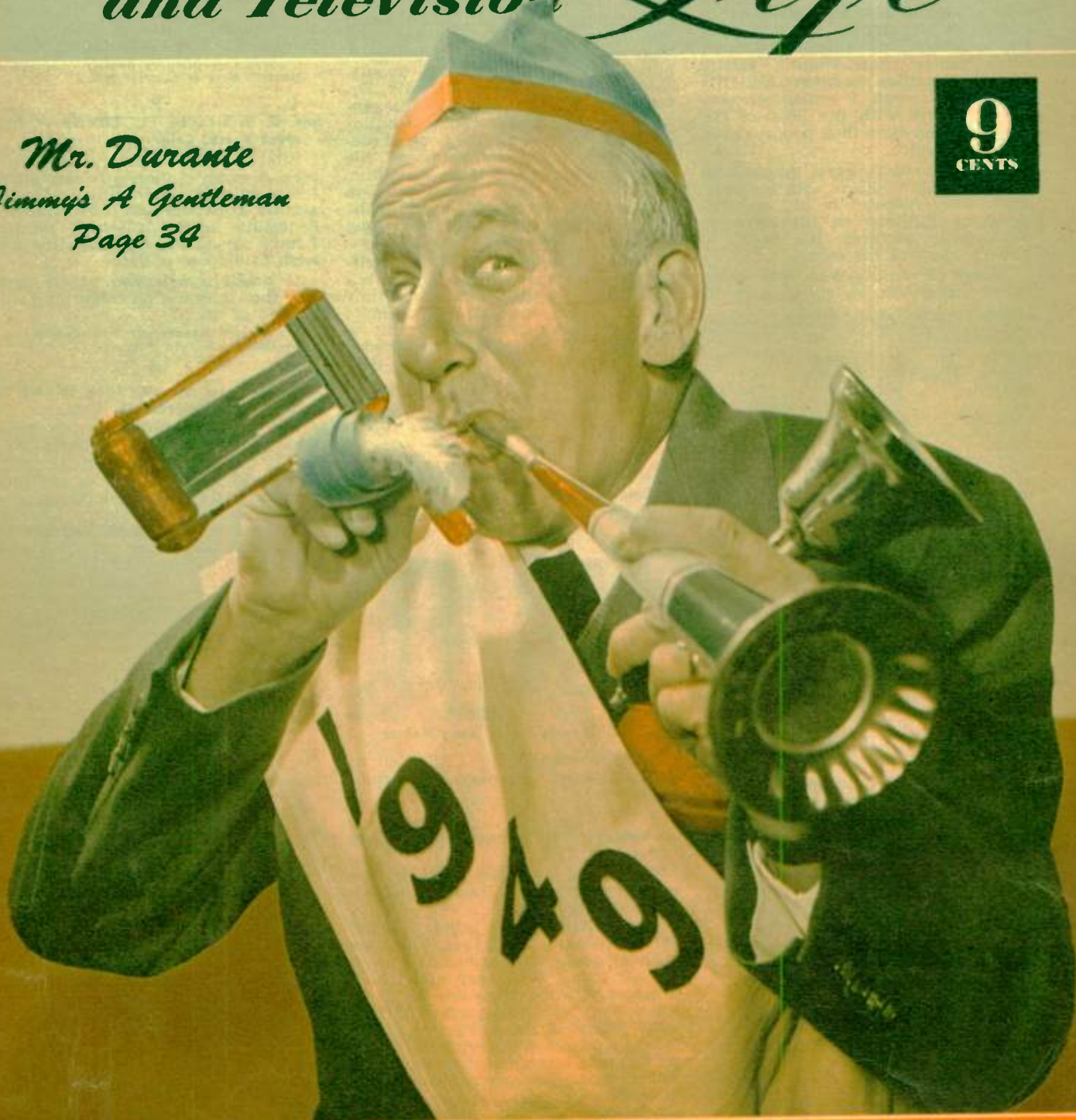

KTTV, the Los Angeles Times-Columbia Broadcasting System station, debuts on January 1, 1949. Its "kickoff" is literally that, for the initial telecast is the famous Rose Bowl classic. When boot meets ball in the center of the field that day, audiences at home will be meeting KTTV.

Other significant broadcasting "firsts" are being established with this Rose Bowl airing. It is the first time that CBS is broadcasting the classic, after its twenty-one years on NBC; and it is the first time that a Rose Bowl broadcast-telecast is under commercial sponsorship. The Gillette Safety Razor Company is picking up the tab for both the radio and television presentations.

Handicaps Many

With the advantage of a nationwide attention-getter for its first telecast, KTTV also assumed some terrific disadvantages. There can be no re-

CBS Knows What Day and Hour Its Big Outdoor Television Premiere Comes Off, but It Doesn't Know What Weather May Have to Be Overcome

hearsal pickups of the actual Rose Bowl game. That is strictly a one-shot affair. The game is an outdoor spectacle, so the elements can't be predicted, nor special lighting rigged to offset possible fog, rain, or even

one of Pasadena's rare but not impossible snows.

