Top Agency Presidents

• Pictures and profiles of the men who held the billing reins for the top twenty-five ad agencies in the nation. Total investment by these agencies in radio and television in 1955 amounted to more than \$675,750,000.





BEN DUFFY, president of BBD&O, has spent his entire career with the firm. Starting at 17 as an office boy, the young Irishman became head of the media department in 1928 when the George Batten company merged with BD&O to form the present company. Baptized Bernard Cornelius, sometime in this period Ben lost his given name, and now only uses it for the most formal signatures. In 1934 he tecome director of media; in 1938 a vice-president and director; in 1941 executive VP; in 1945 general manager; and finally, in 1946, president. In 1951 Ben found time to author the standard "Profitable Advertising in Today's Media & Markets." He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Audit Bureau of Circulations; member of the Advisory Committee on Advertising of the Proprietary Association of America.

NORMAN H. STROUSE, the new president of J. Walter Thompson, has spent virtually all of his business career in advertising. He was an advertising salesman with the Seattle Post-Intelligencer for four years before joining the J. Walter Thompson Company's San Francisco office in 1929, where he served in a variety of capacities, including account representative. Strouse enlisted in the Air Corps, as a private, declining an officer's commission, early in the Second World War. He ended his service as a Major, with a Legion of Merit, three campaign stars and a Medal of Merit from the Philippine Government. In 1945 Strouse went to the Detroit office of the Thompson Company where he became a vice president, and later manager of the office.





ADOLPH J. TOIGO, president of Lennen & Newell, Inc., is a strong believer in research, and has spent much of his agency career as a research director. While holding a full time job with John H. Dunham, a Chicago agency, after his graduation from the University of Chicago in 1929, he was a football line coach for Stagg. In 1936 he came east to manage the research department of Benton & Bowles, and four years later moved to Geyer, Cornell, & Newell in a similar capacity. In 1943 he became a vice-president and research director of William Esty Co., and soon became chairman of the plans board and supervisor of the Colgate account. In 1952 he helped change Lennen & Mitchell into Lennen & Newell, and became a vice-president.

SIGURD STANTON LARMON, president and chairman of the board for Young & Rubicam, Inc., began his career as a salesman in 1914 with various companies before becoming district manager of Columbia Phonograph Co. in 1922. In 1925 he joined N. W. Ayer & Son as an account executive. Larmon became associated with Y & R. in 1929, reaching his present position in 1942. Born in Stanton, Iowa, July 21, 1891, he attended Dartmouth College, receiving his B.S. degree in 1914 and his M.A. in 1948. Larmon is a member of the U. S. Advisory Commission on Information, a trustee of the Committee for Economic Development and a member of the Research & Policy Committee for the government. He is also vice chairman of the U. S. Council of the International Chamber of Commerce.





MARION HARPER, JR., president of McCann-Erickson, was born on May 14, 1916, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, attended Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass., and was graduated from Yale University in 1938. During the following year he joined McCann-Erickson. After serving successively as manager of copy research, vice-president in charge of research and merchandising, and assistant to the president, Harper became president of McCann-Erickson in December, 1948. At that time the agency had 24 offices and 1,200 employees. Today it operates from 34 offices in sixteen countries and its employees total 2,775. During the same period, the agency's business volume has more than doubled. Harper is also the author of "Getting Results from Advertising."



WARNER S. SHELLY, president of N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., can really claim to have started his career at the bottom. His first job, in 1920, involved working under the Hudson River on the Hudson tubes. This was a full-time job, and he was also taking full-time courses at Fordham University Law School. His double career caught the attention of friends who worked for N. W. Ayer & Son. He joined Ayer in 1923, worked up steadily through several departments to become a vice president and manager of client service in the New York office in 1938, and a director in 1951. In the latter year he was also elected president. In the average year he travels about 50,000 miles by plane visiting clients throughout the country and as far away as South Africa.

ATHERTON W. HOBLER, Chairman of the Executive Committee of Benton & Bowles, Inc., has been associated with the firm since 1932 when he joined as an equal partner, becoming president a year later. A University of Illinois graduate, Mr. Hobler entered the advertising field as an assistant in the media department of the Gardner Agency in St. Louis, but after six months joined the Appleton Manufacturing Co. as an auditor. By the time he was 24 he had complete authority over sales and marketing, but returned to Gardner in 1919, and by 1922 was vice-president and general manager. Three years later he came to New York as an account executive with Erwin Wasay & Co., and later became a partner. The native of Chicago became chairman of the board of B & B in 1941.





MILTON H. BIOW, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the Biow Company, has never worked for an agency other than his own. Born in New York on July 24, 1892, and attending schools there, Milt entered the advertising business as a young man, founding his own firm in 1918. He has a keen interest and appreciation of English antiques, whether it be furniture, silver, china or glassware. His mid-Manhattan air-conditioned town house on East 62nd St. is filled with fine pieces, as are the offices of the Biow Co. Strongly disliking personal publicity, his biography in Who's Who is limited to a few lines. He married the former Milise Lane Banning on January 9, 1944. Biow's first principle is to constantly re-examine advertising and merchandising, to quote him, "with an ear to the familiar cash register ring."

FAIRFAX M. CONE, president of Foote, Cone & Belding since 1951, formed the company in 1943 in association with Emerson Foote and Don Belding—all three vice-presidents of the dissolved Lord & Thomas Agency. He started out with L & T as a copywriter after three months on the staff of the San Francisco Examiner. Within nine years he became a vice-president of the agency and manager of the San Francisco office. In 1941 he became executive vice-president and manager of the Chicago office. Since the formation of FC&B Mr. Cone has been successively chairman of the executive committee, chairman of the board, and since 1951, president. He is also a past chairman and currently a member of the advisory council of the AAAA.





JOHN P. CUNNINGHAM, president of Cunningham & Walsh, Inc., has been with the same firm, or its predecessors, since he entered the advertising field as an artist fresh from a World War I tour in the Navy. A Harvard graduate, he started in the art department of C & W's predecessor, the Newell Emmett Co., and quickly moved into copy territory. He was appointed vice-president in 1931 and later became the agency's creative head. When C. D. Newell retired in 1949, Cunningham became executive vice-president. At this time the agency changed its name to reflect current principals. He was elected president in 1954, at which time Fred Walsh became chairman of the board. During World War II, he was a chairman of the creative advertising committee for the U.S.O.



JAMES H. S. ELLIS, president of the Kudner Agency, Inc., has been with the firm since 1935, when it was founded by Arthur Kudner. A native of Rensselaer, Indiana, Jim Ellis entered the advertising field after service with the A.E.F. in the first World War. His first position was with a firm in Columbus, Ohio, and in 1928 joined Erwin, Wasey & Co. as copy chief. On the death of Mr. Kudner in 1944, Mr. Ellis succeeded him as president, and in 1945 became head of the newly formed Kudner Agency, Inc. Jim is board chairman of the National Outdoor Advertising Bureau and a former member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of Advertising Agencies. A resident of New York City, he is married to the former Maxine Courtney Ford, and the father of three sons.

LEO BURNETT, chairman of the board, Leo Burnett Company, Inc., started out to be a newspaperman on his home town paper, the St. John's (Mich.) Weekly, and after his graduation from the University of Michigan, worked for the Peoria (Ill.) Journal. He moved on to become editor of the Cadillac Motor Car Company house organ, and advanced to the position of advertising manager. Mr. Burnett held positions with the Homer McKee agency, Indianapolis, and Erwin, Wasey & Co., Chicago, before opening his own firm—with a staff of seven, and three accounts—in middepression 1935. Best known for his creative work, Mr. Burnett is still actively in charge of the agency's creative work. The parents of three children, the Burnetts live on a farm in Lake Zurich, Ill.





