

Frances Langford was not on the Star of Stars list for 1935 or 1936—but right now she's in third place! I had that awful longing and desire to reach into the loudspeaker and draw you down close to my breast and cuddle you in my arms, oh so tenderly, and love you, pet you, mother you. I want your arms about me. I don't want love from anyone else, not ever. After the man in the moon chimes his wedding bells for us, up there along the Milky Way, I'd love to explore the heavens with you . . .

You would think, wouldn't you, that it came from—at the very least—the acknowledged fiancée of the radio star to whom it was written? So would anybody. But it didn't. It came to Ralph Kirberry, the Dream Singer, from a girl he has never seen.

WHAT in the world possesses these women—women all over the country—thousands of them—who fall in love with men on the air whose voices alone are known to them? To Bing Crosby, Dick Powell, Rudy Vallee, Frank Parker, Ray Heatherton, Frank Munn, Kenny Baker, Wayne King, Fred Waring, Shep Fields—to every man in radio who has an appealing air personality comes the adoration of these women whom they have never met and will never meet so long as they live. Pretty girls of seventeen send in photos of themselves in bathing suits; sometimes in the nude. Mothers of large families with perfectly good husbands of their own hint that they will be delighted to secure a divorce if only Fred Waring will have them.

"Fantasy love," psychologists call it. Fantasy love is capable of provoking the strongest human passions because, in its very nature, it must remain one-sided and unsatisfied. A girl out in the country falls passionately in love with a radio star because her real-life

FRANCIA WHITE DOESN'T WANT BRIGHT LIGHTS—BUT DOWN-TO-EARTH LIVING!

GATHER 'round, you girls who envy radio and movie stars their beauty. Step right up, you lads who are looking for a "different" sort of girl. Attention, you mothers and dads who don't quite know what to do with those zippy twentieth century youngsters of yours.

I want you to meet radio's girl in a million—Francina White! You know her as the lady with the delicious, lilting voice who sings as one of Fred Astaire's stars on the Packard hour each Tuesday night.

But she is more than that!

Francina White is the lone enemy of Hollywood's hokus-pokus. The girl who says: "You don't need glamor. You don't need important friends. You don't need romance. You don't even need great talent. No matter what the rule-books say, you can have success and happiness without any of these things!"

"Oh, yes?" I can almost hear a

sardonic chorus from **RADIO GUIDE** readers. Well, we can prove it! I mean Francina can. I am only setting down what happens to be true—

That Francina White had "glamor" once, but discarded it as she would a too gaudy hat. That she could, if she wanted to, look like a movie star, but she doesn't choose to dazzle. That she could be a social queen, but scorns the insincerity of such a position. That she could match the endless, trivial romances of stars in Hollywood, but tilts her pert nose in disdain at the mere thought of it.

Back of all this is an untold love story. It begins with Francina White as a wiry, peppy and personable creature of fourteen. At this age she met a young high school chap who became her first "steady" beau. For the purposes of this story he shall be known as Don. This was just the usual high

school affair. Don carried Francina's books home, quarreled with her occasionally and as often made up, took her to dances and generally monopolized her time. The two continued their romance into college.

WHAT finally separated the two youngsters was Francina's decision to join the Fanchon and Marco studio as a dancer. When she went touring with a ballet group, however, she made it a point to let Don know when she would be playing a town near the school at which he was studying medicine. On these occasions, he'd duck away from the campus for a while, during which they would pick up the threads of their long-distance romance.

You know how young people are. On one of their meetings, Don was considerably upset over an exam he had flunked. He saw Francina out in

the world doing things. Years of work stretched ahead before he could hang out his doctor's shingle. How did he know whether this was really the career for which he was destined?

Francina, already schooled to hard knocks, laughed at him and gave him a friendly scolding. Was he going to be a quitter? Why, she thought he had more backbone than that! So, for the first time she and Don separated without bothering to patch up the quarrel that had been smoked up in the midst of an argument between sweethearts.

FRANCINA went her way, Don his. And those gods of fate who rule young love must have shrugged their shoulders and smiled as they made a note to get these two together again. But somehow the gods suffered a lapse of memory, for Don met another girl and quite abruptly they were married! You may be sure that when Francina heard the news she was considerably upset.

This explains the *why* of Francina's utter independence of men in general, though as a child she was brought up with exactly the opposite idea in mind.

"I don't expect things from any man. I don't want him to hold my chair for me, insist on my going through a door first or put on my wrap. Heck, women nowadays are out earning their own living! They're in professions, they vote. Why shouldn't they be capable of pouring cream in their own coffee or putting on their coats without assistance?"

as those around her are doing. Yet, she is essentially a happy person.

But if Francina's reasons for blithely disregarding love in her scheme of things seems odd, her utter contempt for that prime essential known as "glamor" is really startling.

Mention glamor, and she says: "What of it? Where do you get it and how? If anyone can prove it has advantages, I'll be glad to take a bottle. Oh yes, I have been glamorous. During one whole radio season I was known as 'that glamorous young California prima donna.' Immediately I had to live up to the name—

"A new evening gown once a week and all the things that go with it. New street clothes, do's and don'ts from the publicity department so that the illusion wouldn't be disturbed.

"And so what? There is something essentially useless about pretending to

be an orchid morning, noon and night. My singing wasn't one bit different, and here I was putting on a big front for a few hundred people who attended each broadcast. The thousands listening in would have liked me just as well if I had been wearing overalls!"

So Francia gave up glamor. Her friends liked her better that way. And just for the sake of proving her point, I convinced the unglamorous Miss White to let herself in for one of those typical Hollywood "duco finishes" for the picture you see on this page, just so RADIO GUIDE readers could decide for themselves whether she's right or not.

In the beginning I told you Francia insists that talent isn't a prime essential. Let's modify that a bit—to be a successful radio star you must have something that can be developed into talent by hard work.

FOR instance, before Francia did much of anything in the entertainment world, she heard that producers were looking for girls to appear in a play called "Good News," which was to open at the Mayan theater in Los Angeles. She rushed over and found out that they wanted only blondes.

Being strictly brunet, she hurried away and procured a wig. They gave her a trial, and she created a minor sensation. But just as she was about to sign, the director, who had been watching her closely, said, "Take off that wig! Now, can you dance?"

"Of course!" Francia exclaimed, thinking he meant ballet.

"Okay, report for rehearsal tomorrow morning."

She reported all right, but the director asked her to do a "buck-and-wing." She didn't know what he was talking about and was fired on the spot!

Now, this is the point. She didn't have talent for tap-dancing, but this failure was a challenge. She went out and *learned* to tap even though by now she had no reason to. But several



have to make "contacts" at parties or kowtow to executives to get her chance—all of which falls under the classification of what she terms "apple-polishing."

And what does she mean exactly by apple-polishing?

