles. Associated with Paramount since 1921, his duties include supervision of budgets and planning, and of all of the firm's TV interests. A native of Illinois and a graduate of the University of Illinois, Paul spent four years with Bell Telephone as a design engineer. In 1937-8 he conducted a survey of TV developments here and abroad that gave Paramount an early edge in the field.



MAURICE J. RIFKIN, vice-president in charge of sales for Ziv TV Programs, Inc., was born in Marinette, Wisc., on July 12, 1914. His family moved to Youngstown, O., when he was one year old. It was there he stayed through his graduation from Rayen High School in 1930. He received a B.A. in 1935 and an M.A. in 1936 from the University of Southern California. At that time, he returned to Youngstown where he worked as an account executive with WKBN. In 1938, he moved to Cincinnati, where he joined the Frederick W. Ziv Co. In 1949, Rifkin came to New York City to be sales manager for Ziv TV Programs, Inc. He was appointed to his present position in 1952. He and his wife, the former Theodora Levin, have one child, Joan, and they live in Great Neck, Long Island.

MARK GOODSON, partner with Bill Todman in Goodson-Todman Productions, was born in Sacramento, Calif., and began his career in show business as a child actor in stock companies. Goodson entered radio at KJBS, San Francisco, as a disc jockey in 1936. He moved on to the Don Lee Network Headquarters in 1937, where he began as an announcer, switched to special events, then production, in which capacity he developed a group of shows. He came to New York in June, 1942, where he began as emcee of "Battle of the Boroughs" and the "Jack Dempsey Sports Quiz." This led to his directing soap operas. He wrote and directed dramatic spots on the "Kate Smith Show" and co-produced the first of the "Stop the Music" series before he and Todman became associated.





MILTON GORDON, president of Television Programs of America, Inc., is the third member of the triumvirate of Edward Small and Michael Sillerman, who guide the fortune of the flourishing TPA. A financial wizard associated with multi-million dollar investments in television, Milt left active supervision of the Walter E. Heller Company, the Chicago banking firm where he had been vice-president, to enter the infant industry of TV. In 1946 he pulled the frozen food business out of the red, and later launched a new program for Capehart-Farnsworth. Milt also inaugurated the first split hemisphere financial deal between an American banking firm and English investors to produce the Academy Award winning motion picture, "The African Queen."

JEROME S. HYAMS, president of Hygo Television Films, Inc., and Unity Television Corp., spent 18 years with Commonwealth Films before founding his own firm in 1952. Starting in 1934 as an office boy, his first promotion came when they established their 16 mm motion picture department, when Jerry became a salesman. During World War II he served in the OSS film department, where he worked with John Ford. After the war he went back to Commonwealth as sales manager of 16 mm films. With the coming of television, Jerry helped establish and manage the sales activity. A resident of Great Neck, and a do-it-yourself gardener, Jerry held that position until he formed the Hygo firm.





FRED J. MAHLSTEDT, director of operations for CBS-TV Film Sales, is not only a pioneer in the television film industry, but has the unique distinction of having been a practicing architect for four years. Educated at the Pratt Institute's School of Architecture, he started in broadcasting with Erwin, Wasey, and the Kudner Agency. In 1939 he joined Columbia, where he has been ever since. He started as the chief of sales development for the research department, and moved to radio sales promotion, and then to spot sales. In June, 1950, he was given the job of organizing a film syndication unit, and has handled it ever since.



SHAMUS CULHANE, president and founder of the animation studios that bear his name, established the firm in 1945, after a long and meritorious association with RKO, Universal, Paramount, and MGM studios. Shamus worked on more than 250 animated pictures, and won six national prizes for his cartoons. For a period of five years he was with the Walt Disney Studios, working as a pantomine specialist on such pictures as "Snow White," "Pinnochio," and the "Pluto" series. He has produced animated telecommercials for Ajax Cleaner, Muriel Cigars, Halo Shampoo, and others. Since his start as a 15-year-old errand boy for the old Lantz Studios in New York, Shamus has come a long way, working at every job in the industry en route.

SAUL JEFFEE, president of Movielab Film Laboratories, started in the industry over a quarter of a century ago. Always mechanically inclined, Saul has combined business and pleasure in his hobby of tinkering in his home machine shop, and has developed many modifications which have contributed to the advancement of film processing. Saul's firm is finishing up an expansion program that will have increased the firm, 80 per cent of whose clients are television accounts, threefold. Saul is completely wrapped up in his work, but does find time to pursue a second hobby, tropical fish.





WILLIAM J. GANZ, president of the William J. Ganz Co., Inc., has produced over 1,000 films on a tremendous range of subjects for practically all major industries. At 20, Bill was a free-lance cameraman, and served as Universal Newsreel's Philadelphia representative, back in the early days of the news short. In 1919 he came to New York and started his own film business, specializing in the production of sponsored films for industry. Ganz films evolved as quickly as the industry, shifting from silent to sound in the late 1920's, and ten years later from black and white to color. In 1943 he formed the Institute of Visual Training, Inc., for the specific purpose of offering "planned distribution" to clients.

JACK WRATHER, president of Wrather Television Productions, Inc., and part owner of station WNEW, New York, has business interests ranging from the oil industry to the resort field. In television, his firm is the producer of "The Boss Lady," and the owner of all rights to the "Lone Ranger," acquired from Trendle & Associates for a reported \$3,000,000. Jack started out in the then new field of TV with the purchase of KOTV Tulsa, and a year later, in association with Mrs. Helen Alvarez, KFMB and KFMB-TV, San Diego. At the present time he has applications before the FCC for a TV channel in Corpus Christi and a UHF channel in Boston. The Tulsa property was sold recently. Wrather's fortune was founded in the oil industry, and in addition to TV, has expanded to resorts in California and Nevada.





PAUL TALBOT, president of Fremantle Overseas Radio & Television, Inc., the largest distributors of radio and television material for the international market, got in on the ground floor of television with CBS in 1941. Following Army service during the war, he became American representative for the Italian Radio Network, and for Radio Andorra, which was the first European station to get back on a commercial basis after the war. Today, as one of the youngest executives in the field, Paul heads a firm with a program on the air somewhere in the world every minute in the year. The firm has recently acquired two wholly owned branch offices in London, and Mexico City. Paul was the American representative to the recent UNESCO conference on international television and movies.



JAMES L. CADDIGAN, director of the Electronicam Division of the Allen B. DuMont Laboratories, Inc., is a veteran in the entertainment field, and a pioneer in TV network programming. His background includes radio, the legitimate theatre, and 15 years with Paramount Pictures and Paramount News. In 1947, Jim began supervision of programming and production for the DuMont Television Network, and led the way for the first full daytime operation by a television station, WABD, in New York. He was also responsible for the first science fiction series, "Captain Video," and the first big amateur show, "The Original Amateur Hour." In June, 1955, Jim was named director of marketing for Electronicam, and in January of this year became overall director of the division.

ARMAND L. SCHAEFER, president in charge of production for Flying A Productions, Inc., was born in Tavistock, Ontario. Following service in the U. S. Army tank corps during World War I, he entered pictures in 1924 as property man with Mack Sennett comedies. Following a career there where he also functioned as electrician, actor, etc., Armand became property man for Mary Pickford Productions and later functioned as assistant director and production manager for various independents. Becoming a director in 1932, Armand directed 13 serials, including Gene Autry's first. When Gene Autry Productions was formed in 1947, Armand resigned from Republic to become president of the company and in 1950, became president of Flying A Productions.





MARTIN N. LEEDS, executive vice-president of production at Desilu Productions, Inc., has been with Desi and Lucy since 1953. Marty holds one of the most responsible jobs in Thile still in his thirties. A graduate of New York University with the degree of bachelor of science and bachelor of laws, he was admitted to the California bar upon his arrival there. Desi Arnaz, Desilu prexy, was so impressed with the former CBS-TV business affairs director, that he brought Leeds into the Desilu picture in the second highest position in the firm. Leeds is also a vice-president of Motion Picture Center Studios, and chairman of the code committee for the TV industry. A veteran of the U.S. Army, he is married to the former Doris T. Segal and is the father of two sons.