BARTON A. CUMMINGS, president of Compton Advertising, Inc., is probably one of the youngest chief executives of a multimillion-dollar corporation in the nation, heading up an agency that has more than doubled its billings in the past 8 years. Following his graduation from the University of Illinois in 1935, he joined his father's agency in Rockford, Ill., and later was associated with Swift & Co., and Benton & Bowles. During the early part of the war, he worked with the OWI and the OPA, later joining the Navy. After V-J Day, Bart spent a short time with the Maxon Agency, and in 1947 joined Compton as an account executive. Three years later he became a vice-president, and in 1952 was elected a director. In January 1955 he was elected president.

HENRY G. LITTLE, chairman of the board and president of Campbell Ewald Co., Detroit, has been in advertising for 36 years, all but three of them in the agency field. He started with Lord & Thomas in 1919, and seven years later was transferred to the San Francisco office. In 1935 he opened an office in Dayton, Ohio, to handle the Frigidaire account. After becoming a vice-president he left the agency to manage the Cincinnati office of Roy S. Durstine, and then moved to the general managership of Campbell Ewald Co. A year later he became executive vice-president and a director. He was elected president in 1952, and chairman of the board in 1953. Henry was recently elected chairman of AAAA board of directors and its operations committee.





WILL C. GRANT, president of Grant Advertising, Inc., established his agency in 1935 at Dallas, Tex., after selling advertising for R. R. Donnelley & Sons from 1932 to 1934. He also sold for W. F. Hall Printing Co. Grant opened the home office in Chicago in 1937. The New York office opened three years later, and several foreign branches are now open. Grant was born in Dallas on Aug. 9, 1906 and attended high school there. He entered Southern Methodist University in 1924. While working his way through, Grant sold so much advertising for the student annual paper that the university abolished the paper on the grounds that big business was not a suitable student endeavor. Grant is also a member of the Indian Hill Club, and the Racquet Club.



HOWARD D. WILLIAMS, newly named chairman of the board of directors of Erwin, Wasey & Co., received his B.S. degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1911. He joined the Chicago Sanitary District as an engineer the same year. Williams has successfully worked for James McCreery & Co., New York City, Stewart Dry Goods Co., Louisville, and the National Cash Register Co., Dayton, where he was vice-president in charge of foreign operations, before entering the advertising field. At Erwin, Wasey & Co., Williams held several posts, becoming president and general manager in 1947 and now chairman. He is a member of the American Association of Advertising Agencies, director of the Advertising Research Foundation and a 32nd degree Mason. Williams is a World War I veteran.

CLIFFORD L. FITZGERALD, president of Dancer-Fitzgerald-Sample, Inc., has swapped titles of president and chairman of the board with H. M. Dancer for twelve years. After graduating from Dartmouth College, the young native of St. Louis founded the Fitzgerald Advertising Agency in New Orleans in 1927, at the age of 24. In 1937 he left his partners to manage the Chicago office of Sherman &. Ellis & Co., In 1941 Cliff joined Blackett-Sample-Hummert as vice-president and over-all supervisor of the agency's Procter & Gamble account. In 1943, the organization became Dancer-Fitzgerald-Sample, Inc. Cliff married the former Isabel Hanway in 1924, and is now the proud grandfather of six.





WILLIAM B. LEWIS, president of Kenyon & Eckhardt, Inc., brought a broad background of experience in broadcasting to the firm when he joined them in 1944. Starting as an apprentice at J. Walter Thompson, he joined CBS in 1935 as commercial program director, and a year later became the first vice-president in charge of programs, and the network's youngest vice-president. In 1941, at the request of New York's Mayor LaGuardia, Lewis went to Washington as Chief of the Radio Division in the Office of Facts and Figures, with the job of coordinating the government's radio activities. When the OWI was formed in World War II, he was appointed Chief of the Domestic Radio Bureau, and organized and operated the Radio Allocation Plan. Returning to CBS briefly, Lewis joined Kenyon & Eckhardt in 1944 as a vice-president.

ROBERT M. GANGER, chairman of the board of the D'Arcy Advertising Co., spent twenty-four years with Geyer, Newell & Ganger, Inc., and its predecessors, and did a three-year stint with P. Lorillard and Co., before coming to the D'Arcy agency in his present position in 1953. Fresh from Ohio State University, he started with the Geyer Co., of Dayton, Ohio, as an office boy, and in four years—in 1930—was a branch office manager, and in another three, a vice-president. A native of Greenville, Ohio, Bob became a director of P. Lorillard in 1950, and in 1952 was elected president, to become the youngest of prexies in tobacco's Big Five. In 1953 he assumed his present post with D'Arcy. Besides introducing Embassy and Kent for Lorillard, Bob's achievements also include the "Man of Distinction" campaign.





ROBERT M. WATSON, president of Ruthrauff & Ryan, Inc., joined the firm as an account executive in the San Francisco office in 1940, and subsequently became manager of that office. In 1943 he moved to the New York office, and in 1946 became vice-president. Six years later he was named executive vice-president in charge of eastern operations. Before joining R & R Bob had been a newspaper reporter, copy writer, salesman, and retail advertising and sales promotion manager. Mr. Watson married the former Frances Baldwin, and is a resident of Greenwich, Connecticut.



ROBERT E. ALLEN, president of Fuller & Smith & Ross, Inc., joined the agency in 1936 as an account executive, after having his own agency in Philadelphia. In the position of account executive Bob directed the advertising and marketing activities of more than a dozen clients, and gained the experience that has won him a reputation as an expert in marketing and a champion of integrated merchandising. In 1945 he was made a vice-president, and after the death of the late Allen L. Billingsley in 1954, he was elected to the presidency. From 1950 until his election to the presidency, he had served as manager of the agency's New York office. A graduate of Temple and Columbia Universities, he is, at 42, among the youngest presidents of any major agency in the nation.

ERNEST A. JONES, president of MacManus, John & Adams. Inc., at 40, is the youngest president of a major advertising company in the nation. With MJ&A since 1938, he came to New York in 1950 to open the New York office, and was elected vice-president at that time. A graduate of the University of Michigan, he returned to Detroit in 1953 as executive vice-president and account supervisor of the Dow Chemical account, and more recently of the Pontiac Motor Division account. While a senior at Michigan, W. A. P. John, then president of MJ&A, visited the campus and was impressed by Ernest, who was business manager of the Michigan Daily. He offered him a job soon after his gradution in 1938.





MAURICE H. NEEDHAM, founder and president of Needham, Louis & Brorby, Inc., has led the agency which bears his name a long way in the 31 years he's served as chief executive officer. From a single room and three modest accounts billing \$270,000, NL&B has grown to occupy the top three floors of Chicago's newest and tallest structure—the Prudential building. It represents 17 of the nation's top advertisers, whose billings amount to more than \$30,000,000 per year. Needham recently delivered a talk entitled "Towards the Complete Man," outlining the belief he's held since college days that it's the man with a broad base of education in the humanities who makes the most effective leader in advertising, or in any other business.

WALTER C. AYERS, president of Brooks, Smith, French & Dorrance, Inc., is a "salesman." He has been a retail and wholesale salesman, field training supervisor, district manager, branch and sales manager. This covered 17 years before he joined BSF&D's merchandising staff in 1939. A year later he was vice-president in charge of research; by 1954 a senior partner; in 1950 executive vice-president, and in 1955 he became president. Commenting on business, Ayers recently said, "With the U. S. national product forecast at \$415 billion in 1960, and with competition in almost all major industries in the 'dog eat dog' stage, it seems we are heading into the toughest fight in the history of business for the greatest stakes in the history of business."





RAYMOND F. SULLIVAN, president of Sullivan, Stauffer, Colwell & Bayles, upon graduating from Yale in 1920, joined Ruthrauff & Ryan as a copy writer and within six years became a vice-president. By the middle thirties he was a director of the agency. In July, 1946, along with Donald T. Stauffer, Robert T. Colwell and Heagan Bayles, he founded Sullivan, Stauffer, Colwell & Bayles, Inc., and became president of what is today's largest post-war agency. Under Sullivan's leadership, SSC&B has grown from \$4,500,000 billings in 1947, the first full calendar year of operations, to approximately \$32,000,000 in 1955.

