"The Man Who Was Responsible for Television"

Allen B. Du Mont was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. on January 29, 1901, to William H. B. and Lillian F. (Balcom) Du Mont. His father was Secretary and Treasurer of Waterbury Clock Company, reknowned for the Ingersoll dollar watch; his maternal grandmother was an inventor of some note. At an early age, Allen and his family moved to Montclair, New Jersey; he lived there until his death on November 14, 1965.

While still in elementary school young Allen developed an interest in electricity and wireless. Following an attack of polio at age 11, his recuperation was speeded by working with a crystal radio receiver, and soon he began to construct his own transmitter and receiver. Before long he was owner and operator of amateur radio station W2AYR. By age 14 he had earned his First Class radio operator's license and began a series of summer jobs as wireless operator on coastwise and transatlantic vessels.

On one such trip, aboard a fogbound fruit ship off the New Jersey coast, young Allen was checking out the new-fangled radio compass and was alarmed to discover that they were headed straight for Barnegat and disaster. He warned the skipper, who was very skeptical of the mysterious device. But the skipper dropped anchor for the night. Next morning they found themselves sitting just off Ambrose Channel—safe.

Ironically, many years later, Dr. Du Mont was an observer aboard a Naval vessel evaluating a new cathoderay tube radar display. This time the skipper was not only skeptical but stubborn—and his ship piled up on a rock!

Following graduation from Montclair, N. J. High School in 1919, Du Mont matriculated at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. While studying electrical engineering he was particularly interested in the oscillographic display of electrical waveforms; there he had his initial introduction to the cathode-ray tube, then a relatively crude, short-lived device. But even its limited potential impressed him—influenced the direction of his professional career

Despite the handicap resulting from the polio attack, Du Mont did not neglect extra-curricular activities, including sports. In addition to being manager of his class bowling team, he was a member of the varsity swimming team. Indeed, he was known as the "human fish".

Du Mont as Tube Engineer

Shortly after graduation he joined the Westinghouse Lamp Company as an engineer in the development laboratory and later in charge of receiving tubes production. At the time only 500 tubes a day were being produced. With improvements in the design of the tubes, to facilitate fabrication, and the machinery for manufacture of tubes and their parts, for which ten patents were issued to him, Du Mont increased production rates to 5000 tubes per hour. For this achievement and for other accomplishments that helped make production history in the vacuum tube field, Westinghouse gave him the 1927 First Award of \$500.


Meanwhile, at a party in Montclair, he had met Ethyl Martha Steadman, and in October of 1926 they were married. Their two children are Allen Balcom and Yvonne.

When, in 1928, Dr. Lee De Forest, inventor of the audion tube, started to reactivate the De Forest Radio Company after a year's shutdown, Allen Du Mont's achievements at Westinghouse seemed ideal grounds for his selection as chief engineer, and later vice-president in charge of engineering.

To quote Du Mont: "My immediate problem was to supervise the designing of a complete new line of receiving tubes, lay out and supervise the installation of factory equipment necessary to produce thirty thousand receiving tubes a day, and to get together and organize the necessary engineering and factory staff." The challenge was met, and in less than a year production exceeded thirty thousand tubes a day. Special test equipment and automatic machines were developed to increase production and decrease costs.

With receiving tube production well under way, Du Mont turned his attention to transmitting tubes and soon had a complete line in production. Then came the design and manufacture of c-w and telephone transmitters, as well as a practical facsimile system.

At about this time De Forest purchased the rights to the

C. Francis Jenkins mechanical scanning system of television, then capable of producing a 48-line picture, and set up television broadcast station W2XCD in Passaic, N. J., operating in the AM broadcast band. In 1930 W2XCD transmitted the first sight and sound test programs in the United States. A small number of television receivers was manufactured and sold to experimenters and amateurs.

Despite the considerable effort expended to develop this mechanical system, it soon became apparent that the limitations were too severe to permit the development of an entertainment type of television system. Du Mont remembered the cathode-ray tube in the laboratory at Rensselaer and decided, with others, that it held the key to the high-resolution television receiver.

