#### Here's The Dope!

BY K. G. ORMISTON

Well! Our little yarn about the "real performer" last week seems to have stirred up considerable interest, judging by the requests for more dope which we have received.

Meanwhile the set has continued to perform under the most trying conditions to which we could subject it, and has come through every test with flying colors. It is gratifying to attain a selectivity which permits of distant reception within a few blocks of half a dozen or more powerful stations, and yet preserve a tone that has real quality. It is nice to have more volume available than you really want, to have an additional stage of RF amplification up your sleeve when a far-distant station needs it and the static level permits such a high degree of amplification.

The Magnaformer intermediate frequencies used in the circuit have a very high voltage amplification peak with a peak width of the full 10,000 cycles; are well matched and so constructed mechanically that the frequency remains unchangeable permanently.

They are the heart of the circuit, and give it the vital qualities which permit real performance. They are peaked in the neighborhood of 72,000 cycles and are so shielded that they may be mounted close together and parallel without feed-back troubles developing.

The complete wiring diagram of the circuit is given on page 35. The 4 RF amplifiers, two detectors and two audio stages employ 201 A type tubes. The first audio is of the 112 type and the last or output stage of the 171 type.

The set operates on the Quali-Tone loop. This loop is of the mid-tap zero potential type, and is sharply directional in operation. The loop is tuned by a Remler condenser (C1), and is coupled to the plate of the detector through

a midget variable condenser. This arrangement gives greatly increased selectivity over the ordinary two-terminal loop, and added sensitivity due to the regeneration.

The detector is followed by four stages of low-frequency amplification one of which may be cut out by means of a Yaxley jack switch. Both detectors, all RF tubes and the oscillator operate with but 45 volts of plate potential. The oscillator is tuned by a second Remler .0005 mfd. condenser (C-3); this and the loop condenser comprising the two major controls of the set. The oscillator is coupled to the grid circuit of the first detector through the Magnaformer Unicoupler unit indicated in the diagram immediately above the oscillator, tube.

The audio stages are coupled by the transformer method and an output transformer protects the windings of the loud speaker and still further improves the quality. Both audio tubes are of the power type, the first having 135 plate voltage and the second 180. volts. Both are biased by suitable "C" batteries.

The filament current of the four RF tubes are controlled by a panel-mounted rheostat with which is incorporated an automatic filament switch by means of which the set is turned on and off. Mounted also on the panel is the potentiometer which controls the grid biasing of the RF tubes. On the sub-panel are two rheostats which are not controls, but remain fixed when once adjusted. One controls the filament voltage applied to the first detector and the oscillator and the second performs the same function for the second detector.

The two power tubes use Amperite ballast resistors as automatic filament control. A radio frequency choke coil



keeps the radio frequency current in the detector output circuit out of the audio transformers, and suitable bypass condensers are provided across the primary of the first audio transformer and also across the entire 45 volt "B" supply circuit.

The illustration of the set indicates the general layout. The arrangement is such that the fan who delights in "building his own" should experience no difficulty in assembling and wiring, and with less of the resultant "grief" usually experienced by the home-constructor in attempting the construction of a set of this type.

Next week we will give you detailed constructional information on the set; together with the results of an early morning battle with King Static in an effort to tune in our elusive friend 2BL in Sydney. It's winter with him and transmission is at its best at that end of the line but the ether is a bit noisy (to put it mildly) here.


Anyway, if the noise level will permit us to use that ninth tube we expect to hear 2BL ask his listeners if they have seen "Our 'arbor!"

### What Next?

By DR. RALPH L. POWER



Dr. Ralph Power

Jules Verne was way ahead of the times in which he lived, but his "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea," and the voyage of the good undersea craft, "Nautilus," while fantastically written. has come down to us in the day of the submarine. Verne's ef-

forts are more or less vindicated and his futuristic creations take on a mantle of respectability and belief.

The Brothers Gernsback, Sidney and Hugo, with their seemingly almost impossible prophetic utterances of the past twenty-five years are still going strong in their self-appointed role of sceintific seers. Many of their earlier predictions have already come true, more especially in the field of what we now call television.

Three and a half years ago in the columns of "Radio Doings," the official program for the radio exposition at the Biltmore that year, Ned Lawrence foretold several things about broadcast. He included the belief that radio artists would not continue indefinitely to entertain without remuneration, that radio studios would have practically a 24-hour daily schedule, that country-wide broadcast would prove feasible, and we would hear the President's voice even in the most secluded hamlet. These have already become realities.

All of which is just a sort of prologue to the statement that my guess at least ought to be as good as the other fellow's.