"Don't you remember," she explains, "when there were always one or two kids in your class at school who always brought teacher a brightly polished apple? As I recall it, only ten percent were apple-polishers and the other ninety percent hated them for it. But it seems that when people grow older a lot of them weaken and go in for it, with the result that it seems to be an accepted formula for success in radio or movies."

AS FOR going to cocktail parties with the hope that some important mogul will discover you, Francia laughs!

"I hate parties. Nothing is worse punishment for me than to have to 'sit up for company.' It seems so stupid to go to a party where you spend an evening with a lot of people you don't know, eating and drinking a load of things you'd never choose yourself!"

Can you help but warm to a girl like that? A songstress who could easily afford to put on airs and make-up as thick as a snobbish prima-donna on her opera debut, but who chooses not to?

You ought to see her as I have, standing before the mike during the Astaire rehearsals, mink coat draped carelessly across her shoulders, lovely dark hair tumbling almost to her shoulders, one hand on her hip with an utterly feminine air of swagger!

Francia White is genuine!

You can understand her when she says: "I can't stand hypocrisy in anything. Sometimes I wish I could be a little more flexible, but there are some things that get under my skin, and try as I may I can't be nice about them."

"One of these is broken promises. I guess that too has stuck with me

years later she was stranded in New York.

"I didn't know quite what I was going to do," she remembers, "but I was composing a wire home that ran something like—'love and kisses and please send me some dough-re-mi,' when an agency called and asked if I could tap-dance. I could, so out I went in a road show. I danced, played the piano and sang. In fact, I did everything but pull the curtain. Would I have had all this grand experience if I hadn't been fired for not knowing how to tap-dance? I don't have to give the answer to that one."

There is another answer Francia doesn't have to give to an old, old theory about radio—that anyone has to have influential friends to get somewhere in the business. Hard work, an inner zest and charm, gave her a voice that couldn't be ignored. She didn't

Picking the Hits with



Lombardo and his band. They play the hit-songs first!

IF YOU had bought \$5,000 worth of a certain radio stock in 1931, today you'd be worth nearly half a million dollars! But you didn't. And why didn't you? The answer is simple: you didn't know which stock to pick!

As in the stock market, so in the song market. If you can pick the winners before the race, you'll be wealthy. That's why Guy Lombardo is rich—rich in hit-songs! He's America's champion song-picker!

When the average number of songs that attain to nation-wide popularity in half a year is only about thirty, it's an astounding feat for one man to pick and introduce twenty best-selling tunes within that time. And Guy Lombardo did just that during the last six months of 1936!

Remember "When Did You Leave Heaven"? Certainly you do! You've hardly had a chance to forget it. That was a Lombardo discovery. So was "In the Chapel in the Moonlight." So was "When My Dream Boat Comes Home," "I Love You From Coast to Coast," and "It's De-lovely."

Recalling the list of recent Lombardo first-choices is enough to make you tune-dizzy. "I'm Riding High" leads the parade. Then there's "You Do the Darndest Things, Baby," "With Plenty of Money and You," "Sweetheart, Let's Grow Old Together," "That's Life, I Guess," "I Stumbled Over Love," "Now That Summer Is Gone," "I Was Saying to the Moon," "An Apple A Day," and "Same Old Line."

No, Guy Lombardo isn't infallible—but he's a little better than the best competition in the business!

HOW does he do it? Listen to Guy explain his success himself:

"Getting the songs is the easiest part of our job," he says. "We don't have to look for them. They're handed to us by the hundreds. Song-writers, music publishers and 'pluggers' camp on the doorstep, begging us to take their products. The problem is to choose from all these—and choose wisely."

"The selection of tunes is just as important as the way in which the

orchestra plays them. The numbers we introduce are identified with us, and if they aren't up to standard, we suffer for it. The audience doesn't know exactly what's wrong, but the natural inclination is to blame the band.

"It isn't a simple matter to analyze a hit before the song is launched. After it becomes successful, one can explain its popularity—it's unique, beautiful, catchy, and so on. But beforehand, when the composition in question is just one of many, diagnosis of its qualities takes real skill and discernment.

"The judgment of melodies requires a combination of common sense and good musical judgment. After a number of years in the business, one gets to the point where he can 'spot' a hit almost the instant it's played. But nobody can be right *all* the time!"

And that's why Carmen Lombardo has twelve hats!

Remember "When Did You Leave Heaven"? Did you know, the first time you heard it, that it would be a smash hit? No? Well, for once, neither did Guy Lombardo. But Carmen, his saxophone-playing brother, knew—and he has a dozen hats to prove it!

A HIT—BEFORE IT IS A HIT?
GUY LOMBARDO DOES—
THAT'S WHY HE'S TOPS!

"When Did You Leave Heaven?" was submitted to the Royal Canadians last Summer with another number published by the same concern: the hit "Did I Remember?"

"'Did I Remember?' will be a hit," the publisher wrote, "but the other isn't important. I just thought you might want it for your music library."

GUY LOMBARDO and all the boys of the band except Carmen agreed with the publisher's judgment. Carmen insisted that "When Did You Leave Heaven?" was slated for the top. To back up his argument, Carmen offered to bet a hat on the song. And every man in the orchestra, including Guy, took him up on it.

Not long ago the song hit the top and Carmen collected a dozen hats—the very best hats, too!

Brother Carmen is Guy's right-hand man in the difficult business of picking hit-songs. He knows a hit when he sees one; he should, he has written enough of them! And he has his own rigorous standards.

"A hit must be natural!" says Carmen. "The song's message should be so natural that people listening to it

will say to themselves, 'Why, I've often thought that, too—I could have written that song myself!'"

Guy looks for simplicity, sentiment, infectious rhythm and lyrics that can be understood by everyone, and the brothers agree that a hit-song must express emotions which everyone has experienced at one time or another—love, grief, exaltation, regret.

If you'll think back, you'll notice that nearly every top hit-song falls into one of these four categories. Love? That's too easy. Grief? Remember "Gloomy Sunday." Exaltation? "I'm Riding High" fits that one. Regret? You've heard "Now That Summer Is Gone." And all these are simple songs; that is, the central theme around which they are built is simple, but beautifully presented.

LACK of this essential simplicity is one reason The Royal Canadians have avoided being the first to play songs out of the big musical comedies. They are usually too tricky and complicated, both in rhyme and rhythm, to become popular as dance music.

Songs by the so-called "sophisticated" writers, men like Cole Porter and Noel Coward, often depend for their effect on highly involved, complex lyrics and comparatively subtle melodies, and because of these factors, often do not achieve national success. Nor are they intended to do so.

"We don't want to give the radio public music lessons," Guy Lombardo

Styles in music may come and go—but inimitable Guy Lombardo goes on and on!

says. "We don't want to make our music hard to listen to. If an unfamiliar song is too involved to be appreciated 'at first sight,' it is not our place to educate audiences to it."

Songs written for the movies, on the other hand, are considered excellent material, because they are intended for a universal audience. Films go into every city, small town and hamlet from Coast to Coast.