GEORGE S. GLADDEN, executive vice-president for Academy Pictures, Inc., the commercial film production organization, joined the firm in November of 1954 after a varied career in the motion picture and radio fields. In 1931 he joined General Motors and rose to become the head of the Public Relations Motion Picture Department. He designed and established the format of the firm's first major road show, "The Parade of Progress," which has been seen throughout the nation since 1936. In 1938 he joined Audio Productions as a writer-director and simultaneously acted as Eastern color director for Technicolor, Inc. Starting in 1940, George served for 14 years as the head of the motion picture and film TV department of the J. Walter Thompson Agency. A graduate of both Cornell and M.I.T., he is married and the father of three children.





CHARLES E. RYND, president and chairman of the board of Audio & Video Products Corporation, was instrumental in solving one of the major headaches of network radio. Back in 1946 Charlie's efforts in behalf of "Operation Rynd" resulted in the technique of delayed network broadcasting via Ampex Tape Recordings, which solved the problems resulting from daylight saving time, and was quickly adopted by all networks. A graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Hamilton College, Charlie entered radio with NBC. From 1935 to 1942 he was with the network's sales and traffic, later moving over to ABC as sales service manager. He rose to become vice-president and assistant secretary of the company before leaving to form his own firm.



JOHN W. LOVETON, president of John Loveton Productions, West Coast TV film firm, started his broadcasting career handling the General Foods "Show Boat" radio program for Benton and Bowles. In 1937, he moved to Ruthrauff & Ryan, where he supervised 17 shows and directed some of their top radio productions. From there, he went to Foote, Cone and Belding, where he was placed in charge of all Lucky Strike radio. After a brief term as co-director of radio for Geyer, Cornell, and Newell, he joined Lennen and Mitchell, where be began his long association with the "Mr. and Mrs. North" property. He resigned from the agency in 1947 and has since produced and directed this show from his own office. When he moved into TV, he transferred his production set-up to the West Coast.

CHARLES J. BASCH, JR., president of Television Screen Productions, and in partnership with his wife Frances Scott, Basch Radio-TV Productions, has been a producer of radio shows and commercials for 21 years, and has been in television for ten. Born in Newark, New Jersey, Charlie spent his early career in the manufacturing field, leaving it in 1929 for a Wall St. job. He spent two years in the financial world, before teaming up with his wife in show business. His wife, "Scottie," was radio's first woman roving reporter at the time they formed their own firm. Charlie conceived and directed many of the nationally known spots on the air, and have handled live shows and commercials for many clients. They formed Television Screen Productions in 1949.





GUY V. THAYER, vice-president and general manager of Rowland Reed Productions, Hollywood TV film firm, entered the motion picture field, while a senior at Hollywood High School, working at an after-school job in the Paramount film laboratory. He moved up through the ranks as senior film editor at Paramount, RKO and Universal-International, then became associate producer for PRC. He left the latter position for service in the U. S. Navy, serving in a photographic unit. At the United Nations conference in San Francisco, he was coordinator between the military and government crews of all countries, and he also set up the photographing of the war crimes trials in Nuremberg, Germany. Guy was discharged from the Navy in 1945 and he immediately joined Roland Reed Productions.

TOM VALENTINO, head of T. J. Valentino, Inc., has been supplying the radio, theatre, and television world with sound effects and mood music for the past 20 years. He broke into radio on what must have been one of the first P.I. deals on record. At the time Tom was a piano and organ tuner and tuned station pianos in return for two-minute pitches advertising his services. While working around the studios he noticed the first crude attempts at sound effects—which led him to form his present company. From a modest beginning, Tom has gone on to create sounds for practically all the shows on Broadway, not to mention little theatres all over the country.





JOSEPH PLUNKETT, vice president of North American Television Productions, Inc., has had a varied career as an executive in show business. In the legitimate theatre, he was associated with Liebler & Co., and George Tyler, producing many Broadway hit plays. He was managing director of the Century Theatre (formerly the New Theatre) and also produced plays under his own management, then was appointed managing director of the Strand Theatre in New York. He produced pictures for Paramount Pictures Corporation, then became director, vice president, and general manager of the RKO Corporation. Later, he served as vice president of Select Attractions, Inc., distributing special pictures. It was in 1954 that Plunkett entered the TV film field, assuming his present post with NATP.



WILLIAM F. BROIDY, president of Wm. F. Broidy Productions, Inc., is a native of Chelsea, Mass. He spent two years in the business school of Northeastern University but was forced to leave due to illness. Bill first entered the textile business then interior decorating before discovering a lifetime career in the distribution of motion picture films. In March, 1946, Bill went to California and spent three and a half years learning all phases of motion picture production. In 1950, he organized Wm. F. Broidy Productions for the purpose of producing films, especially for TV. Headlining his current schedule is "Wild Bill Hickok," co-starring Guy Madison and Andy Devine, a series which enjoys great popularity with the children's audience.

EDGAR G. (TED) SISSON, director of the NBC Film Division, is responsible for the sale, advertising, and kinescoping of the vast NBC film library. Ten years service as a mechanical and radio engineer, in a consulting capacity for radio set manufacturers, preceded his directing-producing positions. He joined NBC's radio production staff, and directed "The Jack Benny Show," and "Your Hit Parade," among others. A Princeton graduate, where he helped start an experimental station, Ed became head of the radio department at the New York office of Lord & Thomas. He then spent nine years with Pedlar & Ryan, ultimately as VP in charge of radio, and then four years with N. W. Ayer. In December, 1953 he joined NBC as an associate producer, and the following month became director of the Film Division.





CHESTER ERSKINE, President of Chester Erskine Productions, producer of the Reader's Digest series of TV films, has had a long and varied background in the producing, directing, and writing of plays and motion pictures. He abandoned the law career for which he studied at Union University, Schenectady, N. Y., in order to study for the theatre at the American Academy for Dramatic Arts. In 1929, he began directing Broadway plays. At one time, he was head of Charles Frohman, Inc., and also served as director for the Theatre Guild, and the Erlanger and Shubert interests. Starting in 1944 he wrote and directed a number of screenplays. First venture under Chester Erskine Productions was "Witness to Murder," starring Barbara Stanwyck, George Sanders, and Gary Merrill.

NORMAN GLUCK, vice-president and general sales manager of United World Films, Inc., started up the ladder of the film business as an usher in his hometown of Racine, Wisconsin. From this beginning Norm went ahead to become the manage of many theatres throughout the East for both RKO and Skouras. Between 1936 and 1947 he managed movie theatres in Schenectady and Albany as well as several cities in New Jersey and New York. Following the end of World War II, in which Norm served in the army, he became affiliated with Universal Pictures and for two years managed the Park Avenue theatre. Later he moved to United World Television, the Universal subsidiary, in 1949. Two years later he assumed his present post.





BASIL GRILLO, executive vice president of Bing Crosby Enterprises, is described by industry associates as an account with imagination. His financial and management background is both wide and varied. He has managed all of the Crosby financial interests and has organized all Crosby packages for the past ten years, including acting as executive producer of the "Fireside Theatre" series. He is also acting in the same capacity for the dramatic series which the firm is producing for the Studebaker-Packard Motor Car Company. Basil has an active hand in such allied organizations as Decros Corporation, the Crosby-Jayson Corporation, Bings Things, Inc., and Crosby Research Foundation. He is president of the Namso Enterprises Inc., merchandising firm serving the Crosby interests.