The 1927 Los Angeles radio show will give you the latest and best in every phase of radio activity. There may even be some models of yesteryear by way of contrast.

So you will get both the past and the present. But what of the future? Here is a ripe field of conjecture and speculation. It is without doubt a great field in which a writer's imagination can run riot.



Even if the patch does get a fairly creditable start there is the terrible task of weeding, cultivating, watering and thinning out of the young growth.


News dispatches from various points in the British Isles, and even in our own country in Pennsylvania, tell us that radio waves have been mobilized to help the poor down-trodden farmer.

### Foreign Stations Not So Numerous or Powerful

A revision of the list of foreign radio broadcasting stations has just been completed by the Department of Commerce. Some of the highest powered stations shown are two government stations, RA1 and RA3 at Moscow, Russia, with 40,000 and 20,000 watts, respectively; one national broadcasting station, no call signals given, at Motala, Sweden, 40,000 watts; and one government station at Daventry, England, 5XX, 16,000 watts.

From 500 to 1000 watts at a glance seems to be the average power of foreign stations.

There are in the neighborhood of 425 stations in all the rest of the world, as compared with 696 stations in the United States alone.

### Five Midwest Radio Concerns Merge

Merger of five Middle West radio manufacturing companies with aggregate assets in excess of \$1,000,000 was announced at the conclusion of a ten-days conference of executives of the companies in the Hotel Commodore recently.

The companies merged are the Apex Electrical Manufacturing Company and the Sentinel Manufacturing Company, both of Chicago, the Indiana Electrical Manufacturing Company of Marion, Ind., the Slagle Radio Company of Fort Wayne, Ind., and the Workrite Manufacturing Company of England.

The new company formed by the merger, incorporated under the laws of Delaware with 30,000 shares of no par value stock, will be known as the United States Electric Corporation and will have headquarters in Chicago. The president will be Allen G. Messick, president of the Robbins Body Company of Cleveland.



### **A Laboratory Oscillator**

By E. K. HAYES\*

In designing a radio frequency oscillator a few of the most important considerations are a pure sine wave, minimum output variation, stability, adaptability to various uses, etc. The oscillator herein described should make an excellent outfit for the experimenter and home laboratory, and satisfies to a large extent the above conditions.

The LC circuit is a center tapped inductance with a suitable condenser for covering the desired frequency band. The milliammeter in the grid circuit indicates resonance of the circuit to be be controlled with this resistance without having any appreciable effect on
the frequency, thereby making it possible to adjust the votlage to a constant value over a wide range, a very
desirable condition when measuring the
gain of high frequency R. F. transformers. As for adaptability, the numbers
in the diagram indicate terminals
brought out to the panel for the following purposes: No. 1 is for coupling
the oscillator to another circuit through
a small fixed capacity, convenient for
comparing capacity or inductance. No.



measured by the "dip" method. It also indicates the oscillatory state of the vacuum tube. The blocking condenser in the plate circuit should be big enough to have negligible frequency reactance within the range covered, and likewise the R. F. choke should have no resonance points. The variable feedback resistance may be 10,000 ohms or more, depending on the type of tube used. The purpose of the resistance is to adjust the voltage feedback so that the tube is operating on the straight portion of its curve. By this method harmonics are reduced to about 4% of the fundamental.

The output of the oscillator may also

2 and No. 5 are for a vernier or a decade condenser. No. 3 and No. 4 are connections to a one turn pick-up coil which is used as a coupling medium to vacuum tube volt meter set ups. etc.

Any distortion of wave form present is materially reduced in the transfer of E.M.F. from the oscillatory circuit to the pick-up coil. Any method of modulation adaptable to your needs may be employed. The writer uses a General Radio 1000 cycle audio oscilaltor. which is satisfactory for most purposes. For testing and neutralizing radio sets a buzzer will fill the bill. A UX120 is the ideal tube for this oscillator and has plenty of output. It is more constant than either an "A" or 199 type.







The success of "The Lash" was so great that other sketches used for Vitaphone recordings will be used by KFWB.

The Precision Electric Manufacturing Company of Los Angeles is responsible for a highly efficient development of the electrolytic type of rectification as employed in B battery elimination. Their Pemco units have in the past met with wide-spread popularity and a great many thousand of them are in use.

The new models for the 1927-28 season incorporate several technical refinements, and a more compact and attractive cabinet. The Model S is equipped with a 47 ampere-hour storage battery, charged by a dissimilar-metal type of rectifier. The charging rate is from .7 to .8 ampere. The entire operation of the unit is controlled automatically by a Yaxley relay switch. The battery is on charge at the trickle rate at all times when the radio set is not in use.