In 1931 Du Mont returned from a vacation in Bermuda to find that the depression had taken its toll and that the De Forest Radio Company had failed. While his relationship with the company was ended, his warm personal relationship with Lee De Forest continued, with exchanges of correspondence and visits, as well as personal and business association, until Dr. De Forest's death. Not long before his death, Dr. De Forest was honored on a "This is Your Life" program. Appropriately, the program was introduced by Allen B. Du Mont.

And so, by a stroke of fate, Allen B. Du Mont was in a position to pursue what had been since 1928 the focus of his interest and ambition: the development of a practical electronic television system. He was certain that the key lay in the cathode-ray tube; yet the tubes then available were mainly imported from Germany, were scarce, very expensive, small, with maximum screen size of five inches, and had useful life expectancies of only about a hundred hours. The problem was to produce tubes at reasonable cost with large screen sizes and that would last for thousands of hours.

Quoting Dr. Du Mont, "The road ahead seemed to clear. Develop the tube, develop the circuits to control the tube, and—presto, we'd have television. I invested \$500 and a very good friend (Henry R. Crowley) put in another \$500. This was the initial working capital for Du Mont Laboratories. We hired three good men, and a

fourth man worked for us part time. One was a glass blower, one a chemist, and two were technicians. Our place of business was the basement of my house in Upper Montclair."

A thorough survey and study was made of all available literature on the cathode-ray tube, and many types of guns and deflection plate designs were evaluated and tested. The young Du Mont organization concentrated on high-vacuum tubes, although small quantities of gas-focus tubes were made to fill requests over many years.

Much trial and error was involved in arriving at satisfactory designs. The scarcity of glass bulbs for making tubes meant using chemical flasks and receiving or small transmitting tube bulbs for some of the gun and fluorescent screen tests. The phosphors had to be developed, and the New Jersey zinc mines provided one source of willemite, a component of one type of screen. After hundreds of tubes had been made and tested—many of which ended up in the trash barrel—he was able to achieve several thousand hours of operation in tubes having an electron lens for focusing instead of an inert gas. But since there were no television stations, there was no market for television cathode-ray tubes and no source of income for the fledgling Allen B. Du Mont Laboratories.


The cathode-ray oscillograph

And so, in 1932, Du Mont introduced his first commercial cathode-ray oscillograph, Type 127, to create a market for his tubes. Also in that year he made, in anticipation of color television, a cathode-ray tube with various color phosphors. The Type 127 was followed shortly by a continuing series of new and more versatile cathode-ray oscillographs as the business was built up as a means to the end of developing an all-electronic television system.

During this period Du Mont, in April 1933, disclosed to the U. S. Army an indicating radio locater. He was re-

quested not to file a patent application on the invention, in the interests of national security. This might have been a basic patent in the field of radio/radar location, potentially worth millions of dollars. Later he was to find a French patent on a similar device, issued six years later in 1939.

Du Mont was involved in other approaches to remote detection and location. There was early work in infrared detection; in experiments with the Signal Corps off Atlantic Highlands the heat of ships was detected through fog. During the 1930s Du Mont provided cathode-ray tubes for use as indicators in Potomac River tests in which the Naval Research Laboratory measured distances to remote targets, using radar principles.

With the market for cathode-ray tubes and oscillographs beginning to grow, the basement of the Du Mont residence gave way to a store on Valley Road in Upper Montclair, N. J.; before long it was necessary to break through the wall and expand into a second, then a third, until five stores provided the crowded manufacturing space for tubes and oscillographs. Despite this growth, revenues from sales of all products were small: \$70 in the first year of business, \$1,850 the second, reaching \$18,000 the third. This meant that more funds were needed, which Allen Du Mont raised by borrowing on insurance policies and from members of his family and friends who had faith in the potential of his business. In the first four years he had invested \$25,000 in the company; now he was able to obtain a mortgage of \$16,000 on some propeprty, which provided working capital for a couple of years more.

The famous "Magic Eye"

Meanwhile Du Mont developed a tuning indicator using the principles of the cathode-ray tube, and sold rights to RCA for \$20,000. This was the famous "Magic Eye", used extensively for years in radio receivers.

The new funds made it possible to purchase the first manufacturing plant, a 30,000-square foot former pickle works in Passaic, N.J. There the company of some 20 employees began to expand its tube manufacturing capabilities, bringing out 14-inch diameter electrostatic deflection tubes suitable for television receiver use. In 1938 modest production of 14-inch television receivers was

begun. What he had seen of European television during a trip to England, France, and Germany in the late thirities convinced Du Mont that the large-screen receiver had the best hope for commercial success, and he concentrated his efforts there. In addition to table model and console sets, electrostatic deflection 20-inch receivers were produced for commercial sale during 1939 and 1940.

