The Trailer Menace

In a movie theater, the trailer is that bit of film which introduces next week's attractions. Invariably it is peppered with adjectives such as "terrific" and "stupendous." Invariably it is boring.

Recently a radio program introduced the same technique. It was a night-time program with a trio of girl singers who, just before closing, swung out on a few bars of their next night's offering. It wasn't bad, but it wasn't good, either. One advantage might be that it offers the listener an opportunity to make up his mind that he will return for the next broadcast or that he can fare better in other fields. A disadvantage is that a little success with this experiment might encourage radio-show producers to go even further. Conceivably, many of us might find ourselves listening tonight to samples of tomorrow night's broadcast.

Producers should remember also that their programs are minutes long only, while a movie is hours long. From these minutes of entertainment, the listener subtracts the commercial announcement. If he is forced to subtract more minutes for a "trailer," he will soon turn to "How to Win Friends" or night baseball.

Most of all, producers should remember that the best of all possible ways to get an audience back for the next week's show is to put on a good show this week.

5,000,000 Sets on Wheels

We are told, and our ears agree that more than 5,000,000 radio sets are moving down the highways this summer. The news confirms a suspicion of ours that listeners, just like cross-word puzzlers and doodlers, are creatures of habit. Radio listening and the pleasure it gives is as insidious as a drug. Uncle Sam Reaches Across the Border

Americans, take your hats off to yourself. You are doing a nice, friendly job. You are being a good neighbor. Or didn't you know that those short-wave broadcasts which slide down the Americas and across a dozen borders were your broadcasts, bought and paid for out of your pocket?

The job needed doing. Foreign stations were pumping South American ears full of nonsense about us. Foreign propagandists left no doubt that German and Italian brains and

brawn were much stronger, that European governments made much better friends, and that their commercial houses made much more favorable contracts.

Adding it up, Uncle Sam was losing business—which loss hits every single American citizen in the long run. Counter-propaganda was the immediate answer: American programs which would compete with those from Europe, which would tell of a friendly American nation.

Today those programs are rolling

down to Rio and Lima and Buenos Aires, hurled southward by the short-wave stations owned by NBC and CBS. Today South American ears are hearing the truth about us. CBS and NBC will continue those broadcasts just as long as American listeners support radio-advertised products, for it is from that support that the networks derive their income. Let us remember, then, in our daily shopping that we are buying much more than an advertised article. We are buying the means also of stretching our hands in friendship down across the Panama Canal.

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

RENDEZVOUS AT GETTYSBURG

IF GENERAL James Longstreet had attacked at Gettysburg on the morning of July 2, 1863, as Robert E. Lee had ordered him to do . . .

If Ewell, on the Confederate left, had gone into action early on the second day, instead of waiting until afternoon, with the consequent loss of precious hours . . .

If Pickett's division had made its famous charge at 9 a.m., when the troops were first put into formation, instead of waiting until 1 o'clock in the afternoon . . .

If these things, or perhaps any one of them, had come to pass, the Battle of Gettysburg might well have been a Confederate victory. And a Confederate victory at Gettysburg might have meant disaster to the North, final success to the South—and a changed course of history for America! To the day he died, Robert E. Lee believed that if he had won at Gettysburg, he would have taken Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, and won the war.

But Longstreet did not attack in the morning (his later life was embittered by controversies arising out of his action), Ewell, who was waiting for the sound of Longstreet's guns as a signal, naturally did not leave his position, and

the incredible charge of Pickett's Virginians did not begin until afternoon, with the Union troops solidly entrenched behind high breastworks to receive them. And so Gettysburg became a Confederate tragedy, the turning-point of the war; and when Lee withdrew his crippled forces, he left behind him on the field not only 30,000 of his best soldiers but the hopes and high-born aims of the whole South.

This year marks the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg, and on July 1 the veterans of the Gray and the Blue will gather in the little Pennsylvania town, probably for the last time—age is taking its toll, and there are only some 8,000 Civil War veterans alive, out of the 2,000,000 who fought—to talk over the old days, go over the old battlefield again. Because this reunion is almost certain to be the last and most important for all, NBC and Mutual have completed arrangements for extensive coverage of every event connected with it on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

To climax the whole series of broadcasts, the voice of President Franklin D. Roosevelt as he dedicates the new Peace Monument at Gettysburg will be broadcast on the last day of the reunion to be held on Sunday, July 3.

Many presidents have, of course, spoken at Gettysburg, the focal point of Civil War veterans for so many years, since that November day in 1863 when Abraham Lincoln dedicated it to "the brave men, living and dead, who struggled here." And their speeches have, of course, always been conciliatory, full of compassion and forgiveness, as Lincoln's was, so that today there is little bitterness left in the hearts of the men who fought there, little to remind later generations that the Civil War was the bitterest and bloodiest ever fought on this continent, one of the most sanguine, in fact, that history has to record. And in the entire four-year struggle, no battle was harder fought than Gettysburg.

STRANGELY enough, the Battle of Gettysburg was an accident. No one, North or South, intended to fight there. Lee, riding on the crest of his offensive thrust toward Washington, had merely ordered his forces to re-form at Gettysburg; and Meade, the Union commander, held the town with only one cavalry division and two army corps, stationed there to screen the concentration of the Army of the Potomac at a carefully selected point some distance

away, called Pipe Creek. The battles of Bull Run, Shiloh, Antietam, Vicksburg, Fredericksburg had been fought, and the South, generally inferior in numbers but superior in individual fighting skill, and with the advantage of working largely in home terrain, seemed more than once at the point of final victory. Political necessity, jealousy and incompetence impaired the efficiency of the Federal commanding staff. The war was set in a seesaw dead balance, and no one cared to predict the end of it.

And certainly no one at Gettysburg, on either side, imagined that the two armies were at the threshold of the most decisive battle of the war. Generals Lee, Longstreet, Hill and Ewell headed the southern army, facing, finally, the Union leaders, Meade, Doubleday, Reynolds, Hancock, Warren. There were 157,000 men engaged before the battle ended, and for more than 50,000 of them it was the last battle. But at the beginning, early on the morning of July 1, most of them expected only a skirmish. The Confederate corps under Hill and Ewell, with Longstreet's men backing them up, attacked on two sides. Hill met fierce

It was in the Catskill Mountains of New York that Rip Van Winkle took the long snooze so celebrated now in song and story, but that was a long time ago, and there's nothing sleepy about the Catskills in the summertime today. Dotted with summer camps, hotels, resorts of every kind, the Catskills resound all summer long to the crash and blare of dance bands, to the off-beat songs of the swing singers. Definitely not "big league," grouped by hopeful entertainers into the so-called "Borscht Circuit," are still highly important, for they have cradled many a beginner destined for stardom. Just such a star today is Henny Youngman, ace Broadway comedian, veteran of Kate Smith's radio show and featured engagements at New York's top night clubs. Monday night, June 27, will find Henny Youngman making a guest appearance, this time on the Monday Night Show at 8 p.m. EDT (8:30 p.m. PST for the West).