WILLIAM VAN PRAGG, head of Van Pragg Productions, produces and directs both film commercials and features for television. From a start in the industry as manager of a theatre, Van Praag got into advertising via a promotional scheme for theatres. He worked on advertising films for theatrical distribution, and from there became a free-lance film editor, doing stints for some of the top film companies. His creative talent drew the notice of Uncle Sam, who contracted him to set up the first film unit for the OWI. After a three-year hitch in the Army, he went back to free lancing on a large scale. Prior to forming his own company, he did some pioneer film work for NBC-TV, was on the production staff for several features released through United Artists, and worked for Bray Studios.

HENRY "DOC" BROWN, president of Atlas Television Corp., has been in the motion picture business for over 25 years, and has experience as an exhibitor, owner of a chain of theatres, producer of motion pictures, and head of an international distributing organization. "Doc," a graduate of both CCNY and Columbia, founded Atlas in 1948, and collected more than 350 film comedies, editing them to quarter-hour lengths so that program managers could use them freely. Since then Atlas has gone into new production, and has several filmed program projects under way. "Doc" is a member of the board of the National Television Film Council, a director of the Allied Theatre Owners of New Jersey, and a Motion Picture Pioneer.





ISIDORE LINDENBAUM, president of Filmcraft Productions, is one of Hollywood's leading makers of filmed TV productions. He attended UCLA and Harvard Law School and has long been recognized as one of the top experts in the television film field. He entered the TV medium in 1949, when he formed a corporation to explore Doctor Ferenz Fodor's inventions, which since have been responsible for many advances in TV. While always feeling that TV was his medium, "Lindy" still maintains a large practice at law and at one time he was a pharmacist, and is still licensed. His Filmcraft company is on a par with the biggest in Hollywood and at present towns its own large studio and took over the first motion picture theatre in Hollywood for exclusive use for filmed TV productions.

LOUIS HUOT, vice-president in charge of client relations for Five Star Productions of Hollywood, has had wide experience both in newspaper work and film production. For five years he was vice president and European manager for Press Wireless, Inc. He represented the Chicago Tribune in Europe for two years, headquartering in Paris, and has worked for numerous other papers, including the Montreal Gazette. In film production, Louis has produced public relations movies for such clients as the Prudential Insurance Co., Pontiac Motors, and the Block Drug Co. of New Jersey. He has made movies on new weapons and techniques for the Army Signal Corps. In his position at Five Star Productions of Hollywood, he suprevises the production of both TV commercials and institutionals.





EDWARD HOCHHAUSER, JR., vice-president of Muzak Corporation, vice-president and general manager of its Associated Program Service Division, and vice-president and director of merchandising for Muzak Corporation Franchise Division, initially joined APS as a field representative in 1951. He started in local radio in 1941, and in '46 joined the newly formed Transcriptions Sales, Inc., where he was successively account executive, sales manager, Eastern Division manager, and vice-president. After joining APS he was rapidly made sales manager, general manager, and in January of 1953, he was elected vice-president of Muzak. The 37-year-old Mr. Hochhauser is an alumnus of the University of Virginia, and a resident of Merrick, Long Island.



MARTIN P. HENRY, president of Video Pictures and West Coast Sound Studios, was born in Lebanon, Indiana on June 4, 1904. He was educated at the University of Florida. He began his career as an assistant director in 1924 and worked for Famous Players, Lasky, Paramount and Fox. He opened West Coast Sound Studios in 1932, with George Goman and Al Manchee. Martin serviced West Coast Productions, shooting screen tests, second units, and backgrounds. He later branched into short subjects, documentaries, sales training and educational pictures. From 1942 to 1946 he was a Major in the U. S. Army Signal Corps, Chief of Army Ground Force Training Films. He returned to West Coast Sound Studios and Video Pictures as vice-president and production manager. Martin is now making pilot films for TV.

JAY BONAFIELD, general manager of RKO Pathe, a division of the RKO Radio Pictures, Inc., entered the motion picture field as a reel boy in the cutting department of Fox Movietone News. A native of Tunnelton, West Virginia, he was soon promoted to assistant editor, and then film editor, working on newsreels. In 1931 he joined Pathe as newsreel film editor, and in his years in that capacity personally edited such outstanding news stories as the Hindenburg disaster, the Lindbergh case, the Morro Castle fire, and presidential inaugurations. He was transferred to the short subjects department, where he became head of the editing department, and then to production manager.





W. WALLACE ORR, president, Tel Ra Productions, Philadelphia, is believed to be one of the largest producers of TV sports film. Tel Ra Productions, which he founded in 1948, produces "Telesports Digest," "Sports Spotlight," "Touchdown," "Greatest Pro Football Plays of the Week," and "Post Time, U.S.A." During the past eight years, his firm has produced more than 700 sports shows for TV use. Presently, along with its established sports programs and some TV commercials, Tel Ra Productions is placing emphasis upon color films. Thus far color is being used extensively in filming thoroughbred racing and major league baseball. Orr was an advertising executive for 27 years, being vice-president of N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., 1944-48.

KERN MOYSE, president of Peerless Film Processing Corporation, has a wide variety of experience in his business background. He was born in Columbus, Georgia, graduated from Harvard, and then from St. Lawrence Law School. He went to work in the Texas oil fields, and spent a period in the banking business in New York, where he became the managing director of National Coal Company of Cuba, and followed this experience with 11 years as an insurance broker. In 1934 Kern became vice-president of Peerless, and in 1946, president. He is a director of the Association of Cinema Laboratories, and of the National TV Film Counsel, as well as a member of the Motion Picture and TV Engineers Society, and of the Radio and Television Executives Society.





SAM HERSH, president of Family Films, Inc., a prominent figure in the production and distribution of religious pictures, is no stranger to show business. For some time prior to 1948, Sam was a well-known film sales executive, handling his own pictures as well as features for several studios. Traveling extensively, it was meeting the actual buyer of films that catapulted Sam Hersh into the production of motion pictures. Noting that the film industry produced relatively few inspirational pictures, Sam decided to go into this type of production. In 1948, Sam formed Family Films, Inc. The company's prowess since has been illustrious. Family Films, Inc. has produced to date over 200 inspirational films for both the TV and church markets.



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FRANK BRODOCK, general manager of Reela Films, Inc., Miami, moved to Florida in 1951 after 17 years as an account executive with the Jam Handy Organization, where he handled the Chevrolet and Lucky Strike accounts, with the thought of retiring. But Reela Films, then in its infancy, asked Brodock to take a position as sales manager. In two years, he increased Reela's billings three-fold and was greatly influential in getting the film company to the position where it now calls itself the "most complete film studio in the South." Upped to general manager in 1953, Brodock hired personnel for his executive staff in Hollywood, New York, and Chicago. Reela Films has produced TV and industrial films for a number of major cities in both North and South America.

HERBERT SCHEFTEL, chairman of the board of Telenews Productions, Inc., started his career as a member of the New York Stock Exchange, but soon became interested in the production of visual news. In 1938 the first theater television projectors were being demonstrated, and he foresaw the possibilities immediately. He became involved in a chain of newsreel theatres, but the war. in which Herb served as a major in the Air Force, intervened. After V-J day, he went to work in earnest producing spot news films for television. A graduate of St. Paul's School and Oxford University, Herb is a devotee of golf and bridge.





TOM LEWIS, president of Lewislor Enterprises, Inc., entered TV production after a brilliant career in advertising, radio and motion pictures. An advertising executive with Young & Rubicam, Inc., before the war, Lewis was vice pleadent of radio production in charge of that organization's Hollywood office when he entered the Army in 1942. During World War II he created the Armed Forces Radio Service, of which he was commandant, and rose to the rank of full colonel. Following his return to civilian status, Tom was associated with a long list of radio's top-ranking favorites before entering the field of motion pictures to produce MGM's "Cause For Alarm." In 1953, he formed Lewislor Enterprises, Inc. and produced "The Loretta Young Show."