FRANK WHITE, chairman of the board, McCann-Erickson Corporation (International), was born in Washington, D. C., and educated at George Washington University. Beginning as an accountant in 1921 he later became assistant to the president of the Union News Company, 1924-29 and then treasurer of the Literary Guild of America from 1929-35. In 1942 he became a vice-president of CBS and in 1948 president of Columbia Records, Inc. This began a series of presidencies: president and director of the Mutual Broadcasting System, in June, 1952, president and director, NBC, January-August, 1953, and chairman of the board of McCann-Erickson Corporation (International) since January, 1954. He is a director for the Better Business Bureau of New York, and also a member of the Armed Forces Advisory Committee for the Northeast Area, and Sigma Nu.

FRANK SILVERNAIL heads the radio-TV time buyers department at BBD&O, and is considered a veteran of the field. Before joining NBC as merchandising counsel in 1929, Frank broke into the broadcasting game as a guitar artist on WEAF in the early days. He was first with Pedlar & Ryan before joining Young & Rubicam in a similar capacity and then later, in 1943, moved to BBD&O. A graduate of the University of Rochester, Frank often recalls his undergraduate days where even then he laid plans for a career in sales promotion and time-buying techniques, techniques that have embarked him on a time-buying vocation that comprises handling radio-TV campaigns for every type of product from soap to cigarettes and from beer to automobiles.





LESLIE L. DUNIER, director of radio and television for the Emil Mogul Company, became interested in radio after doing a short stint with the Armed Forces Network in England during World War II. He began his advertising career with the Sterling Agency, then for a number of years headed his own agency and specialized in servicing radio-television spot advertisers. At Mogul he plans the air media strategy for Esquire Shoe Polish, Manischewitz Wine, Rayco Seat Covers, Block Drug, National Shoes, Barney's, and many others. When time allows Les enjoys traveling and meeting with the many station people he has done business with through the years.

RICHARD P. POWELL, vice-president in charge of information services for N. W. Ayer & Son, has a background of newspaper work, public relations, and free-lance writing involving scores of magazine stories, articles and serials, and ten mystery novels. After graduating from Princeton University in 1930, he joined the Philadelphia Evening Public Ledger, where he worked at everything from police reporter to feature writer. In 1940 he joined Ayer's public relations department, but in 1942 was called to active duty in the War Department's public relations bureau. Later he served on MacArthur's public relations staff, and handled many of the press arrangements for the Japanese surrender ceremonies. Returning to Ayer, he was elected a vice-president in January of 1952.





NICHOLAS E. KEESELY, senior vice president in charge of radio and TV for Lennen & Newell, Inc., has many current hits to his credit, including "Two for the Money," "Queen For a Day," "Home," and "Today." Born in Philadelphia in 1910, Nick attended Temple University and the Charles Price Advertising School. His first radio advertising job was with N. W. Ayer & Sons, starting in 1928. In his fifteen years with the firm, he held the positions of everything from producer to account executive. In 1943 he became program sales manager of CBS, and later with MBS. He is a member of the New York Committee of the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, and is on the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation's Radio Committee.



WALTER WARE, director of television for Scheideler, Beck & Werner Agency, broke into commercial TV in the days of hall-room studios, and hot lights. The native Kentuckian started in radio on the home-town station, WLAP, Lexington, and in 1941 joined the Maxon Agency in New York as a copy writer. He put his theatrical knowledge to work in television experimentation in 1945 by launching the first experimental TV show from the Dumont Wanamaker studios. He is credited with the success of New York's first women's daytime show, "Missus Goes A'Shoppin'", telecast direct from supermarkets. Walt set up the TV department for SB&W when the agency was launched in 1951.

JANE DALY, vice president and radio-TV director of the Earle Ludgin Company, Chicago, joined the company as a young secretary in 1942, and then later became the first vice president at the year-end corporate meeting. Three years after she joined the agency she became the assistant time buyer, and soon after that became head of the radio-TV department. As newest of the agency's vice presidents, Jane continues as radio-television director, a position which she has held for the past several years.





ARTHUR A. KRON, executive vice president, treasurer and radio-TV director of Gotham-Vladimir Advertising Co., is unique in having been with the one agency his entire career, joining Gotham in 1916. Virtually a one-man agency, he is the founder of the International Advertising Convention which he initiated while president of the International Ad Association. Also active in other professional groups, he is charter member of the Association of International Ad Agencies, and the Association of Ad Men & Women, vice chairman and treasurer of the New York World Trade Week Committee, as well as active in the RTES, Radio Pioncers, and others. Chief interests on the outside are golf, gardening, and pistol-shooting.

LYNN DIAMOND, radio and television time buyer for the Emil Mogul Company, joined the agency's time buying department in March of 1953 as executive assistant and was upped to radio and television time buyer in July of the same year, working primarily on the Rayco Auto Seat Cover account. She joined the agency after two years at Cecil & Presbrey, where she was assistant to the account executive on Tintair. Her present job is a prodigious one, since Rayco is a chain of franchised retailers with over 100 stores in approximately 90 markets, and each outlet operates on an individual budget allocation. All radio and television advertising is planned on a local spot basis.





HERBERT GRUBER, business manager of the radio and television department of Edward Kletter Associates, Inc., was previously head time buyer at the now defunct Cecil & Presbrey, Inc., before assuming his present duties, where he is concerned primarily with the purchase of all radio and television time and the execution of all such contracts for clients. A veteran specialist in the time-buying field, Gruber, previous to joining Cecil & Presbrey, Inc., had been with the Biow Company for several years in the same capacity as the post he now holds. Delving in both art and the more strenuous game of tennis, both actively and passively, form two of his most favorite pastimes.



JAMES C. DOUGLASS, vice president in charge of radio and TV for Ted Bates and Company had been, after the war, production manager of the Colgate-Palmolive-Peet Company's radio unit in Sydney, Australia, working for their ad agency, the George Patterson Company, Ltd. He was also formerly vice president in charge of radio and TV at the Erwin Wasey Company. After graduating from Hastings College Conservatory of Music and the University of Nebraska, Jim joined WAAW (now KOWH) in Omaha, as assistant manager in charge of programs. Later he shifted to Central States Broadcasting System as program director, and then later to CBS as program production manager in St. Louis. During the war he was a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Navy.

ROBERT FOREMAN, vice president of the radio-television department of Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn, is the youngest man to have been made a vice president of the agency. Starting in the trade copy department 17 years ago, then into consumer advertising, Bob was a VP 10 years later. He headed the first segregated radio group of the agency and, in that capacity, helped with the development of the famous "Chiquita Banana" and "Willie the Penguin" commercials. The author of a bi-monthly radio-TV copy column, Bob has an avid interest in early Americana, and lives in a 150-year-old farm in Westport, Conn.





GERALD GIBSON, chief time buyer at Doherty, Clifford, Steers & Shenfield, Inc., returned to his native state of New Jersey to embark on his agency career with McCann-Erickson, where he estimated radio-TV time for Lever Brothers' products, after he had begun his broadcasting career as a time salesman for WJOY, Burlington, Vt. He joined Doherty, Clifford, Steers & Shenfield in 1953, as time buyer on the Pharmaco and Minit-Rub accounts. He was subsequently promoted to his present post as head of the time-buying department, supervising the purchase of spot radio and TV and network buying for such accounts as Borden, Bristol-Myers, Curtis Publishing Company, Sonotone, and other top-notch clients.

WINSLOW II. CASE, vice president of Geyer Advertising, Inc., has been associated with Stinson Aircraft, La Driere Art Service and Chesterfield cigarettes and has served on the advertising faculty of the University of Columbia since first entering the advertising field back in 1927. Formerly associated with Campbell-Ewald as senior vice president, he is known as a major contributor in the development of that agency's television department, working closely with Chevrolet officials in their TV expansion. Active in the presentation of "Famous Jury Trials" and the Notre Dame grid games on DuMont for Chevrolet, Case supervised more than sixty remote events at N. Y.'s Madison Square Garden.