3,000 Hours

Almost ten years ago the National Broadcasting Company instituted a program designed exclusively for the American farmer. Put on the air to coincide with the farmer's noon hour, styled to appeal equally to the man of the family, his wife and their children, the National Farm and Home Hour was an instant success, was soon dubbed "the nation's agricultural bulletin board." Broadcast every week-day since October 2, 1928, the Farm and Home Hour will, on Monday, June 27, celebrate its 3,000th hour on the air! Participating in the celebration will be the United States Department of Agriculture, the National Grange, American Farm Bureau Federation, Farmers Union, National 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers of America, Association of Land Grant Colleges and Universities. U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace will be among the speakers. The time: 12:30 p.m. EDT.

Lewisohn Stadium

In 1918 the war fever in America was at its bitter height. The country thought of little else but the necessity of an Allied victory, and everything that could in any way, however remote, contribute to that end, was speedily done. Traces of those wartime activities have of course been noticeable ever since, and most of them, sadly enough, have been in no way beneficial. There is one remarkable exception: the Lewisohn Stadium Concerts, played every summer by the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Society Orchestra. Originally instituted as an entertainment for the soldiers and sailors under arms, the Lewisohn Concerts were continued after the war, and will, with this summer's



series, mark twenty-one years of performance. The first broadcast of this season will be put on the air from the giant stadium at City College of New York by the Columbia Broadcasting System, at 8:30 p.m. EDT Sunday. Alexander Smallens will conduct.

November 25, 1637

Any schoolboy knows that Columbus came to America in 1492, and most schoolboys know that the Pilgrim Fathers landed at Plymouth in 1620. But few Americans, schoolboys or grown up, know that in 1638 a group of adventurous Swedes anchored their cockleshell ships near what is now Delaware, to become the first white settlers of that entire region. That, however, is the fact of the matter, and on Tuesday, June 28, the National Broadcasting Company will put on the air highlights of the celebration planned to commemorate the 300th anniversary of their arrival. From Sweden to represent the mother country will come Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf, Crown Princess Louise, and Prince Bertil of the Swedish Royal Family. Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf will speak at 7:30 p.m. EDT.

Helen Hayes

Probably the greatest actress on the American scene today is Helen Hayes, tiny, wistful-looking person whose genius and vitality have thrilled playgoers and movie fans from one end of the country to the other. Already a stage immortal, and secure among the film greats of all time despite the fact she has made very few movies—"Farewell to Arms," in which she starred with Gary Cooper, is currently being reissued with the reverence due a classic—Helen Hayes also ranks with the topmost stars of radio. Fresh from a triumphant road tour in perhaps her greatest role, that of the queen in "Victoria Regina," Miss Hayes comes before the Lux Radio Theater's microphones on Monday, June 27, at 9 p.m. EDT, to play the lead in "Jane Eyre," adapted from the great nineteenth-century novel by Charlotte Bronte. The poignant story of an orphan who falls in love with her employer, only to find that he is already married to a madwoman, "Jane Eyre" has the terror, the passion and romance that Helen Hayes so beautifully projects. Katharine Hepburn toured the country in the stage version.

Boat Race

Anything can happen at Poughkeepsie when the best eight-oared shells in the land, their crews intent on victory at any price, go rocking down the Hudson River, the finish-line four miles and thousands of heartbreaking strokes away. Still talked about wherever rowing enthusiasts get together is the famous "berry crate" incident of some years ago, a tragi-comic occurrence that robbed a good crew of rightful victory. The victims were University of Wisconsin oarsmen, the villain of the piece a waterlogged berry-crate floating aimlessly in the Hudson. Never a top-ranking threat on the water, the Wisconsin varsity crew was still a couple of lengths ahead of the field on that day,

rowing strongly, confident of victory—when the coxswain, too late, saw the berry-crate dead ahead. He knew it would sink the shell or throw the crew off stroke, so he pulled hard on the tiller-rope, turned wide away. The boat missed the crate but went so far off its course that it never regained its precious lead. On this Monday, the best crews in the land will once again compete for the blue-ribbon prize of American rowing, with Washington, last year's winner, again a heavy favorite, followed by Navy and Cornell. For Columbia, Ted Husing will go on the air with the first event—the freshman race—at 3:45 p.m. EDT. The Junior and Varsity races will follow.

"The Marriage of Figaro"

When Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was four years old, his father one day found him hunched over a table, busily scrawling on a piece of ruled music-paper that was a welter of blots. When he indulgently asked the nature of the so-ambitious project, his incredible son replied, "I am writing a concerto for the clavier." Amused, the elder Mozart picked up the sheet of paper. The smile faded from his face and tears welled up in his eyes as he began to read the notes. It was indeed a concerto for the clavier, in proper form, of considerable originality and incredible difficulty! The recorded history of genius offers no comparable event, Mozart fulfilled every promise he showed in his youth to become one of the greatest musicians the world has seen, and if he had lived to full maturity, as did Beethoven, he would probably be entirely without a peer. On Wednesday, June 29, at 2:30 p.m. EDT, the second act of his opera, "The Marriage of Figaro," will be short-waved from England to the Mutual Broadcasting System network. The op-



era will be sung by the Glyndebourne Festival Opera Company in Sussex.

For \$50,000

Biggest anti-climax in sports this year came when the much-ballyhooed match race between Seabiscuit and War Admiral was called off. With the whole country figuratively hanging over the rail, eager to see which of these two superhorses could rightfully be called the greatest runner on American tracks, the race was suddenly abandoned, and the question remains unanswered. At least a partial answer to the enigma may well be given on Wednesday, June 29, however, when the crowd at the Suffolk Downs track near Boston shouts "They're off!" For that's the date of the fourth running of the Massachusetts Handicap, carrying \$50,000 in



prize money, and Seabiscuit and War Admiral, as well as Lawrin, winner of the Kentucky Derby, Dauber, Stagehand and other top-notchers are all entered. Clem McCarthy will describe the running for the National Broadcasting Company, and he'll be on the air at 4:45 p.m. EDT.

