

The first religious services to be broadcasted were those conducted by the Rev. Edwin J. Van Etten of the Calvary Episcopal Church, Shady Avenue, Pittsburgh, these services having been a regular feature in the Radio program since January 2, 1921. Later, the services of the Point Breeze Presbyterian Church, Rev. P. H. Barker, Minister, were added. On December 11, 1921, Radio Chapel at Station KDKA was inaugurated by the Rev. George Taylor, Jr., and the quartet choir of the First Presbyterian Church, Wilkinsburg, Pa.

Many favorable comments on these services have been received from shut-ins and others who have heard them.

Broadcasting Service Being Extended

These programs include entertainment by individual and grouped artists of the musical and theatrical world, speeches by famous public men, and women, playby-play reports of all kinds of sporting events, children's bedtime stories, and many other special features.