During the decade starting in 1931, the major commercial activity was in the sale of cathode-ray tubes and oscillographs, but toward the end of that period increasing effort was applied to television. Many new and refined oscillograph designs came out of the laboratory and into production, in tube screen diameters of 3, 5, and 9 inches. There was even a 20-inch cathode-ray oscillograph, sold for instructional and demonstration purposes. The tubes were improved in resolution and sensitivity, using the "intensifier" principle of post-deflection acceleration. Many new phosphors were developed, ranging from very short-persistence, highly actinic blues for photographic application to long-persistence types useful for the study of single transient phenomena. An electronic switch was developed to provide two-signal-channel presentation, later supplemented by two-gun cathode-ray tubes, which did not require time sharing. Multi-gun tubes were produced with up to five independent channels. These were used in military electronic counter-measures analyzers designed and built by Du Mont for the Navy.

Applications of the oscillographic technique in fields outside electronics were explored in an effort to build up business volume. The *Resonoscope* was an instrument for tuning musical instruments, using a microphone to pick up the musical tone from the instrument and presenting its output on a timebase stabilized at a selected reference frequency on the musical scale. Then there was the *Cyclograph*, an instrument for analyzing metals by means of a crt pattern derived from eddy current and hysteresis characteristics of the metal sample compared to a reference sample. (One humanitarian application of this device brought relief from pain that had persisted over 20 years to a veteran of World War I. Imbedded shrapnel that had eluded discovery was located on the first probe and promptly removed.)

The Military Electronics Period

As the political-military situation in Europe worsened, more and more of Du Mont's activities were in the area of defense. A special oscillograph was developed for testing gunpowder by the closed bomb method. To achieve its precision calibration it was necessary to develop the forerunner of the metallized screen now in universal use. Another special design was used for analyzing the ignition systems in Wright Whirlwind engines. Special circuitry for selecting the number of cylinders, up to the 18 used in the B-29 bomber, permitted expanding the ignition discharge waveform for any cylinder over the full screen. The patent on this delayed and expanded sweep circuit, later used in precision radar ranging, led to improved analysis of highspeed phenomena in many fields. The super-precision A/R Range Scope, developed at M. I. T. Radiation Laboratory in cooperation with Du Mont, and produced by him on a crash basis, is generally credited with saving London during the buzz bomb blitz.

Du Mont as Sportsman

Allen Du Mont's love of the water naturally meant that he loved boating, and he spend as much time as he could on his cruisers, successively named Hurricane I, II, and III. Precision navigation was his special interest, predicted-log racing in particular. He was so skillful that he was national champion for three years. In recognition of his special skills in boating and in electronics, he was granted a special license to operate his 35-foot Hurricane II during World War II, making tests in the waterways around New York City of TV ghosts as related to signal transmission and the detection of other objects.

HEROISM AT SEA

Two heroic young ladies who lost their lives under similar circumstances in the violent storm that swept over the notorious Bermuda Triangle March 22, 1973, have just been awarded posthumously with the Marconi Memorial Scroll of Honor by the Veteran Wireless Operators Association and their names will be added to the list on the Marconi Monument in Battery Park, New York.

Bente Knudson was only 24 years old when she went down with her ship, the cargo M/V NORSE VARIENT. As usual, she had brought a cargo of Volkswagens from Europe and was taking a cargo of coal back from Norfolk, leaving there March 21.

Within an hour, the M/V ANITA, an idential ship in the same service, carrying similar cargo, also left Norfolk. ANITA's Radio Officer was Kari Bergelien, age 27.

The next day, both of these young seagoing telegraph operators were heard by shore stations, reporting their distress. Bente Knudson flashed that her ship was sinking. Five minutes later she reported that the crew had abandoned ship.

There was only one survivor of that tragic sinking. Motorman Stein Gabrielsen told how the wireless operator, Bente Knudson, had remained on duty in the radio room all through the storm. She had not been on the boatdeck when the crew prepared to abandon ship.