Beginning and End

"That worst of plagues, the detested TEA, shipped for this Port by the East-India Company, is now arrived in this Harbour . . . every Friend to his Country, to himself, or to Posterity, is now called upon to meet in Faneuil Hall, at Nine o'clock THIS DAY (At which Time the Bells will ring), to make a united, and successful Resistance to the last, worst, and most destructive Measure of Administration." That was the notice posted one cold winter day of 1773 in Boston town, and the results of it every American knows: a party of colonists, disguised as Indians, descended on the tea-laden vessel, threw it into Boston Harbor. This was the beginning of the American Revolution. On Wednesday, June 29, the "Living History" program will present, over the CBS network, a complete dramatization of the Boston Tea Party. The program goes on the air at 7:30 p.m. EDT. If the Boston Tea Party was the beginning, the capture of General Burgoyne at Saratoga might be said to have been the beginning of the end, and this event, too, will be dramatized by the Living History cast. Saratoga is a battle that lends itself well to dramatic treatment. General Burgoyne, descending from Canada, planned to effect a meeting with a force moving northward under General Howe, thus completely bottle up Washington's army between them. But Howe could not carry out his part of the campaign, and proud Burgoyne, trapped, was forced to surrender himself and his entire force. The



program will be presented before the National Education Association.

Mr. Gumpox Speaks

Six years ago an irate radio manager ordered a writer to turn in a new script or go back to the farm. Writer Paul Rhymer went home and wrote the first episode of Vic and Sade. That was the beginning of a popular serial which celebrates its sixth birthday this week. The celebration is of more than usual interest because of the impending five-word speech to be made by a character who, up to this time, has said nothing. Often Vic and Sade listeners have heard the Gooks refer to Mr. Gumpox, the local garbage man-around-town. But Mr. Gumpox never got on the air. This birthday, he does. In celebration, he will say, "Hello, Mr. and Mrs.

Gook." Listen in on June 29.

Tragi-Comedienne

Movie-makers, many a Hollywood star will tell you, have an almost irresistible tendency toward what has come to be known as "typing." If, for instance, an actress is particularly successful in the role of a langorous, glamorous siren in one picture, she is very likely to be so cast the next time she comes before the cameras. If a male star scores a hit in a light whimsical musical comedy role, he will probably play such a role six times in succession, though his heart bleeds for a he-man part. Alice Brady was for long known to movie-goers for her expert portrayal of scatter-brained society women. Admittedly this type of role has rarely been better played than Miss Brady did in "My Man Godfrey" and "One Hundred Men and a Girl." But it took "In Old Chicago" to demonstrate to the Hollywood powers-that-be Miss Brady's deep capabilities as a dramatic actress. She had, of course, already demonstrated her talents on the legitimate stage. Radio listeners will have an opportunity to hear Alice Brady Tuesday night, June 28, when she appears as a guest on the Al Jolson program. Whether she will play a comic or a tragic role is yet to be decided. The time: 8:30 p.m. EDT (8:30 p.m. PST for the West). The network: Columbia.

Teen-Age Debaters

Vitally important to every American today is the burning question: In the face of the worst world turmoil since the War, can democracy, as we know it, be preserved in America? Nor is this a question with which only the grown-ups of the United States concern themselves; today, the young people as well recognize its extreme importance. Ten years ago, perhaps such would not have been the case. Ten years ago America was riding high on the crest of a prosperity such as had never been seen before, and young men and women of high-school and college age regarded the world as their rightful oyster. The depression changed all that, and today American students are as likely to discuss the grave problem of unemployment as they are the best features of big-time swing orchestras. Typical of the thinking of youth today will be a debate by New York high-school students broadcast by NBC on Wednesday, June 29, at 2 p.m. EDT as a feature of the National Education Association program. The program will be patterned after "America's Town Meeting of the Air." The subject: "Does the American High School Train for Democracy?"

Husband and Wife

The many-sided activities of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Mrs. Roosevelt will coincide on Thursday, June 30, when the President comes before the National Education Association Convention in New York to speak before a meeting at which his wife will preside. His speech will be the highlight of the convention, and will be the first of two addresses which he will deliver over National Broadcasting Com-

pany facilities within the space of four days. He will speak again on Sunday, July 3, to climax a series of talks by prominent government officials in connection with the Battle of Gettysburg. The meeting of the National Education Association which he will address is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. EDT. He will go on the air from Gettysburg at 3 p.m. Sunday. Both speeches will be short-waved throughout the world.

"Aaron Slick of Punkin Crick"

The villain still pursues her out in the country behind the city and this summer's brightest radio idea is to put the sounds of that chase into the microphone. Of course there will be bold words of defiance from a heavy-breathing hero and sighs of sorrow from the sweet farm gal whose pappy is about to be evicted. It will make entertainment of a rare sort if "Aaron Slick of Punkin Crick" and the other cross-road melodramas can stand transplanting from a roving tent-show to a radio studio. Last year it is estimated seventy million customers crowded tents all over America to cheer their hero and jeer the villain. City dwellers will do well to tune in the Four Corners Theatre, which makes its premiere over CBS, July 1, 9 p.m. EDT.

A King and a Queen Go Visiting

King George VI will speak from a sacred spot in France this week. While a part of the world is planning and arming for new wars, he will be concerned with the tragedy of the last. In France, 11,000 Australian soldiers fell and died but have no known graves. In their memory a great shaft has been built over the plain at Villers Bretonneux, France. George VI and his Queen will go there to dedicate it. But first they will be received in Paris, where the French President will greet them with speeches. There will be many speeches and some songs, notably the singing of a verse in English of the British national anthem by a chorus of 240 French boys who attend a school built by Australian money. Listen to those songs and between the words of the speeches and know that two other European gentlemen, named Hitler and Mussolini, are listening too, and wondering if they together could defeat both France and England. The broadcasts will be on Tuesday and Friday. Of the greatest political significance to all Europe because it will be a demonstration of the solidarity of England and France, war-time allies, the visit of King George and his Queen will be studied in its every ramification by nations throughout the world. The French government has made preparations for the royal visitors.

"Over Markstown at 8,000 feet. On instruments. What's the weather?"

"Zero-zero here. Wind N4. You can't come in. Floyd Bennett has a 600-foot ceiling. Put it down there."

"OK."

Day and night, every hour of every day, conversations like that crackle through the air above American airports; brief, staccato exchanges between pilots sitting up in the sky and the calm, fast-thinking men who sit before microphones in the glassed-in airport radio-control towers.

These men—they're called traffic-control engineers—are perhaps the most important single group in commercial aviation. For upon their skill and their judgment—and sometimes upon these things alone—a transport pilot must depend if he is to land his plane and his passengers safely, or at all!