HOLLYWOOD, always in search of established talent, has drawn the best Tin Pan Alley writers, men who know the ingredients of a hit-song so well that they have reduced the matter to a formula. Their songs are scientifically designed to make the widest possible appeal, and that's just what they do!

Lombardo has the privilege of choice of such melodies, too. Before "Follow the Fleet" was released, he was offered seven songs from the pic-

ture, two of which he introduced: "But Where Are You?" and "I'm Putting All My Eggs In One Basket."

Back in the year 1924 of the wild and wicked "flapper era" Guy Lombardo introduced the first of the long list of hit-songs that was destined to make his reputation as a tune prophet. The song was "Gimme A Little Kiss, Will Ya, Huh?" and you probably still remember it now, thirteen years later. Since that time, The Royal Canadians have been first with so many hits that Guy himself can't remember them all. Try these over on your mental piano!

"You're Driving Me Crazy," "Little White Lies," "When the Organ Plays at Twilight," "Moonlight Saving Time," "You're Gonna Lose Your Gal," "Stars Fell On Alabama," "Annie Doesn't Live Here Any More," "When I Grow Too Old To Dream," "I Just Couldn't Say Good-by," "Did You Ever See a Dream Walking?" "Little By Little," "Heartaches," "Blue Moon,"

fluence him in consideration of it. He plays no favorites, accepts no "cuts" or commissions, guards himself carefully against prejudice, and insists that the music publishers are doing him a favor in submitting songs to him—not vice versa!

That's a startling attitude for an orchestra leader to adopt! Musicians are the legitimate prey of song-pluggers, of course, and as such, they are bedeviled and harried with a rare persistence. Publishers' agents camp on their door-steps, haunt their offices, and lurk in wait for them in unsuspected places. But Guy Lombardo recognizes that they are both necessary and important, and he treats them accordingly.

Lombardo refuses lots of songs, of course—and for lots of reasons. Once he decides to refuse a song, he's not to be moved by arguments about the prominence of the composer, the number of great hits he's written, or any

such considerations. Guy Lombardo listens to the song, and if he doesn't like it—he doesn't play it, and that's that. Recently he refused "The Girl in the Police Gazette," an Irving Berlin song from the film "On The Avenue." Although he accepted other songs from the same show, Guy felt that this one wasn't the type that could achieve national acclaim.

CLEAN lyrics and danceable melodies of strong appeal to the majority of the people are what Guy is always looking for. He is vindicated not only by the success of most of his choices, but by the fact that the songs he rejects seldom "catch on" elsewhere.

A regular feature of Guy's Sunday evening broadcast is his Song of Tomorrow—one new song introduced each week as a potential top-notch. In exchange for presenting these new melodies, Guy is granted exclusive playing rights for a period of four or five weeks, following which the selections are released to other orchestras.

Guy Lombardo is of course an earnest student of song trends, and his observations often lead him to amusing conclusions.

"All song-writers are moon-struck," he announced the other day. "They never get over it. Other song subjects may run in cycles, but the moon is always a favorite. Like 'Moon Over Miami,' 'Rocky Mountain Moon' and 'Moonlight on the Ganges' of seasons past, there has been no hit in the last five months to equal 'Chapel in the Moonlight.' Song-writers are moon-struck—but they love it!"

Guy's own favorite song has nothing to do with the moon, concerns itself not at all with young love, and never saw Tin Pan Alley. It's his own signature song—"Auld Lang Syne!"

Guy Lombardo may be heard Sundays over a CBS network at 5:30 p.m. EST (4:30 CST; 3:30 MST; 2:30 PST).

"Broken Record," "It's Been So Long," "Whistling in the Dark," "I'll Get By," "My Fate Is In Your Hands," "Lullaby of the Leaves," "Too Many Tears," "Sweet and Lovely."

The Royal Canadians have introduced all of Carmen Lombardo's hit-tunes, of course. You remember "Snuggled On Your Shoulder," "Sweethearts On Parade" and "Coquette."

But even Carmen often has trouble "plugging" his songs with Guy. The first of the Lombardos is almost fanatical in his determination to allow nothing outside the song itself to in-

An All-American Singer's

Life Story

THIS is the last instalment of my story, so I shall try to cram all the advice I can into it for those of you who want to sing.

Last week I told you how to choose, for your early training, a teacher located somewhere near you. Here are the things you should get from that teacher:

1. Help in developing your voice production.
2. Musicianship; the desire to know better music, along with the technical side of it. You should know what goes into the making even of a simple scale that a child might sing. A musical background. Repertoire. The selection of songs suitable for your voice.
3. Your ear developments. The pupil must be conscious at all times of true pitch.
4. Learning how to listen to music to learn the most from it.

HERE radio is helpful to all of us.

Most of the voices you hear on the air today are examples of good singing without forcing of tone. When Bing Crosby first sang, he stood close to the mike. Now when you hear him you think he must be standing close to it, but actually he stands much farther away today than he used to. I have watched him. He has improved his voice so that it is no longer necessary for him to croon. Listen to the singers on the air today and you will fall into habits—good habits—of singing without strain.

If you are to be a singer, you must also be a scholar. If you are the sort of person who hated to study in school I advise you to give up any thought of a musical career at once. (Unless the one subject you didn't hate was music.) For instance, at the very start you must learn at least three languages, Italian, French and German. And you must learn them not as you do in high school, where you get simply a reading knowledge, but well enough to speak them fluently. You must also learn to play an instrument.

If you go to the Curtis or another institute you will find that everybody has to take piano lessons. Of course you must be able to read music.

Don't think for a moment that this musical background and ability to read is unimportant. Once, singing the part of Siebel in "Faust" in concert form, I suddenly felt people on the stage nudging me and whispering to me that I must sing the role of Marguerite as soon as I finished my own. The girl who was singing Marguerite had sat down after an earlier solo and completely forgotten that she was to sing again. The score was thrust into my hands. I had never seen it in my life. I had to read and sing it at sight, and I did. Such emergencies are liable to come up at any moment for you, and you must be prepared to meet them.

Now, what are some things you can do by yourself, when you are not with your teacher?

A breathing exercise which I recommend is that of panting, just the way a dog pants, for a few minutes. Rest for ten or fifteen minutes and then pant again for a bit.

Another exercise: Lie on your bed and take a deep breath so that the arch of your back makes a straight line and touches the bed. Then exhale as slowly as you can. The floor is even better than your bed. Count as you inhale and as you exhale. The object is to make the count longer and longer.

THEN lie on the floor with a heavy book on your diaphragm and breathe rhythmically. (You may remember seeing Grace Moore do it in the movies.) The biggest breath comes from the back of the chest, not from the front.

Don't be self-conscious about your work or your practising. Don't be discouraged by ridicule. Your family may laugh at you, but so have other singers' families. If you are sincere in your work you can take an untold amount of teasing. Every young singer must be sure of his or her course,

have courage, and be swerved away from the goal by nothing in the world.