During the month before the game, Radio Life occasionally visited with the technical staff of KTTV, headed by Joseph W. Conn, to see what steps were being taken to overcome the "unknowns" in the preparations.

This nerveless Mr. Conn remains calm through all these big preparations by reducing everything possible at the present time to the most perfect state.

"We know that we will have the most perfect equipment possible, and as much of it as we need. There will be five cameras in use. Not all of them will be used at once, that isn't necessary. The five will be spotted strategically about the field, and as the play carries the ball over

the field, the cameras, probably two, will pick up the play *and* the field. One will handle long shots, a second the close-ups. That avoids switching one camera from long to short shots, thereby possibly missing an important split second of play.

"We rather reluctantly abandoned mobile cameras, but they just weren't safe. Those football players can move faster than a camera crew, and many times out-of-bounds plays carry the ball way over the side lines."

Local Games Shot

"As far as actual practice on this big game goes, we aren't too worried. The field is going to stay the same size, and the number of men on each team the same, no matter who is playing. We've been out there almost every day televising

games. Pasadena, Muir Junior College, Compton J. C., Long Beach, Glendale—all the local junior colleges have held their games there. Many of them have been night games, and if we've beaten the darkness, we can beat any threat of fog.

"Each telecast has been run into the mobile unit just as it will be the day of the game, but the actual telecast has gone by closed circuit into our headquarters at the Bekins Building."

Biggest Poser

"Our biggest problem is the human equation that enters into televising sports, for us or anyone else. You see, a cameraman who doesn't know his football is no good to us. He has to be able to anticipate plays,

What Makes a Christmas Memorable?

It Takes More Than Largesse to Make Christmas Exciting. Here Are Some More Anecdotes From Radio Personalities Ready to Prove the Point

Jack Bailey, star of Mutual's "Queen for a Day": "It was back in Hampton, Iowa, when I was a kid about fifteen years old, still in high school. The man who was going to play Santa Claus for us got sick, and asked me if I would take the part. Well, I hated to see all the little kiddies disappointed, so I said I would. That Christmas we didn't have any snow and on Christmas day it started to rain. It poured all day long. I was afraid that all the kids would think that Santa Claus wasn't going to come because there wasn't any snow, so I skated down the aisle of the Methodist church in my Santa Claus suit on roller skates with an umbrella over my head. It got the biggest yuk the Methodists ever let out!"

Barbara Whiting, star of CBS's "Junior Miss": "The super holiday was the first time I was allowed to stay up all Christmas Eve to welcome the twenty-fifth. We always had a big party at our house, and the older I got, the harder it was to drive me from the festivities to my trundle bed. Took years of coaxing and pleading, and finally, maybe just out of self defense, the Whiting parties were increased by one—me."

Hal "Gildersleeve" Peary: "My most memorable Christmas was a soul-satisfying one.

"It occurred in 1941. Like millions of other shoppers, I was rushing through the mad hustle of last-minute Christmas shopping in a local department store when I stopped in the toy department to rest for a moment.

"I saw one of those typical Santa Clauses with children flocked around

him and I watched him for a time. He looked tired. As I watched, a sudden thought came to me. There must be many Santa Clauses around Los Angeles, Hollywood and neighborhood cities who took these jobs because they needed the work badly. While they were exuding Christmas cheer and jollity, few if any people realized that possibly Santa Claus himself wasn't going to have a very good Christmas.

"What if someone put on a Christmas party for all the Santa Clauses he could bring together? Why shouldn't that man be me? So I did. I postponed my Christmas celebration until later in the day and had a Christmas Day breakfast for the Santa Clauses at a Hollywood restaurant and almost fifty were on hand for the party, still wearing their Santa Claus suits! There were presents for all of them, too, and we had a wonderful time. Believe me, it was a Christmas I won't soon forget!"

Beverly Wills, of "Junior Miss": "My most memorable Christmas happened a few years ago. It was the kind of holiday you read about—carol singing, games, a big—but not too big—group, surrounded by friends. My mother (Joan Davis), my father and I were invited to one of the famous Whiting parties, and

Yes, Christmas is for the children; their joy is ours."

Jack Smith, CBS singing star: "My most memorable Christmas is due December 25, 1948. It will be the first one that I've spent in my home

8. War in Palestine and the assassination of Bernadotte.
9. Death of Babe Ruth.
10. The spy investigations (Bentley, Chambers, Hiss).

Out of the running entirely were such some-time sensations as the Henry Wallace campaign, the Carole Landis suicide, the birth of Princess Elizabeth's heir, the Robert Walker-Bob Mitchum escapades and the peregrinations of Lana Turner and Company.

