LISTENERS TO GET BETTER PROGRAMS **DURING SUMMER**

For the first time since the popularization of radio there is to be no let-up in broadcasting activities during the summer months. This is due primarily to the improved conditions for reception, and the great improvement made in radio receivers this past winter. The modern radio set is no longer subject to the whims of the weather man; hot weather or cold; storms, rain or shine, the set of today brings to radio listeners the best entertainment in the world, ready at the flip of a dial to come into the living room, where it may be listened to by every member of the family.

Word has been received from both the large networks and from the local stations that this summer will see an unparalled amount of exceptional broadcasts. The theory is that listeners will be at their radios much more during the "dog days" this summer then ever before. The prolonged depression, which has worked havoc with theater and movie box office figures, is teaching people the value of radio entertainment in the home. and the public is responding to an unprecedented degree. Even those people who prefer an automobile outing on a hot summer evening will carry their entertainment along with them, in the form of an automobile radio. These auto radios have been perfected to a high degree and are being bought in great numbers this spring.

Another inducement to radio listeners to continue their nightly radio sessions, throughout the summer is the broadcasting this June and July of the two great national conventions. People in all parts of the country will buy new tubes and receivers, or have the old set overhauled and repaired in anticipation of this event, which will be broadcast by both networks as well as by a number of the individual stations.

The radio broadcasters are taking advantage of the continued interest in air entertainment during the summer by the presentation of many exceptionally fine broadcasts daily throughout the season which has heretofore been considered "slack." 

Charles Wakefield Cadman will also speak on one of the broadcast programs some time during the week.

Schumann-Heink, Grace Moore, Giovanni Martinelli, Carmela Ponselle, Reinald Werrenrath, and many others will be heard at 4 this afternoon on WENR in General Electric's full hour broadcast, given for the benefit of unemployed musicians.

The American Society of Composers will not press its claims on the National Association of Broadcasters for an increase in their annual payments for the use of songs, until after the first of September. MUSIC IN THE AIR

By CARLETON SMITH

COMMERCIALISM ON THE

RADIO
COMMERCIALISM has its advantages. In America, it has given radio listeners the best of the symphony orchestras and of performing musical virtuosi. The programs come into our homes with practically no financial outlay except that part of our expenditure which goes into the advertiser's budget and which might easily be used for less diverting entertainment than we now hear. It is true that we must suffer irrelevant and often distasteful propaganda. But we

The matter of our enjoyment, however, is becoming a bit doubtful. For commercialism has showered unmixed blessings on the radio music-lover.

Complaints come to me from every vantage-point. The present classical broadcasts evidently do not please many, and well do I know that an attempt to please everybody is fool-hardy. With the goal of increased sales and under the stimulus of the "profitmotive," the vast majority must be satisfied. There is little time to cultivate the tastes of those who like to hear great music given an inspired performance.

Art, via the radio, is not free to concern itself with the realities or the imaginings of life. It is prostituted. Artists are but hirelings. They bend great talents toward the securing of advertising, rather than artistic results. Entertainment is secured, though elevation and creation are forgotten. Now the blame does not rest with the advertiser. With all righteousness, he seeks sales. It may be that private charity is needed to rescue culture from civilization. Certainly, a condition in which the search for riches involves the enslavement of the arts is a poor one.

question of improvement remains. Can industry be expected to use its powers of finance and publicity to produce works worthy of an age that claims intelligence and culture as its hall-marks? Not unless industrial captains can be convinced that it pays. And they are not.

CLASSICAL BROADCASTS INTERRUPTED Hence, the final broadcast of the Metro-

politan season and final two programs of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony were not received in many cities of the country. Dependent for a hearing upon the rain, the winds were against them. The baseball season had started, and there was a larger public to be served. Being imbued with the democratic ideal where public servants such as the radio are concerned, we would agree that the majority's preference should prevail. Not, however, to the exclusion of the minority. Is it necessary that five stations broadcast baseball while the symphony programs go un-

Under the present arrangement, the answer seems to be "Yes." No station is willing to be altruistic (and that is how they feel about it) at the cost of losing listeners Deplore the situation as you will, you can-

not blame them.

But you may find cause to wonder if the radio is operating in the "public interest, convenience and necessity." Competition fails here, as it frequently has elsewhere. Regulation is slow and inadequate. The Federal Radio Commission has no direct method of controlling programs. It is, in fact, expressly forbidden, and is left only with the ephemeral standard of "public interest."

If you proceed on the assumption that the

will of the majority should prevail, of course without neglecting the rights of the minority. you will agree that the lovers of good music are entitled to a hearing. The advertiser—and he is the final arbiter—does not know how to measure their importance. Marketing surveys have failed. Reliance is still placed on the obviously absurd indications of "fan-"



HAPPY DAYS FOR B. A. ROLFE



had" and leads the new Ivory Program to popularity over an NBC network. "Every time Rolfe leaves a job they get ready to write his professional obituary," the rotund conductor grins. "By this time they ought to know that I'm a pretty good bouncer. The harder I fall, the higher I bounce."