ROGER PRYOR, vice president in charge of radio and television at Foote, Cone & Belding, started off in show business at the age of 18, when he played summer stock and gradually moved to leading parts on Broadway and Hollywood. With an exceptionally large background in the entertainment field, Roger finally moved into radio, first as an orchestra leader, then as MC on the Gulf Screen Program. He joined Foote, Cone & Belding in 1947 as director of television. Among the clients he has presented on TV are Union Oil, Sunkist, Pepsodent, Kleenex, Toni Home Permanent, B-B Ball Point Pen, Rheingold Beer, and the New York Central Railroad.



DAN SEYMOUR, radio and television supervisor of J. Walter Thompson Company, is a well-known radio veteran, as well as a pioneer in television, both as a performer and as a producer. His greatest fame came as the emcee of the very popular "We the People" show on radio, and Dan was largely responsible for the long list of firsts accredited to the show. While at Amherst College, Dan was active in campus dramatics, and at 18 went abroad as a guest of the Austrian Ministry of Education to study and teach stage techniques. Dan was with Young & Rubicam for five years in a position similar to his present one with the Thompson Agency, which he joined in 1955.

HARRY WAYNE McMAHAN, vice-president in charge of TV-radio commercials and a member of the Creative Plans Board at McCann-Erickson, Inc., is the author of "The Television Commercial," and "TV Production Handbook," which is scheduled for publication late this year. Mac was born a Hoosier, raised in Texas and transplanted to California before moving to New York two years ago to join McCann-Erickson. In 1935 he wrote and produced his first advertising film, and in 1939 founded Five Star Productions, Inc., in Hollywood. Since then he has written more than 3,000 commercials, and supervised production on more than three times that many. McMahan's articles in television production have appeared in trade publications in both Britain and America, and have been translated into Spanish and Japanese.





SAMUEL H. NORTHCROSS, vice president and director of television for the William Esty Company, is a scholar with a background in both the newspaper and audience measurement field. After graduation from North Carolina University, Sam studied at Oxford University, England, and returned to enter the newspaper field as reporter and country editor for the Washington Herald. He spent five years with the George Gallup organization in public opinion and audience research, before joining Young & Rubicam for a two-year period. A veteran of the Army Air Corps, from which he emerged with the rank of captain, Sam was a vice president and manager of television production for Esty for five years before his appointment as over-all director of the agency's television department.

JOHN R. SHEEHAN, vice president and director of radio and television for Cunningham & Walsh, Inc., launched his career as a featured vocalist at WGY, Schenectady, under Kolin Haeger. Moving over to the business side of radio, John became assistant to the station manager and, in 1936, joined General Electric as manager of international broadcasting. In this position he inaugurated, staffed, and managed GE's full-time FM station and had supervision of the planning and editing of GE's documentary and institutional films. After Pearl Harbor, he was appointed Chief of Facilities and Radio Operations of OWI, and was responsible for all communications for both OWI and the Armed Forces Radio.





MYRON P. KIRK, senior vice president and director of television and radio for the Kudner Agency, Inc., is a veteran advertising man, and was a pioneer of many of today's radio and TV formats. He received training in the banking, brokerage, agency, theatre, radio, and movie businesses and, from 1938 to 1941, he served as a vice president of Famous Artists, and had previously been a vice president of Ruthrauff & Ryan, Inc. He joined the Kudner Agency as director of radio and was among the first to recognize the potential of TV. He is credited with many of the experiments which helped the medium come of age. Becoming vice president of radio and television, he helped set the pattern of the original Berle show and of the Caesar-Coca show.





JOHN PAUL MARSICH, assistant media director for the Kudner Agency, has attended Columbia and New York University, graduating from NYU with a degree in Business Administration. He began his advertising career with NBC in 1940. In 1943 he left NBC to join the service. As a lieutenant in the navy, he commanded an LSM in the Pacific Theater until the end of hostilities, whereupon he returned to the television department of NBC. By 1949 he had advanced to supervisor of production costs on all network shows. He served in that capacity until August of the same year, when he accepted an offer from Kudner to join the agency as assistant business manager of the radio-television department.

GEORGE POLK, radio-TV supervisor with Batten, Barton, Durstine, & Osborn, Inc., attended Hotchkiss and Pomfret Schools in Connecticut. With BBD&O since 1950, George is a graduate of Erskine College, South Carolina, getting his BA degree with the class of 1950. He started his advertising career in the mail room of BBD&O and, progressing steadily, he went on to research, time buying, to his present post, where he works with Robert Foreman, vice president in charge of the radio-television department. George, still single, is a native New Yorker.





LOCKE TURNER, media director of Batten, Barton, Durstine, & Osborn, Inc., Los Angeles, joined the firm after graduation from Stanford University, and has now been with BBD&O for the past seven years. He began as a trainee and was promoted successively to production and account duties. Prior to being named media director, he was an assistant account executive on the Rexall Drug account for a period of four years. He was married to Barbara Walsh early in 1955, she being the assistant to the research director of BBD&O. Los Angeles.

FRANK MINEHAN, vice president, media director and member of the plans board at Sullivan, Stauffer, Colwell & Bayles, had before that post spent a short time as media director at Pedlar & Ryan. With Sullivan, Stauffer, Colwell & Bayles since 1946, Frank had been media director and a Brand Man at Lever Brothers Company in Cambridge, Massachusetts, before coming to New York. After graduating from a finance school in Boston, he began his business career as a public accountant and school teacher. After joining Lever Brothers Company, he switched to advertising and he has continued brilliantly in the field since that time.





GEORGE KERN, associate media director of Lennen & Newell, Inc., started in the advertising business in 1923 with the Chicago office of the George Batten Company, now known as BBD&O. After several years there in various departments and capacities, including several weeks in the New York office, George joined Blackett, Sample, Hummert (now Dancer, Fitzgerald & Sample) in 1931, as an assistant account executive on the Parker Pen, Insulite, Stewart-Warner accounts, remaining there for several years. In 1940 he joined Benton & Bowles as chief time buyer. During World War II, he served on the staff of General MacArthur in the Moral Services Section. Prior to joining Lennen & Newell, he was associated with Benton & Bowles.



LEONARD F. ERIKSON, vice president of McCann-Erickson in charge of the central radio-television department, started with CBS in the early days of commercial radio, after receiving a degree in journalism from the University of Wisconsin and a graduate degree from the Harvard School of Business Administration. His first major position with CBS was as Western sales manager working out of Chicago, and later on as general sales manager in New York. After 14 years with the network, Leonard went to BBD&O in 1945 as assistant to president Ben Duffy, and handled liaison between management and the radio department. His next move was to Kenyon & Eckhardt, where he was vice president and director of radio and TV.

HENRY FOWNES, vice president, director of the radio and television department, and manager of the New York office of MacManus, John & Adams, Inc., started his advertising career in the mail room of Benton & Bowles. It wasn't long before Hank was appointed to the post of assistant executive on the lucrative TIDE account, but soon after left to become a radio-television producer with Fenton Productions. In this post he serviced numerous accounts, among them those of Cadillac and Pontiac, whose primary agency is the MacManus Agency, with head offices in Michigan. When they decided to open offices in New York, Hank was chosen to head the air waves department, later becoming manager of the New York office and vice president.





WALTER CRAIG, vice president in charge of television for Norman, Craig and Kummel, started his career in show business, but in 1930 moved into the ground floor of radio as program director of the old World Broadcasting System. A native of St. Louis, Walter left World to found his own producing firm, and created top shows for clients such as Chevrolet, United Drug, Coca-Cola, Beechnut Packing, Carter Products, and Wheaties. Illness forced him to retire for two years to his home in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, where he raised cocker spaniels and Guernsey cattle. Unable to leave the field completely, however, he acted as radio consultant for Street & Finney, until his return to full harness in November, 1942, as program director for WMCA.

GEORGE WOLF, vice president and director for radio and television for Ruthrauff & Ryan, Inc., joined the firm in 1953 after seven years with Foote, Cone & Belding, where he was director of radio and TV, supervising a large part of the agency's eighteen-million dollar-a-year airtime billings. George started out as a free-lance radio writer and producer, contributing to many of the leading programs of the pre-war era. After Pearl Harbor, he served with the Signal Corps Motion Picture Center, assigned to writing and producing documentary training films. After the war, Wolf wrote and produced a weekly network institutional show for NBC, in addition to working on special assignments.