WILBUR J. STREECH, president of Wilbur Streech Productions, the TV commercial and animated film production firm, received early training as an animation artist for the Walt Disney studios. After Pearl Harbor, Wilbur served as a Captain in the Signal Corps photographic center in charge of the organization of production animation. Right after the war he became a partner in Triangle Films, when that firm was making a series of one reel nusicals for Universal. In 1951, the UCLA graduate formed the present company on his own, some of whose clients include Cities Service, Brylcreem, Eno, and Kleenex.





SAUL J. TURELL, president of Sterling Television Co., Inc., has brought a merchandising approach to low budget shows and stand-by films that has made Sterling one of the largest distributors in the field. Saul is a native New Yorker. He attended CCNY and the University of Chicago. From 1942 to 1946 he was in the Army and spent most of his time, according to his own testimony, on KP. Serving in the South Pacific, New Guinea and the Philippines, Saul emerged from the service as Sgt. Turell. After the war he went to work for Official Films and after watching volume sales of home movie films, such as Castle and Official, he decided to launch Sterling Films in 1946, in partnership with Robert Rhoades. In 1949, when Bernice Coe joined the company, a TV department was inaugurated.



WALTER SCHWIMMER, president of Walter Schwimmer Productions, Inc., Chicago, is a Northwestern University graduate who has worked as a publicist, songwriter, radio station manager. He was a founder and partner of the Schwimmer and Scott Advertising Agency, from which he left on an indefinite "sabbatical" leave to set up and guide his radio and television program packaging company. Schwimmer bridged the gap from AM radio, with "Foto-Test," which went on the air over TV stations. His packaging firm has been well represented on some 250 AM markets with "Tello-Test," "Tune-Test," and the "Deems Taylor Concert." One of his principal innovations for TV was the inauguration of the "Miss U. S. Television" contest which made its debut in 1950.

CHARLES E. SKINNER, president and executive producer of Charles E. Skinner Productions, Inc., was surrounded by show business almost from birth. He attended school on Hollywood motion picture lots, and acted as an assistant director on feature pictures at the age of fifteen. A long-time member of the Screen Directors Guild, Charlie used his Hollywood know-how in positions with the Jam Handy Company, and first transferred his talent from Hollywood to television when he converted the original "Big Story" series from radio to television. His film credits, besides seventy-three "Big Story" films, include "Murder in 'A' Flat," and "Les Paul and Mary Ford." His latest producton is "Sgt. Preston of the Yukon."





CHARLES Z. WICK, president of Telefilm Enterprises, formed that distributing organization after an exhaustive study which enabled him to present detailed plans to a prominent group of investors. Charlie has always made us of his talents for both music and commerce. While an undergraduate at the University of Michigan, he formed orchestras which made him \$26,000 in one year. He later studied law at Western Reserve University, was admitted to the bar in 1943, then organized a band to play in a Cleveland hotel at night, and set up a day time law practice. In 1943 Tommy Dorsey engaged him to handle legal and husiness affairs for his orchestra, and to write musical arrangements. Charlie is married to the former Mary Jane Woods and they have two sons, Charlie, Jr., and Douglas.

FLETCHER SMITH, president of Fletcher Smith Studios, Inc., producer of TV films, commercials and industrial films, started his business career at the age of 18, with a graphic art enterprise based on a capital of \$200. He entered the animation field through doing special effects for M-G-M studios, then began developing industrial accounts. In 1938, he set up his own sales organization and branched into live action films, first on location, then on sound stages. During World War II, he devoted himself exclusively to shooting educational films for the government. With the end of the war and the advent of TV, he went into production of filmed TV commercials. Fletcher relaxes from his duties through hobbies of woodworking and amateur painting, and learning to play the Hammond organ.





HERBERT R. PILZER, president of Circle Film Laboratories, Inc., is the son of a prominent Viennese film producer, and has an extremely broad technical and business background. Born in Vienna, he was educated at the Theresianische Academy in that city, and continued his studies at the Marigny Institute, and at the Sorbonne in Paris. During 1941-42 Herb produced a number of films for the war effort in association with the Harmon Foundation. The following year he joined Circle Films, and three years later, in 1946, was elevated to the position of general manager. Quickly realizing the future of film on television, he oriented the firm toward that objective. In 1953 Herb was elected president of the firm.





HENRY MORLEY, president of Dynamic Films, Inc., a graduate of Yale University with a degree in economics, also did post-graduate work at NYU and CCNY in engineering. His business career in the movie industry began with J. A. Maurer, Inc., designers and manufacturers of sound equipment. He started in sales but quickly moved himself into production and he was made general manager of the firm. Post-war, Henry, along with Nathan Zucker, a Yale classmate, formed Dynamic Films, Inc. From the beginning they concentrated on films for TV when not turning out industrial and sponsored films. They handled every phase from script writing through photography, sound recording and editing. Today, as president, Henry brings to the job the technical and engineering background which has spelled success for Dynamic.

MILTON J. SALZBURG, president of Cornell Films, Inc., and of Pictorial Films, Inc., has been actively engaged in some form of show business since he was 17 years old. He launched his career at the Roxy Theatre in New York and from that springboard went on to the production end of films as an assistant film editor, then on to the production of his own films, making many outstanding documentaries. Three of them which established him firmly in this field were "Pattern for Survival," "Target, U. S. A.," and "FDR-Hyde Park." In 1953, he formed Award Television Corporation, of which he is president, to produce package film programs for use on television stations around the country. One of his TV film innovations is a series on golf, featuring the champion golfer, Jimmy Demaret.





BURT BALABAN, president of Princess Pictures, Inc., received his first experience with Paramount Television in 1946, after a tour of duty with the Marine Corps as a combat photographer. A native of Chicago, Burt attended Roanoke College, Virginia, and summers worked for the National Screen and Photographic Studio. He spent fourteen months in the Pacific, making D-day landings in the Marshalls, Saipan, and Guam, along with extensive aerial photography on bombing missions. His first work with Paramount TV was obtaining film programs for KTLA and WBKB, Chicago, Later, he managed the firm's film department, and was in charge of film programming, and the company's syndicated program distribution.

JERRY FAIRBANKS, head of Jerry Fairbanks Productions, started his career as a cameraman in the movie industry, then began producing films and short subjects. Winner of two Motion Picture Academy Awards, he was the first to take the plunge into the filmed TV field. Under contract to NBC, he made the first series seen on video: "Public Prosecutor," "Crusader Rabbit," "Jackson and Jill," "Bigelow Theatre," "Silver Theatre," and others. Fairbanks also developed the MultiCam System which permits filming and sound recording by two or more cameras. Fairbanks is now one of the leading commercial film makers in the business and at present is doing television commercials, industrial telefilms and feature length films for both television and motion picture projection.



MOE KERMAN, president of Regal TV Pictures, Inc., has had a long and varied background in the motion picture business. His father was one of the first motion picture exhibitors in the borough of Brooklyn, and the son followed in his footsteps as an exhibitor when he was 14 years old. Not long after that, he set up his own independent film outfit called "The Kerman Film Exchange." He once produced movies under the Mutual Production Corp. banner, and these movies are now being shown on TV. He started in TV movie distribution in 1948, when he bought the entire Hal Roach Studio Library for TV.



CHARLES DAND, Director of the Films and Publications Division of British Information Services in New York City, was born in Dundee, Scotland, on April 24, 1902. After he received his education at Glasgow University, he was in newspaper work from 1922-29, during which time he contributed to many British and American journals. From 1929-35, he worked as a scenario editor for London's Associated Sound-Film Industries, and as a writer and director of documentary and instructional films. He returned to journalism for two years, after which—in 1937—he entered British government services as Public Relations Office, Edinburgh. During the war, he was with the Scottish Education Dept., Edinburgh. He returned to London in 1949 with the Central Office of Information and came to New York in 1952.