Rumors Are Flying

Edgar Bergen may change his mind about retiring and wind up on CBS too. . . . Also, if Fred Allen retires for the next year, he'll do six guest appearances with Bing—which isn't exactly retiring. . . . "Mr. Ace and Jane" will probably remain on CBS as a sustaining feature, even though their sponsor cancels as of December 31. Reception accorded them by the trade and the critics didn't go unnoticed. . . . "Your Lucky Strike"

Radio is leaving no stone unturned in an effort to discover talent these days—and cigarette sponsors are missing no bets in urging the housewives to join the nicotine slaves. This combination adds up to "Your Lucky Strike," KNX, 2:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Don Ameche is the emcee-interviewer-father confessor, even as Arthur Godfrey and Ted Mack are on

their respective shows. He holds the program together and manages a smooth transition from contestant to contestant. The talent is just about what you'd expect if you've ever listened to either "Talent Scouts" or "Original Amateur Hour," not amateur and not quite professional. The move into daytime radio is a welcome one for listeners who like air fare and are tired of soap operas. Further tie-up with housewife listeners is the judging gimmick, whereby three ladies at home listen by phone and judge the three contestants. Studio audience picks the winner if the ladies disagree.

Only detriment that we can list on the new venture is the horrific cigarette commercial repeated with insane enthusiasm—it's the one about feeling "your level best." Jack Benny has it though, and look what he's been doing these days.

"Remember That Music?"

We had a nice jolt Tuesday evening, when we dialed KFT's 6:15 p.m. period.

Under the beguiling title, "Remember That Music?" the station has been programming, for some weeks, "nowhere" new recordings of old tunes. Through a very happy change of heart, Andy Mansfield has now been given the same time and program, to play his collection of genuine old-timey pieces made twelve or fifteen years ago.

Rudy Vallee's "Deep Night" was Andy's theme for the evening we listened, and he will vary with other old chestnuts from week to week. We also heard Bing sing "I Found a Million Dollar Baby" (in his most buh-buh-boo style), and Whiteman's early orchestra (with Zeiderbecke, Dorsey and Trumbauer) play "Back in Your Own Back Yard."

Andy is now assembling some of the best of the Bert Williams tunes featured by Phil Harris and Leah Ray at the Cocoanut Grove; Jimmy Greer specialties; Gus Arnheim favorites. His personal library of over 10,000 records includes Coon-Sanders, George Olson, Earl Burtnett, ad infinitum. And, we can hardly wait to hear the waxings of "The Three Ambassadors" (one of whom was "our own Jack Smith") which he gleefully informs us he also has on file.

"Remember That Music?" should now hit a "yes!" response from many, many listeners. Matter of fact, fifteen minutes a week seems a singularly small amount of time for such unusual recorded listening. Not just because Andy is a Radio Life columnist, but because we genuinely like his show,

. . . To Milton J. Cross's contagious enthusiasm about his musical charges on "Piano Playhouse" and the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts.

. . . To the "Quiet Please" tale of the three kings on their way to Bethlehem—and to narrator Ernest Chappell and writer Willis Cooper for doing it so well.

. . . To Danny Kaye for his appearance on Louella Parsons' show last week—and for his rendition of the fine old classic, "Ballin' the Jack."

. . . To the overwhelming frankness of Arthur Godfrey's commercials. "I'm here to sell yuh Lipton's Tea. Not you folks who already drink it, but you other clunks."

. . . To Leon Errol for recreating his original role in "Sally" on the "Railroad Hour" twenty-seven years after he first appeared in it on Broadway—and for being charming, comic and traditional.

We View With Alarm

. . . The lack of Christmas music on the air, as late as two weeks before Christmas. The disc jockeys fell down on the job particularly hard, we thought.

. . . The messy transitions between station breaks and transcribed programs. This is what we've been hearing: A long pause, the station break, another pause, the live announcer's voice saying, "The following program is transcribed," and breaking into the last word, the announcer on the transcription saying, "The following program is transcribed." This is the sort of sloppy work which causes heads to roll in motion-picture technical departments—yet is practically accepted practice in radio.

"Cavalcade" Thrill

One of the most heart-tugging, best presented broadcasts of the season was Cornelia Otis Skinner's story of her father, "Family Circle," featured on the "Cavalcade of America" last Monday (December 13). Cornelia's father, in case you have a short memory, was

the much acclaimed American actor, Otis Skinner, whose trouping brought the theater closer to thousands of his countrymen.

Perfect casting, on this occasion, set Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., in the role of Otis, Patricia Neal as his wife, Maud, and author-actress Cornelia as herself in both the narration and portrayal. We have never heard Doug in a more apt characterization, nor heard Cornelia Otis Skinner speak with such emotion and sincerity. After the last scene, which had Otis accompanying his daughter in her Broadway debut, Cornelia sounded close to tears. We were just as close.

We have just one resolution for the New Year—to continue and increase our efforts to make our views known. We don't want to take radio entertainment away from our children—we just want to be sure it is entertainment. We don't want to hurt business for broadcasters—we'd just like to prove that good radio can be good business, too. We don't want to frighten away sponsors—we'd like them to know that 190,000 families in this area is a market which is theirs in return for children's programs that we can conscientiously support.