Kari Bergelien was heard by a radio station on Prince Edward Island as she tried three times to contact another station. That was the last heard from the ship.

All hands were presumed lost.

Loftin and White had a paper "Constant Coupling" in the March issue, and Keith Henney described circuits and methods for measuring tube characteristics. He compares the 201-A tubes of some 29 different manufacturers, from Apco to Zetka. Only one of them appears to be in existence today.

Feature of the January issue was an article by Benjamin F. Miessner, describing a Garod set completely powered by a.c. (It used '112-type tubes, with a '99 detector.)

An ad appears in the March issue for the 1927 Banquet and Entertainment—"Tickets, as usual, are \$4.00 per person."

Charles E. Summers (M 1972, F 1976 and a Director of the Club) received a striking tribute from IBM on his 35 years of service, in an article in the company's house organ September 14. The article dwelt especially on the phenomenal increase in IBM's use of radio under Summers' direction as Private Radio Services Manager.

SARNOFF—An American Success, by Carl Dreher. Quadrangle/The New York Times Book Co., 3 Park Ave., New York, NY 10016. 6½ x 10 inches, 282 pages, hard cover. \$12.50.

The author, a former chief engineer of RCA's WJZ and later of RCA photophone Inc., not only knew and admired Sarnoff, but was closely associated with him in his work and was acquainted with his weaknessess as well as his strengths. The book therefore steers between the adulatory tone of many hero-worshipping works and the debunking attitude of others. It presents a balanced story of how Sarnoff was constituted and how he operated, and explains some of the whys. Possible the best story yet of the man who turned from the engineering approach to the financial, and thereby became one of America's greatest commercial successes.

Executive Committee Discusses Finch Scholarship

The most important business of the March 17, 1977, meeting of the Radio Club Executive Committee, in Orlando Florida, was Capt. Finch's announcement that he intends to start a "Captpain William G. H. Finch Scholarship Fund," with an initial gift of \$10,000. It will be under the guidance and adiminstration of the Scholarship and Research Committee, chaired by John F. Rider. Mr. Rider also reported on the 1976 contributions of \$500 to the Armstrong Memorial Research Foundation and of \$250 to the Foundation for Amateur Radio, and recommended that they be continued in the same amounts for 1977.

The well-tanned appearance of the attendees was partly due to the Florida sunshine, but more to an attempt to reproduce a color transparency in black-and-white.

RAY MEYERS RECEIVES AFCEA AWARD

Lt. Comdr Ray E. Meyers USN (Ret), long time Regional Vice President of the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association, was honored by AFCEA during the annual luncheon held during the convention in Washington, D.C.

Vice Admiral Jon Boyes USN, who will assume the office of AFCEA President this year, decorated Ray with the AFCEA Gold Medal for his long services in behalf of the organization. Ray has held the office of Regional VP for over 16 years, two of which were in the office of RVP on the West Coast. In addition to these offices he is former Chairman of the Greater Los Angeles Chapter.

In accepting the medal—after Admiral Boyes said he had two minutes to respond—Ray gave a most interesting talk on his past experiences as a radioman.

Starting in 1910, he went on the air in Brooklyn, NY and when the Safety at Sea Act became effective in 1912, he obtained his Certificate of Skill granting him operating priveleges as both a Commercial Operator and an Amateur. Only three of this type certificates were issued by the Navy, acting for the Department of Commerce.

Ray cited many humorous incidents during his trip to the polar regions aboard the submarine NAUTILUS (ex USS 0—12) as the news correspondent, secretary-treasurer, personnel manager, NBC's nemo operator, electrician of the boat and radio operator (after the radioman was washed overboard during the trip from Philadelphia to New York).

On the way over the Atlantic, with the sub rolling 53 and 54 degrees, one engine disabled, one generator burned up, the batteries so low that even the gyro compass had stopped running, Ray sent an SOS by using an oscillating receiver, transmitting calls for help during the silent periods 15-18 and 45-48 minutes after the hour.

His calls were answered some 18 hours after he began calling for help by the SS Independence Hall which in turn asked the Battleships *Arkansas* and *Wyoming* to assist.


For this feat, the Veteran Wireless Association awarded Ray the Marconi Medal for outstanding achievement during the year 1932.