ALVIN KABAKER, manager of the Hollywood office of Compton Advertising, Inc., is unique in that he was a practicing attorney before turning to the advertising field. Receiving both a Bachelor of Arts and a law degree from the University of Chicago, Al practiced law two years before venturing into advertising as a copywriter with Blackett-Sample & Hummert of Chicago, the predecessor of Dancer-Fitzgerald & Sample, Inc. Rising to the production field, he supervised shows such as "Beulah," "Mystery Theatre," and "A Date With Judy," while manager of the Hollywood office. After seventeen years with DFS, Al moved to Compton this year as manager of the Hollywood office.



NORINE FREEMAN, media director for Western Advertising Agency, Los Angeles, was a news reporter for more than fifteen years on mid-Western newspapers, such as the Toledo Blade, the Toledo News-Bee, and the Cincinnati Post. With this background of newspaper reporting, she left the newspaper field for publicity and public-relations work in New York, where she was an account executive with Earle Ferris, Inc., and later radio director of Carl Byoir Associates. Norine left New York for Chicago, where she became publicity director and radio-TV planning director for W. B. Doner and Company. She went to Los Angeles in 1951, and was media director for the Gables Company, before joining Western Advertising Agency.

PETER ARNOLD KRUG, director of radio and television for Calkins & Holden, was formerly with Hicks & Greist for seven years in the same capacity and, prior to that, served as business manager of the radio department of Donahue & Co. He has directed radio and television activities for such clients as Prudential Insurance of America, Stokely-Van Camp, Marculus Manufacturing Company, Oakite, Stereo-Realist Cameras, and other nationally-known accounts. His non-agency experience includes five years as program director, writer and performer with WEBR, Buffalo, N. Y., and an earlier stint with WNBX, Springfield, Vt., now WKNE, as station manager.





BETH BROBERG, media director for the Mayers Company, went from USC to Foster & Kleiser Company, where she learned the advertising business working in various departments, including the posting and sales. She left Foster & Kleiser after four years to join West-Marquis, Inc., where she started as a general employee and at the end of a two-year period, was assisting the media director, production manager and chief accountant. Two years later she joined the Jere Bayard Associates as media director where, for three years, she selected various media and kept all agency media records. She was associated with Grant Advertising Agency before joining the Mayers Company in 1951.

JOHN GAUNT, director of television and radio for Grant Advertising, now divides his time between supervising such programs as ABC's "Make Room For Daddy" and "Lawrence Welk Show" and NBC's "Roy Rogers Show", in addition to creating filmed commercials for national Grant clients. Formerly a director and producer of many top-rated network shows, Gaunt, when recently asked to define his position, replied, "Television and radio broadcasting today is made commercially possible only by combining the talents of two widely divergent types of creative people—the artistic theatrical type and the sales managerial type—each is able and resourceful."



H. PIERSON MAPES, general manager and vice president in charge of radio and TV in the New York office of Hutchins Advertising Company, Inc., joined the May Radio Corp. in 1930 and became sales promotion and merchandising manager in 1933. In the same year he moved from May to Philco as sales promotion manager. Coming into TV via radio advertising and merchandising, Mapes joined the Hutchins agency in 1945 and has been responsible for the radio and television activities of Philco Corporation ever since, with a notable series of shows, including "Radio Hall of Fame," "Bing Crosby Show," and the "Philco Television Playhouse" on NBC-TV. Pierson also supervises planning of Philco conventions and other national activities.



DON BLAUHUT, radio-television director of Edward Kletter Associates, holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Ohio State, which he gained in three rather than the customary four years. A native New Yorker, Don has been associated with the H. B. Humphrey Agency, and in 1950 joined the Peck Advertising Agency as the assistant to the director of radio and television, and the following year was advanced to become director. In 1952 he joined Raymond Spector as radio-television director, where he worked principally on "This Is Your Life." In 1953 the young veteran of World War II joined Kletter in a similar capacity, and is working on such programs as "The Red Skelton Show," "Meet Millie," "Douglas Edwards With the News," and "Masquerade Show."

VICTOR SEYDEL, vice president for radio and television for Anderson & Cairns Agency, never had any doubt about his career. A star performer on the school and dramatic society boards of Grand Rapids, Michigan, and later Pottstown, Pennsylvania, Vic was all set to enter Michigan University, when an RKO theatre manager offered him a summer job as a song and dance man in Chicago. The job lasted two and a half years, and Vic's been connected with show business ever since. He started in radio with the old Blue Network, now ABC, as a director, and worked on such top shows as "Counter-Spy" and "Ladies Be Seated." In 1944 he became Eastern radio and television director in the New York office of the Walker & Downing Agency, and later moved on to Anderson & Cairns in a similar capacity.





FRANKLIN ROBERTS, vice president and director of radio and television at the Will Roberts Advertising Agency in Philadelphia, brings a wealth of varied experience to his duties. While studying at the University of Pennsylvania, Frank was both a campus correspondent and sports writer for the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin. Upon graduation his first position was with the Harry Feigenbaum Ad Agency as radio continuity writer. He soon became a director for radio and television and, in addition, wrote musical jingles for both mediums and created TV commercials. From there, Frank moved to his present position, where he maintains an active interest in Philadelphia's television association, and is an active sportsman.

EDWARD RATNER, radio-TV director of Friend-Reiss, has had a varied career as a ghost writer for a syndicated column, a short-story writer, and a free-lance script writer, although he is only 31. A veteran of World War II, in which he served as an aerial gunner, Ed received a degree in English from NYU and received his first experience in advertising as a radio-TV copy chief with Product Services, Inc., where he created and scripted numerous shows for both mediums. A native New Yorker now residing in Hudson County, New Jersey, Ed is a member of the Radio Writers Guild since 1946, and a director of the Metropolitan Advertising Men.





BARBARA JONES, Donahue & Coe time buyer, is a graduate of Smith (cum laude) and formerly on the staffs of Mademoiselle, Life, and Television magazines, free-lancing with scripts to all major outlets. The blonde member of the Jones Girls' time-buying triumvirate, none of whom are related, Barbara, after a stint with the package firm of Video Associates, Inc., embarked on her agency career with Grey where, for over five years, she ran the gamut of production, business management, talent buying, et al, to become the administrative assistant to the radio-TV vice president. She's been in her present post for over 30 months, and lives in Greenwich Village.





EDNA S. CATHCART, chief television and radio time buyer for J. M. Mathes, Inc., is one of that small group of advertising personalities who have maintained a long and unbroken association with one firm. Edna started with the Mathes firm in 1937, and since then has gained a broad experience in all branches of the advertising field. Her first taste of huckstering was with Young & Rubicam, where she spent three years. At present Edna is responsible for the purchase of all broadcasting time for the firm, which handles such accounts as Canada Dry Ginger Ale, Inc., Ludens, Inc., the Northern Warren Corp., Bates Fabrics, and the Capehart Farnsworth Co.

WILLIAM L. WEDDELL, vice president in charge of broadcasting for the Leo Burnett Company, Inc., joined the firm in 1946 after a long association with the National Broadcasting Company, which he joined in 1929, soon after his graduation from the University of Chicago. With NBC he served as sales promotion manager, account executive, and chairman of the operations committee in Chicago. Later, he became radio director for Erwin Wasey & Co. Bill is a member of the National Committee on Television and Radio Policies of the AAAA.





CHARLES W. CURRAN, television film producer at McCann-Erickson, Inc., commenced his advertising career with general agencies in Chicago before coming to New York. In 1931, after his play "Ad-Man" was made into a feature by RKO-Radio Pictures, Charlie went into film production with several major companies. During the war he served at the Naval Photo Center as head of writers and directors division. JOSEPH P. BRAUN, vice-president in charge of media at Kenyon & Eckhardt, Inc., joined the firm in 1933 as an office boy. Over the years he has advanced through various jobs within the agency, including media clerk, research reporter, statistician, and space buyer. He moved to BBD&O as a developer of new programs for radio and TV. He ultimately became vice president of that department.