Last October when B. A. Rolfe went off the Lucky Strike Program, the press and the public shook their heads. At last, they agreed, "B. A." was "through."

The attitude was unreasonable. Rolfe had conducted the Lucky Strike Dance Orchestra for three years and six months without a rest. His physician advised a vacation, and Rolfe agreed. But those in the know refused to see it that way. Other artists had come to the end of their contracts before and nothing had been said. But with Rolfe it was different. It was too bad, said his radio colleagues, but the veteran maestro was out.

B. A. merely smiled. Perhaps he was contemplating the chart of his past activities.

It must have looked something like the graphs stock brokers distribute to prove that no depression can last forever. Up and down, up and down, with the peaks always higher with each fall.

And so, the round, ruddy dance director bought a pair of new white trousers and went to Honolulu for a vacation. When he re-turned he gave his answer. He signed a long time contract with Proctor and Gamble, one of the biggest advertisers on the air, to head the new Ivory Program.

And so the people "in the know" were fooled again!

It has always been like that with B. A Rolfe. A new enthusiasm, a new triumph has always succeeded the former one. Music was his first venture, and his first success. It brought him to the first peak on that imaginary chart at the age of eleven. As the "Boy

Trumpet Wonder," he toured Europe with a comfortable salary attached.

A few years later, he hit his first low. No longer able to make a convincing child prodigy, he ceased to be a "boy wonder" and became just a trumpet player, albeit a good one.

By the time he reached New York City in 1903 he had dropped into the first valley on that mythical chart. Even then he was a pretty good bouncer, however, and with a young chap, whom he had just met, named Jesse L. Lasky (you may have heard of him), he entered the vaudeville field as a producer.

Rolfe and Lasky took the conventional song and dance turns of the two-a-day and, with tinsel and colored lights and pretty girls, converted them into feature presentations. Their innovations were so successful that the B. F. Keith organization promptly employed Rolfe as a builder of vaudeville acts. former cornet player was in the money again

With the advent of the motion picture, Rolfe recognized a potentially vast field of entertainment. Lasky had already started making pictures in California and Rolfe followed suit in the east, at City Island, N. Y.

"None of my productions ever reached the screen," their producer admits. "They were too bad."

But apparantly movie patrons didn't quite agree with him. At least he stuck it out to become one of the best known producers in the moving picture industry. His thirty pictures a year represented two-thirds of the annual output of the old Metro Picture corporation, now part of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Company.

With the advent of big capital, however, Rolfe found himself faced with the tug of high finance. Once again the wheel of fortune

turned, and Rolfe went down.
"Three times and out," murmured those who had watched the erratic career. When Rolfe was younger it had been different, they argued, but now he was forty. Men didn't start all over again at that age

But Rolfe knew differently. He turned to his first love, music. After a position as trumpet player in Vincent Lopez' orchestra, came an offer to succeed Samuel Rothafel as director of the Strand Theater in New York. The Ivory Program leader was on the way up again.

Soon he had his own orchestra at the Palais D'Or restaurant. His reputation spread, and the dancers flocked to the place.

In 1926 the NBC put the one time "Boy Trumpet Wonder" and his musicians on the the colorful and amazing career of "B. A."

air. Their success was so immediate, so widespread that when Rolfe went off the air last fall, it was only natural that people should wonder and question. Nor was it unusual that some should say, "Now, surely, this is the end."

Rolfe's secret, his ability to come back in the face of overwhelming difficulties lies in the fact that he is an eternally young, ambitious spirit. Rolfe, again and again, has punctured the adage that middle age must bow to youth.

He says: "When you discover that you are lagging in the musical world, you've got to change your stride. Once I played all my music much as Floyd Gibbons would announce the balcony scene from Romeo and Juliet. Now I'm trying to get the noise out of jazz.

And it is this quality, this ability to see and analyze his own mistakes, that accounts for

SYMPHONY OF SIX MILLION

It may sound like just another picture when you hear the plot, but it isn't. It will hold you every minute during the rise to fame and a bank account and the return to the slums and "real" people, or the bets are wrong. Here's the story.

Felix, a boy from New York's Ghetto becomes a talented surgeon, but so absorbed he forgets to collect the doctor's fees that should be rolling in. His brother is more practical when the old sock needs filling and the upshot is that Felix opens a Park Avenue office and welters in gold, but misses the Ghetto clinic. His father is taken ill, and the son operates, but the old man isn't able to pull through and Felix swears he will never again touch a surgeon's knife. Fate in the person of Jessica, a pretty school mate from the slum days, compels him to operate on her crippled spine. The cure is complete and Felix, faith in himself restored, returns to the Ghetto clinic—and, no doubt, to Jessica.