EDGAR F. JOHNSON

Honored by U. of Minnesota

Edgar F. Johnson, Fellow and former Director of the Club and recipient of the Sarnoff Citation in 1975, was singularly honored in his native Minnesota last Spring, when he was presented with the University of Minnesota's Outstanding Achievement Award. In presenting the award, Dr. William G. Shepherd, director of the University's Space Science Center, said:

"Edgar F. Johnson was really a pioneer. No one else was manufacturing parts for the needs of the amateur radio enthusiast in Minnesota. He and his wife—and his brothers and their wives—pioneered in the development of an industry that has gone from radio parts to amateur radios to CB's to land mobile. He has been outstanding not only in that field but has been a responsible citizen in his community of Waseca and in the support of higher education," Dr. Shepherd continued, citing Johnson's support of the Operation Bootstrap Mission in Africa and his gift of half a million dollars to Gustavus Adolphus College.

The Outstanding Achievement Award is the University's highest honor to an alumnus and is bestowed by the Board of Regents upon recommendation of the University's Honors Committee. All former students and alumni (nearly three-quarters of a million persons) are eligible, but to date only about .01 per cent have received the award.

Johnson published his own account of his career (A Lifetime of Radio) in the midsummer of 1972 issue of the *Proceedings*. In his acceptance address, he went over some of the same ground, with more emphasis on his college experiences. Not entirely new to electrical experimenting and even to amateur construction and operating when he entered the University in 1918, he found a University station in operation, with an experimental license. (Of his own spark station, built on the farm, he said, "There was no one within listening range of my feeble transmitter and no other transmitter near enough for me to hear, if indeed I ever succeeded in locating the 'sensitive spot' on my galena crystal.")

His experience in radio grew with the construction of crude receivers to pick up the new broadcasting stations. He took one of these receivers home during the 1920 Christmas vacation, and brought radio to his home town. The local newspaper duly chronicled the reception of KDKA in Waseca, and observed that the University was "doing all right" for Ed. Johnson.

In 1923, discouraged with the slowness and unreliability of ordering radio supplies "from the East," Johnson

and his young wife decided to start an amateur radio parts business, which they did in their own home. Using the Amateur Call Book as a mailing list, their business grew fast, and in a year they were able to move to a vacant store building. In 1936 the E. F. Johnson Co., now a going concern with 17 employees, moved into a new factory and office building and in 1947 began the manufacture of amateur radio transmitters, until that time practically all hand-built by the amateur himself. The Johnson Co. continued to distinguish itself, not only in the amateur field, but in government operations and CB sales, until it has reached its present peak, with Edgar Johnson as Chairman of the Board.


Among the guests present to honor Edgar Johnson was Elmer Engstrom, former President and Chief Executive Officer of the RCA Corporation, another distinguished graduate of the University. He delivered the main address of the evening: "From Alternator to Satellite." Both Johnson and Engstrom spoke with enthusiasm of one of their old instructors, Dr. C.M. Jansky, Jr., who came to the University of Minnesota to initiate courses in radio communications.

Offenhauser Receives Grierson Medal



William H. Offenhauser, Jr., has been awarded the John Grierson International Gold Medal Award for 1977 by the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers (SMPTE). The medal is given "to honor the recipient by recognizing significant technical achievements related to the production of documentary motion-picture films."

Mr. Offenhauser, says the citation, has devoted a lifetime to energy to improving motion picture and sound performance, beginning with his development of the so-called MGM squeeze track for RCA Photophone in 1921, for which 11 patents were issued. Authorship of the book 16mm Sound Motion Pictures, a manual still in use, and his instrumentality in the development of the JAN projector, was also mentioned.

Further cited is Mr. Offenhauser's service in developing specifications and standards, especially in picture and sound synchronization. He has received some 70 patents, and has been a Fellow of the SMPTE since 1946, and a fellow and Past President of the Club.

Obituaries

Since the last Proceedings was published, we have received information of the passing of 11 members:

Carl E. Atkins (M 1962, F 1967), Montclair, NJ, died May 18, 1977. He started in the semiconductor division of Sparks-Withington (Sparton) in 1928. Joining Tung-Sol in 1940, he continued with Wagner Electric after Tung-Sol's merger with that company, retiring as Director of Research and Development in 1976. He was a member of IEEE and SAE as well as of the Club.