There is a unique reason for the traffic-control engineer's existence. It is the fact that a plane cannot remain motionless in the air. Modern transports weigh as much as twelve tons, and those twelve tons hurtle through the air at 200 miles per hour and up. Twenty-four hours a day, from San Francisco to New York, from New Orleans to St. Paul, scores of these monsters are speeding across the sky in every direction, at every altitude. They must not collide. They must remain, literally, "on their own side of the road." They must land safely, many times under the circumstances that prevent the pilot from seeing a hundred feet in any direction. Hence the traffic-control engineers.

In order that Americans may know more about these vitally important men, the Columbia Broadcasting System, on June 30, will put on the air an intensive half-hour program from New York precisely detailing the role they play in

American aviation. One of the regular programs in the "Americans At Work" series, this broadcast will present a wide panorama of radio in air transportation. Listeners will be taken into the carefully guarded control-tower high over Newark airport to hear the control engineers issue vital orders to pilots a hundred miles away and control pilots a mere 1,000 feet over the airport. They will hear the crisp replies of the men in the planes. Then the program will shift to New York for a series of dramatizations of the history of aerial communication and safety work. Back at Newark Airport radio-control engineers will come to the microphone to

explain their duties and recount some of their experiences. The program goes on the air at 10:30 p.m. EDT.

In the old days—and in aviation the Middle Ages passed only a dozen years ago—pilots flew without radio and so without the help of radio-control engineers. They flew "blind"—and many of them died doing it. Imagine yourself in an open-cockpit plane, your only navigation instruments an altimeter, which is supposed to measure height above the earth but is valueless at less than 500 feet, and an ordinary compass. Imagine that it's one o'clock in the morning. You're an airmail pilot, night-flying from Chicago to Cleveland.

Clouds and fog are massed in the sky. You can't see your own wingtips. The airspeed indicator tells you you're moving 150 m.p.h. but you could swear that the plane is hanging motionless in the sky because you have nothing from which to judge motion. You know that you're moving, but your mind argues that you're standing still. The deafening din of twelve cylinders pounds at your ears, and the wind shrieks through the wires and struts. You're headed just south of east, you're 7,000 feet in the air, and over Toledo—maybe. Or maybe you're not. There was a southerly wind blowing up when you took off at Chicago. You know it's perfectly possible for your instruments to tell you you're traveling due east at 150 m.p.h. while in reality you're only pointed eastward, with a wind shoving you steadily northeast. Maybe you're not over Toledo at all. Maybe you are over Lake Michigan.

"I've got to go down," you tell yourself. "Wonder where I am? The lake? Toledo ought to be coming up any minute now. I'll go down and have a look."

You nose the plane down. How far do these clouds reach? Are they tight against the ground or is there a ceiling somewhere down there that you can fly under, watching for landmarks. You go down, watching the needle on the altimeter. It drops past 1,500, to 1,100 feet, down to 750 feet. You still cannot see the ground.

You're so low now that your life and your plane are riding with Lady Luck and nothing else. If there is anything in front of you that's 750 feet high, you'll never know it. You think of things like that when you're barreling along at 150 m.p.h., scared stiff.


Hold that nose down! It seems to rise against your will, against your controls. Your senses are playing tricks. Twenty minutes in soup like this is ten years on the ground. You hang your head into the slipstream and look down. The blackness has turned to gray. As you drop, it brightens. You see lights, pin-


RADIO IS DRIVING DANGER FROM

pricks against a ribbon of black just below. That is a road. Look at the map on your knee. Quick! If there is a hill ahead it will take a week to find the pieces. The map shows a crossroad, another road to the north running parallel. Looking at the ground again, you check the dark lines and the parallel streaks of light. Miracle of miracles, you know where you are.

You're not lost any more. You're fifteen miles west of Toledo, on your course, and everything is right with the world. You grab the throttle, open up the motor and start upstairs as fast as 250 horses will take you there. You'll have to come down again, you know that, but maybe it'll be clear then.

Maybe!

But this is 1938. Today—and tonight—flying is a vastly different matter. Motor failure is a rarity, and any twin-engined plane in the sky can fly with one dead power plant. The clouds can be as thick as cotton wool, the wind can blow a half-gale, but the pilot and copilot up there in the cockpit will know where they are, to a mile, and they'll be on their course as surely as if the plane were grooved to it.

It is radio, in the main, that has done all this. Radio and improved instruments. The modern transport pilot, flying a machine that costs about \$100,000, doesn't have to rely on a handful of near-reliable instruments and an occasional look at the ground. Under his finger-tips are 41 flying-controls, 46 panel instruments, 17 electrical switches, eight radio controls, three ventilation controls. If he wishes, the plane

will fly itself, and do it better than any man alive could hope to do. In fact, there are airplanes in existence, radio-controlled, experimental types, that can take off, fly, and land—with no one aboard!

The most important single fact to remember about radio-controlled flying is this: No one man flies a commercial transport plane today. The pilot may be the only man with his hands actually on the wheel, but there are dozens of men on the ground who are helping to fly that ship: mechanics, meteorologists, control engineers, radio operators. Unless all three of his radio sets go out of commission, a modern airline pilot is never alone up there. He has all the help that millions of dollars can give him, at the ends of his fingers.

FOR an hour before the pilot takes off, he studies weather reports, some of them only a few minutes old. He knows everything about the weather over every foot of ground on his trip before he climbs into the cockpit. And before he even starts his motors, he clicks on his radio, picks up a microphone, talks to the control engineer in the tower, for the control engineer's orders are absolute, and the plane cannot move a foot without his permission. He tells the pilot which runway to use, when to take off, and sometimes in which direction and at what altitude to fly away from the field. A pilot can talk back to a control engineer, but he never disobeys control's orders—not more than once, at any rate!

But it's when he's in the air, and fly-

ing blind, that the real miracle of radio asserts itself to the airline pilot. For it's then that he uses the so-called beam system, the apex of everything that man has learned about radio control. Briefly, the beam system consists of small transmitting stations placed along all the country's airways. Automatically, continuously, they send out four signals: two A's, two N's, and the station-identification signal. The first four signals, dot-dash for A, dash-dot for N, are transmitted directionally, pointed; that is, as a searchlight is pointed. The A's are sent to the left of the regular course; the N's are sent to the right. Accordingly, when the pilot hears a steady stream of A's, he knows he is left of his course; when he hears N's, he knows he is to the right. When he is on the proper course, he hears a steady long dash, with the transmitting station's call-letters occurring every few seconds. The system is fool-proof, and with it to keep him flying straight, turn-and-bank and artificial-horizon indicators to tell him when the ship is flying level, any one of a dozen control engineers in different cities ready to help him at the slightest hint of trouble, the commercial pilot of today can almost fly blindfolded.