WILLIAM R. SETH, JR., vice president and director of radio and television of Lewin, Williams & Saylor, Inc., has a solid background in local radio. A graduate of the University of North Carolina, Bill has been an announcer, disc jockey, and news editor, and has managed stations in Fredericksburg, Virginia, and Youngstown, Ohio. For a time Bill was with NBC Spot Sales and, in 1948-49 was the director of advertising for Muzak. Prior to his present connection, he was vice president in charge of television and radio for Needham & Grohmann, and earlier was radio director of O'Brien and Dorrance. A member of AFTRA, Bill keeps his perspective by doing occasional spot announcements, in addition to being account executive for four advertisers.

TOM McDERMOTT, vice president of radio-television programming at Benton & Bowles, has set an astonishing record for a young man in his early thirties. Tom got a head start as a writer and producer of shows while a student at Manhattan College, as a youthful organizer of a local dramatic society, and as a summer theatre producer. Prior to entering advertising, Tom worked on the staffs of WNYC and WOV and wrote and directed for Ireene Wicker, "The Singing Lady." He has directed "When A Girl Marries," "The Prudential Family Hour," and has written, produced and directed scores of other top-flight shows. A lifetime student of the drama, Tom has studied at Fordham, Columbia, and NYU. He joined B&B in 1942.





JEAN L. SIMPSON, radio and television time buyer at Doyle, Dane & Bernback and formerly time buyer at Anderson & Cairns Agency, is a native of New Jersey, specifically, Passaic. She went out West for her education, receiving a B.A. degree in sociology from Oberlin College in 1947. She began her time-buying career with Anderson, Davis & Platte in 1950, continuing after the agency merged with John A. Cairns Company to form Anderson and Cairns. She's a specialist in the spot field, handling only spot radio and TV while other colleagues handle network purchases. Her outside interests lie mainly in the field of architecture, being the wife of architect John E. Grocco.

ROBERT W. DAY, vice president and radio-television director of Albert Frank-Guenther Law, Inc., has a well-deserved reputation as one of the leading radio-television authorities for Wall St. After graduation from Harvard, he was associated with Broadcast Advertising, Inc., in Boston, where he served as the merchandising representative for network food programs from 1939 to 1942. The war years were spent as a lieutenant in the Navy, and the first post-war period with the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company. Bob has also been radio-TV director of Lynn Baker, Inc., and H. B. Humphrey in New York.





PAUL GUMBINNER, director of radio and TV for the Lawrence C. Gumbinner Advertising Agency, Inc., was one of the creators of the station-break and singing commercials. In 1929, Paul sold the idea of a fifteen-second singing commercial to George Washington Hill of the American Tobacco Company, and then made a tour of the country, explaining the methods radio stations could use to gain revenue by selling station-break time. Paul pioneered in the creation of filmed television commercials in 1947, using his own apartment as a studio, and shooting exteriors on Riverside Drive.



MILDRED FULTON, chief time buyer for McCann-Erickson's Bulova Watch Company account, has served in the same capacity for nine years. Starting on the account in 1947 with the Biow Company, Mildred moved with it to McCann-Erickson in January, 1955. Her experience before that was rather varied, having worked with organizations ranging from tree surgeons to country clubs. During the war she worked as secretary and administrative assistant to Edward W. Barrett, former assistant Secretary of State, with the Office of War Information. Moving to New York City in 1945, Millie entered the advertising field with Free & Peters. She is a native of Stamford, Connecticut, and among her many hobbies, she enjoys doing portraits in oil best.

BERNARD G. RASMUSSEN, manager of broadcast media at Fuller, Smith & Ross, Inc., started as an accountant with Seagram Distillers Corporation. A native of Brooklyn, with a degree in Business Administration from Fordham University, during World War II he saw service as an Air Force navigator in Europe. Bernard joined Ruthrauff & Ryan in 1947 as a timebuyer. He has been with Fuller, Smith & Ross, Inc., in his present capacity since 1952.



JAMES ZABIN, radio and TV director and partner in the Posner-Zabin Agency, has a well-versed background and a wide community of interests that include trusteeship in the N. Y. Society for Ethical Culture, a hoard member of the Riverside Community House, member of the New York Financial Advertisers, and former officer of the Associated Motion Picture Advertisers and other professional groups. The co-author of "Understanding Advertising," Zabin is equally talented in his artistic pursuits, having exhibited in numerous shows. He began his ad career with Paramount Pictures, later going with United Artists and thence to the Hann-Metzger Agency (now Buchanan Company) for 15 years.

MARVIN L. GRANT, vice president, radio-TV director, and account executive of the Dobin Agency, gained his triple-threat versatility as a free-lance writer-producer-director with the William H. Weintraub Co., where he had an outstanding record of many national radio programs to his credit. He moved over to the Mann-Ellis Agency in a position similar to his present one, where he had overall supervision of radio-TV from time buying through production, as well as executive on six accounts. Grant joined Dobin in his present position in 1955.





KENNETH G. MANUEL, vice president and director of TV and radio at D. P. Brother & Co., entered broadcasting as the discovery of the veteran Harry Bannister, quickly becoming a full-time newscaster and commentator on WWJ, Detroit. He became a TV pioneer when he inaugurated the first major educational telecast, "Television University," staged on WWJ-TV in collaboration with the University of Michigan, the University of Detroit, and Cranbrook Institute of Science. Manuel's alma mater, the University of Michigan, where he was an outstanding sports star, continued the series on the same station as "Telecourses," and has won many commendations for it.



PHILLIP ROUDA, Chicago vice president in charge of radio and TV for Bozell & Jacobs, Inc., joined the agency in October, 1944, as a copy-writer, after serving with the Army Air Forces as a radio instructor. He has been with the agency for ten years. His previous background included motion picture work with National Screen Service and Filmack in writing and production and also varied motion picture and other advertising. His radio and TV work at Bozell & Jacobs includes program and spot buying for the cream of the agency's clients. He has won six Chicago Federation Advertising Club awards for individual ads and campaigns handled as creative account executive. He was educated at the University of Chicago.

EVELYN LEE JONES, business manager of the radio and television department, and chief time buyer of Donahue & Coe, Inc., joined the agency as a copy writer, later shifting to the administration and business division. She has been with the agency since 1943 and, prior to that, Evelyn was at City Hall as Civilian Defense Volunteer Aide to the late Fiorello H. LaGuardia. Immediately prior to World War II, she was director of advertising for Theatre-on-Film, Inc. Evelyn has been on the board of directors of Advertising Women of New York, Inc., from 1954-55. She attended Columbia University and Rochester University. Marriage entered the picture in 1934 when she met Charles Reed Jones.

RINO NEGRI, vice president and member of the Executive Committee of the Emil Mogul Company, is a leading authority on the advertising and marketing of Italian-American products, particularly in the radio-television media. Born and raised in Venice, Italy, Rino is a graduate of the College of Milan, and speaks and writes five languages fluently. He got his start in advertising as an Italian language announcer at WOV, New York. Rino became associated with Mogul in 1945, and since then has directed the very successful campaigns for Ronzoni Macaroni Company, Berolio Importing Company, Gem Oil, and Berio Olive Oil, which have proven his mastery of the Italian-American market.

ALVIN Q. EHRLICH, vice president in charge of radio and television for Kal, Ehrlich & Merrick, of Washington, D. C., is a pioneer and long-time leader of the advertising field in our nation's capital. Al, always active in civic and advertising affairs, was twice president of the Washington Advertising Club, has been a director of the Better Business Bureau, and is a member of the Radio Pioneers. He entered advertising in 1929 as manager of Raleigh Haberdasher's advertising, and joined the Kal Agency in 1932. Within three years he was a partner in the firm, and after three years in the service during the war, rejoined the firm which reorganized as Kal, Ehrlich & Merrick.