And remember this. As you practise, be critically aware of what you are doing! Merely going through the motions is worse than useless. Concentrate on your exercises. Concentrate on your tone. Always sing correctly. Stop singing at once when you begin to feel a strain and become tense. Learn to relax.

Practise with a mirror is excellent. It teaches you to become visual-minded. Often, when you produce a fine tone, a glance at your mirror will help you to remember the positions of your lips and tongue. A mirror helps you, in addition, to overcome bad hab-

its of facial expression. Grace Moore and Gladys Swarthout, Lily Pons and Jeanette MacDonald would never look so beautiful while they're singing on the screen if they didn't practise with their hand- or full-length mirrors.

READ all the musical biography you can locate. For a start I suggest the biographies of Maria Malibran, Calve, Sembrich, de Reszke, Caruso and Garcia. Also read:

The Unknown Brahms, by Schaffler
Music and Musicians, by Lavignac
The Art of Singing, by Lily Lehmann

Study these Bach numbers, which are fine exercises and great music.

Laudamus, Qui Tollis, Agnus Dei, all three from the Mass in B Minor. *Twenty Sacred Songs* by Bach, *Solos from the Sacred Cantatas*, 1st and 2nd series.

To develop your sense of rhythm, practise swinging your arms and legs in different tempos as you walk to and from work. For instance, walk in four and swing your arms in three. If you think it's easy just try it!

As for your health, it is very important to be healthy and happy and rested at all times. A violinist may go to a party, stay up all night, and play well the next day. The violin is his instrument. But you as a singer are your own instrument and late hours will be reflected the next day in every tone.

Swimming and horseback riding in my opinion are perhaps the best exercises of all for singers. Riding, especially, improves the circulation.

HEAR as much music as you can. There are few towns too small to have a concert group of some sort. Join a chorus. (There is no better way to learn the great choral works!) Go to hear all the singers who come to your town. If you tell them at the box-office that you are a student they will probably give you a reduced rate on your ticket.

Should you make up your mind as to the type of music you are best suited to sing and then stick to that to the exclusion of anything else? Well—yes and no. It is a good thing, naturally, to “size yourself up” and consider the scope of your voice. On the other hand, don't have too many hazards for yourself. Nothing will be so damaging to your career as the inferiority complex resulting from a feeling that you can't encompass any field of reasonable scope.

For instance, I was discouraged in my early days about opera. They told me that my height was against me and that I would never be a success in opera because I was so tall. As a matter of fact, my height has been a great asset to me in opera. A tall woman can give such a character as Anneris, to name one, a commanding presence.

In conclusion—what are your chances of success? The American-

born, American-trained singer has a better chance of reaching the top in his chosen field today than ever before. We are all of us, as Americans, pro-American, you know. You have the sympathy of your future audience with you from the start.

The plan which you should lay out for yourself runs something like this:

1. Learn all you can by yourself.
2. Study with a teacher near you, at first.
3. From your teacher, or one of the great musical foundations, learn the name of a musical preparatory school. Go there when you think you are ready for it. If they agree you are ready, a place may be made for you.
4. After your preparatory work, apply for admission to one of the big American schools on the list I gave you last week.

Does it work?

That depends entirely upon what sort of voice God gave you, plus your personal integrity, stamina and intelligence. As for myself, I spent five years at the Curtis Institute. During my fifth year, an audition was arranged for me at the Metropolitan Opera House. I sang just after singing in my first concert in New York and, either for that reason or because I had to take a bus to and from Philadelphia to save money, I sang badly. Anyway, I made another audition a month later

and—realized my dream, the offer of a contract! I was still not completely certain that I was ready. Finally, however, I signed a contract for three years on a cautious weekly basis. Then after a year they gave me a new contract on the performance basis, which is the arrangement made for the better artists. Needless to say, it was a great compliment.

DURING my first year at the Met I was lucky enough to be chosen by Stokowski to sing in his concert version of “Parsifal.” I sang the role of Kundry, a great experience. At the end of my second year I went to England for the first time and sang at the Golden Jubilee festivities and gave a concert at Lady Astor's home. I had five weeks there. But I think my greatest thrill came last year when I sang twice with Maestro Toscanini—first Debussy's “Blessed Damosel” and then, later, the Beethoven Ninth Symphony. This year I have been twice to the Coast and I am on my way to Florida as you read this. I expect to be in England for concerts during the Coronation and then I shall do another European tour. But it is only because I am firmly on my feet here at home that I feel ready to go abroad.

So, you see—it works!

Good luck! My heartfelt wishes for your success are with you!

RUGGIERO RICCI

RUGGIERO RICCI is the violinist's choice for top-honors among the youthful prodigies who have been cluttering up the newspapers and the concert halls during our bristling nineteen-thirties. Not so successfully exploited as others of his youthful colleagues, Ruggiero—who wants to be known as Roger—has a talent and an individuality all his own, which many authorities profess to prefer to that of other more highly press-agented and, perhaps, more colorful boy violinists. In a matter of taste, your preference should be your own.

When you tune in Sunday, observe the vigorous attack, the beauty and boldness of the tone, the cleanness of the rapid passages, the exactness of pitch in the double-stops and, above all, the sincerity of feeling which inspires his playing, and which makes his performance a joy to the understanding listener. ("In his playing," it has been said, "you will find all the lyricism and fiery passion of his race. For, although he was born in this country, his parentage is Italian.")

He has a quaint little clipped accent, peculiarly his own, and his opinions definitely are his own. If you know and understand him, he is a charming and agreeable companion. With strangers, he is shy in manner. At home, he is the "life of the party."

HE loves to fish and ride his bicycle and drive his car. Every Spring he wants to take part in the local baseball nine, but such sports are forbidden. His violin playing necessarily takes precedence over all sports in his life. As you watch him during an ordinary conversation, the fingers of his left hand move against his palm as though he were playing.

His taste in music is ultra-serious. His favorite composer is Beethoven. He hates jazz. In literature, he enjoys history most. Fiction does not interest him.

"Why read about something that never happened?" he asks. When he is performing, nothing confuses him. There he shows his genius.

Saturday, April 17, when the curtain falls on the Metropolitan Opera's performance of *Carmen* in Cleveland, the most successful operatic broadcast season in history will be ended. Nineteen full-length performances of seventeen operas will have been broadcast—*Hansel and Gretel* and *Carmen* were each given twice—to an audience living on three continents. A dramatic

zation of each opera's plot was broadcast on an evening during the week of the opera's performance. The Metropolitan Opera Guild gave a series of "pep talks," informative and entertaining, on a week-day afternoon. Sixty-three singers were auditioned before the microphone, and two, Maxine Stellman of Brattleboro, Vermont, and Thomas L. Thomas of Scranton, Pennsylvania, were awarded contracts for the Metropolitan's Spring season beginning next month.