The beam system will bring a pilot straight to the landing-field. Another beam, a few hundred yards away from the field, will point his nose directly at the runway on which he's to land, and he can come down in perfect safety without seeing the ground until he's on it—he can, that is, if the engineer in the control room will give him the

necessary permission to come in.

It's often foggy at Newark airport. According to weather reports, it's foggy there tonight. Fifteen minutes and 45 miles away you switch on your transmitter, pick up the microphone.

"Plane 108 calling Newark. Two miles north of Princeton, 4,000 feet. Arriving in fifteen minutes. Ground conditions, please."

"Newark to Flight 11. Ceiling 1,000, visibility one mile. Light ground haze. Go to 7,000 feet and stay there. OK?"

"OK, Newark. Seven thousand it is."

There's a little traffic congestion in the fog there over Newark. A plane from Washington has just come in and landed. A big transport from Boston has been sent to 5,000 feet to wait for a clear field. At 6,000 a sleep plane from Chicago, and down below, at 3,000, a ship out of Cleveland is waiting for clearance. The lives of every person in all of these ships and a half a dozen more depend on one man's judgment. That man sits at a microphone, surrounded by a confusing welter of radio receivers, charts, graphs, position-markers. His mind is working as fast as a man's mind ever works, and as clearly. Every word that he speaks, every word that a pilot replies to him, is automatically recorded, so that in case of trouble there is no difficulty in placing the blame.

Radio control engineers often have nightmares, they say, horrible dreams characterized by a pile of ten-ton airplanes stacked from the ground to 20,000 feet, six inches apart, and all of them doing 500 m.p.h. in a big circle!

I HAVE often tried to determine which of the four Brahms symphonies I like best, but it is a case of mind-changing each time I hear any of them. The third is perhaps the most immediately understood by the learner of Brahms, for the composer wastes no time in starting his heroically sweeping theme (violins). The second movement suggests rhapsody; the scherzo has lovely cello ministrations; the same instrument registers again with jubilant songs in the concluding pages, where, as the symphony ends, an attentive ear catches the identical theme that opened the work.

Grieg's amiable score is an orchestral arrangement of four of his six morceaux for piano, known as "Lyrical Pieces." The ones so amplified are "Shepherd Lad" (strings and harp), "Norwegian Rustic March" (jaunty theme for clarinet and violins), "Nocturne" and "March of the Dwarfs," with an expressive solo violin interlude.

HEARD with unflinching frequency, the Smetana overture, merry though it is, deserves a restful vacation. The fanciful Rimsky-Korsakoff music, on the other hand, has been absent recently and makes a welcome return under the baton of Conductor Smallens.

Smallens, although born in Russia, is considered an American conductor, is known as one of the leading interpreters of serious modern music.

Schumann opens with a mood of melancholy (violins and cellos), but soon strikes a note of boldness. The second movement—romanza—introduces an exquisitely lovely theme for oboes and cellos, allotted later to the solo violin. The scherzo, by turns energetic, capricious and dreamy, leads directly into the finale, with its frolicsome middle episodes and the concluding lively measures of speed and vivacity.

Tainted Trumpets

MANY letters received by this department ask for more old music on the air, and an equal number desire more new compositions.

What to do about it is a difficult question, for the conductors and soloists select their own numbers, based, of course, largely on their personal preferences. It seems logical to assume that most listeners like works with which they are familiar, but there is, too, an appreciable group that wishes to know the creations of the composers of today, even if one experience often proves to be sufficient.

On the whole, the contemporary output reveals talent but lacks genius. Ours is simply not an age of inspired musical creation. Nevertheless, all sincere and serious music should be given public performance. If no wide demand ensues for repetition, at least the composers could feel that they have been given a chance.

Some of the output of the moment is unmelodious craftsmanship, some is empty pretense or thunderous vociferation.

The last-named brings to mind the old lady of Duluth. Afflicted with deafness and using an ear-trumpet, she has just dialed an ultra-modern symphonic example, which features sour harmonies and noise. For a few moments she listens in amazement to the discords and din, then removes her ear-trumpet, shakes it violently and exclaims: "Drat it, this durned thing has gone out of order again!"

Native to the U. S. A.

Two Americans etherizing this week are Albert Spalding, renowned violinist, and Charles O'Connell, RCA recording executive and frequent guest conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, on whose tour he served as associate to Leopold Stokowski. The young director also is an officer of the French Academy. Spalding's foreign preference consists of a professorship bestowed by Italy, where he made his youthful studies in music. Aside from his violin eminence, the artist shines also as a composer and linguist, to say nothing of his able technique with the tennis racket, which has often run the writer of these lines ragged in former years.

WHICH ear so resistant and imagination so dull that they cannot be enlivened and charmed by Mozart's most engaging moments? Particularly the first movement of the *Symphony in G Minor* invites affectionate response. The melodies are fresh as spring and the writing is clear as sunlight.

Lalo, French composer (1823-1892), like his compatriot, Bizet, fell captive to the musical influences of Spain. Both men had the genius to imitate cleverly the tonal idioms of that land, with all their seductions of rhythm and wealth of coloring. See if you can find the Lalo passage that suggests the current popular song "Ti-Pi-Tin," the latter also leaning a bit against Chabrier's "España" and Waldteufel's "Estudiantina" waltz.

A FOURSOME that towers! And yet the selections chosen by Hilsberg reflect chiefly the gracious side of the group of musical giants.

Mozart gambols and exults in his effervescent overture to the opera dealing with the philandering Count Almaviva.

A whole library of controversy has been published about the meaning of Beethoven's *Symphony No. 7*, which, strangely enough, is the most romantically happy of the nine. The explanation generally accepted is Wagner's: that the score voices "the apotheosis of the dance," as nearly all its motives are metered in that style. A long introduction gives way to a dotted rhythm used copiously and reminding one of the call of the quail. A heavenly allegretto, romping scherzo and genial finale make up the balance of the good-natured and inspiring masterpiece.

IN THE second act of the sprightly Mozart humorous opera, amorously adventurous Count Almaviva himself becomes victim to an intrigue by which his countess seeks to regain his wandering love. In that laudable endeavor she is assisted by the resourceful Figaro, the same lathering hero (from a comedy by Beaumarchais) immortalized additionally in Rossini's "Barber of Seville."

Further complication in the Mozart libretto is effected by the young page, Cherubino, disguised as a maid, who pays adolescent court to the countess. The serenely beautiful aria sung by the youth, "Voi che sapete" ("What is this feeling"), is one of the most famous vocal numbers in the lyric repertoire. The excerpt used to be one of the triumphs of Geraldine Farrar at the Metropolitan.

SO FAR as the present chronicler is concerned, he finds it easy enough to say that Wagner was not riding the clouds when he penned his Festival March, commissioned by the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia, 1876, and rewarded with a fat check. The piece sounds bombastic and insincere and has only historical interest.