The Model GG also employs the 47 ampere-hour battery, but a heavier charging unit which has an output of 3 amperes. A relay switch operating on both the voltage and thermostatic principles automatically disconnects the battery from the charger when it is fully charged. This is the most satisfactory method of taking care of multi-tube sets with heavy current consumption. The relay switch which incorporates this new and vital feature has been thor-

oughly tested and is entirely satisfactory

The B supply of the Pemco units is the outstanding feature, because it differs quite radically from the usual socket power units on the market. The power transformer is of low capacity between windings, in order that the transfer or radio frequency from lighting circuits to the radio set may be minimized, thereby reducing the broadening effect often experienced. The rectifiers consist of four electrolytic cells, of low and equal resistance. The condensers, two in number, are also of the electrolytic and self-healing type. Their capacity is sufficiently great to store a surplus of energy to supply the heavy drains of plate current required by loud, deep or sustained musical notes. This permits excellent tonal quality, particularly of the bass notes. The output characteristic is comparatively flat, the no-load voltage not rising greatly above the full-load voltage, thus reducing the danger of breaking down by-pass condensers within the set. The voltage variation under varying load is less than usually experienced in the average eliminator.

Terminal posts and adjustment control are inside with holes through the case for the leads. The unit is more compact than last year, and the general design of the case presents a more attractive appearance.



### Temple Speaker Heard at Long Range

Those who are interested in radio amplification and sound reproduction and the application of same to a loud speaker will realize the advancement that has been made by electrical engineers and professors of acoustical science in the radio field when they have heard the giant speaker, manufactured by Temple, Inc., which was recently demonstrated in Chicago.

This giant speaker weighs pounds, has an air column of ten feet, a bell of three feet, and an especially constructed unit.

Recently Temple, Inc. conducted one of the most rigid tests ever given a loud speaker for clearness of tone, volume and general all-around performance. One of the Temple giant speakers was taken from stock and placed on the Lake Shore in front of the Sheridan Shore Yacht Club in Chicago. Some fifteen men, including publishers, radio engineers and others in the trade, were taken by Mr. Henry Crowell out on the Lake on his cruiser Perry Kay II, a total distance of six miles.

A system of signalling with searchlights from the shore and from the boat was used with regular standard code. The signals were "play orchestra," "play vocal," "soft," "very loud," and "use 13-inch drum as a microphone and talk through the giant horn." The boat stopped at intervals of one-half mile, one mile, two miles, three miles, four miles, five miles and six miles. In each case, all present on the boat kept a score as to what they received and, in every case, each man was able to recognize the number broadcast and distinctly heard the announcer. Only the lateness of the hour made it necessary to stop the test without extending same to a greater distance.

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### The New Two Dial Karas Equamatic

A very unusual development in the radio industry has come from the Karas Electric Company in their new Two Dial Equamatic.

This extremely sensitive super-selective circuit is founded on the new con-

ception of an old idea.

Way back in the early days of radio, we had variable inductances of varying descriptions. And, while they played an important part in the circuit, they have since been eliminated along with a sacrifice of efficiency, because of the trend toward fewer controls.

Most receiving sets of today, due to the fixed coupling between the the primary and secondary of the radio frequency coils are of necessity designed so as to prevent oscillation at the lower wave lengths where the tendency for oscillation is greatest. The means employed for suppressing these oscillations are loser methods in one form or another.

It is very often necessary in this type of receiver to provide a very small primary in order that the tendency to oscillate will be less. However, this makes a very inefficient receiver at the higher wave lengths, for the tubes are far below an oscillating condition.

Now, it is obvious that to maintain the tubes in a receiving set at their peak of maximum efficiency which is just below the point of oscillation it becomes necessary to provide a continuous maximum and equal transfer of energy between the primary and secondary inductances at all times and all

wave length settings.

The difficulty in accomplishing the result sought was complicated by the fact that the impedance of the inductance coil varies with frequency. Therefore, the amount of energy transferred from the primary to the secondary varies with the impedance. This requires a much greater inductance or a greater number of turns in a primary coil to tune a 550 meter station than is required to tune a 200 meter station.

If we could find some means that would give us the equivalent of the correct number of turns of primary at 200 meters and an ever increasing amount up to the correct number of turns necessary to operate the tubes just under the point of oscillation at 550 meters, then we would have the problem solved.

This is just what the Karas Equamatic System does. It provides a mechanical means for varying the primary coupling so as to give an equal transfer of energy over the entire wave band.