TELEVISION TIPS

If facts and figures bore you . . . skip this paragraph. For you who want to know how many fellow-viewers are building up an audience mark that will boost competition, which in turn will boost programming, here you are. Just under 1,000,000 video sets are now in use, with 2,000,000 predicted by the end of 1949, "according to current production estimates." Philco alone has set a production schedule of 10,000 per week for next year, and the rest of the big outfits won't lag behind. Too, approximately 100 smaller manufacturers have entered the field this past year. The only factor that might stymie plenty for all would be the tube and steel shortage.

One of New York's top tele shows, Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town," will move to KTTV (Channel 11) after the December 19 and 26 showings over KFI-TV (Channel 9), 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. Via kinescope, of course.

A press showing of one of these kinescope films left the impression that the Coast can easily match talent paraded in the East (with the exception of that wonderful dog act, "The Bricklayers"), but it also left the impression that this Coast will have to go some to match Ed Sullivan's emcee work, both as a personality and as a boy who can draw guests.

That drawing of guests to his show brings up another point. Why don't variety shows on TV here spark up the entertainment with a big enough audience to provide the laughter and applause that lead home viewers to believe they are seeing the very best. Ed Sullivan wisely draws the cream crowd by spotting and introducing audience members. The TV camera pans to these audience members, who rise and bow to acknowledge both the introduction and the plug for their work, which Sullivan slips into the intro.

The foregoing is not to minimize the entertainment value of "Toast of the Town." It's a jolly show, as you viewers will soon see.

Arrangements are full and showy, yet do not overshadow the fine vocal work of soloists Genevieve Rowe, Lillian Cornell and Lawrence Brooks. Particularly well done and seldom heard is "Your Land and My Land"—with its stirring martial strain and brilliant brass sounding a Chord in G for RCA-Victor. . . . **POP ALBUM**

OF THE WEEK: Capitol's "Giants of Jazz" with its six sides bulging with top names is definitely a collector's item. . . . Here is jazz from the picture "A Song Is Born," and where else could you find the Golden Gate Quartet, vocalist Jeri Sullivan, Benny Goodman, Tommy Dorsey, Charlie Barnet, Mel Powell, Louis Armstrong and a score of the country's best side men all on one hunk of shellac? OF THE WEEK: To Phil Green and his Orchestra, with Pat Dodd at the piano, goes a three-note rating for their excellent double-sided London waxing of Richard Rogers' "Slaughter on Tenth Avenue." . . . Here is concert jazz at its best, and once heard will be oft repeated. Jim Hawthorne, star of ABC's "Hawthorne Thing": "My most memorable Christmas was my first one. I was one month and nine days old and it was shortly after I had accepted my first job, Adult Sitting. Being small for my age, I was tiny. Well, I decided that my parents should have their Christmas socks filled with the usual goodies, toys, etc. As these socks are usually hung on the mantelpiece, this proved a problem for me as I could barely reach the top of the mantel. This was solved by me in this way: I purchased a carload of fast-rising yeast and mixed it into the batter of a three-layer cake. Needless to say, I rose to the occasion. I felt crummy when, without warning, my parents returned home! In a panic I quickly hid in the nearest available place—one of the socks I was to fill. The reason that this Christmas was so memorable to me is the fact that my mother and father didn't discover me until thirteen years later. But I suppose I shouldn't kick, as in this sock I conceived the idea for my present air show on ABC."

Peter Potter, KFWB disc jockey: "When I think of happy Christmases, I'll always remember a little eight-year-old boy who wanted a bike. His mommy and daddy promised him one if he would be a good boy. During the week before Christmas he 'forgot' to come home for lunch three times. Each time his mommy and daddy said he wouldn't get that bike if he didn't come home for lunch. Gordon MacRae, star of ABC's "Railroad Hour": "How could I forget the Christmas of 1943? I was in the Army, an air cadet, and I had arranged to meet my wife in the lobby of the Gunther Hotel in San Antonio. Sheilah had to travel from New York to keep the appointment, and she was expecting a baby at the time. Nothing went right at first. When I entered the lobby Sheilah didn't recognize me in my long GI overcoat, trailing down to my ankles. Besides, I was late and had a hard time getting a pass. We just sat and twiddled our thumbs. We were tired and disappointed. And all I had was twenty-five cents. It was then that Santa Claus, quite out of uniform, showed up in the person of a matron from the Cadet Club. She had a standing offer to all married cadets—who could prove they were married, and we could—of a three-day pass, Christmas gifts and a wonderful dinner. It was a glorious, un-

or the cameras would be way behind the ball. The technical director inside the mobile unit has to know football too. He is the man in charge of all the mixing, even down to running in the Gillette film commercials at half and quarter time.

"Mixing" means synthesizing pictures from each camera with one another and with sound. If the director mixed two pictures, say one from a long- and one from a short-shot camera, and didn't pick up at least the formation around a hidden ball play while the sports announcer was pointing out the hidden ball, the result would be pretty flat for viewers. Follow me?"

Easy to see why these two months of practice on the games being played in the Rose Bowl have been so valuable. Probably a helpful psychological factor is the knowledge that the Rose Bowl contract covers not only the 1949 game, but the 1950 and 1951 epics. Should anything unprecedented happen, it could be cleared up in subsequent telecasts, with a whole year to iron out the kinks.