Raymond P. Aylor, Jr. (M 1973), Garrett Park, MD, was a project engineer for the Voice of America. He was 62 years of age.

William J.D. Bradford, (M 1973), National Sales Manager, Antenna Specialists, Cleveland, OH, died last December 12 from a heart attack. He was an active radio amateur and aircraft pilot. He was active in the American Management Association and the EIA, and was chairman of a group in the FCC's Personal Use Radio Advisory Committee (PURAC).

John R. Brinkley (M 1970, F 1971) died suddenly in August of an inoperable brain tumor. Considered one of the world's outstanding communications experts, he was Chairman and Managing Director of Redifon Communications Ltd. and had been managing director of Pye Telecommunications. Mr. Brinkley consistently came to the United States to attend meetings and participate in our Annual Banquets, had given papers at the IEEE Vehicular Technical Group meetings and authored the article "Fifty Years of Mobile Radio" in the October, 1976 Proceedings.

F. Vinton Long, (M 1970, F 1975), Boca Raton, FL., was one of the earliest amateurs in his district, with the call 4IH from 1921. A retired communications consultant for the petroleum-gas pipeline industry, he was for years a leader in that field.

Walter Lyons (M 1952, F 1961) Flushing, NY, died last May., He had been Chief Engineer of Wells-Gardner, Emerson and Majestic radio companies during the '30's, and later worked with RCA as design engineer and communications manager for more than 20 years. He was a Director of the Club from 1968 to 1972.

Lucius Packard (M 1940, F 1941), Melvin Village, NH, died at the age of 63. After an early career with General Radio, during which time he developed (in conjunction with H.H. Scott) advanceed impedance and phase-angle measuring equipment, he founded his own firm, Technology Instrument Corp., which he retained to the time of his death. He had been semi-retired for some years.

Robert M. Peterson (M 1969), San Diego, CA. He had specialized in information recording and data displays, working most recently with Stromberg Datagraphix.

Arthur Schermer (M 1971) died in September 1976. A petrochemical engineer, he spent much of his life in South America, where he was a leading amateur. W2HYY since the early 1930's, he was the first American to obtain an amateur license in Brazil, and was CE1IE in Chile.


James D. Shaw (M 1973) Assistant Director, Equipment Services Dept, City of Dallas, TX, died last December 19. He came to the Communications Division of the City of Dallas from Communications Industries, where he was Chief Engineer of Secode Electronics.

Louis J. Winslow (M 1971). Long Branch, NJ, died March 14, 1977, at the age of 69. He founded Winslow Tele-Tronics in 1923 with a capital of \$5, which grew to more than \$3 million. He was active in a number of local and national organizations, including the National Trust for Historical Preservation and the Navy League.

Four Members Receive An











The 1977 Anniversary Awards are going to an especially distinguished group of members: Arthur A Collins is known for sophisticated transmitter and receiver design, particularly in aircraft radio. Bill Lear is probably the most versatile inventor and innovator in the field today. John F. Rider produced what was the Bible of the service technician, thereby compiling a record of radio and television receiver evolution. And the work of W.E.D. Stokes was—as pointed out here—possibly fundamental to the very existence of amateur radio. All four are Fellows of the Radio Club of America, and Mr. Stokes is one of the Club's eight Honorary Members.

The Armstrong Medal, highest honor of the Radio Club of America, is awarded this year to Arthur A. Collins. The Medal is given by the Club to "any person in its membership who shall have made...an important contribution to Radio Art and Science."

Arthur Collins founded the Collins Radio Company in 1931 and became a pioneer supplier of equipment to radio amateur, commercial and military services. His engineering developments and refinements made Collins aircraft radio standard equipment on the bulk of U.S. World War II aircraft and caused it to be used extensively by American and foreign aviation since. His precision remote tuning systems are considered an engineering triumph.

Among his other accomplishments are the development of multi-channel automatically tuned radio transmitters, receivers and transceivers. He was directly responsible for

numbers of advances in single-sideband communication, which contributed greatly to single-sideband's wide acceptance in airborne, land and marine use. Among these advances were the development of stable and linear oscillators and numerous refinements in linear amplifier circuits. His contribution to tropospheric scatter communications methods have been significant and include many improvements in antenna design. Most recent contributions include completely automatically tuned radio communications systems and the world's first computercontrolled 250-kW broadcast transmitter.