VINCENT J. NOLA, head of Nola Studios, Inc., was born in Italy and came to the U. S. at the age of ten. With money saved from a paper route he studied voice in Buffalo and later transferred to New York where he resumed his studies and later established himself as a vocal coach. Realizing the pressing need for rehearsal studios he established 16 of them in Steinway Hall, and equipped most of them with recording facilities. Needing more space, he brought his total number up to 32 with rooms in the WMCA building, six of which are equipped for making tape and disc transcriptions as well as for making TV films.





CHARLES B. BROWN, vice-president in charge of sales and program procurement for Bing Crosby Enterprises, has a background which ranges through all phases of selling, merchandising, promotion, and management. Much of his experience and "know-how" was gained as program manager of KFI, director of advertising, promotion, and research at NBC, and director of advertising at RCA Victor. While at RCA, Brown originated National Radio Week. His first film venture was an assignment from John Royal at NBC to film Admiral Halsey's return from the Pacific which was later televised over NBC-TV. Brown is also a vice-president of NAMSCO (North American Merchandising and Sales Corporation) Enterprises, Inc., which is the merchandising and sales promotion arm of Bing Crosby Enterprises, Inc.

GEORGE BAGNALL, president of George Bagnall and Associates, Inc., became identified with the motion picture industry after a long experience in the financial field. He joined the Fox Film Company in 1928 as comptroller of its West Coast Studios and later was placed in charge of all finances. He joined Paramount Studios in 1935 as studio treasurer and later was named executive studio manager. In 1937, he was named vice-president of the company. He resigned in 1941 to join the Alexander Korda producing organization, serving as vice-president and general manager until 1942, when he was designated vice-president of United Artists. In 1952, he formed his present company, establishing offices in various leading cities, including New York and Chicago, and acquiring new product for distribution.





CHARLES MICHELSON, president of Charles Michelson, Inc., is one of the principal contacts between Australian and American television. He is the buying agent for much of the TV programming planned for "down under," and has purchased many radio scripts for Australian use. U. S. shows using his library include the "Hallmark Hall of Fame," "GE Theatre" and "Studio One." Mickey, a Columbia graduate, worked in the stock exchange and the family export firm before turning to the entertainment field. He began selling radio transcriptions in the early thirties, and through the years his operations expanded to a world-wide scale. Lately, the firm has included domestic TV distribution in its operations.



JACK J. GROSS, a native New Yorker, had his first taste of the entertainment field as a movie-house usher. This led to a job as cinema theatre projectionist in St. Joseph, Mo., and from there he joined Maupin's Chatauqua Concert Orchestra—a road show which toured the country performing under the auspices of churches, clubs, etc. Following many years of managing theatres, Jack finally settled as manager of the West Coast RKO Hill-Street theatre in Los Angeles, later becoming Western Division manager of RKO theatres. In 1939, he became a producer at Universal in Hollywood until 1943, then he became executive producer at RKO. After a series of outstanding movie successes, Jack joined with Philip Krasne to form Gross-Krasne. Inc.

HAROLD R. LIPMAN, television film manager at Audio Productions, Inc., New York, is a graduate in Mechanical Engineering at Rutgers University. He has been engaged in motion picture production for nearly 20 years, with experience in animation, special effects, optical printing, live action direction and production, processing and design of special equipment. He joined Audio Productions, Inc., in 1936. During the war years he was with the Army's First Motion Picture Unit at Culver City, Calif., and later was assigned to the film production unit covering the Burma campaign at South East Asia Command headquarters in Ceylon, where he spent nearly two years. In 1946 he returned to Audio Productions, where he has specialized in the production of films for TV.





EMANUEL H. DEMBY, president of Demby Productions, Inc., is a spare-time writer, and author of "My Forty-Year Fight For Korea," published by A. A. Winn & Co., in 1952. His first break into radio came at 15 when he did a news program on WMCA. Before the war Manny was an independent producer and writer, and was also a director for the Winer Co., and Arthur Rosenberg agencies. He wrote and produced "One Year Ago Today," and "It Takes a Woman." After discharge at the end of the war, during which he did a wire recorded show from Paris, "The Rainbow Corner," he organized the present firm. Plan—to shift to feature films for theatre showings, present productions include "Hollywood to Broadway," "What's Playing," and "How To Be a Cowboy," all produced in New York.

HELEN "BIJOU" KELLEHER, president of the Empire Broad-casting Corporation, one of the oldest recording studios, was catapulted into the recording business following the death of her husband, Gerald. "Bijou" had received early preparation for her duties due to her early association with the financial and commercial world through her banker father and shipbuilder brothers in Kingston, New York. Further business acumen was gained at Marymount College, and by the receipt of a Masters degree from Fordham University. Since she took over the helm of Empire in 1943, the firm has grown from four recording machines to 30. Empire does chiefly the mechanical work for ad agencies and stations, on transcription, spots, and jingles.





WILLIAM SELDEN TODMAN, partner with Mark Goodson in Goodson-Todman Productions, was born in New York City on July 31, 1916. He received degrees from Johns Hopkins University and from N. Y. U. Following his first job as a copy writer for a New York advertising agency, he became a freelance radio director and a writer for Red Book Magazine. This was followed by writing and directing for a number of BBD&O radio shows. Later, he joined the Biow Company as N. Y. Producer for "The Philip Morris Playhouse," Crime Doctor," and "Take It Or Leave It." Joining with Mark Goodson, Todman and his partner have inaugurated the following TV successes: "What's My Line?" "I've Got a Secret," "Two for the Money," "It's News to Me," "The Name's the Same," "The Web,' and "Beat the Clock."



JIM JEWELL, president of Jewell Radio and Television Productions, Chicago, began his radio career in New York in 1926 with Channon Collinge. Two years later he moved to Detroit, becoming drama director of WXYZ and the Michigan Radio Network In 1939, Jim moved to WWJ as program and production director where he held the title of "original producer-director" of such Detroit originations as "The Lone Ranger," "The Green Hornet" and "Challenge of the Yukon." In Hollywood he was director and writer to Warner Brothers. In 1941, Jim went to Chicago as vice president of Stack-Globe Advertising Agency, and later joined MacFarland-Aveyard & Company as vice president in charge of radio. In 1945, convinced that Chicago was ideal for TV and radio shows as an origination point, Jim founded his own business.

PETER M. ROBECK, sales manager of the film division of General Teleradio, possesses a well rounded background in merchandising and sales. Born in Wisconsin but raised in California, Pete had his first position with CBS interrupted by five years in the Air Force. After V-J day he became merchandising manager of KTTV and of the Columbia Pacific Network. The young graduate of the University of California advanced to become sales manager of the station, followed by a position as sales manager of Consolidated Television Sales. After a series of merger agreements with Jerry Fairbanks, Inc., the firm altered its name to Consolidated Television Sales. Pete later joined General Teleradio.





JACK ASHER of Lab-TV has been a photographic salesman in 46 of the 48 states, missing only Washington and Oregon. In the industry for over a quarter of a century, Jack has been associated with the Gevaert Co., and for eight years with the photographic advertising page of the old New York Sun. He has also been a photographic buyer and consultant for U. S. Navy Ships Stores, and advertising manager of Photo Trade News. Jack has been an active Mason for many years, and is a member of the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers.

ED THORGERSEN, veteran news and sports commentator, opened his own offices in 1953 to produce and participate as a TV personality in live and filmed programs, for both sports and industrial exploitation and sales promotion. Ed's microphone career began back in 1927 as an announcer with NBC, broadcasting news, sports, and special events. Six years later Ed joined the expanding editorial staff of Movietone News where his face and by-line acquired national prominence via the newsreel screen. With broad experience in the field of film shorts, Ed projected his talent into many award-winning pictures in the short subject field, and ultimately became identified with the production of "Ed Thorgersen's Sports Review."