Mr. Conn smiles at this suggestion, and invariably knocks on the nearest wood. "We're pretty certain it will be a good telecast. About the only thing we aren't sure of is who will

play in the game. That wouldn't be much help technically, sure, but what odds we could get betting on possible contenders," Mr. Conn quipped, during our early November interview with him. "Outside of that we have anticipated everything possible."

Everything, Mr. Conn? Exactly twenty years ago, in the University of California-Georgia Tech tilt in this same Rose Bowl, Roy Riegels astounded spectators, opponents and his own team by recovering a fumble and speeding sixty-five yards down the field the *wrong way*, to lose the game for California. Are the cameramen prepared in case history should repeat itself?

With a show that's dedicated to the young . . . and the young in heart, another old radio favorite, Al Jarvis, presents "The Adventures of Squeaky Mulligan, the Talking Cat," over Lucky Channel 13, KLAC-TV, from 7:00 to 7:15 Monday nights.

Guest stars will weekly do their stuff with "Squeaky" as a critical audience, and Al's favorite heckler, Marilyn Jarvis, will weekly soothe the kids with a lullaby a la Schumann-Heinck. You can't beat an animal act, even a little stuffed . . . woops! . . . a little "simulated" animal like "Squeaky."

At the risk of being presumptuous, we can't help suggesting that Rita LaRoy is hiding a lot of light under a bushel by use of the title "Who's That Girl?" for a clever weekly show that packs dramatics, excellent staging, comedy and her own ad-lib artistry into a half hour.

The "Girl" in question is a masked feminine guest of note. Contestants on the show (chosen from mail applications) shoot at guessing her identity, true enough, but before they qualify to guess, each must participate in a skit based on a historical figure or incident. Rita's models help in the skits, and the costuming, staging and dialogue are exceptional. If the contestant can guess what role he or she played in this skit, then he gets in on the guessing and the subsequent good prizes.

We won't even try to suggest a title that would tell all about the show, but we can suggest that you catch this 8:00 p.m. Tuesday spot on KTLA (Channel 5).

Jimmy's a Gentleman

A Glimpse Into the Real Life of the East-Side Boy Who Grew Up to Be an Ace Comic From Swank Beverly Hills

CLOSE your eyes and you can see him . . . his wiry figure hunched over the keyboard . . . hat cocked on his thinning hair . . . generous grin . . . wickedly merry eyes . . . every atom of his body reverberating to the rhythm of the music he's ripping out while he shouts and rasps the lyrics of "Umbriago" . . . just a rough 'n' tumble character who has probably massacred more three-syllable words than anyone else who speaks English (and

that "includes in" Samuel Goldwyn). Just another boy from the East Side who sprinted onto Broadway and straight into the elect coterie of big names in showbiz. Jimmy Durante.

Somehow or other Jimmy always seems just to have arrived at the NBC studios from some humble walk-up flat . . . he's that warm and friendly and human. He's one of the people and it's hard to picture him rolling around town in an expensive car, eating leisurely meals in swank restaurants, going to sleep in a luxurious room in a fine home on one of Beverly Hills' secluded avenues. But

the sturdy income derived from his multiple entertainment activities permits Da Schnozzola to enjoy most of the subtle touches of life and, to coin a cliché, it couldn't happen to a nicer person . . . or a more sensible one . . . for J. Durante will always be the same.

This New Year's Eve he will be celebrating at home with a few cronies. For twenty years he had to pass up such pleasant occasions while he and his buddies entertained others in night club or on stage. So now, for Jimmy, it's home and a few friends who'll laugh away the night with him and stick around until breakfast time January 1, 1949.

