The Vacuum Tube

By HALL BERRINGER

Perhaps no one particular item is as responsible for the advancement of radio telegraphy and telephony as is the vacuum tube. This device was perfected about 1910, and it was used solely for reception until the latter part of 1915, when it was discovered that the vacuum tube could be used for transmitting purposes also.

The vacuum tube is more or less a familiar object to the average man of today. It consists of an evacuated vessel somewhat similar in size and construction to the ordinary incandescent lamp. Instead of two connections made in the case of the electric lamp, the vacuum tube has four Two of these connections serve the same purpose as those of the incandescent lamp, namely, to light the filament; the other two connections lead to two new elements, the grid and the plate. There are therefore three elements in a vacuum tube—the filament, grid and plate. These elements are so arranged with the filament in the center, the grid

on the outside of the filament, and the plate outside of the grid.

The filament consists of a tungsten wire, the grid of a small coil or mesh of wires, and the plate a thin sheet of metal. The tube operates as follows: A six-volt battery is connected to the filament which when lighted emits small particles of electricity in every direction. A battery of from 22 to 300 volts is connected with the positive side to the plate and the negative side to the filament. When this battery is connected, the small particles of electricity which are emitted by the filament, and which are negative in character, are attracted to the positive plate. A or an alternating current, such as that due to a signal, is connected to the grid so that the voltage of the grid is changed, the current flowing in the circuit formed by the plate and filament will vary in the same manner. The variation is much greater than the small voltage placed on the grid is changed. would warrant. The current will increase when the grid is positive and will decrease when the grid is negative.

The plate current is sufficient to operate a pair of telephone receivers or a loud speaker. The current will flow without interruption as long as the filament is lighted, and the battery in the plate circuit is connected.

New applications of the amplifying properties possessed by the vacuum tube are being found every day. Due to the above property the vacuum tube is used also as a generator of continuous waves, and this is the part it is used for in radio telephone transmitting stations.

The above description is merely a slight outline of what the vacuum tube really is. The writer would like to suggest that very interesting data can be obtained by reading "Vacuum Tubes" in "Wireless Communication"



Condenser Data That Will Interest You

By HALL BERRINGER

Electrostatic energy may be stored in a body of conductors and insulating material called a condenser. The action of a condenser is similar to that of an air tank used for the storage of air. The amount of air this air tank will hold is not a constant, fixed amount; it depends on the pressure forcing the air into the tank. The back pressure of the air opposes the pressure applied. If the applied pressure is released and a valve is left open, the air rushes forth. The amount of electric charge given to a condenser depends on the electric pressure, or potential difference; and in exact similarity to the air, the charge is proportional to the difference in potential. The constant ratio of the charge to potential difference is called the capacity of the condenser. The capacity of a condenser depends on the size and distance apart of its plates, and of the kind of dielectric used between the plates. The dielectric is the name used for the insulating medium in a condenser.

The condensers used in modern receiving equipment are of the air and mica dielectric type. The plates or conductors are not important, it is only required that they be of low resistance. The majority of condensers of the air dielectric type are made of aluminum. Variable condensers are extensively used in tuning, either to add to the wave length of a circuit or to decrease the wave length of a circuit. A variable condenser connected in series in a circuit will make it possible to decrease the value of the circuit in wave length. A variable condenser used to shunt an inductance in a circuit can be used to increase the value of the circuit in wave length.

A variable condenser used in the secondary circuit is always shunted across the secondary of the vario-coupler, therefore adding to the value of the circuit, and therefore providing a fine adjustment in the tuning of this circuit. A series condenser in the antenna circuit shortens the wave length at will to which the aerial responds. It gives a fine adjustment of the tuning of the aerial circuit.

A grid condenser is used to adjust the voltage on the grid of the vacuum tube. The bypass condenser provides a path for the radio frequency current to pass to the plate than through the telephone receivers on primary of the first amplifying transformer.

Secretary Hoover has announced that with slight changes he will put into effect the recommendations of the special conference the details of whose finding RADIO DOINGS published last week.

The assignment of definite wave lengths of stations will be done gradually so as to allow broadcast stations ample time to make the necessary changes in equipment.

Perhaps the most important change, from the listener's point of view, is the change that will be made in the ship-to-shore wave length. This is now 450 meters but will be changed to 800. When this change goes into effect it will be found that there will be a very marked decrease in interference, an annoyance for which the amateur has been unjustly blamed.

Radio is developing the imagination. There is a station in Los Angeles that is licensed but has never erected a broadcast station. Yet every week they are in receipt of letters from distant listeners thanking them for the fine concerts that these zealous listeners have heard.