DAVID A. BADER, vice president and general manager of Atlantic Television Corporation, has a rich background gained in careers both here and abroad. He joined Universal Pictures in 1920, and was with them until 1935 as manager of press campaigns, and as personal representative for Carl Laemmle. In 1936 he formed a literary firm in London, David A. Bader, Ltd., and in 1938 became president of Literary Corporation Ltd. He worked with George Pal Productions from 1940 to 1942. After handling the trade relations department for Twentieth Century-Fox, he entered the 16 mm. field, editing and publishing trade periodicals. In 1952 Dave joined Commonwealth TV as executive assistant to Mort Sackett, and in 1954 joined Atlantic as executive vice president in charge of sales. He is also VP of the parent company, Astor Pictures Corporation.





DAVID PIEL, independent producer of commercial productions, TV spots, sales training films, slide films; creator-producer-director of the new "Story Films" now running on "Captain Kangaroo" over CBS-TV. During Piel's days at Yale, he conducted a radio program called "Gullible's Travels." His children's "spectacular," "Golden Time," (in color) was produced for NBC-TV with Simon & Schuster for Christmas-time viewing. He got his first start in theatrical and commercial films with Louis de Rochemont's "Your World and Mine" series—36 geography films aimed at children. Has to his credit many documentaries, two of which won awards at the Venice Film Festival; one of his training films was awarded first prize by N.A.V.P.

DON L. KEARNEY, vice-president in charge of sales for the American Broadcasting Company film syndication division, was assistant maanger of ABC-TV before taking his present post. A native New Yorker and a graduate of Fordham University, Don was a sports reporter and commentator on several local stations before World War II. After Pearl Harbor he served in the European Theatre as an infantry and public relations officer, and returned to civilian life with the Katz Agency, and later with the Mutual Network as sales manager for cooperative programs. In 1951, Don moved over to ABC as manager of TV spot sales, and soon moved up to become national sales manager of ABC owned TV stations.





MAX ALEXANDER, vice-president and secretary of M. and A. Alexander Productions, was born in Cassell, Germany, and first entered the motion picture industry in Berlin in a production capacity. Among other producing organizations he was associated with were UFA Studios and Universal. After gaining a reputation in several European capitals, he came to Hollywood and joined Abe and Julian Stern, the pioneer producers. In 1931-32 he was associated with Phil Goldstone in several producing ventures. Max then formed his own firm and made more than 100 pictures, many in association with his brother, Arthur Alexander, for release through PRC, Grand National, and other independents. In 1949 he and Arthur formed M. and A. Alexander Productions.

G. RALPH BRANTON, president of Interstate Television Corp., TV film producers and distributors, has an extensive background in theatre management which led to his entry in the TV field. He served as supervisor for F & R Theatres in Minneapolis, as director of operations for the Publix New England circuit, and later general manager with partnership status in the Tri-States chain in Iowa and Nebraska. He later moved to the West Coast as vice-president of Allied Artists, a post he held during the wide expansion of that company's activities. He formed Interstate TV in 1952. Branton believes "Mass audience, like mass merchandising is a product of this mid-century. Neither the theatre nor television has yet remotely realized the full audience potential within its grasp."





AL STAHL, president of Animated Productions, had his first cartoon strip nationally syndicated when he was only 17 years old. He became, in succession, an animator for Max Fleischer and storygag editor for Terrytoons, then continued in technical animation work for the Army Signal Corps during World War II. He opened his own studios after V-J Day, and produced his first animated cartoon show in 1946. A pioneer in the television field, his firm has created and produced TV animated and live advertising for leading agencies and has made great strides in photography of stylized animation. Al developed slide-motion and multi-plane animation for NBC-TV. He is a member of the board of National Television Film Council.



PHILIP N. KRASNE, partner with Jack Gross in Gross-Krasne, Inc. is a native of Norfolk, Nebraska. A graduate of the University of Michigan, Phil obtained his law degree from the University of Southern California in 1929 and engaged in the practice of law, specializing in motion picture matters. In 1936, he became engaged in independent motion picture production and began to produce the famous "Charlie Chan" series. This he followed up quickly with production of "The Falcon" series and then, with Fred Ziv, acquired the rights and began filming the famous stories, "The Cisco Kid." In 1950, Phil switched his production activities to TV. As president of Cisco Kid Pictures, Inc., he produced 39 Cisco Kid TV films, all made in color. Thereafter, Phil sold his interest to Ziv, and in 1952 joined with Jack Gross.

JAMES A. LOVE, president of Lally and Love, film producers, has been in one form of show business or another all his life. His family travelled as a vaudeville team in his early years. When his father became a motion picture theatre manager, Jim's first theatre job was bicycling features to his father's theatres. He then became assistant projectionist and worked part time throughout his school years. Jim joined Warner Brothers in their booking department upon leaving school. While doing military service in The Coast Guard, he entered the production field as a film editor. Later, he was the founder of Cineffects Productions for Nat Sobol. When that organization was disbanded, he formed the company which he now heads. Jim is married, and has one child, James Allen, Jr., who is three





WESLEY GIBBS of Lab-TV started in the Kodak Research Laboratory in 1918 and has been engaged in many lines of technical photography, as well as being a noted writer on photographic subjects for over 35 years. His experience includes time as a cameraman in the old days at Fort Lee, chief physicist of the Fleischman Yeast Laboratory, chief photographer of Liberty Magazine, and for over 12 years in charge of the technical work at the Gevaert Co. During World War II, Wesley was on the War Production Board in charge of photo equipment production and allocation, later handling surplus photo property through the Treasury Department. Wesley is a well-known film exhibitor in salons throughout the country, and an Associate of the Royal Photographic Society of London.

ROBERT M. SAVINI, president of Atlantic Television Corp., started in the film industry in 1900 when he invested in a penny arcade in New Orleans, when he was only 16. He has been connected with the film industry ever since. In 1904 he formed Dixie Films, a distribution company, and later owned a chain of theatres. In 1926 he came to New York and founded Astor Pictures, the first company to distribute major re-issues. When television was just starting, he was among the first to rent pictures to the new medium, supplying RCA and DuMont's early experiments. He formed Atlantic Television in 1950.





ARTHUR ALEXANDER, president of M. and A. Alexander Productions, and a member of the board of directors, began his career in the department store field in Germany, where he was born and educated. When he switched to motion pictures he joined the Universal Studios in Frankfort, Germany, and in 1929 came to Hollywood as an assistant director, and a year later joined his brother Max in organizing a new firm. The company produced over 100 features in the independent market, and later for PRC and Grand National. In 1949 they entered the television distribution field, and now handle more than 200 properties. The brothers Alexander also handle the production of television commercials and spots.



LLOYD L. LIND, vice president and general sales manager of Interstate TV Corporation has been with Allied Artists Pictures, Corp., Interstate's parent organization for over 21 years. He served as assistant to the president, Steve Broidy, for several years and was supervisor of all Allied Artists exchange operations. In 1939, Lind made his first feature sale for TV, and NBC purchased a full length feature for telecasting in New York. With this in his background, it was a natural for him to take over the reign of interstate's sales department. Among the products currently distributed by Interstate are the "Ethel Barrymore Theatre," "The Amazing Tales of Hans Christian Andersen" and a group of features and westerns. Their "Little Rascals" series is now playing in top national markets.

MANNY REINER, general sales manager for IFE Releasing Corporation, joined the firm in October of 1955. Manny has had extensive experience in motion pictures, radio, television and domestic and foreign film sales. Prior to his present position he was vice president of Guild Films, Inc., and had also been vice president in charge of sales at PSI-TV, Inc. He joined Warner Bros. back in 1933, and then was associated with MGM, Monogram Pictures and Paramount. From 1942 to 1946 Manny was film officer in Europe for the OWI and from 1946-50 he was general manager in Latin America and Australia for David O. Selznick. A stint as foreign manager for Sam Goldwyn added further experience to Manny's already full career.