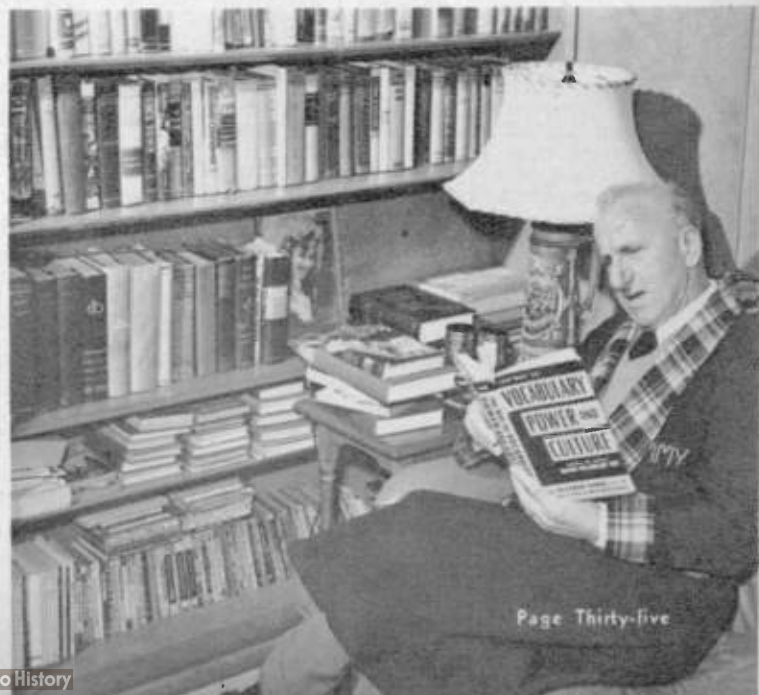
Last year, Jimmy had planned to

hold a small party in his home. Then, instead, the doctors told him he would be in the hospital being prepared for surgery. When New Year's Eve closed in, Durante lay on his stark hospital bed and felt very lonesome and unhappy. Grabbing the nearby telephone, he sent for three or four bosom pals, who drove to the hospital just before midnight and parked outside the entrance. Durante slipped out of bed, eased out of his white nightgown, scurried into his suit, and stole out to the car. The old year died. 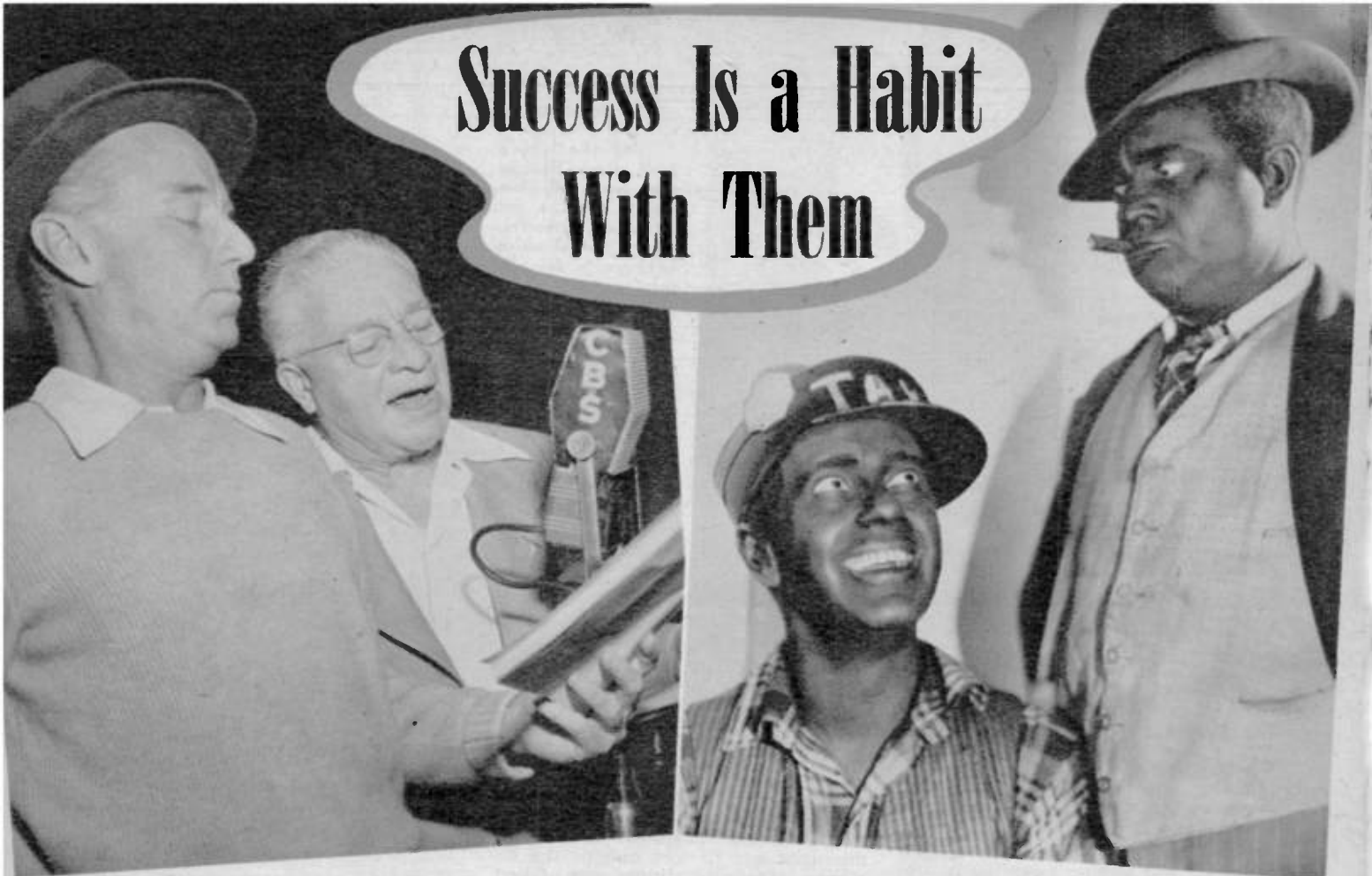

SHOW-BUSINESS historians have never quite decided whether Marconi made a success out of "Amos 'n' Andy"—or whether it was vice versa! Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll were certainly the first personalities to make radio listening an American habit, and like Marconi they created their "inventions" out of their understanding of the elements at hand plus their own imaginations.