IN CASE you care, of the operas broadcast this season, none was in English, five were in Italian, and French and German each claimed six. We heard more than half of the company's entire current repertoire, seventeen out of thirty-three operas.

The English operas which we did not hear were Richard Hageman's *Caponsacchi*, Domenico Cimarosa's *Il Matrimonio Segreto*, presented as *The Secret Marriage*, and Smetana's *The Bartered Bride*. The two operas in French not broadcast were Rimsky-Korsakoff's *Le Coq d'Or* and Delibes' *Lakme*. Five Wagnerian music-dramas, *Gotterdammerung*, *Parsifal*, *Der Flie-*

Additional good news comes in the announcement that the Metropolitan box-office had its best Winter since 1930 and therefore next season is being extended to sixteen weeks, with all artists getting contracts for two years. This is the first time in six years that arrangements have been considered for more than one season at a time. Radio's influence on music is growing.

THE box-office reports *Tristan and Isolde* its best-seller, was also Broadway's first attraction: Eight performances brought an intake of \$120,000, whereas two Broadway hits, for example, in a week of eight performances, drew only nineteen and fifteen thousand dollars apiece. The conclusion must be that Wagnerian opera with Flagstad is exceedingly popular. According to Mr. Olin Downes in the *New York Times*, "Public taste in opera has developed prodigiously in late years. A very important force in this development has unquestionably been the radio." This is the same radio that a decade ago was expected to kill music.

Sunday the Philharmonic-Symphony comes to its penultimate broadcast with a broadcast of Honegger's *King David*, Agnes Davis, Frederick Jagel as soloists, and Paul Leyssac as narrator. On April 18 we will bid the famous orchestra farewell until next Fall.

For the amusement of his own children—so the story goes—Engelbert Humperdinck wrote the fairy-tale opera "Hansel and Gretel." It is said that he had no intention of publishing it. It is a pretty little tale, treated with a spontaneous, light, deft touch. It is not, however, inconsequential by reason of these things. Humperdinck was an extremely competent musician with a deep and scholarly understanding of his art. "Hansel and Gretel" everywhere shows evidence of his instinctively fine workmanship.

As the opera opens, we find a family scene in the house of the Broom-Maker. Father and Mother have gone to market, leaving Hansel and Gretel behind. They are singing old songs and playing. Their mother returns, cross and tired, and the children complain of hunger. There is nothing to eat, so she sends them into the woods to pick strawberries, warning them to stay away from the Isensteein, a bewitched place inhabited by an old hag who entices children into her house, bakes them in gingerbread, and eats them.

Act II, which is very brief, finds the children in the woods. Tired, they lie down as darkness comes, say their prayers, and are put to sleep by The Sandman.

The children are roused by Dewman, the Dawn Fairy, as Act III opens. The morning mist blows away, disclosing a wonderful gingerbread house. Hansel begins to nibble at it, and the witch pops out. Soon Hansel is in the barn, being fed allmonds and raisins to fatten him for the roasting. Gretel is ordered to stoke the fire, but she traps the witch and pushes her into the oven.

Hansel is soon free, and as the witch is burned, many little boys and girls who were her victims are restored to life.

Cavalleria Rusticana

"Cavalleria Rusticana" enjoyed a quicker success on presentation than almost any other Italian opera. The composer, Pietro Mascagni, was an obscure music teacher when the opera was produced, but he became, overnight, the reigning sensation of all Italy.

Written in competition for a prize offered by Sozno, a music publisher of Milan, "Cavalleria Rusticana" was turned out by Mascagni in eight days. The reception accorded it was frantically enthusiastic; Mascagni, still in his twenties, was hailed as a genius.

The story of the opera is of extreme simplicity. Turiddu, a young Sicilian, comes home from the wars to find his old sweetheart, Lola, married to Alfio, and in anger he makes love to Santuzza. Later, however, he takes advantage of Alfio's temporary absence from home to renew his relations with Lola. Angry and hurt, Santuzza informs Alfio, the men fight, and Turiddu is slain.

On Easter Morning, in a Sicilian village, the opera begins with an orchestral prelude, and the voice of Turiddu is heard singing the "Siciliana," one of the most popular airs in an opera noted particularly for them. The people are going to the little church across the square from the inn owned by Lucia, mother of Turiddu.

Lucia is stopped by Santuzza, who wishes to know of Turiddu's whereabouts. She tells his mother of Turiddu's faithlessness to her. Lucia is not surprised, and tries to console the girl, who threatens vengeance. Lucia enters the church, and a moment later Turiddu appears, to quarrel violently with Santuzza. Lola appears, and enters the church, asking Turiddu to follow. Despite Santuzza's entreaties, he does so. Now comes Alfio, and Santuzza, enraged, tells him of Turiddu's love for his wife. He promises revenge.

In Scene II, Alfio has that revenge. He sees Turiddu and Lola drinking a toast, and approaches them. Offered a drink by Turiddu, he refuses, and a challenge is quickly made. The end comes soon. Bidding farewell to his mother, and asking her to take care of Santuzza, Turiddu rushes away, and shortly afterward the crowd is told that he has been killed by Alfio.

On Sunday afternoon, April 25, NBC will start a new weekly series, "A Trip to Our National Parks," under the auspices of





We tuned in the Winchell repeat broadcast from WBAP, Fort Worth, Texas, and heard him tell his audience of the flash on the early show and how the police officer arrived in the studios before he had finished his newscasting, the first time.

The auto broadcast with Fred Astaire and Charles Butterworth will come to an end for the Summer months when the present thirteen-week option expires in June. The agency handling will make no effort to save the present time, as it is not deemed the best obtainable. They will take their chances on securing a more desirable time in the Fall.

Studio Stick-Up!

THEY were tough but natty, those two youths. And as they entered his little studio, the photographer, Salvatore Caputo, met them with a professional smile. Customers, he thought—and all dressed up to be snapped.

"Do you take pictures?" the younger one asked.

"Oh yes, of course," replied Caputo, still smiling.

"Then take a picture of this!"

Caputo's eyes widened. His smile vanished. For *this* was a revolver and there was a sneer upon the sallow young face of the man who held it.

"This is a stick-up, see?" the other youth announced. "Get it? A stick-up! Hand over your dough and be plenty quick about it."

Salvatore Caputo half raised quivering hands. He backed to a desk in the corner of the studio. The scowling youngster with the gun kept it pointed at his stomach.

"Don't shoot!" murmured Caputo.

"I've got—there's money—here. Over \$300. But don't shoot!"

"Now you're talking," said the man who had no gun. "Well, get it up!"

That was enough. The two thugs were hurrying down the street when the radio car containing Patrolmen Nicholas Grecco and Joseph Tracy raced down 116th Street.

Panicky now, utterly demoralized by the fierce wail of the patrol car, the two stick-up artists broke and ran. One ducked into a tenement house at 2239 Second Avenue.