Igor Gorin's vocalizing ranges from the passion of the best known of all prologs to the bubbling gayety of the most celebrated of all barbers, and the tragic intensity of Tschaikowsky's most deeply felt song.

The "Americana" part of the program, comprising arrangements of "Turkey in the Straw," "Pop Goes the Weasel," "Cakewalk" and "Fugato on a Well Known Theme" will ring most familiar to the majority of listeners. Conductor O'Connell does well to remind us that our country has some ebullient and cocky folk-tunes.

New York's Stadium Concerts
Scheduled for Eight Weeks

Sunday, June 26, at 8:30 p.m. EDT on CBS

RESIDENTS of the metropolis and its visitors who are to enjoy the annual eight weeks of Stadium concerts with the Philharmonic Orchestra this summer will share their pleasures with radio auditors, for each Sunday evening brings a broadcast, beginning June 26 at 8:30 p.m. EDT on CBS. Five conductors will be heard in one or more of the concerts on the air, Alexander Smallens directing the opening event. The others are Macklin Marrow and Massimo Freccia (making their Stadium debuts), Willem van Hoogstraten and Jose Iturbi.

Freccia, thirty-two years old, born in Florence, Italy, never previously heard in America, comes here after finishing the Augusteo series in Rome, and is familiar with outdoor tonalizing, for he frequently conducted open-air concerts at the Basilica Massenzio in the Italian capital. He also has appeared in many other European cities and is a composer of talent.

A highly commendable gesture, the

securing of Marrow, for he is American, born in Virginia thirty-eight years ago. From 1923 to 1929 he served as music director of the Provincetown Players in New York, and during that period wrote or conducted compositions for about fifty plays by Eugene O'Neill, Stark Young, Shakespeare, Marlowe and others. Also he led operas and oratorios elsewhere, and was at the head of the summer festival at Central City, Colo.

This is the twenty-first season of Stadium concerts (their first conductor was Arnold Volpe, now at the head of the Miami Orchestra), and they have maintained their popularity unceasingly, about 300,000 persons annually attending the concerts, operas and ballets at the amphitheater, donated to the College of the City of New York by the copper magnate and philanthropist, Adolph Lewisohn. For the past eight summers, CBS has broadcast the Stadium events. Their chairman is Mrs. Charles Gugenheimer.

Dunrovin Music Festival
Features Mozart's Music

Saturday, July 2, at 4:30 p.m. EDT on CBS

ANNUAL musical festivalizing in America is not as old a custom as might be supposed, for it dates from just before the Civil War. Previously some communities had occasional "conventions," but they were not on the same high artistic level as the subsequent festivals, the first of which, held by the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston, occurred there in 1857. Shortly after, Worcester, Mass., followed suit, and in 1873 came Cincinnati with its biennial May festival. The famous Bach festival at Bethlehem, Pa., started in 1900. At the present time so many localities give yearly musical celebrations (including sectional and national music weeks) that their enumeration is impossible in this limited space.

The one-composer festival idea originated in Europe, but was not adopted here until the Bach ceremonial in Bethlehem. A few years ago John Christie of Glyndebourne, England, built a tiny stage on his estate at that place and inaugurated annual per-

formances specializing in the operas of Mozart given under ideal conditions based on authentic traditions and long preparatory periods of elaborate rehearsing.

Now comes William Matheus Sullivan, a music-loving attorney of New York, and sponsors a festival at his picturesque country home in Ridgefield, Conn., with three programs of Mozart music on Saturday afternoons, June 18, 25 and July 2. The last part of the July 2 program, comprising the entire second act of "The Marriage of Figaro," will be broadcast.

Officially the enterprise is known as the Dunrovin Music Festival, and the formal title of its location is the Playhouse of Dunrovin, at Ridgefield, Conn. Fritz Mahler is to conduct seventeen Metropolitan Opera and Philharmonic players for the July 2 event, with Felix Brentano (former assistant to Reinhardt) as stage director and Paul Boepple in charge of choristers. Eddy Brown, the violinist, is general manager.

Frank Hawks Airs Aviation Series

Saturday, NBC, 5:45-6 p.m.

As undeniable evidence of the widespread interest in air navigation, particularly youth's interest in that science, the Junior Birdmen of America boasts a membership of more than 500,000 boys and girls. The organization, an independent national youth movement, covers every phase of aviation with which its members are concerned.

A recent complete reorganization put absolute control, management and authority to maintain and perpetuate the organization in the hands of an able group of the profession's leaders. The first major step taken by this body was to inaugurate a series of weekly broadcasts by and for Junior Birdmen and all others interested in aviation.

It was appropriate to select the world-renowned aviator, Commander Frank Hawks, as director of this radio series. Commander Hawks, whose record of achievements has made him the idol of young aviation enthusiasts, at one time held 214 international speed records. He has complete charge of the programs, acting as director and commentator.

The radio series, now in its fourth week, presents short aviation sketches, reports on topics of interest and guest-appearances by prominent flyers.

Among the men who guide the destiny of the Junior Birdmen we find Captain E. V. Rickenbacker; Major General Oscar Westover, chief of the United States Army Air Corps; Rear Admiral A. B. Cook, chief of the Bureau of Aeronautics of the United States Navy; Dr. Alexander Klemm, professor in charge of the Daniel Guggenheim School of Aeronautics; W. A. Patterson, president of United Air Lines; Juan T. Trippe, president of Pan-American Airways; Walter C. Newton, Lawrence Shaw and Commander Frank Hawks.

Cycle of Rural American Dramas Premiered

Friday, CBS, 9-9:30 p.m.

Columbia's first donation of lighter dramatics for the summer season will be a series of simple dramas and comedies taken from the nation's rural playhouses. This cycle, under the general title "Four Corners Theater," will be premiered on Friday. The plays are to be presented by a cast of representative American actors and actresses precisely as they were intended, without burlesquing or parody.

The first play will be Lieut. Beale Cormack's classic of the rural theater, "Aaron Slick of Punkin Crick," an opus that was produced for countryside audiences more than 25,000 times.

In an attempt to keep education up to date, an organized group of educators meets in convention each year to discuss the pros and cons of their principles, methods and aims of their profession, and to decide what shall be the best approach to the momentous obligation that is placed on their shoulders—the responsibility of educating America's future men and women. President Roosevelt's address on Thursday will culminate a group of special programs presented this week in connection with the seventy-sixth annual convention of the National Education Association.