On network radio since August, 1929 (and radio actors since 1920!) the two have made a habit of establishing records. And they're still doing it. After their show recently moved from NBC, the first announcement of the opening of the new Sunday night series brought CBS six ticket requests for every seat available for the first broadcast. Only enough tickets to fill the studio were issued, and even at that, Columbia Square was jammed by non-ticket-holders who started gathering two hours before airtime, hoping by an odd chance to get in. A public-address

system was turned up in the lobby so that the faithful could hear the show, even if they couldn't see it!

Legends Americana

During their first phenomenal rise to success, the legends of "Amos 'n' Andy" popularity grew. A president was said to have changed the air time scheduled for his speech—it was at the "Amos 'n' Andy" hour and he not only did not wish to disturb the nation's listening habit, he himself wanted to hear the chapter that night. There was the story of the firemen who, distraught because the alarm sounded just as they were waiting for the show to start, put out the fire in record time, saved the radio and sat down to listen. And the murder suspect who not only claimed that he hadn't killed any-

one, but also that he wouldn't kill anyone at the time "Amos 'n' Andy" were on the air—the established time of the crime. His alibi was the "Amos 'n' Andy" story line, which he quoted accurately to prove his case!

Canadian Faithful

In Hamilton, Ontario, a radio sponsor made the unprecedented gesture of buying fifteen minutes of *silence* on his local station so that listeners to the Buffalo, New York, station could hear the program without interference. Recently, a Montreal dispatch to an American trade paper revealed that "Amos 'n' Andy" had again exerted their charm over Canadian listeners. A four-year-old Dominion program, "Music for Canadians," was canceled because "Amos

'n' Andy" were set to be carried on another network at the same hour. "We were realistic," stated a representative of the Canadian program, "our sponsor agreed with us and we canceled the show."

The perennial success of the black-face team is a point scored in favor of efficiency and order rather than informality and luck. Gosden and Correll themselves keep rigid office hours in the preparation of each program. In their early radio days they often worked all night to make sure they'd have a satisfactory script for the following evening. As they hit their stride they gained confidence and worked quickly. At one time there was a story going the rounds at WGN (their station at that time) that the boys would dash into a room adjoining their studio a half-hour before air time and come darting out with a finished script and ten extra minutes for chit-chat. Nowadays they're in their office at nine in the morning, every morning except that of the broadcast. By Friday of each week they have a story line for the following week's program. Tuesday there is a story meeting and talk that may lead to a few changes—or to throwing out the whole script. Wednesdays and Thursdays, the staff has a run-through. Friday is a private rehearsal with writers, cast and stars. It can happen that the whole script is thrown out at this point, too, but that seldom occurs. Minor changes are made and dress rehearsal is set. Sunday at 11:30 a.m. finds the whole production getting a strenuous run-

expected climax, and certainly made that Christmas unforgettable for Sheila and me."

Abbott and Costello: "Our most memorable Christmas was not when Santa Claus came down our chimney but when we played Santa Claus. It was last Christmas at the Yuletide party for our 10,000 adopted kids at the Lou Costello, Junior, Youth Foundation. We never had a happier time than we did passing out prizes to those happy youngsters and entertaining them. Nothing anyone could wrap in a package and tie in pretty ribbons could compare with the thrill we received on that unforgettable evening."

Anna Roosevelt, ABC commentator: "My most memorable Christmas was spent in Seattle, the second year the children and I were not with the family at the White House. I had planned to arrange a wonderful Christmas for the children. Then I became ill, and had to go to the hospital. At the hospital I received a wire from mother and dad. They had decided jointly to submit to a Christmas separation for the first time since they were married, so that mother could fly to Seattle and arrange the Christmas festivities I had planned for the children! To make the Christmas perfect, I was taken home from the hospital by ambulance to be present at the party."

J. Carroll Naish, star of CBS's "Life with Luigi": "This will be my most memorable Christmas if the show gets a sponsor. However, Christmas of 1924 was quite memorable, too. I had stayed in France following my war service and had joined various road companies there. My career as an actor was suddenly ended when the traveling company folded in Brussels, Belgium, and I was broke. I was certain that none of my family knew where I was, but I took a chance on Christmas eve and wired Paris to ask if I had any messages. To my delight, there was a message—and a one-hundred-dollar money order with greetings from my father in New York!"

Jack Carson, CBS star: "I'll never forget the Christmas of 1933 when Dave Willock and I were playing in vaudeville in Minneapolis, nor will the boys of the Civic Club there ever forget it either."

"They invited Dave and me for their private Christmas party and

added a sly, 'And bring your friends!' By the friends, of course, they meant the girls in the chorus. And, to face facts, it was the gals they wanted—not us."

"So, we arrived for the party—a really wonderful banquet of turkey and all the trimmings—with chairs conspicuously empty for 'our friends' arriving shortly."