"Get that other guy!" snapped Officer Tracy, as he swung himself expertly off the running-board of the fast-moving patrol car. His buddy, Grecco, slowed the car, then spurted as Tracy landed on his feet.

A quarter-block ahead Grecco slammed the car to a stop and raced after a cringing figure that had no swagger left.

A Calling All Cars Story—by Arthur Kent

YOU'VE probably never heard of Jerry Vogel. But if you are a radio listener, this man has touched your life many times. For he is a professional "song-rememberer"—as far as I know, the only one of his kind!

Where do all the good little popular songs go when they die? The men who plan, prepare and play radio's musical programs know the answer: They would go into oblivion were it not for Jerry Vogel's fantastic memory. Mr. Vogel knows not only the tune but the date of publication and the full name of the lyric writer, composer and publisher of every song hit in the last thirty years!

Recently, Ken Christy, who arranges the Wonder Show program on WOR, wanted to use a song called "Convict No. 84." Somewhere, a long time ago, he had heard it. He wasn't sure of the name, he didn't know who published it and he didn't remember all the words. But it had just the right "tears in your beer" flavor for his Gay Nineties program.

Christy stopped people he knew in the studios and hummed for them. He sent out scouts to try to track the song down. The American Society of Composers and Publishers confessed defeat. As a last resort, Ken called Vogel.

Vogel's genial, broad face wore a triumphant smile as Ken told him his troubles and hummed the haunting tune over the telephone. Quicker than you can say "Tin Pan Alley," Vogel had the song "placed." He hummed it back to Ken, interpolating whatever words he could remember. He told

that the better-known name of the song was "Picture No. 84." Most important, Vogel told him that the song was in public domain and could be used safely. The show went off as planned, thanks to Vogel's prodigious memory.

About six months ago, someone asked Vogel about a song called "Just a Word of Consolation." Vogel remembered it all right. He remembered that it was written in 1905, the words by Frank B. Williams and the music by Tom Lemonier, both Negroes.

Vogel had always been fond of this song. The chance question reminded him of it; he would republish it.

HE SOUGHT and found Williams, blind and broke in Harlem. He got in touch with Lemonier in Springfield, Illinois, where he had a menial job in the State House. They turned over the thirty-one-year-old song to Vogel, who secured them in their rights to royalties. Vogel's friend, Arthur Fields, of the Streamliners, sang the song over the air. His friends, Fred Waring and Rudy Vallee, included it in their broadcasts. "Just a Word of Consolation" went over with a bang.

Orders from sheet music jobbers are still pouring in from all over the country. Two broken-down composers are back on their feet (at the present writing Vogel is trying to get blind Williams on the Hammerstein Music Hall program).

Old music and old songs are vital to radio. Lazy Dan, Ed McConnell, Happy Jack Turner, Frank Crumit, Harry Frankel, Ted Hammerstein's program—all include the songs of yesterday and even the songs of the day before yesterday. They find the fans

like it. Even the big "name" orchestras go in for old favorites much more than you would think at first glance. Do you remember what Rudy Vallee did with "A Tavern in the Town," which had been dead for a number of years? Abe Lyman, Fred Waring, Horace Heidt, Wayne King, Meredith Wilson, Morgan Eastman, Walter Blaufuss—shrewd showmen all—know the pulling power of old songs—and keep the wires busy, humming them to Vogel.

He gives information cheerfully and without charge. "That's published by Harms," he says to somebody on the other end of the wire, "it's out of print, though." To another he says: "You are looking for a song on Nellie? Sure there is one—there is a song about any woman's name you can think of. 'Wait Till the Sun Shines, Nellie,' that's a good one. It goes like this: dum-da-da, dum-da-da . . . It was written in 1905 and it's a Harry Von Tilzer song."

Arrangers for orchestras know Vogel's phone number as well as they know their own home number.

Big advertising agencies call on Vogel quite often. They are planning a special broadcast. They want to include this song. Does he recognize it? Of course, that's "Meet Me in St. Louis, Louie," written way back in 1903.

A woman calls up about national anthems of all the South American countries. A little out of his line, but Vogel knows them anyway. He tells her what they are and where she can get them.

Vogel is up to his ears in work—but he wouldn't have it any other way. He thinks, talks, dreams popular songs. He reads newspapers and magazines only because there might be a possible mention of songs. He goes to the movies only to hear new songs. He buys only books which mention songs—but he buys all of those. He attends the premiere of every musical comedy—and can usually call the turn on them on the strength of its songs.

He has a philosophy of life, too—simple but, he claims, very effective. "If you do good, it will come back to you that way." And Vogel tries to do good.

His hobby is charity—not just sending away a check to an organization now and then, but the old-fashioned, personal, basket-for-the-needy-Smiths kind of good-will charity.

FOR years, he has collected Thanksgiving funds with which he personally arranges for Thanksgiving dinners in municipal lodging houses and hospitals. He solicits contributions from all his friends in the 'business—he hints that all those who at some time or another have "asked Jerry" give something. Contributions range from \$1.00 to \$100, most of your radio orchestra favorites contribute and the fund has already reached as high as \$5,000. With the money, he buys not only turkeys and cranberry sauce, but tobacco, shoes, socks—and greeting cards. The original "spread

a little sunshine" boy, he insists on these down-and-outers, who may not have held a pen in their hand for twenty years, sitting down and writing a card to the "folks back home." He often sits down and helps them write. Vogel explains it thus: "When I was a kid and we were poor, a kind family used to make us very happy every Thanksgiving. I swore then that if ever I were able I would try to make some other people happy on Thanksgiving and maybe other days."

Vogel's charity takes other forms. He believes that there is nothing like a piece of candy to cheer up adults as well as children. So, he has a standing order for about \$1,000 worth of candy a year and he spends his free moments and his Sundays packing this candy in little bags which will appear on the trays of patients in Central Islip and other hospitals.

He sends a lot of candy to the Leper Colony in Carville, La. "They are all washed up," he explains sadly.

Popular songs, like the good, die young. And radio has often been called "baby killer" because it has been responsible for songs being played to death.

But while radio does look for new songs all the time and it does give hits the "rush," it also knows the value of old favorites.

And so Vogel, who knows more about Tin Pan Alley's thousands of "ghosts" than any other man in the world, is a godsend to those who are haunted by snatches of melody but who can't place it.

"Hum it to Vogel!" has been the advice to the perplexed in Tin Pan Alley for years. And it is fast being adopted by Radio Row as well!

In Hollywood, Kostelanetz appeared as guest conductor with the Los Angeles Symphony orchestra with Miss Pons as guest soloist. The concert broke all attendance records for the Hollywood Bowl.

One of the songs from "That Girl From Paris" will be sung by Miss Pons for her premiere. The song is "Seal It With a Kiss," remarkable for the fact that several records were established with it.