JOHN P. ATHERTON, vice president and director of radio and television for the Atherton & Currier Agency, brings a unique talent to his position. E. A. "TIM" ELLIOTT, media director and vice president of the Fletcher D. Richards Agency, has spent his entire career (over a quarter of a century) with one agency. He directs the purchase of TV and radio time for U. S. Rubber, Eastern Airlines, Dixon Ticonderoga Pencils, Waterman Pen, American Machine & Foundry, among others, as well as serving as account supervisor on many key accounts. 

Network Radio To Experience Renaissance

 \mathbf{T}^{HE} time to **sell** network radio, not to sell it short is now.

This medium possesses the power and magic needed by national advertisers and requires only a vigorous and positive selling approach, such as was used to create it from nothing after World War I to one of America's great sales asents before World War II.

By virtue of its coast-to-coast facilities, network radio at a very low cost-per-thousand delivers potential clients quickly and effiiently. The key to success lies in finding the proper means and time for the particular product.



Network radio commercials also serve as the perfect complement to other forms of advertising. It's a known fact that people associate what they hear on radio with commercial copy placed on television, in newspapers or magazines! And once again, at a low cost, network radio can buttress the campaign of many advertisers.

Back in the early days of the industry, our predecessors had to use every bit of ingenuity and resourcefulness at their disposal to put noross to the public a then unknown and unpredictable form of communication. When their critics said it couldn't be done, they did it, to paraphrase a line from Edgar Guest. Radio executives admittedly had one advantage in those days over present-day men; there was no past experience to guide them.



Creativity, time and money have been lacking in the more recent years of network radio because of the pressure of developing television. But the time has come when TV has reached a degree of maturity and at ABC for example, greater attention is being placed on radio.

We have added new program properties including Walt Disney's "Magic Kingdom" bringing to the aural medium the talent of one

of America's great creative artists. This new daytime entry is planned to meet some of the desires of morning audiences, yet while it is new, it is really only old time showmanship of which Disney is a master.

With the "Breakfast Club," also heard in the morning, ABC has found this property as valuable as ever. To insure its financial success, we have found it necessary to change our selling techniques, accommodating advertisers in smaller segments, from five minutes, one-time only to any other amount of time over a year or more. The results have been gratifying proving that network radio needs only the right combination of time and program for the advertiser to buy.



ABC has experimented in other areas of programming, particularly the nighttime, and will continue to try new ideas and techniques to eventually discover what the public and the advertiser wants, knowing that ultimately our endeavors will pay off. Since we are in business for a profit, we have faith in what we're doing and have no intention of going out of the rudio business.

While research men have come up with every kind of statistic about radio ("radio set sales are greater than television," "radios are everywhere," "radio appeals to the individual at work or play") television has still copped the headlines on sales and programs. Many radio executives have succumbed to thinking negatively and defensively as a result. Personally, I think this is a great failure on their parts.

Other industries have suffered set-backs such as motion pictures, records, etc. But we have all seen how they have snapped out of the doldrums and are now doing well.



Difficulties often serve to rally the best in a person or an industry, and I sense that this is happening in many areas of network radio at this very moment. Self-confidence is being restored and better efforts are being made to compete with other media. It is quite possible that network radio, within the next year or so, will experience a renaissance, gathering strength as the industry learns to utilize fully its tremendous but now latent potential.

Radio networks can still do the best job in many fields of endeavor and I believe they will continue to do so.

Not expecting miracles overnight, ABC be lieves that with patience and ability, we will accomplish what some pessimists say can't be done and return network radio to its respected position in American Itfe.

Radio's New Threshold Of Achievement

THE exciting thing about radio today is that it keeps breaking through its own high "ceilings."

In 1955, there were just short of 15 million radio sets produced—the biggest year for set production since 1948. Equally impressive is the fact that this tremendous year for radio set production came at a time when there were already a record number of radios—some 132 million of them—on the job to the nation. Also, out-of-home radio grew to be as large in numbers as the entire medium of television. And still radio continues to grow, expanding as rapidly as the manufacturer can make listening available in new and different ways.

Such vast acceptance of radio, of course, means that advertisers must continually re-examine it as an advertising medium. Last year, therefore, was one in which the greatest emphasis was placed on informing advertisers of radio's basic law costs and vast audiences. It was a year of enlightenment for many advertisers. Now, in 1956, radio emerges as a powerful all-purpose tool for the big national advertiser, and one highly effective, as well, for the low-budget advertiser who needs both trequent and continuing exposure.



Thus, at the beginning of 1956, we find Chesebrough-Ponds entering daytime radio with co-sponsorships of many different Monday through Friday programs. Hazel Bishop is purchasing a full 15-minute show each weekday, Monday through Friday. Lever Brothers, after a brief absence, is returning to network radio in a similar way. The F. C. Russell Company is purchasing evening segments of "The Bing Crosby Show." F. W. Woolworth has gained customers and prestige through its presentation of an hour-long "live" Sunday musical program. The Insurance Company of North America chose network radio for its fabulous Christmas Eve. "Christmas Sing With Bing." And all this activity is

taking place on one radio network — CBS Radio.

These new purchases of network radio, of course, augment a list of long-established ones — General Motors, Brown & Williamson, Liggett & Myers, General Foods, Longines-Wittnauer, Wrigley's, Campbell Soup Company, Standard Brands, Pillsbury Mills and many more.

Among all the radio networks, there has been a definite accent on the versatility of radio. Radio's new audiences, its audiences of all kinds of people doing all kinds of things, has been our hue and cry. There is no time of day or night when there is a dearth of listeners, whether at home or away. During one specific 15-minute period on a Sunday afternoon, for example, Nielsen found that more than 3 million auto radios were in use. And during many weekday evening periods, auto radio listening adds more than one-third to the in-home audience.


There have been many and varied approaches to reaching these vast audiences on the move, busy with their avocations, driving about the country, and those merely relaxing at home. One pattern seems to have wooed and won more listeners more consistently than any other. And that pattern is the one which CBS Radio adopted. Regular programming of popular stars and programs - the established favorites - has regularly gained for CBS Radio greater audiences than any type of programming by any other network. The serial-dramas continued to draw the biggest audiences in doytime radio. CBS Radio, through nearly all of 1955, produced all ten of the most popular daytime shows. In the evening, lavorites Bing Crosby, Edgar Bergen, Our Miss Brooks, Amos 'n' Andy, Gunsmoke, among others, continued to outdraw the competition. Day and night, listeners continued to choose the name stars and the big shows as their tavorite form of radio entertainment.



And winte at the business of programming and selling was going on, there were other examples of radio's inherent ability to serve its listeners more effectively than anything else known to man. The devestations of hurricanes and floods were reported almost the instant they struck. There were many exciting on-the-spot reports from Geneva as well as everywhere else in the world—including Russia, to the first time since 1947. Radio news rose to new heights during the year; CBS Radio exceeded previous peacetime records with 101 news broadcasts a week.

Last year, network radio regained a great part of its glory and is now on the threshold of new and greater achievements.



Radios Bought Every 4 Seconds In America



By JOHN B. POOR

ODAY'S miniaturized radio receivers, research-developed in the war years, blueprinted for consumers in 1950 and made available on a mass scale last year, are charting the metamorphic turns in current broadcasting operations.

And they're doing it intangibly as well as

Most obvious effect has been the sudden realization of the tremendous number of sets in use, approximately 125-million, or one for every 1.4 people. The RAB's latest brochure states there is a radio for every person in America over nine years old . . . and recent RETMA figures show that there is a radio purchased in the United States every four seconds - - 365 days a year! ! I'm sure these radios were not bought to be used as book-

broadcasters and advertisers to the co-related fact that radio is the most mobile of the mass communications media. Perhaps the best tribute to the manufacturer's ingenuity has been the development of the miniature tube and the transistor which has made radio so small and portable that today there are people who literally "wear" their sets. It can be listened to -- and be a constant companion - no matter where the listener might be and no matter what he or she are doing at the time they're listening.