Mr. Collins was born in Oklahoma in 1909 and received his education at Amherst, Coe College (Iowa) and the University of Iowa. He is a Fellow of the Club and of the IEEE, and holds honorary doctorates from Coe College, Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute and Southern Methodist University.

The Ralph Batcher Memorial Award, "for accomplishments in preserving the history of radio," goes this year to John F. Rider, possibly the best known figure in the field of radio literature. He began his radio writing career in 1921, and conducted the "Laboratory Scrap Book" section of the New York Sun from 1922.

In 1929 he founded his book company, John F. Rider, Publisher, and started to put out, among other publications, an annual book of radio schematics, with complete chassis layouts, tube complements and parts lists. First called "The Perpetual Radio Troubleshooters Manual" these books were later known simply as "The Rider Manuals." The information in these volumes was not only invaluable to the service technician, but formed a continuing record of the state of the radio art and industry, not to be found elsewhere.

Working with service instruments as well as with service manuals, Rider in the late '30's invented the Voltohmyst, to this day one of the outstanding service instruments. Another contribution was the Chanalyst, an instrument that, with multiple connections to the receiver, located troubles and especially intermittents automatically.

Retiring in 1961, Rider has since devoted his time to his hobbies of

Stokes

William P. Lear

W.E.D. Stokes, winner of the Pioneer Award, was the first President of the Junior Wireless Club, and served from 1909 to 1911, when it changed its name to the Radio Club of America. In 1910, at the age of 14, he and three other members of the Club, Ernest Amy, George Eltz and Frank King, attended Senate hearings on the Depew bill, which was expected to eliminate the radio amateur.

Newspapers headlined the event: "Boy Wars on Air Trust," and reported that the "Bill to Curb Amateurs Is Earnestly Denounced by Him." The press pretty much agreed that Stoke's arguments were the chief factor in killing the infamous bill. Thus all radio amateurs today may feel that their existence is possibly due to his pioneering work.

Stokes was granted four radio patents before 1920, and served as Assistant Communications Officer of the USS Delaware in World War I.

golf, philately and amateur radio. Besides his radio books, (one of which, "The Cathode-Ray Tube at Work," was probably the all-time best seller in the radio technical field) he has published a great deal of material on stamps. He is also an extremely active amateur, with his old call W2RID.

William P. Lear, a prolific inventor and innovator, will receive the Sarnoff Citation, "for significant contributions in electronic communications." These contributions have been in many fields. He was an early pioneer in the automobile radio receiver field and with cartridge audio recorders. Inventor of the famous Lear Electropilot, he also made important contributions in automatic direction finders and automatic aircraft landing systems.

A pioneer also in the field of aircraft radio manufacture, Lear had a factory in Long Island from about 1935 to 1940, afterward setting up Lear Avia in Vandalia, OH.

As an aviation engineer, his role with Lear Jet is well known. He also modified and made design changes in a quantity of surplus Lockheed Lodestars, selling the improved planes as Learstars.

The eight-track tape cartridge is a later Lear development, and he has made continuing inventive contributions in several other fields. Among his honors and awards, most outstanding are the Collier Trophy in 1950, for developing the first successful autopilot for jets, and the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering from the University of Michigan, also in 1950. He is a Fellow and former Director of the Radio Club of America and a Fellow of the IEEE.

Club Honors Loyal Members

Two long-time supporters of the Club were honored by the Board of Directors with the title "Director Emeritus for Life" at the semi-annual Directors meeting last July. The members are Dave Talley, the Club Treasurer, and Harry W. Houck, who has been a director of the Club since 1928.



Harry Houck started as a radio amateur in 1909, at age 13, and operated his station until 1917. He then worked with Major Armstrong at the Signal Corps Laboratories in Paris, where he took part in the development of the superheterodyne method of reception. Later he designed the first second-harmonic superheterodyne receiver to be placed in commerical production.



David Talley, W2PF since 1919, has been the Treasurer of the Club since 1969, and is one of the persons responsibile for transforming it from its insecure financial position of that time to the economically and financially stable organization of today. Mr. Talley was born in New York in 1903, and has been involved in amateur radio since he was 12 years old. He is the author of books on carrier telephone and telephone switching systems.