The song was written in New York by Arthur Schwartz. It was finished on one Friday morning and played for Kostelanetz, who liked it. A telephone call was put through to the Coast, and an arranger heard the melody played in New York. Kostelanetz outlined his ideas about the arrangement. The same night, Kostelanetz flew to Hollywood. On arrival Saturday afternoon he found the arrangement complete, rehearsed it and had it on the sound track in less than two hours' time.

Burns And Allen To Start New Show Monday Night

When George Burns and Gracie Allen change over to a Monday night spot for their new show on April 12, Gracie will probably be all confused and George will probably be indignant. They'll have Monday instead of Wednesday, Dick Foran instead of Tony Martin and Ray Noble instead of Henry King.

As to the outstanding biographical characteristics of Monday, there's not much to be said, but Dick Foran and Ray Noble both have interesting histories.

Foran's choice as successor to Tony Martin came as a surprise to a lot of radio and screen luminaries, but not to George and Gracie, who spotted him long ago, predicted great things for him. NEWS AT SUNRISE

BY JOHN GORDON

GOOD morning, everybody . . . This is Harry W. Flannery who Views the News as your Sunrise Commentator."

Since New Year's morning, 1935, this cheerful greeting has been heard by hundreds of thousands of persons in the greater Mississippi Valley, coming from KMOX, Columbia's studios in St. Louis.

At the same hour, day in and day out, every week-day morning at 8 o'clock, the Sunrise Commentator has presented the news of the day, made more clear and exciting by his background of personalities and events; by his broadcasts from the scene of such disasters as the recent Ohio and Mississippi River floods, and by his presentation of the listeners as their own commentators in a new feature of the program, "What the People Think."

One of St. Louis' leading packing companies asked KMOX for a program that would sell meats. They had no idea what that program would be until they heard Harry W. Flannery with his "Views on News," and, in choosing Flannery, they had a "natural." Because of the packer's brand name, Sunrise, the theme song of the program is about the sunrise . . . Flannery calls himself the Sunrise Commentator, and for his tag-line, the farewell . . . "And may the Sunrise of every day bring you good news."

DURING the past two years "Views on News" has become the kind of a program to which salesmen always point . . . the kind of which the management speaks with pride as being distinctive. It's become a habit with listeners throughout the KMOX area . . . the means by which hundreds of thousands start their day. They listen to Flannery over their morning coffee, and if you were to ride toward St. Louis from any direction at 8 in the morning, you'd be surprised to find that almost every car is tuned to but one station and one program . . . "Views on News." It has become a part of the daily schedule . . . a reliance for an illuminating interpretation of the events of each day, through the presentation of the people who make the news, or through the introduction of those facts that give the news its proper perspective in the growing panorama of history.

Harry W. Flannery is well equipped to talk about personalities because he has met and known thousands of these persons in his years as a newspaperman, in the drama, and in radio. He is also well able to paint the background of facts that makes news events easier to understand because he wrote editorials for a number of years in newspapers of many cities, some of which were syndicated by a New York feature company. In fact, Flannery says, "I try to make 'Views on News' an editorial page of the air . . . a little less heavy and a little more lively and colorful perhaps, but that's the idea. Radio copy has to be more scintillating, has to be more concrete, has to deal more with pictures."

Since his four years at Notre Dame, where he served as editor on almost every school paper and was the originator and first editor-in-chief of the daily newspaper, Flannery has spent one year teaching English at Notre Dame; a year with J. P. McEvoy and Florenz Ziegfeld in the show business; several years in advertising and sales promotion and the rest of the time . . . before radio . . . in newspaper work as reporter, special writer and editor.

It was about five years ago that Flannery made his choice between newspaper work and radio. He says he isn't sure just when it was, because he paid little attention to radio at the time, didn't know much about the programs and nothing about radio technique.

"I was editor of a newspaper in

Fort Wayne, Indiana, at the time," Flannery says, "and I was putting on a program of news comments several times weekly over WOW for the paper. It was interesting work, but I thought it was no more than a sideline then."

However, the program became so successful that the radio management asked him to leave the newspaper and join them instead to take charge of their news program, which he did. Anxious to learn the radio business thoroughly, Flannery not only presented two daily news programs over the Fort Wayne station, but also wrote dramas, produced them and even tried his hand in writing commercial announcements and programs, and still likes to think that he was the first to write and sell several programs for artists who soon afterwards joined the networks and climbed to stardom.

Flannery's career has been almost entirely concerned with news, although he has made occasional side journeys. He started in newspaper work while still in high school, was sports editor and editorial writer for a Maryland newspaper even as he was donning long trousers. After that, he chased news and wrote special stories for other papers in Baltimore, Albany, New York, Chicago and elsewhere, with assignments on all kinds of disasters, trials and special events. It was natural, therefore, for Flannery to feel at home when the Columbia Broadcasting System sent him to southeast Missouri to help cover the recent flood for the network. Trained in news gathering, Flannery covered every important spot from Cairo to Memphis, aided the rescue crews in bringing in refugees and generally helped win for the network the reputation of presenting truthful news from the flood front.

Shortly after Flannery began his "Views on News" over KMOX, he started to campaign for a reduction of the smoke volume in St. Louis. The people of the city had been talking about the evil for years, gone to work in the mornings through a smoke fog that oftentimes made driving hazardous, coughed because of the heavy smoke and suffered more than their share of colds and sore throats. Flannery's vigorous campaign brought action.

"My years in the newspaper business were fine," says Flannery, "but there's nothing more stimulatingly interesting, nothing in which one feels of more service, than my present field . . . RADIO. That's the top!"

If you would drop me a line sometime you would make me the happiest girl in the world. I want it to come only from you, though. Coming from a secretary, it wouldn't mean much to me. And please don't think that I want it just to show it off. I feel too deeply for that. I don't wear my "red heart crumpled" on my sleeve. If you knew me you'd know that. I'm the serious type. I know that you're the serious type, too. I think we would have a lot in common, only I don't sing. I am waiting until I hear from you. Please don't fail me.

RAY HEATHERTON has been receiving regular letters for a long time from the daughter of a family that is extremely prominent socially. Now and then they have proved to be vaguely suggestive, but for the most part the girl writes of her personal problems—her clothes, her friends, her parties, such things. (She also criticizes his singing. They frequently do that. It gives them an excuse to write.) Then for about a month the letters stopped. Recently—a week or so ago—Ray heard from her again. "You have never seen me, but I was in the audience at every one of your cigarette programs," she wrote. "My family insists that I marry a man who has proposed to me. I simply can't go through with it. If you will have me, I will give up my parents, my friends, my money, everything, and be your wife."

Rudy Vallee, of course, is fair game for every romance-starved woman in America. A young girl in Denver once started writing him long letters full of "I love you" and "I belong to you." Her name for him was Dearest Buggy-Man. That was harmless enough. If she loved him, it was perhaps natural that she should feel that she belonged to him. But the next step—and this always happens—was for her to begin to feel that he belonged to her. She went down to the Court House in Denver, took out a marriage license with Rudy's name on it, and then sued him for \$250,000 because, three thousand miles away in New York, he did not put in an appearance to marry her. She claimed she had been on the stage with him.