The most pregnant intangible effect, on the other hand, was the realization too that radio's very acceptance as an essential part of our daily lives had obliterated the aura of romance, of mystery, of actual luxury that had previously excited listeners, and naturally advertisers.

This aura now surrounds television, the luxury item. Radio is the accepted thing, the life necessity as common to the American people as the shoes they wear, the bread they eat and the automobiles they drive. Radio is part of everyday life. People would be lost without it.

But they wouldn't realize that loss until radios were taken from them. That's how well radio has become integrated into our standards of living. It has even become the No. 1 item on Civil Defense lists.

This absorption pattern has not been sudden. Originally, as a luxury item, radios were handsome furniture pieces in living rooms just like television sets are today. Then gradually came the need for second, third and fourth sets in homes - just like there is similar need today for more tv receivers in homes. This prompted development of smaller,

But now the radio-ty receiver set parallel changes markedly. Radios were made, too, for automobiles and trucks. America began spending more of its time on wheels. Radio listening became more mobile - more and more of the personalized and companionate type than the central entertainment unit in

☆ ☆ ☆

War-time development of pocket-sized sets rushed this pattern much faster. Today radio sets, in most homes, are in every room that's used. They're carried in pockets. They're in the cabs of trucks, in cars and taxicabs, in busses, on farm tractors and on motorcycles and bicycles. Last year over 13-million radio sets were manufactured — and they were almost a fifty-fifty split in types between automobile sets and small portables, table models and clock-radios.

This mobility, as we call it, has prompted the new selling and programming techniques we initiated in 1955 and which we will continue to emphasize, with the cooperation of our 560 affiliated stations, throughout 1956.

\$ \$ \$

Mutual foresaw changes in listening trends two years ago when the J. A. Ward survey was authorized to measure total radio audiences throughout the day plus the activities and locales of listeners (bedrooms, living rooms, dens, offices, kitchens, etc.). From the welter of statistics that became available to us. Mutual initiated its new programming and selling concepts last year. Continued faith by the nation's top advertisers in Mutual's effectiveness encouraged us to develop the multiple-brodcast, shorter-time-period pattern that now marks our schedule.

Mutual is unique in that it operates solely as a radio network. It is our belief that network radio, with its vast potential audience, is a valuable and essential means of national communication. We feel that the industry has an obligation to those who invested their money in the millions of radic sets. Conversely, we believe the adequate fulfillment of this obligation will, in itself, bring about the necessary economic stability, and establish, on a firm basis, the true impact of this medium with both the listening public and the udvertisers.



Radio Now Provided With Fresh New Role

THE broadcasting industry, as it enters 1956, can look back upon a year in which these three facts became clearly apparent: first, television is now well anchored as a powerful moving force in the nation's economy; second, the growth of color television into a national service will soon hit snowballing dimensions; third, the new program and sales concepts of network radio, whatever the title given to them, have provided radio with a fresh and hopeful role in the age of television.



For Pat Weaver and myself, and for everyone at NBC, the year just ended has been one of progress and promise. We expanded our color TV schedule by 500 per cent to reach a total of 40 hours live color programming per month. We created new programming forms such as "Wide Wide World," "Matinee Theatre," and "Project 20," and new radio services such as "Monitor" and "Weekday." We pioneered the "Color Spread" sales plan, making big-time evening hits available for the first time to a wide base of advertisers on a single-insertion basis.



During 1955. NBC ordered a \$12,000,000 expansion of its color production facilities in New York, Hollywood and Chicago, to be completed by September, 1956. These added facilities were designed to permit doubling our color schedule to 80 hours a month. As part of this project, the NBC-owned station in Chicago, WNBQ, becomes the world's first all-color station.

The Maurice Evans dramatic series opened up new vistas in television's constant effort to upgrade its product, and developed new Sunday afternoon audiences.

The year was marked by a more mature approach to world problems. Koestler's great drama, "Darkness at Noon," and the dramatic history "Nightmare in Red," brought thunder-bolt impact to the subject of Communism. The full-hour "Meeting at the Summit" provided a stirring prelude to the Geneva talks.



"Wide Wide World" freed television from the constraints of the studio and set it to moving back and forth about the United States, across borders into Canada and Mexico, and over water to Cuba with electronic speed. And the great fulfillment of this program is yet to come -- when transoceanic television becomes a reality within a very tew years.

A new kind of television documentary was pioneered with "Assignment: India," a full-hour "by-line" presentation featuring Chester Bowles.


During 1955, the NBC enlightenment campaign was broadened, with more entertainment programs inserting elements of cultural and educational value into the format. We also set up the television industry's first Children's Program Review Committee to provide us with added guidance in improving our children's shows.



Looking toward television's talent needs of the future, NBC created the Talent Development Program, a multi-million dollar project designed to seek out and develop new stars, writers, producers and technicians.

Greater flexibility in programming was accompanied by greater flexibility in sales. Multiple sponsorship advanced to a point where it accounted for more than half our entire schedule. The network served 231 clients in 1955 as against 210 in 1954 and 165 in 1953. All in all, NBC-TV showed an increase of 34.6 per cent in total gross billings over the previous year, and a gain of 22.5 per cent in overall income.

Spot Can Make Or Break National Business

VERY often the question comes up as to-what the Station Representatives Association is doing for the industry. Before explaining this, it is important to understand the basic fundamental upon which this Association operates. We believe that a healthy broad casting industry should be our aim. With this in mind, we can consider only one thing

-what is in the interest of the television and radio stations? Because we are their sales representatives, it is natural that we should be particularly interested in their economic health. The SRA, therefore, leels that basically the good of their own industry is tied so closely to what is good for broadcasters, that, for all practical purposes, their aims should be identical.

Everything in the broadcasting field depends primarily upon the good economic health of all broadcasters. The amount of public service they can perform and the amount of tolent they can develop depend upon economic well being. We realize our responsibility in seeing to it that, so far as we are able, the broadcasting business develops financially.

It is a fact that most major radio and television stations depend upon national spot business, for which we are responsible, to such a point that what we do can virtually make or break the broadcasting business. We realize this responsibility and accept it.



Along with this responsibility goes the need to do two things:

- Pave the way for the development of a maximum amount of National Spot business.
- Wage war on anything contrary to the best interests of cur clients — the broadcasting stations.

During the past year, the SRA has done a great many things - some of these activities have appeared in the trade press but most of them have not. The station representatives have individually developed a number of fine presentations to sell both radio and television. Through the offices of the S.R.A. the various representatives went over their individual presentations with competitors, and, it should be noted, that curs is a very competitive business. This exchange of information is beneficial to all representatives because obviously there is no monopoly on ideas. The representatives, therefore, not only effectively sold the modium on an industry-wide basis, but actually shared their ideas and plans with other strong competitors.

As salesmen we realize that the best way to assure yourself of a sale is to make it as easy as possible for the advertiser to buy. This has meant more and more research to show agencies and advertisers that Spot Television and Radio is the best buy and at the same time simplify as many steps along the way to make our medium one that can be handled as inexpensively as possible. We know that even though what we are selling represents the best advertising buy that it is still expensive for advertising agencies to handle. Step by step we are whittling away at this problem. We are trying to climinate all of the costly bottlenecks.

A good example of this is the standard availability form which was introduced last year. Each one of our members and even some representatives who are not members are, as new forms are printed, accepting the new form. This has been approved by the AAAA. In the industry we know the difficullies that were encountered when an advertiser suddenly put on a large coast-tc-coast spot campaign. An agency suddenly needs a great many new timebuyers which usually results in the addition of novices. Standard forms overcome many of the difficulties in training these new people. More and more we are standardizing procedures. This makes spot easier to use and results in what we are trying to accomplish more income for the stations we represent.

We have many problems that will never be solved, but they can be kept under control by constant surveilance. One such problem is the matter of local versus national rates. In the stations' cwn interest we have been attempting to establish definite policies on what should be considered local and what should be considered local and what should be considered as national business. The definitions can be easily set forth but the interpretation is another matter altogether. By keeping a close watch in this matter, we have saved the industry hundreds of thousands of dollars.