"The toastmaster introduced us and I made a short speech thanking the club for inviting us and our friends—gave Dave, standing at a side door, a cue and said 'Here they are!'"

"The club members rose as one wolf and then stood open-mouthed as our friends trooped in and sat down at the creaking table—15 down-and-outers from Minneapolis missions!"

Howard Duff, star of CBS's "Sam Spade": "The 1948 Christmas season will be a happy one for me. I'm grateful to fans and friends for the recognition and encouragement they have given me in the past year—those votes of confidence make for a happy Christmas and a bright New Year to come."

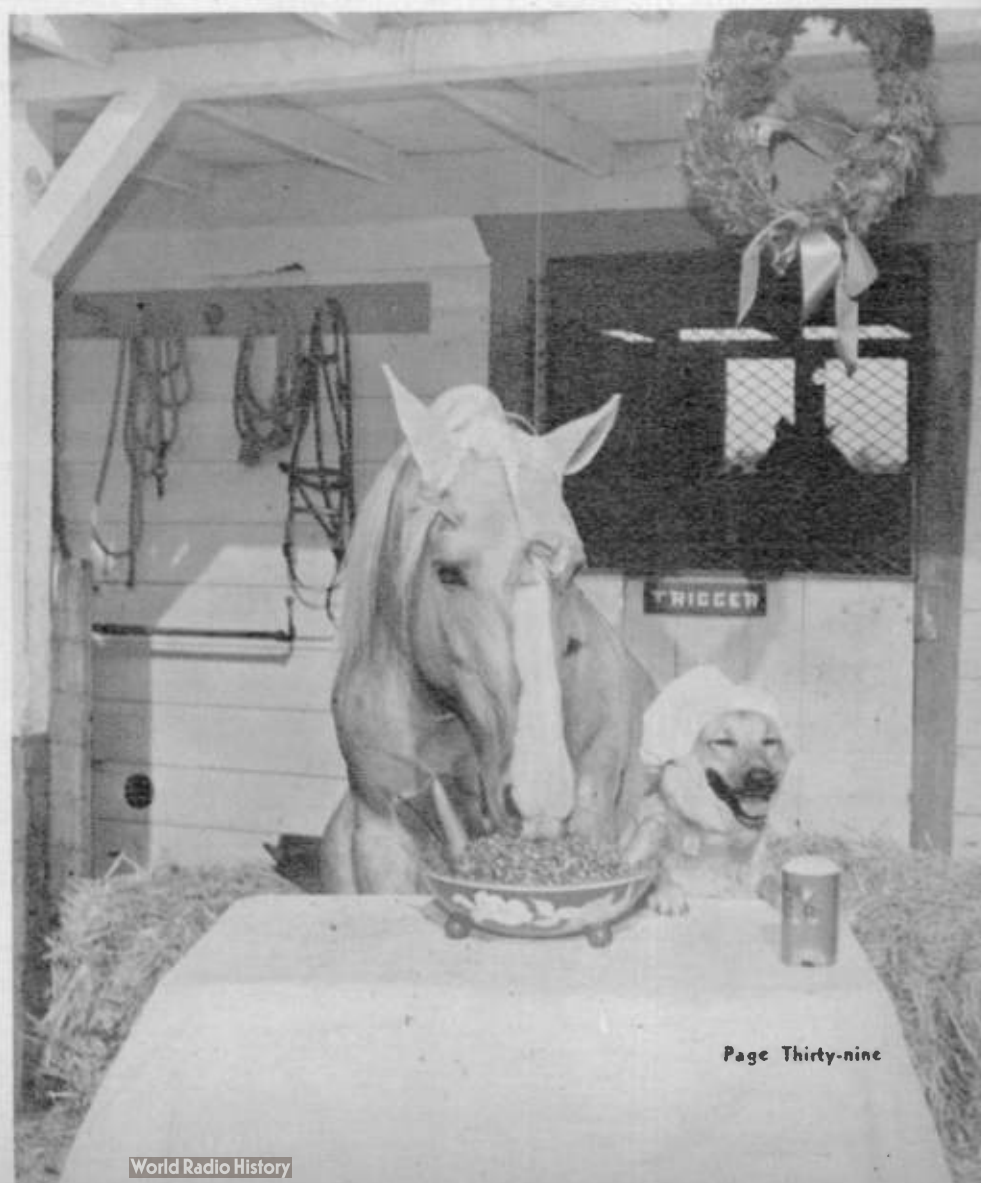

through and recording right up until the show is done live at 5:30 p.m.

Back of these hard-working stars is an equally hard-working staff. Head writer Bob Ross has been with the show since 1938. Secretary Louise Summa, who "knows everything about the business organization," has been doing her job since 1932.

On the air continuously twice each night from 1929 to the time they left the air as a fifteen-minute strip in 1943, "the boys" took but one summer vacation, in 1934. Week-long preparation for their present half-hour series is as rigid a regime. In their well-organized share-and-share-alike company there's one job definitely earmarked as Correll's—in his high-school days he took a commercial course, and he still types the finished "Amos 'n' Andy" script!