"I didn't know her," Rudy says, "I had nothing to do with her, I never met her. She never played in the same theater with me, and I don't believe she ever played in any theater."

BUT this affair was nothing compared to Rudy's palpitating "romance" with another woman. She was a little old spinster lady with snow-white hair, but she certainly had young ideas! She first met Rudy, she claimed in court, when she overheard him threatening to kill himself. According to her wildly implausible story she followed him down the street, gave him a crucifix, and led him penitently home. And what did he do to repay her? Why, he repeatedly sang a song about her in public!

In addition—so she said—he caused people to embarrass her by addressing her as "Mrs. Vallee" when she was out shopping, which was extremely annoying. Poor Rudy! By the time the judge threw that case out of court he was beginning to think he was a Buggy Man. Or at least that there were an

awful lot of buggy women loose.

The Dream Singer runs Vallee a close second. "Though you are unaware of it," one woman wrote to him, "who knows but I am the Dream Girl you sing to? It almost seems too good to be true that such a person as you should be existing and really looking for the kind of companionship which will make your life complete. A few years ago I would have thought this a brazen thing to do, but now when I see something I want I go after it. At least I can see no harm in writing to you. Nothing venture, nothing win!"

Another request, made to him by a girl, might have had extremely serious consequences. She wrote—

All I'd care for, and it would be the greatest reward of all to me, would be a sweet, clean love like yours, to feel your arms around me, to rest against your big shoulder, Packie darling. That's all I'd care for, Ralph—just your love and what you want to give me. And here is a little secret, pet. Listen—in the silver, still night when all is at rest, the sweetest, most precious thing in life would be the mystery of the love that exists between two lovers. You are all I've ever dreamed of; all I want and need, you possess. Ralph, do you mind if I ask you something? If that ring on your finger in that picture where you are holding that book in your hands—remember?—well, dear, if your mother or a friend didn't give you that ring as a gift—do you think you'd miss it if I'd wear it a while dear? Here is the size of my finger . . .


THAT sounds innocent enough; but suppose Ralph should generously send her the ring she asks for? It could be identified from the photograph which she mentions. What if she went into court, swore Ralph had promised to marry her, and offered his "engagement ring" as evidence? At the very least he would have a nasty breach-of-promise suit on his hands. And you can never tell what a jury is going to do.

Innocent—or not so innocent? Recently a hat-check girl sued a prominent bandleader for breach of promise in New York. A little investigation produced the fact that the poor innocent girl whom he had allegedly promised to marry had already been married once—at the age of eleven! And not only that, but she was married again to a man who, on his part, had another wife, from whom he had never bothered to obtain a divorce, and three children!

But there can be no doubt that most of the girls and women who develop fantastic attachments to the men of the air are perfectly innocent—innocent, and pitiful. For they would not need to do it unless they were leading starved, cramped lives. As a rule the women who write such letters and make such proposals are shy, timid; rather vain and egotistical in their natures. They are the sort who never get along well at a party or social gathering but nevertheless believe that—secretly—half the men in the room are mad over them. Girls who do a lot of day-dreaming have the kind of mind which renders them liable to fantasy-love affairs; and so curiously enough, have women who tend to walk in their sleep. Or so say the psychologists, at any rate.

About all the men in radio to whom they write can hope is that they will do a lot of walking in their sleep—and no talking. Imagine the awful things that might happen if Mr. John Q. Public woke up in the middle of the night and heard his wife murmuring: "Oh, Bing, I love you too. Yes, I'll meet you at the post office next Wednesday afternoon at four."

THE COVER PORTRAIT

BETTY LOU GERSON taught a considerable lot of youngsters how to act—before she took a part in a radio show to help a friend who had written the script, and became one of radio's outstanding young actresses herself!

After that career-making appearance, a few short months brought Betty the lead in "First Nighter," opposite Don Ameche. But before that appearance was the life that made her ready for top parts.

She was born in Chattanooga, Tennessee, in 1914—not very long ago, at that! Most of her life Betty has lived in Birmingham, Alabama, the "Pittsburgh of the South." In 1931, after having written and acted in plays in schools and in amateur theaters, she went to Chicago to continue her dramatic studies. There she taught "creative dramatics" in a school of music—but after her first appearance in radio,

she reflected that since her pupils were finding success after her teaching, she might have greater possibilities herself in acting rather than teaching. She appeared in several other amateur parts, and then auditioned for NBC in June, 1934. Within only a few days she was cast in her first network show. Shortly the "First Nighter" lead came to her. Betty's talent allows her to play a wide range of roles. She is capable in French and English parts, has a natural Southern drawl when she wants to use it, and can handle ingenue or straight parts.

Her characterizations are popular not only because of her acknowledged ability in widely varied roles, but because of the freshness her youth lends to her acting.

MANTLE OF PRUDERY (\$5 Prize Letter)

Voice of the Listener: . . . I believe that radio has merely scratched the surface as far as educational value to youth is concerned.



THE most important short-wave item in several weeks concerns the inauguration by EAQ, Madrid, Spain, of an extremely powerful new transmitter on Sunday, March 21. This station, broadcasting on an announced frequency of 9.48 megs, but actually heard on 9.488 megs, has been reported by numerous listeners. Although the claimed power of EAQ2, The Voice of Spain, is only 20,000 watts, it is easily the loudest station on the 31-meter band. The musical portions of the programs, consisting principally of recordings, are of rather poor quality but all voice transmissions are excellent. At present, the station comes on the air nightly at 7:30 p.m. EST (6:30 p.m. CST) with a reading of the latest war news in English, which is followed on Monday, Tuesday and Friday nights by an all-English program, featuring talks by American or Canadian war correspondents or journalists, for publication in United States newspapers and periodicals. This broadcaster is owned by the Loyalist or government forces, and, in fact, utterances against the rebel forces are so vehement that I can't help but wonder just how long it will be before a well-placed aerial bomb terminates its service. Transmissions are usually concluded at 9:30 p.m. EST (8:30 p.m. CST). Reports or comments on the war talks should be addressed to Herbert Kline, in care of the Madrid Bureau, Madrid, Spain, while reports on the station's regular broadcasts for verification purposes should be sent to Apartado O. C. R., P. O. Box 951, Madrid, Spain.

CHARLES GUILBERT of Paris, France, reports a new mystery short-wave station, which comes on the air daily at 4 p.m. EST (3 p.m. CST) on a frequency of 10.07 megs, and announces itself as the station of the German Communist Party. At 4:50 p.m. EST (3:50 p.m. CST), this dual-personality broadcaster appears on a new frequency of 10.42 megs, announcing as "Radio-Milano," station of the Italian Communist Party. 