An average fifteen minute skit-that is, a dialogue in which character's names are placed on a line by themselves—requires twelve pages of double spaced copy. If a fifteen minute monologue is written, six double spaced pages are sufficient. A half hour skit requires twice as much continuity, of course. A script generally denotes any unit of continuity, in other words, a complete program, or an episode in a series. Our advice on marketing radio continuities is to go straight to an advertising agency, and present a script which you consider a good advertising medium.

We recall, no doubt as you do, that famous Alabama delegation, and its unswerving loyalty to the Underwood interests . . . And do you remember the unflagging enthusiasm of that new radio commentator of events who was making his first bid for nationwide fame? Graham MacNamee had the ears of the nation glued to his voice. The people realized that for the first time in the history of the nation they were sitting in on President-making, and they were thrilling to the opportunity. And not only were they participating in political history-making, but they were indulging in an activity that was creating a new social order. It was sociology in

Those were the days when squawls and squeals were part of the order of the radio day. A day without them was a date to be chalked off in flaming red figures. No doubt you recall back in 1924 when getting an outof-town station was as exciting as going to a ball game and seeing Babe Ruth hit a homer, or going to the races and seeing your favorite dash home a 100 to 1 shot.

When the next convention year rolled around (1928, as you know) manners and styles had changed. So had public entertainment tastes. But people were still politically minded, and with prosperity zooming along so faithfully, everyone wanted to be in on things when Hoover was formally nomin-And you can bet that there were very few, Democrats or Republicans, who wanted to miss that nominating speech for Al Smith, down Texas way. Then, through the year, there were speeches and address by men of note, all of whom were attempting to present the national issues, avoid political harangue, and yet get votes for their candidates. "Continued prosperity" was the battle cry in those days. Prohibition was played down. "Depression" was a word lost in the lexicographer's collection. That was the year when crooning first started with an unknown saxo-phonist named Vallee. The "Maine Stein Song" hadn't been heard outside of England, but then Capone wasn't what he is today, either. Network programs were growing in importance. NBC became a new symbol on the radio pages. CBS was another, and the name Paley was looming higher on the broadcast horizon. A great part of America was sitting in on all of this. They had the latest sets and static-squelching models. And as they chattered about this feature and that, the rest of the nation began to wake up. They bought radio sets . . . and became part of the vast unseen audience.

Four more years have passed since those Twenty-four for Underwood" days, and the lexicographer wishes he could lose the word New issues are springing to Depression. the fore. The conventions have attracted a great deal of attention, and elaborate preparations are being made for the broadcast of events. That is radio's banner feature for the month of June. History is going to be made, and millions of wise radio fans are going to heed and listen.

Dear DX Editor:

I have been reading Radio Guide ever since it was first placed on sale at our local news stand. I must say that it is "quite the berries," if you will excuse a slang expression.

I am extremely interested in DX and especially short wave DX. I have built my

own S-W receiver and I would be glad to send anyone the diagram and explanation that would write me for it. I have picked up a good many short wave stations outside these United States.

For the broadcast band (as it is usually called in radio circles) I am at the present time using an Atwater-Kent Model 46. 1 have found that this set is tuned so high as to receive a good many police stations all over the United States. Among the good ones I have picked up on this set are: WKDU, Cincinnati; KGPC, St. Louis; WRDS, Lansing (Mich.), and WPDC, Chicago.

For Mr. Thompson of Dalton: I have picked up the Melbourne station (VK3ME) at 31:28 meters, about 9,550 kc. Try there and you should pick them up. They broadcast Wednesday and Saturday at 5 to 6:30 a. m. (EST).

Hoping that this reaches the DX corner, and not the waste basket, I should like to say that I will answer all letters and also give all information that is possible for an amateur to give.

Canada Widens Its Broadcast Band

It would seem that Canada intends to secure more wave lengths for broadcasting without awaiting the customary formality of a parley with the United States. Plans are rapidly moving ahead for a new 5,000 watt station which will soon be operating in Windsor, Ontario, just across the river from Detroit.

The station will utilize the 540-kilocycle (555 meter) wave length, which is just beyoud the outer edge of the 96-wave broadcast band that has been apportioned between the United States and Canada under their five-year-old "gentlemen's agreement." It is one of the three long wave channels which Canada, a year ago, said it would shortly assign to the use of broadcasting. Although a Detroit business man, George Storer, is building the new station, it will presumably be owned by his wife who is a Canadian citizen.

Scientist Of Bridge

(Continued from Page One)

Life was sweet and the card table the pleasure centers, held indescribable joys for him.