Monday's broadcast will bring listeners to the convention's meeting dealing with international aspects of education. James Sunter, of the National Union of Teachers in London, England, and E. A. Hardy, treasurer of the World Federation of Education Associations, Ontario, Canada, will discuss the general subject, "Promoting International Good Will Through the Schools of Britain and Canada."

On Tuesday, Dr. Rollo Reynolds, principal of Horace Mann School, Teachers College, Columbia University, will present a commentary of convention news.

The highlight of the convention will be President Roosevelt's address to the delegates on Thursday. He will be introduced by Mrs. Roosevelt, who will preside at the final meeting.

Bill Thompson does a grand job as the old man ("That ain't the way I heard it") and Nick De Populus. These are only two of the dozens of dialects he can handle. Hugh Studebaker is tops as Silly Watson,

tificate and meetings are held each Sunday afternoon. From what I hear, the "cats" really go to town with the band, offering special arrangements for both instrument and voice.

A few hours after our arrival in New York we were on a train again bound for Philadelphia to present Boake Carter with RADIO GUIDE's medal for having been elected the ace news commentator. As most of you probably know, Carter's broadcasts come from a specially constructed studio in his home. Last year when I visited Carter he was suffering from pleurisy and was a pretty sick man. This year he looked the picture of health. He's added six pounds, the first time he has gained weight in twenty years. Since my last visit, a tennis court and many beautiful trees have been added to the picturesque grounds. No person could ask for more pleasant surroundings or atmosphere in which to work. He goes into the city only twice a week and then only for a few hours. In the early afternoon he generally hops into his swimming-pool, which puts him in trim to prepare the material for his broadcasts. Between broadcasts (he does three a night) Carter feeds the geese, and you should see the race when he comes out with the pan!

Not a trick was overlooked in constructing the studio. The news-wire machines are in a little sound-proofed room in a corner. If a flash news item comes through while the commentator is on the air, a white electric bulb above the door automatically lights up. During the broadcast, a horizontal-shaped box is in front of him with the numerals 5-4-3-2-1. A red bulb is in back of each number and the control-engineer presses the button at the numeral denoting the number of minutes left to finish the broadcast. The most amazing thing is that there wasn't more than three seconds difference in the timing of all three broadcasts Carter did that night. He knows exactly how fast or how slow to talk in order to finish his script on time!

What's In a Name? . . . When "Attorney-at-Law" replaces the Fibber McGee show, starting July 5, Jim Ameche will be replaced by Henry Hunter. Hunter is really Art Jacobson, but changed his name when Universal Pictures gave him a movie contract . . . Bob Barrie, who took over the Radio Newsreel show from Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth, is really Pat Barnes, who conducts the "Barnstormers" over the Mutual network every Saturday night.

KILOCYCLE CHATTER: There is talk again about Ed Wynn coming back on the air in the fall. Seems this rumor pops up about this time every year when sponsors are auditioning new shows . . . ON FRIDAY, July 1, at 8:30 a.m. EDT, King George VI, in the presence of Queen Elizabeth, and President Lebrun of France, will unveil the beautiful Australian War Memorial at Villers Bretonneux, France, the ceremony will be broadcast by Daventry stations GSF, GSG, GSJ; TPB3 (17.765) of France, and W3XAL (17.78), and the NBC network. Preparatory to the above event, the arrival of the King and Queen of England, in Paris, and their subsequent state drive through the streets of this city in the company of President and Madame Lebrun of France, will be described on Tuesday, June 28, at 11:40 a.m. EDT, over GSF, GSG, GSJ; TPB3 and W3XAL.

On Saturday, July 2, starting at 10 a.m. EDT, listeners to Daventry, England, stations GSF, GSG, and GSJ, will be able to hear commentaries on the Ladies' Singles Finals in the Tennis Championship Matches, at Wimbledon; the cricket match between Oxford and Cambridge, and the thrilling King's Cup Air Race.

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: HVJ (15.12), "Radio Vaticano," Vatican City broadcasts daily from 11:30 to 11:45 a.m. EDT, in the following languages: Mondays in Italian; Tuesdays in English; Wednesdays in Spanish; Thursdays in French; Fridays in German and Saturdays in Dutch. TAQ (15.195), Ankara, Turkey, was heard making initial tests, near 11:45 p.m. EDT, by a listener in Cuba. COCQ (9.725), Havana, is now using its full power of 5,000 watts. GSG (17.79), may soon be introduced into transmission VI, heard daily 10:20 p.m. to 12:20 a.m. EDT, from Daventry. VP2LO (6.38) of Basseterre, St. Kitts, B. W. I., is once more issuing verification cards to those sending in reports accompanied by an international reply coupon. Reports on reception of PJC2 (9.095) of Curacao, D. W. I., should be addressed to J. P. Curiel of Mondo Nobo 143, Willemstad, D. W. I. According to New Zealand amateur ZL2QL (14.194), 90% of the hams in that country are on 80 meters, 7% on 10 meters, and at present only 6 stations are allowed on the 20-meter band. ZL2QL has only worked three United States amateurs and welcomes reports from short-wave listeners. Lyle Nelson of Portland, Oregon, writes that JVH (14.6) of Nazaki, Japan, is again broadcasting the Japanese baseball games early Sunday mornings from about 12:05 to 2 a.m. EDT, or later. TIEMT may be the correct call letters for the new San Jose, Costa Rica, station on 10.04 megs, reported in this column last week as TIEM. ZR06 (17.82), and ZR05 (15.3), are low power experimental transmitters of the Rome Short-Wave Center that are being used irregularly for test purposes, prior to the inauguration near the end of this year of the new super-power Italian Imperial Short-Wave Center. YV1RL (5.93) of Maracaibo, Venezuela, is issuing unusual QSL cards with magenta colored call and slogan against a speckled blue background. The identification signal for CXA8 (9.64) of Colonia, Uruguay, is almost identical in sound to the NBC chimes; that for LRX (9.66), Buenos

Aires, is a single note on a bugle, or auto horn.

On Monday, June 27, at 10:30 p.m. EDT, a special program dedicated to the state of Alabama, will be broadcast over Zeesen, Germany, Stations DJB and DJD.

Robert Weber of West McHenry, Illinois, states that PK6XX (14.2 and 14.009) at Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, first mentioned in last week's column, is with the Archbold Expedition. Although the aerial in use is a make-shift affair with one end tied in a cocoanut tree, the station is being well heard in the United States almost daily near 7:45 a.m. EDT. PK6XX also utilizes a commercial frequency of 11.355 megs, and there is a transmitter in their huge plane which broadcasts on 12.42 megs. Harold G. Ramm, W2-BVB, amateur radio operator for the expedition states that no QSL cards are available as yet, but that reports can be sent direct to him at Hollandia, or to his home address, 161-07 Station Road, Flushing, L. I., New York, and they will be verified in due course of time.





resistance, but Ewell's men, led into action by one of the immortals of the South, the tempestuous and fiery Jubal Early, chased a Union force out of its position west of Gettysburg, through the town, to famous Cemetery Hill on the other side. There the Union forces gathered to make a stand, and the Confederates, exhausted from the day's fighting, withdrew.