WILLIAM MIESEGAES, president of Transfilm Inc., was born in London of Dutch parentage. He entered film production by way of Indonesia where, as an exporter of rubber and sugar, he took advantage of the local scene and turned to amateur photography. Many years later, still an amateur, he produced a travelogue, "On the Road to Acapulco," which was booked into the Guild Theatre in New York. In 1941, he turned professional and, with Walter Lowendahl, founded Transfilm. First productons were civil defense films. By 1946, the firm was operating at capacity and facing further expansion. As of today, more than 100 full-time technicians staff the company which, in the Transfilm Building, operates complete motion picture, animation and slidefilm production facilities.

ARTHUR A. "ARCHIE" MAYERS, general manager of Standard TV, was at one time general manager of Colorfilm and while in that post helped establish the present Cinecolor. Archie's next move was sales manager of Atlas Cinephone and then sales manager of World Pictures Corp., a position he held for 12 years. In 1942 Archie became assistant to Jules Levy, president of Mayfair Productions. In 1950 he organized and headed, as president, Unity Television Corporation, and also served as general manager. Five years later he disposed of all his interests in Unity, and in the latter part of '55 became general manager of Standard. Archie has served as president of the National Television Film Council and is currently vice president in charge of distribution for the council.





EDWARD SMALL, co-founder and chairman of the board of Television Programs of America, ran away from his Savannah, Georgia, home at 15 to go into vaudeville, first as a performer, and later as a producer and manager. In 1942 he went to Hollywood for a brief stay, but instead soon establised himself as the leading manager in Hollywood, representing as many as 300 leading names. Ed has been closely identified with launching and developing the careers of some of the all time film greats, including John Gilbert, Corinne Griffith, Norma Shearer and Robert Donat, who was an unknown when Small chose him for the lead in "The Count of Monte Cristo." Still under contract to United Artists as an independent feature producer, Small has made over 150 feature films, 27 of which make up the Edward Small Feature package.



ROBERT SANDE, president of Song Ad Film-Radio Productions, Hollywood, founded the firm in 1950. A native Californian and a graduate of the University of California's Santa Barbara campus with majors in both speech and music, Sande pioneered the merchandising with music technique for TV and radio commercials. His earlier background as both a top professional musician and an advertising agency executive are probably unique in the film-radio production world. Sande's talents, together with those of Don Estey, Del Porter and Larry Greene, his partners, have built Song Ad Film-Radio Productions into one of the largest producers in the business, serving many of the nation's top agencies and advertisers. Their specialty: fully integrated film-radio merchandising campaigns that give sponsors extra mileage per dollar.

FRANK FERRIN, owner of the production company bearing his name, produces, writes and directs "Andy's Gang," the TV film series starring Andy Devine and Nino Marcel. Ferrin created the property for radio in 1940 as "Smilin' Ed's Gang" with the late Ed McConnell. It began on TV in 1950. After McConnell's death in 1954, Ferrin discontinued the radio show and changed the TV film version to "Andy's Gang." Ferrin entered radio via WTCN in his native Minneapolis, some thirty years ago, with the comedy act "Nels and Ole." Later he organized Midwest Recordings, Inc., radio transcription firm, and then joined Henri, Hurst and McDonald in Chicago as VP in charge of radio. In 1942 Ferrin moved to the Leo Burnett Agency in the same capacity. In 1946 he formed the Frank Ferrin Co.





SIDNEY PAUL SOLOW, vice president and general manager of Consolidated Film Industries, has been affiliated with CFI since he graduated from New York University in 1930. Advancing from chief chemist to plant superintendent to his present position as head of the Hollywood lab, Sid Solow has been instrumental in the growth of CFI to its current status as one of the top TV film laboratories in the nation. In addition to directing a company that processes some 70% of all west coast produced film for TV, Sid is active in the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers, and virtually every charity involving the motion picture industry. He has been a lecturer in Cinema Arts at the University of Southern California since 1947.

MAURICE BECK, together with Ed E. McLemore produced a film series entitled "Texas Rasslin" which has proven to be one of the highest rated sports shows on TV. This film started when they realized that wrestling in other states lacked color, speed and roughness so desired by the spectators. A native Texan, Maurice aspired to be an attorney, but after two years of legal study, changed to banking by accepting a job at the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas, where he graduated from the American Institute of Banking. Leaving banking he acquired an interest in one of the largest power laundry and dry cleaning plants in Texas and operated this business for seven years, before entering the entertainment field.





MAURICE UNGER, vice president in charge of West Coast operations for Ziv Television Programs, Inc., was born and raised in Cincinnati. After completing his education, he joined Grandpa Brands Inc., a liquor firm in 1934, and remained there until 1947, working with its affiliated firms as general manager. He also served as president of its Tom Collins Corp. From 1947 to 1950, he was president of the Charles A. Maish Company. Then, in 1950, he joined the Frederic W. Ziv Co. When the firm went into TV production five years later he moved to the West Coast, where he now heads up the firm's TV film operations. Expansion of these operations has included the acquisition of the American National Studios, to accommodate the widened scope of Ziv production schedules.



MARCEL LEDUC, president of Inter-TV Films Ltd., Montreal, and International TV Film Services, Ltd., New York, producers and distributors of television film, had a wide variety of experience in his business background before he became identified with the television film industry. For many years he was active in the export, import and financial fields. In 1953 he formed TV Cooperative Film Sales Co., Inc., distributors of television film. This company was dissolved when International TV Film Services was organized in 1954. In 1955 Inter-TV Films Ltd. was formed in Montreal, P. Q., Canada, with offices in many leading cities, including New York, Los Angeles, Montreal, Toronto, London, Paris, and Rome.

G. CARLETON HUNT, president of General Film Laboratories Corporation, has been connected with the entertainment industry since 1923. He started out with the Hunt theatre chain, moved in 1929 to the Warner Theatres, spent several years as production and stage manager with various stage groups, and was associated for 10 years with RKO Studios as assistant head of the editorial department. Mr. Hunt was elected Governor of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, and has recently been made a Fellow of the Society of Motion Picture and TV Engineers. He entered the TV field in 1951 through the acquisition of Paramount Picture's film laboratory. In allied fields, he is an officer of the Fonda Corporation, builders of motion picture processing equipment, and is vice-president of Unicorn Engineering Corporation.





DANIEL HERBERT KAHN, treasurer and sales manager of Olympia Film Productions, Inc., has a broad and unique background in film and television. A graduate engineer, he has served a rough apprenticeship in practically every phase of the advertising and film business. The second World War interrupted his engineering studies at Bucknell University, and after serving in the Navy, he entered the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis. He was graduated an Ensign in 1949, in time to serve through the Korean War. On leaving the service, he joined the New York Port Authority where he specialized in preparing manuals on handling electronic equipment. In 1953, he became Media Director and account executive at the Lester Harrison Advertising Agency. He joined the staff of Olympia Films early in 1955. His Hobbies? Three: Sailing in the summertime; skiing in the winter; music at all times.

MELVIN GOLD, president of Mel Gold Productions, Inc., started his film career with MGM in Chicago in 1931 as assistant office manager, soon moving to the Reinheimer circuit to manage theatres in Hammond, Indiana. His later experience includes the operation of his own advertising agency, advertising manager of Filmack Trailer, and manager of the Vogue Theatre, Hollywood. In 1943 he joined National Screen Service and served as director of advertising, and later as east coast film production and TV manager. In June, 1954, he formed the Mel Gold Productions. In 1948 Mel founded the National Television Film Council, and has served as both president and chairman of the board. In February, 1955, he was elected an honorary lifetime president. Mel is a member of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, of the Variety Club, and of Cinema Lodge.





JOSEPH S. SALZBURG heads the motion picture and TV film service company bearing his name. The firm supervises the production and editing of theatrical, non-theatrical, commercial, and TV films for producers. Joe has been associated in executive and managerial positions with Pictorial Films, Pathe, Associated Artists Productions and Motion Pictures for Television, Inc., before organizing his own firm. During World War II, Joe was a G. I. production supervisor with the first motion picture unit of the Army Air Forces. He has been called in for special film projects of the Department of Defense from time to time. Known and liked by all in the film business since his knee pants days, Joe is a native New Yorker and a member of the Motion Picture Pioneers.