A system of this kind on a five tube tuned radio frequency set would necessitate six controls. The Karas Equamatic has provided just a system with only two controls. By reason of the fact that the energy transfer varies with frequency, and this receiver utilizes the straight frequency line condenser, it is posible to combine the variable inductances and the condensers into one unit so that the variable coupling is controlled automatically by the tuning of the condenser dials.

But this receiver has gone one step farther by reason of precision design throughout its apparatus and coupled two of the condensers into one control. By reason of the unique features and the use of nothing but the highest quality apparatus possible, this receiver has not only extreme selectivity but perfect tone quality also.

### MORE POWERFUL STATIONS SEEN

There is every indication that the Federal Radio Commission is definitely committed to increased power. This is shown by the fact that WGY at Shenectady has recently been permitted to step its power up to 100 kilowatts and WEAF in New York to 50 kilowatts. And so the experiment of increasing the power of many other stations is likely to be tried out, although, of course, the increase will be relative and not to nearly so great power as WGY and WEAF.

Better service to those portions of the country not now so well served is given as the principal reason for the power increase. Radio Commission officials have expressed themselves as elated at the way higher power is breaking through static. For instance, WGY at Schenectady, on 100 kilowatts is now said to be coming into Chicago like local.

Although no announcement has been made on the subject, it is said that Judge E. O. Sykes, vice chairman of the commission, and representing the South, will advocate higher power among Southern stations upon his forthcoming visit to that region.

The South generally is said, because of atmospheric conditions, to be poorly served in large areas. It will be the argument of Judge Sykes, it is said, that it has been found that high power causes no more interference than low power and is about the only weapon thus far found with which to combat static. The report is that the Judge will urge Southern broadcasters to install up-to-date apparatus and "go to

Further indicating the frame of mind the commission is in at present with regard to higher power, is a statement credited to Commissioner H. A. Bellows that stations using 30,000 watts, 50,000 watts or 100,000 watts were not likely to cause a greater amount of interference than broadcasters using 5000 watts.



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

### New "Armo" Condenser

Fans will welcome a new and efficient condenser that has just been placed on the market by the Armo Laboratories.

This new condenser is of the straightline calibration type, having straightline wave-length characteristics on the lower frequencies, blending to straightline frequency on the higher end of the scale. The plates on both rotor and stator are stamped from flat spring brass and spaced by copper rods, laid in slots and soldered, instead of the usual bolt and spacer method. This, as is well known, affects a considerable lowering of the over-all resistance. The rotor is supported by an extra long bronze bushing of improved design, having a bearing surface at either end, to



eliminate thrust. This new bearing is exceptionally smooth running and accurate, which is of great help to careful tuning, tension being regulated by a spring and screw.

Perhaps one of the most noteworthy features, especially where the condenser is intended for one-dial operation, is a floating stator plate, adjustable in relation to the rotor from either side, so as to match condensers in gang, first on the upper scale by screwing down one corner, then on the lower scale by screwing down the other corner without upsetting the former adjustment.

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

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

It certainly is the bunk to have to get up in the a. m. and warm the milk for the kid and trounce it up and down before the neighbors begin to throw their old shoes and tin cans on the porch to

quell the howling squeals.

Now my idea is that here, indeed, is a vast and growing field for intensive radio research. Regulate the whole business by radio and get it over with. Radio automatically warms the youngsters' milk, wakes him up every two hours, forcibly feeds the child and tucks him safely in the crib again. While all this is going on we might as well have radio rock the crib or roll the perambulator down to the park in the afternoon and save the expense of a nursemaid.

It isn't much of a prophecy to say that ships, airplanes, motor craft and submarines will be steered and maneuvered by radio, for already it has come to pass. Even prospecting for metal ores and coal veins has utilized radio

in a remarkable manner.

If we find that Tesla is right in his theories, power transmission will make it feasible to tap the earth anywhere and get energy for the heating of our homes.

Television is already in our midst. Perhaps the next thing in the photographic line will be the sending by radio of newspapers by reproducing an entire sheet, page by page. Of course, this would beat the wirelessing of the news letter by letter, or word by word.

F. W. Falck

F. W. Falck, Manager of the Advance Electric Company, has been associated with the Radio Industry since 1909, when experimental transmission was carried on between the two stations of the Pacific Wireless Company on the Pacific Electric Building and a station one mile away.

He left the Postal Telegraph to take up general consulting work for the All-American Cables, Vanderbilt interests, William Randolph Hearst and others, and later was instrumental in forming the well known and successful manufacturing firm of Chas. Freshman, Inc.

Sawyer is an expert sales developer, but he has also found time to devise and patent several useful radio devices.

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


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