It was clear now that a battle of the first magnitude was in the making, and General Meade sent for reinforcements. During the afternoon and night three corps of Union soldiers, plus a great artillery reserve, clattered into position.

When dawn broke, hot and sullen,

on the morning of July 2, destiny was beckoning to the Confederate fighters. The Union positions were not consolidated; the men who had slogged up the roads to Gettysburg during the night were tired and listless, and a determined charge might have swept everything before it. And General Robert E. Lee ordered just such an attack by Longstreet. It was not made at the time he asked for it. Longstreet, tragically, did not go into action until late in the day, and for years southern veterans and tacticians argued bitterly that by his inexplicable delay Longstreet lost Gettysburg, the war, and the Confederacy. Lee himself once said that had Stonewall Jackson been there the battle would have had a different ending. But



RENDEZVOUS AT GETTYSBURG

(Continued from Page 13)

Longstreet hesitated to make the charge.

Men and guns were ready at 9 o'clock in the morning, but Longstreet, recognizing well enough that the whole battle hung now in the balance, could not bring himself to begin fighting until one in the afternoon. For Pickett's men, whom he must ask to walk across a deadly 1,800 yards of open valley, were a part of his own corps. However, he gave the order, and 12,000 of the bravest men who ever shouldered a gun moved forward in a solid, massy line.

To this day, Pickett's charge stands in military history as one of the most astonishing attacks of all time. The men who stood in the Union breastworks on Cemetery Hill said later that words could not convey the awful majesty of what they felt as those 12,000 gray-clad men, screaming the horrifying rebel yell, came slowly across the valley before them.

But the charge was as futile as it was awesome. Seventy-seven heavy cannon faced Pickett's men at pointblank, down-hill range. They opened fire immediately with solid shot, cannister and shell, and great gaps began to appear in Pickett's ranks. But the gaps were closed and the Confederates moved on. They did not run, because a man can't run 1,800

yards and fight at the end of it, and these men planned to begin to fight only as they swarmed over the Union trenches. So they walked across the valley into the cannon-fire, stoically closing their ranks as the Union shells swept through them. But the worst was yet to come. When two-thirds of the distance had been covered, the rifle-fire began. Leaning against their breastworks to take steady aim, the Federal riflemen fired until the barrels of their guns were too hot to hold. They fired as fast as they could load. There were literally tens of thousands of blazing rifles converging on Pickett's men, the range was shortening every second, it was almost impossible for the Union men to miss—and still they came on. It seems incredible that any army the world ever saw could withstand so murderous a fire, but the plain fact of the matter stands in the records: Pickett's men advanced up to and into the Union trenches! By this time there were so few of them left that it was no more than a glorious gesture. They could get no foothold, they were speedily driven out. Twelve thousand men had begun the charge. A bare one hundred lived to come back!

The Battle of Gettysburg was over. Broken-hearted, Lee ordered a retreat. He'd lost 30,000 men, the battle, the war, and his country.

In a short time he turned to comedy roles in vaudeville, then to radio in Los Angeles. That brought him to Al Pearce.




APPROXIMATELY two years ago Martha Raye terminated many years of obscurity when movie audiences vigorously made known their appreciation of her completely new kind of inelegant slapstick comedy. Since then in movies (for Paramount) and in radio (with Al Jolson Tuesday nights at 8:30 p.m. EDT on CBS; 8:30 PST for the West) the same technique has made her an established favorite. News to her followers, then, was her recent unsuccessful suit for an injunction to restrain a picture magazine from publishing a picture of her and a chimpanzee. ANNOUNCING IS NO CINCH



ALMOST everyone secretly feels that he could be a radio announcer. Many could, certainly—yet radio experts agree that it is harder by far to find a capable announcer than a talented singer or a competent actor. The better the announcer, the easier he makes his job seem, for a good one calls attention to what he is saying rather than to himself or to the way he is saying it. Such an announcer is John Conte, integral part of the Burns and Allen programs heard on Monday nights at 8 p.m. EDT (6:30 PST for the West). Last

year when George and Gracie vacationed for four weeks, they turned their show over to a series of guest stars and a substitute announcer, Conte. When they returned, the substitute stayed on. Behind the "break" lay hard work, careful training, as illustrated in these pictures, which show some of the things Conte and other announcers do to improve their voices, diction, delivery at the microphone. Above, he perfects diction with a tongue exercise in which he tries to make his speech intelligible with a large cork between his teeth



To pitch voice for most resonance, sing a scale from lowest to highest note. When the diaphragm vibrates most, pitch is best



Equipped with the best voice in the world, an announcer is no good if he doesn't use proper pronunciation and emphasis. He must spend hours over dictionaries checking doubtful words!



To hear your own voice, cup your ears with your hands and talk into a corner. Records are used for voice check-ups frequently





THE TRUTH ABOUT FIBBER MCGEE





SCREAMING headlines often report that a "lie detector" has exposed a criminal or saved a defendant. Not so sensational are services of a "psycho-detectometer" developed by Dr. Orlando F. Scott, director of National Detection of Deception Institute, Chicago. It is used by insurance companies and others in civil suits to detect fraud.

In the hands of capable, sympathetic operators, efficient "lie detectors" have demonstrated their worth. Among observers recently amazed by the psycho-detectometer's degree of perception was Fibber McGee (Jim Jordan), who, since much of his reputation was built on "tall stories," was particularly interested. On NBC Tuesday night at 9:30 EDT, he can get away with some of his stories; at the Institute's laboratories, every lie was caught!


Typical psycho-detectometer graph is shown at bottom. Top line registers even the slightest muscular contraction. Second line measures respiration. Third line down is most important, charts "brain waves," or electrical impulses occasioned by emotional responses to questions. Bottom line shows time in fifths of seconds; the gaps show where questions were asked. Rises in "brain wave" line after time-gaps show lies; questions without subsequent brain-wave rises indicate truthful answers.

To record the "brain waves," or electrical nerve-impulses set up by fear—the emotion recorded by the psycho-detectometer, electrodes are clamped to hands and at the base of the brain. Some "lie detectors" are based on blood-pressure, perspiration, other reaction indicators

McGee was tested by Dr. Orlando F. Scott two years ago on a blood-pressure lie-detector, returned for a test on the "brain wave" recorder, was much impressed