JOHN H. MITCHELL, vice-president and sales manager of Screen Gems, Inc., started his career by way of the mail room of Erwin, Wasey, & Co., and was quickly promoted to the radio department. A native of Rochester, New York, Jack then spent six years with the Mutual Network, organizing and managing the first sales service department. Following his war service, he joined the Honel Corp., and was instrumental in obtaining exclusive area distribution for a number of American products. In 1948, as United Artists television vice-president and general manager, John helped organized UA's TV department. In 1952, he joined Screen Gems, Inc., the TV production and sales subsidiary of Columbia Pictures.

DON FEDDERSON is the creator and producer of the phenomenally popular CBS teleseries, "The Millionaire," and "Do You Trust Your Wife?," as well as the long-running program "Life With Elizabeth." Fedderson is also readying three new video series for coast to coast presentation this coming season. Don came to television after an eminently successful career in radio, and was immediately outstanding as a showman in the new medium. He was the original producer of the Liberace shows on TV, and today he heads one of the biggest production organizations in Hollywood. He was born in Beresford, S. D., and grew up in Kansas City, where he began his business career as a newspaper advertising salesman. From ad selling in San Francisco, he drifted into radio, graduating from jobs as station manager into the production end of the industry in Hollywood.





EDWARD NASSOUR, vice president and treasurer of the Nassour Pictures, Inc., producers of feature films, television films, and television commercials, in association with his brother, William, built the Consolidated Studios in 1945. Five years later the property was sold to the Los Angeles Times, and at the present time station KTTV is on the site. Ed is the producer of the television film series, "Sheena, Queen of the Jungle." He has invented and developed many technical processes for the motion picture industry, including Regiscope. As a producer and director, he just completed "Beast of Hollow Mountain" starring Patricia Medina and Guy Madison, in Technicolor Cinemascope for United Artists.

HARRY FLEISCHMAN, president of Louis G. Cowan, Inc., producers of 1955's greatest hit, and one of television's all-time greats, "The \$64,000 Question," is a native New Yorker, but grew up "down east," to wit, in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. The popular Cowan prexy, an ardent golfer, received his degree from Boston University, following which he was associated with Gilbert Miller for over a decade and a half, mostly as general manager. Harry devoted the greater part of a two year sabbatical to bringing his golf score into the low seventies, and is still trying to improve his game. In April, 1951, he joined the Louis G. Cowan, Inc., organization, and four years later, in August of 1955, became president of the production firm.





KENNETH HYMAN, executive vice-president of Associated Artists Productions, Inc., entered the television field in 1947, when the industry was just getting started. As a member of the sales staff of Associated Artists Productions, Ltd., one of television's pioneer feature film distributors, he was an early advocate of the programming strength of Hollywood's feature product in the television picture. He left AAP to serve in the United States Marine Corps. After two and a half years in service, he joined a production unit of Monogram Pictures, working as an assistant director. With actual production experience behind him, he returned to AAP in 1953 on a sales mission to take up once again the use of feature film on TV.

TV Film Production Abroad

by American companies, for distribution here in the United States, are of the general opinion that it is cheaper to produce overseas than in the U. S. Most of them base their opinions on the cheaper labor that is accessible outside of this country, but the consensus of opinion of film producers, who are producing films abroad for distribution here, is that in the long run, costs are equal. This is primarily due to the facts of importing actors to foreign countries, and the longer period of time it takes to make pictures there.



The European continent, mainly France and Italy, as well of course, as England, have been the locations that have primarily been used up to the present time. The Asiatic countries have been virtually left untouched, and according to Julien Bryan, head of the International Film Foundation, Japan would be a likely place to produce films, due to the comparatively low cost of labor and rental of equipment, as well as the industriousness of the Japanese, and the fine color reproductions made there. As far as actors are concerned, the producers can employ Americans, as well as other English speaking peoples, and their families living there.

The real boom in foreign film production by Americans, for distribution here, is over. The boom was a boom only when it was new. It has settled down now due to the equalization of costs, but the industry can look forward to seeing more films produced abroad by Sheldon Reynolds, as well as such companies as Official Films, Guild Films and ABC Films.

Commercial Television in Great Britain

A PPARENTLY, British commercial TV is having an easier time with its growing pains than even optimists expected. Losses at the end of the first quarter of operation were reported as slightly below those calculated by the two program contractors hondling the programming in the London area. Based on first quarter figures, cost of airing programs during the first year of operation will run at between \$22,500,000 and \$25,000,000, while revenue from advertisers will total somewhere between \$20,000,000 and \$22,500,000, leaving a deficit of from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000.

The ITA (Independent Television Authority) required program contractors to show financial resources of \$3,525,000 before receiving a franchise, this requirement being based on the assumption that British commercial TV would follow the American pattern, showing a loss for three years before it began to pay off.



Estimates are that in order to break even this year, with production costs running at current high levels, 90 per cent of commercial availabilities would have to be sold out. At present, about 70 per cent of the commercial positions have been sold.

The two contracting companies, Associated Rediffusion and Associated Television, provide all programming in the London area, the former producing all weekday shows and the latter all weekend programs.

Extension of the ITA service into Birmingham and Manchester may brighten this picture for them with added revenue and less production cost. The Birmingham schedule uses Associated Rediffusion shows on the weekend and Associated Television programs during the weekdays.



Both companies initially originated seven hours of shows per day but withdrew from the morning hours when they found this time unsalable. This was one of the several sad lactors commercial TV in Britain learned the hard way. There were many lessons thus learned. A much heralded concert program which did not come through with an audience and caused a quick retreat from cultural type programming. The pace at which TV gobbles up time and talent, in spite of the much publicized lindings in America, was underestimated and this was reflected particularly in drama shows which achieved a high level during the first few weeks of operation but suffered an abrupt decline immediately thereafter.

There are reports that the contractor companies found autbacks in staffing necessary once operations gct underway. The matter of personnel left BBC positions for the more lucrative offers held out by program contractors.

The impact of commercial TV on the BBC TV operation apparently has been a healthy one though it did put a premium on some programming through competitive bidding. BBC had to up the unterin bidding for such events as sports. BBC has signed contracts to televise some of the most important sports events to be available to the medium during this year.



Estimates of the commercial TV audience in the London area during the last week of January were based on 600,000 of the 1,500,000 TV homes in the area owning all-channel sets. A little under 8,000 all-channel sets were being sold per week, and a like number were estimated as being converted to receive both BBC and ITA telecasts. Potential audience in Birmingham is estimated at one-half that of the London peak, 400,000 sets having been converted as of January 31.

As a market for American TV film fare, law puts strict limit on the amount of programming which can be bought, stipulations requiring that 75 per cent of the programming must be British product.

However, this aspect of the scene has already brought added revenue to U. S. TV film producers, substantial sales having been consumated on several American series. This is a two-way lane, American advertisers provide a substantial chunk of the advertising revenue now being collected for ITA programming.

The rate structure for advertising has required revision and probably will undergo further readjustment. In approximate dollar amounts, a minute of advertising on a week-day costs \$900 in off-peak hours and about \$2800 in the peak period (7:55-10:05 p.m.).

Advertisers have no actual voice in the placing of commercials but program contractors are co-operative in spotting them to reach the type of audience an advertiser is attempting to reach. There is no such thing as program sponsorship permitted in Britain.

Phenomenal results have been reported by some American firms using commercial TV in England, several cases of 100 per cent increases due to TV advertising being listed.

Most rating services report an even division of audience in the London area, reports in January running approximately 60 to 40 in favor of BBC on weekdays and the opposite on weekends.

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