Gay scenes, music, liquors, beautiful and fashionably gowned women, the elegantes of London and Paris, formed colorful back-ground for Culbertson's first bridge lessons.

Yet from the first, the game was more to him than a pleasant pastime. To him it is poetic, gothic, musical and highly imaginative. "It is a mixture of the intensely idealistic and the practical. It is both poetry and prose.

In Paris, he would spend whole nights playing with the experts. At home, hours were spent analyzing the hands he had just played, finding out the why of his mistakes. And still the possibility of making a living at the game never occurred to him. It was just fun—highly scientific, highly absorbing—

but swell fun just the same.

We don't know how Ely felt when the Soviets took over Russia and with it his father's extensive oil fields. This was in 1917. It's safe to say that he was stunned and frightened.

He had been expensively educated—vet he had no trade. Philosophy was a sublimely impractical trade. Professorships were few and far between. For the first time in his life, he found himself unprovided for and unable to provide for himself.

With just enough money left for his passage to America, the land of opportunity, he kissed the continent and the gay, care-

free life good-bye.

Then to America where, having filed a claim against Russia for 4,000,000 dollars, in Washington, he set about the dreary business of supporting himself.

It was tough going. He tried first of all to get a professorship at some—or any college. No success there. Then he taught French to ambitious matrons for awhile. But they enraged him because they were slow and soon he lost his pupils. From there to selling coffee, coal and washing dishes.

All the time he was playing bridge to help forget his sudden and tragic change of for-

Enter Josephine Murphy, assistant and personal friend to the bridge authority, Whitehead. She was young, ambitious, bridge-wise, and, most of all, she believed in Culbertson!

He met her at the bridge table. They are still playing bridge together, writing, thinking and loving the game together. And bridge, plus Josephine Murphy, has brought fame and wealth to Ely.

While they were still on their honeymoon, Ely started to write a book on contract. was in response to stimulus from an adoring wife who believed in him. "You're better than you think you are," she had said. And fifteen minutes later he had pinched 100 sheets of stationery from the hotel supply and started to work.

For the rest of the honeymoon, Josephine

sat alone—and was glad!

The first seven books were the hardest Ely wrote them and tore them up. But the eighth, written on contract after Harold Vanderbilt introduced it to this country, was concise, individual and took hold immediately.

Then came lectures on the subject, articles for newspapers, appearances at the Whist Club of New York, high temple of the bridge authorities, and general propaganda for the Culbertson System. Josephine knew the ropes. She encouraged him with one hand and worked hard with the other.

Of course he has succeeded—but under terrific difficulties. His first appearance at the Whist Club met with a storm of rebuffs. Everywhere he went he was snubbed. His System was unheard of; it was heretical; it upset the standard already set by Whitehead, Lenz, Work, and other authorities. People began by laughing at him. They ended by playing his System. He literally stuffed it down their throats. He MADE them see it.

Of course we don't know that his playing methods are the best in the world. No one does. Other writers and professionals claim that they are working for a Universal System that will clarify and unify the science everywhere. They claim that Clubertson is too highly individualistic; that he refuses to my system would never have been perfected?"

come half way with them; that he won't last.

In answer to these attacks, Culbertson staged the greatest publicity stunt of last year to demonstrate the soundness of his principles. He claimed he could beat the Lenz System—and he did! The whole affair has been cited as just another example of Culbertson's love for publicity and business acumen, but underneath the ballyhoo, we think, was a sincere attempt to bear out his claims as to the merits of his System.

Did we tell you that Culbertson's mother was the daughter of a Russian Cossack—and his father an American? From the father comes a tall, rangy, athletic, English-American physique. From his mother—imaginatemperament, fire and unquenchable ambition.

It is his mother's fault that he is of distinguished bearing, and that he talks with a faint Russian accent. It is because of his continental training that he prefers London and Paris made clothes, and that, with his two hundred thousand dollar income a year, buys ties, coats, pajamas—everything on the continent.

In the house he lounges, English fashion, in house coat and pajamas. He smokes approximately 100 Egyptian cigarettes a day—and is in the best of health. Moody, temperamental, intellectual and impatient of detail, he leaves the business of organization to his wife and three hyper-efficient secretaries, whom he directs by phone.

Of his two children, Joyce and Ely, he is extremely proud and wishes that they grow up to become anything—except bridge experts. Two maniacs are enough in one family, he says.

Josephine, female maniac of the house-hold, is attractive, shrewd, socially charming, and above all, a marvel of tact! Of managing a husband she says:

"Don't forget that man is a vain creature. Let him think that it is he who rules the roost! Manage him without letting him suspect it."

Of Mrs. Culbertson, the love-sick Ely is

quoted as saying:
"She is my favorite partner and the greatest woman player in the world. Without her
